BRITISH MINERS REJECT PEACE OFFER

Women And Children Killed In Shelling of Damascus By French

PROPOSAL FOR WAGE DECREASE IS TURNED DOWN

Delegates Pass Resolution That Slows Up Settlement

OBJECT TO BOARD

See No Reason Why Measures Should Be Reviewed By Committee

LONDON, May 20—The National Conference of miners' delegates today rejected the government's proposals for settlement of the miners' strike.

The delegates adopted a resolution saying: "We are unable to recommend that the mine workers accept Premier Baldwin's proposals for reduction of wages, which do not at present provide for a decent standard of living."

The resolution adopted by the delegates said that the conference was largely in agreement with the legislative and administrative proposals set forth in the Premier's plan, but that the conference could see no reason why these measures should first be reviewed by a coal advisory committee.

AGAINST ARBITRATION

"We further object to the proposal for a board with an independent chairman empowered to abolish the National minimum wage and to enforce various minimum wages by districts," the resolution said.

"We consider that in making this proposal, the Premier is not honoring the pledge he gave to the country in his message broadcast on May 8, which read, 'I wish to make it clear that I can present the government is not fighting a lower standard of living of the miner or any other section of workers.'"

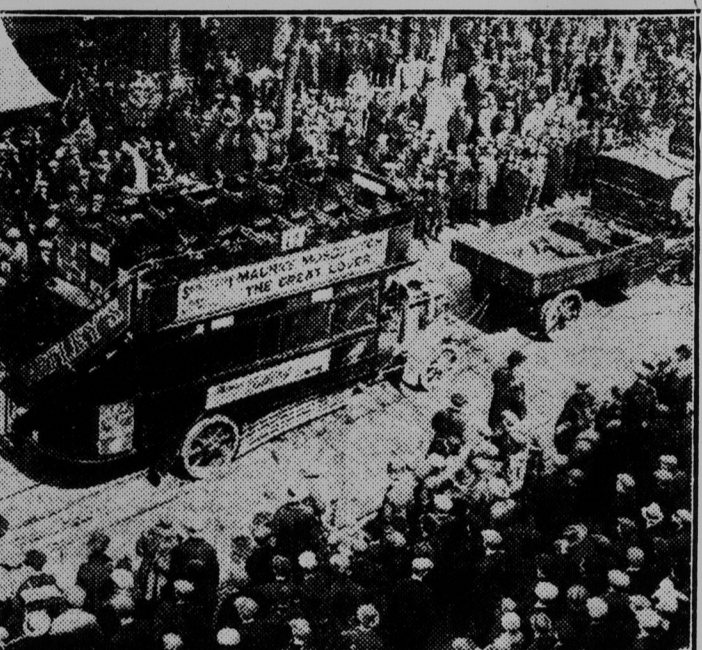
Newton Heights Mother Reports Soon After Quitting Home

One Miss Seized, But She Escapes and Flees To Her Home

MRS. A. STEEVES DEAD, AGED 79

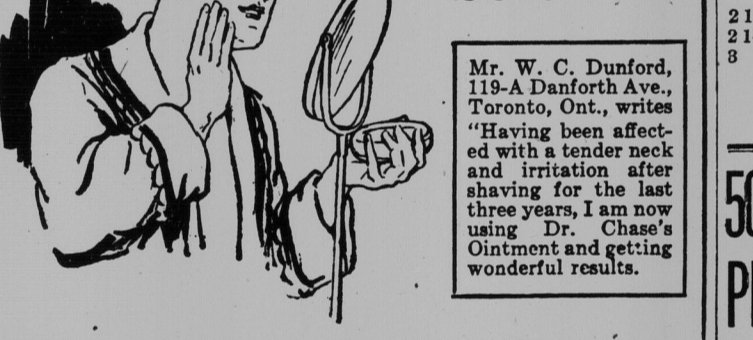
Was Sister of Late John A. Wheaton of Saint John

