



ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twenty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held on the evening of the 17th January, in the Lecture Room of the Church, and was very largely attended. After devotional exercises, conducted by the Pastor, Mr. Walter N. Anderson was chosen as Chairman, and Mr. R. M. Gray as Secretary of the Meeting. The minutes of the previous Annual Meeting were read and confirmed.

The Managers' Report for the year was read by Mr. John Lowden, and the Financial Statement by Mr. John Y. Reid.

It was moved by Mr. H. W. Darling, seconded by Mr. Alexander Nairn, and carried, "That the Report and Statement be received and adopted, and that the thanks of the congregation be tendered to the Treasurer, for the manner in which he has discharged his important and laborious duties."

The names of the retiring Managers were read, viz.: Messrs. Reid, McDonald, Steele, Darling, McEwan and Lowden. The whole six were reelected.

Dr. King, and expressed their high regard for Mr. Taylor, their deep sense of the value of the service rendered by him, and their sorrow at his removal.

Thereafter, Mr. H. W. Darling, in the name of the congregation, presented to Mr. Taylor a valuable gold watch, and to Mrs. Taylor, a beautiful clock and a set of silver dish-covers.

Mr. Taylor made brief, but impressive and appropriate, replies to these presentations.

appropriate, replies to these precention of the ser-The question of the use of an organ in the service of praise having been introduced, it was moved by Mr. William Kerr, seconded by Mr. David Picken, "That, in the opinion of the congregation, it seems desirable that the aid of an organ be now employed in the service of praise; that the Session be respectfully requested to give its sanction to this change, it being understood that nothing be done towards the effecting of the change until the whole amount of the money required is subscribed, and that in the event of the Session giving its concurrence, the following be a Committee to carry the resolution into effect: Messrs. John Douglas, W. D. McIntosh, Thomas Woodbridge, H. W. Darling, John Lowden, D. McEwan, and A. A. Allan."

It was moved, in amendment, by Mr. John Brown, and seconded by Mr. John Y. Reid, "That in the opinion of this meeting it is not expedient to introduce an organ or any instrumental music into the service of praise of this congregation."

The motion and amendment having been put, the former was carried by a large majority.

After a vote of thanks to the Chairman, the meeting was closed with the benediction.

ADDRESS FROM THE SESSION.

DEAR BRETHREN,—It has been usual for some years to accompany the various Congregational Reports with a few words from the Session. A brief statement is all that is needed on the present occasion.

There is not much of an eventful character which has marked the history or life of the congregation during the past year, and yet no year is an exact repetition of the preceding one.

The number of members in full communion is slightly in advance of what it was a year ago; fiftyfour were added during the year, thirty-eight by certificate and sixteen by profession of faith; fifty were removed by death, change of residence, or other causes. The communicants on the roll on the 1st January number five hundred and twelve. It is to be regretted that every year some remove from the city without giving any intimation of their intention, or asking any attestation of Christian character.

It is a matter for thanksgiving that the hand of death has been but lightly laid on us during the year. In a congregation in another city, the numbers of which do not differ greatly from our own, the Annual Report makes mention of the removal by death of nineteen members in full communion. In our own, three only have been thus removed : Mrs. Lindsay, Mrs. Ridler, and Mrs. Dr. Burns. They died, all of them, in faith on that Saviour whom in widely different spheres they had trusted

The last filled so large and so important a place in the religious life of the city, and had taken, for more than thirty years, so prominent and useful a part in sustaining many of its charitable institutions, that special attention may be called to the loss sustained by her death. Her connection with this congregation was of incalculable benefit to it at the period when it was weak and struggling, and to the last its interests were very dear to her. She was devotedly attached to the Church of Christ, and would have sacrificed anything to promote its advancement. May many of the young learn to imitate this feature in the character of the deceased !

An important event in our history has been the removal of Mr. Taylor to Winnipeg, consequent on his appointment to the Bench of Manitoba. The minute adopted respecting him may properly find a place here. "In accepting, as it now does, the resignation of Mr. Taylor, Elder and Clerk of Session, the Session desires to put on record the deep sense which it entertains of the loss sustained by his removal, in view of his many excellent personal qualities, of the fidelity and zeal with which he has discharged the duties of the Eldership, of the important service which he has rendered to the congregation by the uniform courtesy and kindness of his bearing to its members and by the wisdom of his counsels in times of difficulty. It has received with gratification the expression of his regard for the members of the Session, with whom he has so long acted, and of his regret at his separation from them. It reciprocates heartily the regard and regret thus expressed, while it follows him to his new sphere of labour, with the earnest prayer that God may bless him and more and more make him a blessing."

In closing, the Session may be permitted to say that it has learned, with much gratification, the fact that the contributions to the Missionary and Educational Schemes of the General Assembly have been so well sustained, notwithstanding the special efforts put forth to reduce the debt of the Church and to endow Knox College.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

Another year has drawn to a close, and your Managers have much pleasure in presenting their Twenty-ninth Annual Report.

