From a speech in the English house of commons on the "State of the nation," Oct. 10, 1831. At the present moment I can see only one question in the state, the question of reform; only two parties—the friends of the bill, and its enemies.

I know only two ways in which societies can permanently be governed—by public opinion and by the sword. A government having at its command the armies, the fleets and the revenues of Great Britain, might possibly hold Ireland by the sword.

Sir, we read that, in old times, when the villains were driven to revolt by oppression—when the castles of the nobility were burned to the ground—when the warehouses of London were laid—when a hundred thousand insurgents appeared in arms on Blackheath—when a foul murder, perpetrated in their presence, had raised their passions to madness—when they were looking round for some captain to succeed and avenge him whom they had lost—just then, before Hob Miller, or Tom Carter, or Jack Straw, could place himself at their head, the king rode up to them, and exclaimed, "I will be your leader!"