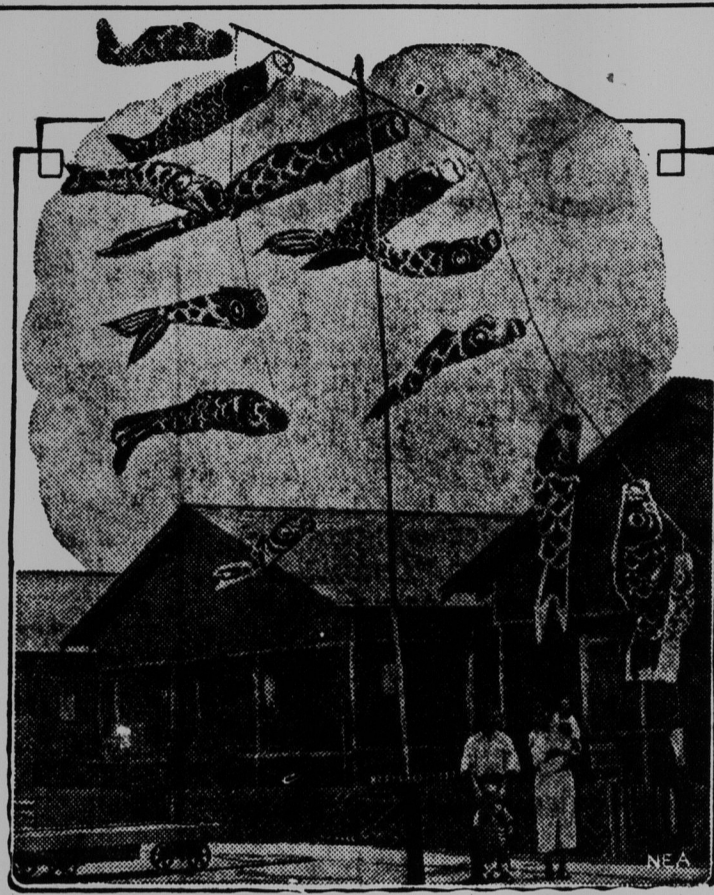

ASIATIC PROGRESS RULES WORLD FUTURE

CHRISTIANITY FACTOR, SAYS EX-CROWN PRINCE

Friedrich Wilhelm, In Exclusive Interview At Locarno, Gives Opinions On World Outlook—Interested In East Indies

SAYS BOYS GOING TO DAY SCHOOL

By BYRON AXEL VON GERTZEN

LOCARNO, May 20—Asiatic awakening and progress, especially in China and India, constitutes the most important and possibly the gravest development now facing the world, Friedrich Wilhelm, former Crown Prince of Germany, declared in an exclusive interview just before he left Locarno for Silesia.

He first denied rumors that he had purchased the village here for either himself or his father, the Ex-Kaiser of Germany.

German ministers visiting here added that probably neither the former Crown Prince nor the former Kaiser would be able to make any foreign investments.

CHRISTIANITY FACTOR "I am convinced," the Crown Prince said, "that the future of the world, and especially of western civilization, depends on the development now going on in Asia and the Pacific. What the outcome will be depends much on the way Christianity is presented to China."

He was especially interested in the development of nationalism in the Dutch East Indies, and in the Indian sub-continent.

EDUCATING CHILDREN "Both my wife and myself are devoting ourselves," he said, "to the task of educating our children and those of all classes to decision, kindness, individual reliance and responsibility in every day life."

"That these efforts are succeeding is evident in the day school at Potsdam where my oldest boys attend and where the students are acquiring quiet, unobtrusive but self-reliant ways."

36 RUSSIANS DIE IN SERIES OF MISHAPS Sinking of Ferry Boat Results in Loss of Nineteen Lives

MOSCOW, May 20.—Thirty-six persons lost their lives yesterday in three accidents in different parts of Russia. The most serious mishap was the sinking of a ferry boat in the middle of the River Sula. Nineteen persons were drowned and eleven saved.

The second accident occurred while a heavy piece of machinery was being transferred from one position to another in the Pribyl plant, near Moscow.

Near Khar'kov, a passenger aeroplane on the Moscow-Tiflis route, crashed, killing two men, one of whom was a member of the staff of the newspaper Pravda.

HOLD REFERENDUM Governor Smith Signs Bill Putting Prohibition up to People

ALBANY, N. Y., May 20.—Prohibition took its place among the issues of next fall's election campaign in this state, with the announcement last night by Governor Smith that he had signed the Karl-Phelps bill providing for a referendum on the question at the general election. Unless the drys seek by court action to prevent submission of the question, which now is considered unlikely, the people of the state at that time will be asked to express their opinion on the following query:

"Should the Congress of the United States modify the Federal Act enforcing the eighteenth amendment so that the same shall not prohibit the manufacture, sale, transportation, importation or exportation of beverages which are not in fact intoxicating as determined in accordance with the law of the respective states?"

Khyber Sanctorum To Become Pilgrims Special to The Times-Star

MONCTON, May 20.—A special meeting of Khyber Sanctorum is to be held tonight at 8 o'clock to lay plans for a pilgrimage to Sackville on Saturday night. It is expected that forty members of the local lodge will leave here on the Ocean Limited on Saturday afternoon, and many others will doubt take advantage of the opening of the roads, to make the trip by auto-

Briand Cabinet Again Endangered By Fall of French Franc

500-Year Old Spanish Coin Found In B. C.

