New model for ladies blouse, carried out in rice cloth and trimmed with trills of batiste and fancy buttons arranged in groups on the collar and cuffs.

Rice cloth is used to make some of the lovely summer blouses of inexpensive design. The model shown here is quilted and has the fashionable raglan effect at the shoulders. The neck is "shaped," while the front of the blouse is tabbed with an accordion pleated buttons trim the collar, being in groups of five buttons each.

the waist, for the material runs from 43 to 44 inches wide. One yard of pleated batiste and 2 1/2 dozen buttons will be needed for the trimming.

First fold the material; then arrange upon the lengthwise fold the back (C), belt (E) and collar (D). The sleeves (B), front (A) and cuff (F), all being marked by large "O" perforations, are arranged on a lengthwise thread of the cloth. For elbow length sleeves, cut off the long sleeve on small "o" perforations.

It is not a difficult matter to put the waist together. First the sleeve is sewed to the front and back as notched, giving the raglan effect. Instead of making a seam the edges may be turned under and pinned or hemstitching used, giving a dainty finish. Close under-arm and sleeve seams as notched, leaving sleeve seam free below large "O" perforation. Adjust cuff to position on long sleeve, notches at lower edges even. Sew large collar to neck edge and standing collar to shield as notched. Gather lower edge of front and back between double "O" perforations. Sew belt to lower edge of front and back, centers even (large "O" perforations in belt at under-arm seam; fold belt through center). Barbour, Perth, Ambury, Lakooka, do; H. H. **Baron Hawke Famous Cricketer, Traveler and Big Game Hunter**

(Times Special Correspondence)

London, July 6--One of the most genuinely interesting men and most popular heroes in all the British Empire has just been paid a great and, all admit, a well merited honor. The man in question is Martin Bladen, 7th Baron Hawke, a famous cricketer, traveler and big-game hunter, who comes down in a direct line from the doughty old sea-dog of the same name who thrashed the French off Belle Isle in 1759, and the honor that has just been paid him consists in his election as president of the Marylebone Cricket Club which, as everyone who knows anything about cricket is aware is by far the biggest cricket organization going, and the governing body so far as British cricket is concerned.

No man living has done more for the game of cricket than Lord Hawke, who, in fact, has been a sort of missionary for the national sport of these islands, having popularized it in many strange and far-off lands. In the course of some thirty years of adventurous wanderings over the earth's surface, he is estimated to have covered more than 150,000 miles. A few years ago, His Lordship received a national testimonial which he did not in the least want, in recognition of his work in this connection.

**A NOBLE SPORTSMAN**

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Characteristically, too Lord Hawke, who is now fifty-four, has done his best to bridge the social chasm which, in this country, yawns between the amateur and the professional cricketer. This chasm is a wide one so one indication of which it may be mentioned that, when reporting cricket matches, the newspapers are careful to discriminate painstakingly printing the initials of each player's name in the case of the amateurs and refraining from doing so in the case of the "pros." At all cricket grounds, too, amateurs leave and enter by one gate and professionals by another, but Lord Hawke, since first he began playing the game, has made a point of using the professionals' gate, a little act of courtesy that has not lessened his personal popularity.

Cricket-matches have taken him to Australia, New Zealand, and the West

forty elephants and twenty camels, and the "bag" included thirteen tigers, two leopards, swamp-deer, cheetah, and other ferocious denizens of the jungle. On another expedition, Lord Hawke got nine tigers all to himself.

Prophecies of the chase, accordingly, are numerous at His Yorkshire home, Wig-hill Park. In the entrance hall, a white bear, shot by His Lordship in Nepal, serves as a card-stand. The staircase walls are hung with the skins of five tigers, one a ten-footer, and here, too, are the antlers of three stags, one a royal, killed by Lord Hawke in one day's stalking in Glendoe Forest.

Cricket souvenirs are still more numerous. They include photographs of all the teams Lord Hawke has captained and all the eleven he has taken to different parts of the world. Here, too, is the ball of which his county scored 887 runs against Warwickshire in one innings in 1894. Four centuries were made in that innings, and Lord Hawke was one of the scoring quartette.