The Treasurer's Statement will, they think, be received with a great deal of satisfaction, as the receipts shew an increase under every head.

The total receipts for the year amount to \$11,568.90; the disbursements, to \$11,276.89; and the balance on hand, December 31st, \$802.48; shewing an increase of \$292.01 over the balance carried over last year.

From the Treasurer's Report it will be seen that there has been a decrease in the expenditure of \$448.61, while, at the same time, we have paid for insurance \$234, which will not occur again for

three years. The Managers, in view of the probable revenue and the obligations of the current year, are of opinion that the stipend of the Pastor should be increased by \$500 per annum, and it is hoped the congregation will concur in this recommendation. At the last Annual Meeting a motion was passed

At the last Annual Meeting a motion debt, and recommending a reduction in the church debt, and leaving the matter in the hands of the Session and Managers to take immediate action.

In pursuance of this, early in the year, a joint meeting of the Session and Managers was held, and a committee appointed to solicit subscriptions from the congregation. This committee have, so far, obtained subscriptions amounting to \$10,960, of which \$5,430 has been paid, the balance pay-There has also been able in one or two years. paid on the original subscription list \$582, making Of the \$8,000, which at our last in all \$6,012. has end blessin entere The very anxious to reduce to at least \$15,000, so that they may have no difficulty in meeting the interest from the ordinary revenue, and as the Building Fund Committee have still a large number in the congregation to call on, they trust that they will be met by the same spirit of liberality which has always been shewn by the members of this congregation.

It is with mingled feelings of regret and satisfaction that an intimation has been received, while this report was in course of preparation, that we are to lose from amongst our number one of our oldest and most valued members; satisfaction, that the Government has recognized his long experience and eminent qualifications in promoting T. W. Taylor, Esq., Q.C., to the Bench in Manitoba; and regret that this will necessarily sever his connection with us, and that we shall lose the benefit of his wise counsels and unremitting interest in the affairs of the congregation.

As a congregation we have much cause for thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church for the prosperity, good feeling and harmony which has existed amongst us, and we pray that His blessing may attend us in the year we have just entered.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL.

The year just closed has been one of the most satisfactory in the history of the school. The attendance of both teachers and scholars has been very steady. There has been again an advance on

the amount contributed for Missionary purposes. A considerable number of the scholars have, during the course of the year, made profession of their faith in Christ. While death has claimed some who in former years were in attendance on the school, no name has been removed from the list either of teachers or scholars from this cause. Twice, in succession, we have been permitted to make this unusual announcement. Those to whom the lives of these children are very dear may surely find in the fact a call to thankfulness.

The number of names on the roll is, of boys, 125; of girls, 186—in all, 311, being a diminution of 6. In the infant class, which is still under the the care of Miss Caven and Miss Inglis, there are on the roll 45 boys and 34 girls, in all 79.

The number of teachers on the roll is the same as in the former year, 33; of whom 14 are male and 19 female teachers. Mr. Kirkland still continues to teach the class for young women meeting in the Ladies' Parlor. The number on the roll is 44, and the average attendance does not fall far short of this number.

There has been about the usual number of changes in the staff of teachers. Owing to removal from the city, sickness and other causes, the school has had to lose the services for the present of Miss Taylor, Mr. George Brown, Mrs. King, Miss Millar and Mrs. John Paton. On the other hand there have been added, Miss Berry, Miss Phœbe Mackay, Miss Alice Smith, and Messrs. Smith and Campbell.

The Library continues to be a great source of interest to the scholars. The Librarians, Messrs. Douglas and Gibson, who have undertaken to manage it since the regretted removal to Montreal of Messrs. Messrs. aken to Iontreal nald, revolumes, selected with much care, have been added in the course of the year. In November, a case containing some 150 volumes, which had been long in use, was sent along with a number of illustrated papers to our Missionary in the Manitoulin Island, who had requested a contribution of this kind for his large but destitute field.

The usual summer gathering was held at High Park on the 24th June, and was to both the children and their friends a most enjoyable time. The Anniversary of the School had been held on the evening of the 30th December, 1882. There was a large attendance. The children were addressed by the Rev. Wm. Inglis and Mr. J. K. McDonald. Mr. Kirkland added much to the interest of the occasion by giving views of some of the more striking characters and incidents of the "Pilgrim's Progress."

A weekly meeting for the preparation of the Lesson has been maintained during a great part of the year. Occasional meetings have been held for business; while the brief season of prayer after the dismission of the School has been continued, and has been found to be, to all participating in it, a source of great spiritual comfort and strength.