KAMLOOPS, B. C., May 20.—While digging a well at North Kamloops, on the Thompson River, E. E. Merrick found an excellently preserved Spanish coin, dated 1450 A. D., at a depth of 17 feet. W. W. Wade, prominent British Columbia historian, has advanced the explanation that the coin was brought to the interior of the province from the coast by an Indian. The spot where it was found was once the site of a Hudson's Bay Company fort.

U. S. DELEGATE AT ARMS PARLEY AIDS BRITISH

Gibson Sides With Lord Cecil On Armament Destruction

FRENCH DISAGREE Questions Concerning Proposed Disarmament Conference Are Considered

GENEVA, May 20.—British and American plenipotentiaries continue to come into conflict with those of France and the French allies on questions concerning the proposed disarmament conference to be held under the auspices of the League of Nations.

Lord Robert Cecil, British representative, insisted that all defensive armaments, except fortifications, can be used for offensive purposes and that therefore there must be limitation of all such armaments.

Hugh Gibson, American representative, was quick to support Cecil's viewpoint. Gibson declared that it would be difficult to make a distinction in the matter. While coastal and internal land fortifications are generally regarded as defensive, Gibson pointed out, it is possible to utilize them for offensive purposes if they are near a frontier.

QUICK TO BACK CECIL Paul Boncour, of France, and De Broekere of Belgium, were on the front instantly to disagree with the expressions of the American and British delegates' opinion.

DIFFERENCE ESSENTIAL Boncour insisted that it is absolutely imperative to establish a difference between offensive and defensive armaments, especially as regards naval armaments where he contended there is a marked difference. The commission, he said, must seek to limit as much as possible all offensive armaments but must leave individual nations free to develop their own defensive armaments. He contended that such protection is the greatest possible security against war.

CHINESE BANDITS HOLD U. S. OFFICER Captain Betts, Captured in Yunnan Province While Making Tour

PEKING, May 20.—Yunnan province bandits have captured, Captain T. J. Betts, United States coast artillery officer from Maryland.

Betts has been serving as language officer at the headquarters of the United States military attaché here.

Betts' capture occurred on the 17th at Lailoupo, sixty miles south of Tung Chuan, where the bandits have recently been most active.

The American consul at Yunnan notified the local authorities and the Peking legation, which is taking up the matter with the foreign office.

Betts was making a tour from the south toward the Yangtze river intending to continue to Peking. His wife and his home-in-law are now in this city.

BRITISH GOLFERS TO VISIT U. S. IN 1927 Invading Team Likely 20 Strong—Trip Sponsored By Magazine

LONDON, May 20.—A team of British professional golf players, probably twenty strong, will invade the United States in the summer of 1927, and engage in a series of exhibition matches and play a team match against United States players. They will then enter the United States open championship.

WEALTHY MAN HELD Jeweler Charged With Inserting Slug in Subway Nickel Slot

NEW YORK, May 20.—His pockets bulging with \$60,000 worth of jewelry and a big roll of bills, Abraham Orzei, 38, a jeweler, was arrested yesterday on the charge of inserting a worthless slug instead of a nickel in a subway turnstile slot. He was held in a \$1,000 bail for examination next Monday.

PARIS, May 20.—The government announced through Finance Minister Peret at the conclusion of a cabinet council this morning, that it had decided to use every resource to support the franc, which has been steadily declining.

PARIS, May 20.—President Doumergue, Premier Briand and M. Peret, the finance Minister, together with the governor and all the regents of the Bank of France, have agreed upon measures to restore the franc as soon as possible.

M. Peret, who has just returned from London, informed the correspondents to this effect after a lengthy conference at Elysee Palace.

AMUNDSEN GIVES STORY APPROVAL Leader of Polar Flight Says Noble's Account is an Accurate One

NOME, Alaska, May 19.—Captain Roald Amundsen, head of the first expedition across the North Pole in the dirigible Norge, said today that the account of the trip written by Col. Nobile, Italian designer of the airship, and sent to Rome, was correct.

WISTING AT BLUFF Captain Oskar Wisting, one of three of the crew of the Norge, who came here with Amundsen Sunday after the dirigible landed at Teller, 75 miles from Nome, following the trip over the North Pole, was at bluff, Alaska, today, 60 miles east of here, on the north coast of the Bering Sea.

TELLS OF CONFERENCE The minister declared that his conversations with Sir Austen Chamberlain, the British Foreign Secretary, and Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer, demonstrated to him that British statesmen were well disposed to aid France.