This great cricketer is a bachelor. He succeeded to the title on the death of his father, in 1887, at which time, by the way, he was playing cricket in Australia. He captained Yorkshire for nearly twenty-five years, and how he is thought of in his own county is well illustrated by a story that is told concerning a dispute about the umpire at last.

The umpire had given a decision which considerably enraged a batsman. The latter declared that the umpire could not have been paying proper attention to the game, whereupon spectators and players settled themselves down in keen expectation of a fight.

"What dost thou know of cricket?" asked the umpire at last.

Here, indeed, was a point, but the man with the bat was equal to it. Drawing himself up proudly, he replied, "I know more than you do, 'any rate.'" Then, curling his lower lip with sublime disdain, he added, "As yet, I shook hands with Lord 'Awke! That's more than you ever did; so there?"

This reference to Lord Hawke settled it, and the umpire retired a beaten man.

A return relating to the amount of the British national debt at the close of each financial year since 1885-86 shows that the gross liabilities of the state, including treasury bills temporarily paid off, amounted on March 31 last to \$707,641,110, a decrease of \$8,684,811 as compared with March 31, 1913. FEW SARDINES AT EASTPORT. An Eastport dispatch of Thursday says that the sardine business, the principal industry in the city, is just now causing considerable uneasiness among the several hundred employes of the factories, who have been idle for the greater part of the time since last December. They had been looking forward to a busy season, owing to the increased demand for domestic sardines, but the little fishes have failed to put in their appearance along the coast in the usual large schools and about all the plants are idle for the greater part of the time. They have only an occasional school since the season opened on April 15. The cannery workers feel the lack of work and there is much distress in consequence.

FLEMMING AND BERRY. At Fredericton on July 8 at the meeting of the Royal Commission Judge McKeown said—

"For myself I think there should be an earnest effort on the part of everybody to get Mr. Berry here. I think if that were done Mr. Berry would be here."

Mr. Carvell said— "Premier Flemming is the man who can get Berry here if he would only send him a telegram to come."

Yesterday Mr. Flemming was asked if he would sign a telegram asking Mr. Berry to return, and he replied that he would not.

MR. BERRY'S SALARY. Some time ago The Times said it had learned on excellent information that the salary of Mr. W. H. Berry for the month of May was paid on instructions from Premier Flemming. The Standard for several days was in a state of great excitement, calling The Times a liar, a deliberate liar and a self-convicted liar.

Yesterday when Mr. Flemming was being cross-examined by Mr. Carvell before the Royal Commission the following dialogue took place— Q.—Did you do anything to see that he (Berry) was paid his salary for May? A.—No.

Q.—Did you telephone to Col. Loggie about it? A.—I have no recollection.

Q.—Will you say that you did not? A.—I do not like to say positively but I think I did not.

It will thus be seen that Mr. Flemming was unwilling to swear that he had not telephoned to Col. Loggie about Mr. Berry's salary for May.

HOUSING REFORM. The housing problem in St. John must be seriously grappled with at once. The partial housing survey that has been made shows very undesirable conditions in some of the old houses which are at present occupied, and shows also that there is some congestion, which will tend to increase, because the population of the city will grow and the demand for accommodation will continually become greater.

The number of new buildings being erected by private enterprise is not and will not be large enough to meet the demand, and many of these houses are not of a character to meet the demand for working-men's homes at a moderate rental.

Consider some of the statements submitted by Mr. Burditt at Thursday night's meeting of the Community Council. In the area between Brussels street and St. Patrick street from Union street to Haymarket Square there are sixty houses without proper sanitary conveniences. It was found that in forty cases one room was used as kitchen, living and sleeping room. One four story house contains eight families, totalling fifty-two people, and it earns a rental of \$862 per year. It is a wooden house of cheap construction.