The Treasurer reports \$292.58 as contributed by the School during the year for Missionary purposes, to which \$8.64 have to be added as the results of interest on deposits, and a small balance, making in all \$301.22, an increase of \$20.22 over last year. This amount has been allocated as follows:

A class for young men continues to meet on Sabbath afternoon at a quarter past three. The subject of study for the present year is the Acts of the Apostles. The number on the roll is fiftynine, most of whom are in regular attendance. A communicants' class also met on Tuesday evening at a quarter to eight o'clock for ten weeks in the early part of the year, and was resumed in November last. The attendance was good, seldom falling below forty, and the results encouraging.

Mr. Kirkland teaches, in connection with the Sabbath School, an advanced class for young women. The class joins in the opening exercises of the School and then adjourns to the Ladies' Parlour. The attendance has been larger than during any previous year.

REPORT.

The Association has now entered upon the third year of its work in its present form. There can now be no doubt that the change made three years ago, from a Young Men's to a Young People's Association, was a proper and judicious one, but it can scarcely be said that the hopes which were entertained at the beginning have been fully realized. There is still much room for the Association to expand, both in numbers and usefulness. The danger into which Young People's Associations seem peculiarly liable to fall is that of having the work done, and consequently the benefit, or the larger part of it, shared by a few.

Our own Association has not been altogether able to avoid this danger, though its efforts to attain the objects for which it was instituted have, we are convinced, been by no means wanting in success. It is hoped that ere long the Association may be started upon a still more useful career through the interest taken in it by the young people of the congregation becoming more widespread, and through a more general participation

in its work by those who are now its members. A new departure was taken in the method of

A new departure was taken in the reorganization conducting the Association upon its reorganization for the present season. Its success, it was thought, would be promoted if the meetings were held at the homes of the members instead of in its rooms at the church. The experiment gives every promise of being productive of excellent results.

of being productive of excellent tensor of seven ordinary meetings of the Association were held during the first part of the year (1882), the season's work closing with a well attended open meeting on the 17th of April. The operations of the Association were resumed on the 7th of December, 1882, and two meetings were held before the close of the year.

During the year there were given (exclusive of the open meeting programme) four piano solos, nine essays, nine songs, and twelve readings. The Magazine has continued to be a prominent feature in the work, and has been well maintained, seven pieces having been contributed during the season. The membership for the year numbered fifty, and the average attendance was about thirty. The balance in the treasurer's hands at end of the season was \$8.09, as per the following statement.

MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

In presenting another Annual Statement, your Committee is gratified in being able to report a large advance in the contributions of the congregation for Missionary and Educational objects.

There was received through the Collectors, in monthly instalments, \$1,769.67; there was paid directly to the Treasurer, including the collection at the last Annual Meeting, \$323; the collection for Home Missions at the interesting services of yesterday amounted to \$203, which, after deducting necessary expenses and the usual Sabbath collection, leaves \$133. Adding to these sums the interest received for moneys deposited during a part of the year, \$33.88, the entire revenue of the Association will be seen to be \$2,259.55. Of the amount thus reported there were contributed specially for Foreign Missions, \$10 by four little girls, and \$50 by William Gordon; for Formosa, \$20 by Alexander Smith; and for the McAll Mission, Paris, \$30 by George Smith. Deducting these special donations, and \$50.38 paid for Records, which are distributed by the Collectors, with \$7.06 for expenses of advertisement, there remains, exclusive of yesterday's collection \$1,959.11, to be allocated among those schemes of the Church on behalf of which these moneys have been con-

tributed. After much careful consideration, your Committee desires to submit the following allocation of the amount for the approval of the congregation: For the General Assembly's Home Mission Fund,

SON, ASURER. \$1,039.11, increased by the collection of yesterday to \$1,171.11; for the Foreign Mission Fund, \$260; for the College Fund, \$430; for Manitoba College, \$25; for the University Scholarship Fund, \$60; and for French Evangelization, \$145; being a slightly increased amount to each of the four leading objects over the allocation of the last or of any previous year.

This is, however, very far from a complete statement of what the congregation has raised throughout the year for the schemes of the Church. It is necessary to add \$296.22 contributed by the Sabbath School for Home, Foreign and French Mission work; \$200 by the Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, for Foreign Missions; \$75, the collection on the day of public Thanksgiving, for the Aged Ministers' Fund and the Ministers' Widows' Fund; and \$42.40 paid out of ordinary revenue for the Assembly, Presbytery and Synod Funds; in all, \$613.62. In addition there has been paid by members of the congregation during the course of the year, \$301.67, for Knox College Building Fund; \$100 for Manitoba Church and Manse Building Fund; and \$1,400 for Knox College En-Your Committee may be perdowment Fund. mitted to state that it has learned with much satisfaction the liberal response which has been made by members of this congregation to the effort, so hopefully begun, to endow the Institution in Toronto which has done so much for the Church in past years. Every one can see that the endowment of the various Theological Colleges will place the Church in a much better position for overtaking the religious wants of this large and growing country.