### EXPLOSION TRAPS VICTIMS IN PLANT AT STE. THERESE

One Will Probably Die if Hurts Received in Leap

MONTREAL, May 19.—Thirteen workmen were injured, one of whom may die, when fire thought to have been caused by a spark from an electric motor, destroyed the piano and gramophone factory of the Colonial Piano Company, Ltd., at Ste. Therese, about 19 miles north of Montreal. The flames also destroyed a large water tank of the Canadian Pacific Railway and burned down some sheds. The damage was estimated by Oella Hogue, secretary-treasurer of the Colonial firm, at \$175,000 partly covered by insurance.

TRAPPED ON TOP FLOOR. The victims were injured when they were trapped by the flames from an explosion in the top floor of the three-story building. The men jumped from the windows or held on to the sill with

the flames licking their hands and faces until ladders could be raised to rescue them. Moise Binette, 47, is not expected to live from injuries he sustained when he jumped. He and another workman had leaped together and collided as they were taking off with the result that Binette landed on his back. He was unconscious when picked up. A priest was summoned after Binette had been carried to a neighboring house and the last rites of his church administered.

For a time the entire portion of Ste. Therese lying on the side of the railroad track containing the factory seemed doomed and aid was summoned from Montreal. Later this danger was warded off and the fire confined to its immediate area.

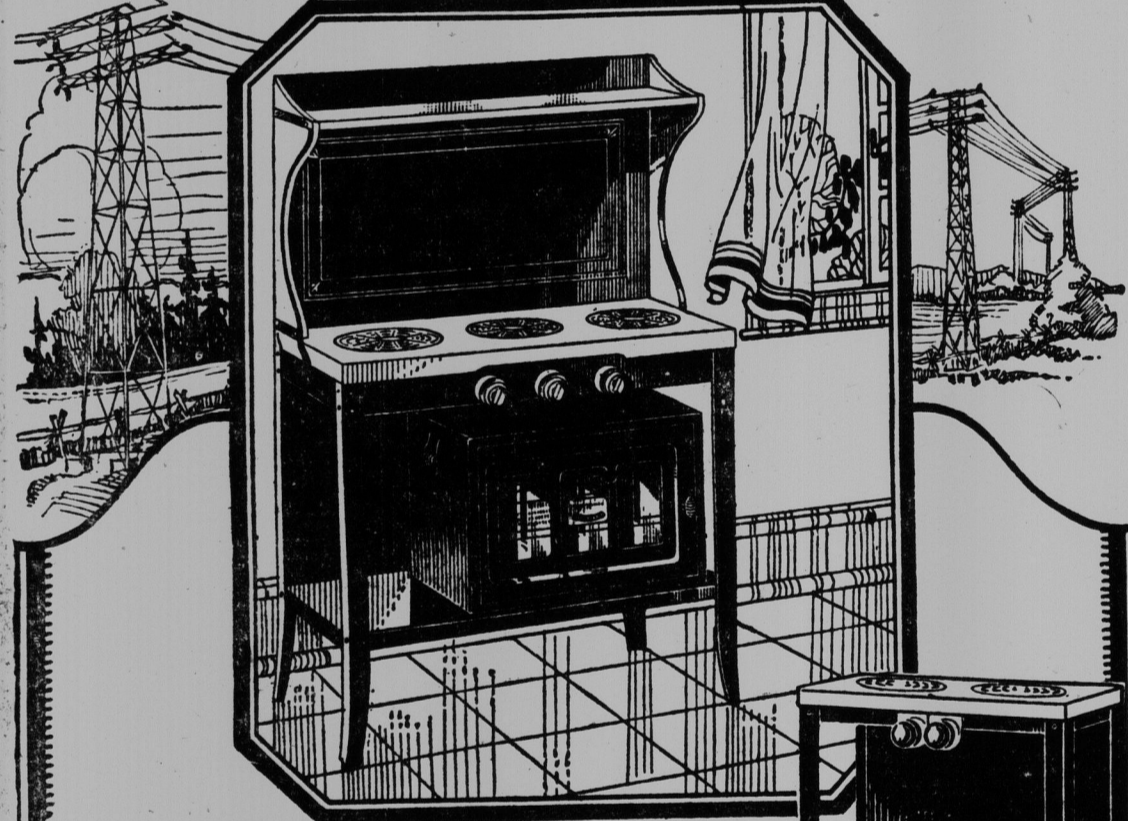

### COMMITTEE HALTS TIDAL-POWER PLAN

Passamaquoddy Works to Be Under International Joint Commission

OTTAWA, May 9.—A bill affecting the development of water power on the International boundary between New Brunswick and Maine, was under consideration in the private bills committee of the House of Commons today. No decision was reported.