Another house two stories high, sheltering several families, yields a rental of \$420 per year, and Mr. Burditt says it is not fit for human habitation. While it may be true, therefore, that this area on the whole is not congested, and that there are many one and two family houses; yet there are some conditions very undesirable, and there are quite a number of rear houses which, being on low ground, cannot well be in a sanitary condition. If a survey of the whole city were made similar conditions would be found in some other sections, and further evidence accumulated to show the urgent need for improvement.

The work of the Community Council has only begun. The majority of the citizens would no doubt object to the city entering into the business of constructing houses. There would be no guarantee of a continuity of policy. The personnel of the city council is continually changing. We have an illustration in regard to the streets of what may happen. The policy of last year's city council is practically reversed by the council of this year. It is extremely doubtful, moreover, and indeed highly improbable, that the city could get buildings constructed as cheaply as they would be constructed by a building company or commission.

It is possible, however, under the new housing law for the city to guarantee 85 per cent of the bonds of a company or commission, provided the people vote in favor of that course. That they would do so admits of little doubt, as it is quite apparent the work which ought to be done cannot be carried out successfully without municipal aid.

Two things therefore are needed. One is to develop a public sentiment which will ensure action by the city council under the housing law, and the other is to have a thorough study made of the whole question so that after the city council has been given the desired authority a practical proposition may be presented for its consideration.

The discussion on Thursday evening, in addition to what it revealed as to the need of action, showed also how little real knowledge many people have of the whole question, and how few are prepared to make practical suggestions looking to the solution of this community problem.

RELIGION IN SOCIAL WORK

A valued correspondent, writing to the Times on the relation of the church to social problems, makes these thoughtful observations— "The more I think about it the clearer it seems that real religion is not concerned only or even primarily with the teaching men an abstract righteousness, but it must insist on a plain, comprehensible system of truth, recognizable by every one and touching all human interests and connections. In a word the righteousness of Christianity, if it means anything at all to the average man, must be capable of revitalizing and renovating the whole life. All social reform work must tend to the building up of the churches, just as the churches ought to be at the back of every effort to ameliorate social conditions. And it is encouraging to see that all Christian churches are taking a firm stand in their attitude toward our social problems. And though men may deride the interference of the ecclesiastical element in social matters it is worth remembering that past history shows that the greatest and most far-reaching reforms have been brought about either directly or indirectly through the influence of the church, using that term in its broadest sense."

The story of Kidd's treasure has always been one of absorbing interest. With the leaders of the two parties in conference again there is still a prospect that serious trouble in Ulster may be avoided.

Premier Flemming will take no steps to aid in bringing Mr. W. H. Berry before the Royal Commission to give evidence. The fact is one of the amazing features of this inquiry.

Premier Flemming's testimony to the generosity of New Brunswick lumbermen will doubtless result in a perfect deluge of appeals to them from the promoters of worthy causes who need contributions.

Hon Mr. Flemming intimated yesterday that he was willing to have the judgment of the people on his acts. As the people are not only willing but eager to deliver judgment, there should be no prolonged delay.

If Premier Flemming were constantly on the alert to expose anything that savored of political wrong-doing would he have consented to the collection of what can only be described as a corruption fund, so soon after the provincial elections, when he had all but two members of the legislature at his back?

Premier Flemming is setting a new standard for statesmanship in Canada. No other provincial or federal premier has ever professed to regard with so much complacency the collection of a fund contributed by men whose business was to a certain extent at the mercy of the government.

It is again announced that the Grand Trunk Pacific will be ready for traffic from coast to coast next fall, with the exception of the Quebec bridge. St. John will not be in a position to take full advantage of its location as a terminus for this line until the Valley Railway is completed, and there is still nothing doing in connection with the bridges or the St. John terminals.