The bill would incorporate the Canadian Dexter P. Cooper Power Company, Mr. Cooper, who already had a plant in Washington County, Maine, explained to the committee the purposes of the bill. It would authorize "the development of power in Passamaquoddy Bay, on the Canadian side, and supply and sell the same for use in any manner at any place in Canada and in the United States of America."

The extent to which it would affect water power rights was brought in question by several members of the committee who decided to postpone further consideration of the bill until officers of the Canadian government can submit their opinion as to navigation, marine and fisheries rights in general and water power rights in particular. The question of jurisdiction of the International Joint Commission also came up and it was decided to draft a clause in the present bill specifying that the commission would have such jurisdiction over the project. A similar clause is contained in the act passed in the legislature of Maine incorporating the Dexter P. Cooper Company in that state.

### MISS WHITTON HITS MOORE OVER STRIKE

Cable of Sympathy Riles Britons, Says Canadian Delegate

OTTAWA, May 19.—The Citizen today publishes a letter from Miss Charlotte Whitton, one of the Canadian delegates to Geneva, written from London during the strike, to a friend here in which she criticizes Tom Moore, president of the Canadian Trades and Labor Congress, for his cable to the Trades and Labor Congress in Great Britain assuring the latter of the moral support of Canadian labor in the recent general strike.

She writes: "Every one is furious at Canada interfering. They say we want to sign our own treaties, send out our own people to the league, decide our own wars and peace and be a separate unit in the Empire, yet the moment a distinctly British domestic crisis occurs, we must go cabling and giving our opinion. I don't blame them, for so far no other part of the Empire has peeped and the United States and Germany have both declined to interfere."

#### 32 ARRIVALS

MONTREAL, May 19.—During the 48 hours between Saturday noon and Sunday noon, 32 sea-going vessels arrived in Montreal, bringing the total at present in port to 54. Although the opening of navigation was delayed for two weeks, as compared with last year, the number in port yesterday exceeded the total for the same day last year by one. The total number of arrivals to date, however, is behind that for last year.

SACKVILLE, May 19—Regents of Mount Allison adjourned tonight at 7 o'clock after being in session all day. At the morning session Rev. William C. Ross, well known throughout the Maritime Provinces for his splendid work among young people and for his outstanding record as an athlete, was appointed principal of Ladies' College. He agreed to accept the position for one year in succession to Rev. Dr. Wigle, who is retiring after nine years of faithful, efficient and successful service. This afternoon plans for a memorial library, to be built of stone, were submitted to the board by a committee previously appointed. The recommendation of the committee to ask for tenders and to proceed immediately with the erection of the library building on the site facing Main street to the southeast of the McClellan School of applied science was adopted after careful consideration. The structure will be in tudor style of architecture of most pleasing design and will undoubtedly prove a splendid addition to Mount Allison's plant. Rev. William S. Godfrey, Campbellton, was chosen physical director for the university while Rev. Norman M. Guy, of Bermuda, a brilliant scholar, was appointed to the chair of economics.

LONDON, May 19—J. H. Mr. Thomas, he said, was one of the first to see the necessary results of action into which national sympathy

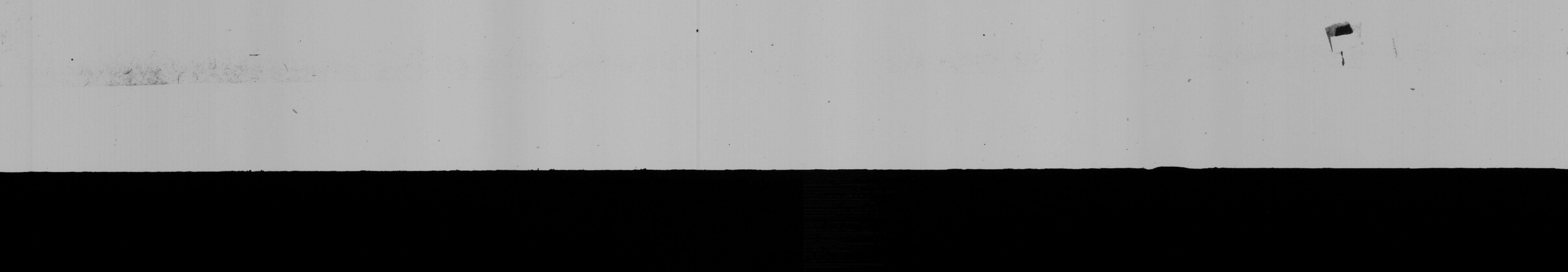