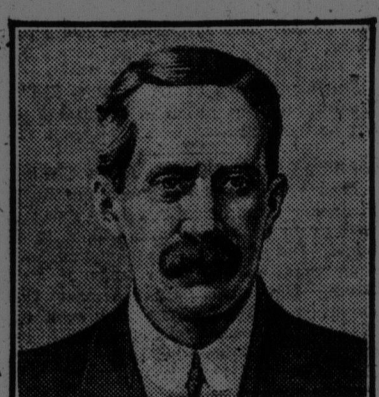

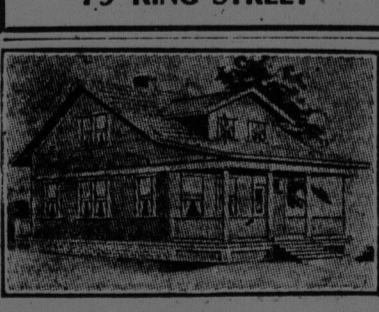

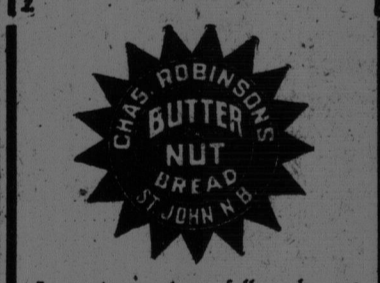

This cleans them beautifully, the cane is kept a good color, and if the seats have relaxed with wear they become quite firm again.

To make wall paper stick over calmed or whitewashed walls get a large brush and some ochre and paint the walls first.

PREMIER FORCED TO ADMIT  
THAT HE KNEW W. H. BERRY  
HE WAS COLLECTING THE FUND

But Did Not Discharge or Even Reprimand Him—When Charges Were Made Discussed With Berry Possibility of Avoiding Inquiry by Signing Denials—Proposals, Made to Mr. Flemming Personally by Lumbermen, Did Not Offend Him—Says Transactions "Not Dishonorable" If Payments Were Made Voluntarily

Under the grilling cross-examination of F. B. Carvell yesterday afternoon, Premier Flemming managed to remember more than he thought he could earlier in the hearing. He admitted yesterday afternoon that he introduced Mr. Teed to Brankley so that the latter would know that Mr. Teed was the man to whom he was to pay the money. He admitted that he knew that Berry was taking an active part in the collection of the fund. Although this was in disobedience to his orders, the premier did not dismiss or even reprimand his official. Mr. Flemming qualified his statement, made yesterday morning, that there was nothing dishonorable about the collection of the fund by saying that it would not be dishonorable if the contributions were voluntary. He maintained that there was nothing improper in accepting contributions from the lumbermen, while legislation affecting their interests was at stake, and could not see that there was anything unusual in the fact that many of the contributors were his political opponents.

The premier admitted that he did not discourage G. C. Couter when the latter offered to contribute \$1,000 while discussing the amount of the timber bonus, or James Robinson when he offered to raise a fund while talking of the same matter. After consultation with his counsel, Mr. Flemming agreed that he knew of the existence of a document containing a denial by W. H. Berry of the charges, but he admitted that Berry came to him and suggested that if they both signed complete denials of the charges that they might avoid an inquiry.

The premier will continue his story on Monday afternoon at two o'clock. Before resuming his cross-examination of Premier Flemming, Mr. Carvell made a statement to the effect that in his purchase of the sixty-seven shares of the Maine & New Brunswick Power Company Mr. Teed paid \$10 a share for the right and \$100 for the stock, thus making the price agree with that already given of \$110.

Hon. J. K. Flemming then took the stand and Mr. Carvell resumed, saying: I asked you if you instructed Mr. Berry not to accept contributions from any except those who would give voluntarily; did you give him any instructions?

A.—No.  
Q.—Do you discuss with him the class of lumbermen who were to be approached?  
A.—No.  
Q.—You still think that this whole transaction was perfectly honorable?  
A.—I don't remember.

Q.—Why not, if it was not dishonorable?  
A.—It never occurred to me.  
Q.—You held this immense campaign fund for seven or eight months and never thought it worth while to discuss it with them?  
A.—I never considered that I held it for one day or one minute.

Mr. Carvell—You held the keys for six or seven weeks. You knew that Mr. Teed held it for you and your colleagues but did not think it necessary to tell them about it?  
A.—I knew he held it for the party.  
Q.—For the local government party, Mr. Teed says, that would be you and your colleagues?  
A.—Yes, and others.

Q.—Knowing that Mr. Teed held it, did you not consider it necessary to inform your colleagues?  
A.—No.  
Q.—You know John Burchill?  
A.—Yes.

Q.—He was a member of the legislature while you were in office?  
A.—Yes, for three sessions.  
Q.—While he was a member from 1900 to 1903 was he a member of the same party as yourself?

A.—Not that I know of.  
Q.—You don't know whether on this important occasion you spoke of the matter to Mr. Teed or not?  
A.—I don't know.  
Q.—Did you talk to Mr. Berry about it?  
A.—I don't think so.

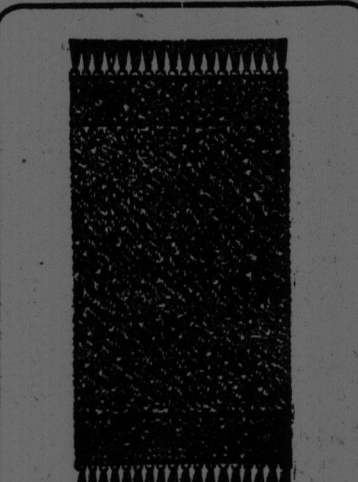

(Continued from page 5.) With the Partington Company. They had been classified, in B. I. think, Mr. Robinson's lands were of a different class and we could not exact a different fee from them on the same block.

Q—How many times did you tell Mr. Teed during the next few months? A—Many times. Q—Many times? A—I could not say.

Q—Did you ever tell him that you were going to get the \$15,000 from Mr. Teed? A—No, I don't think I did.

Loss of More Than \$60,000 For Paris Opera Management

(Montreal Gazette.) Paris, July 11.—Hardly has the difficulty of the Odeon management been settled before a new and more important crisis in the affairs of the state theatres arises—the Opera, whose managers, MM. Messager and Broussan, this week informed M. Angueur, the minister of public instruction, that unless matters should improve they would be unable to continue their engagement, which is to terminate on December 31 next, but would be forced to resign at the end of August, having already lost more than \$60,000, which sum is set by contract at the minimum as a justification for resigning.

The managers thus ascribe the causes of their failure. One of the general bad times in the theatrical world; two, the prejudicial effect of the Russian ballets themselves, successful although prodigiously expensive; three, to the inexplicable fall in the receipts, for instance, of "Pantifla" which opened with a nightly average of \$4000, and now has hardly \$1,000; four, to the rise in the theatrical salaries and the general expenses of the theatre.

In addition to these reasons there is another, which they are not willing to admit, but, at least, is equally genuine, namely, the competition with Russell's opera season at the Theatre des

Champs Elysees, which was a great artistic, if not financial success.

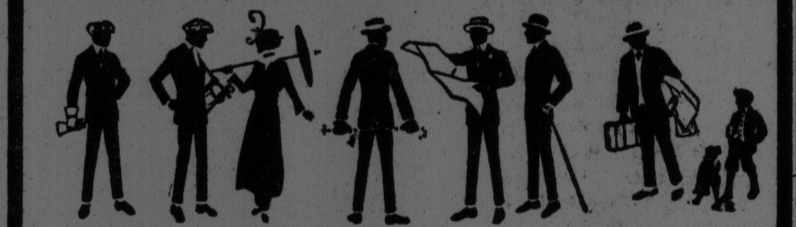
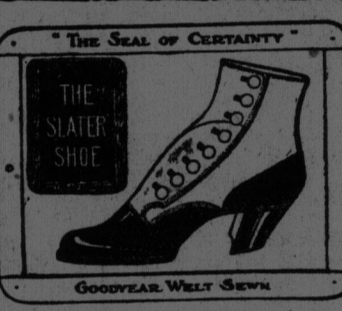
