

BRITISH PROSPERITY

Mr. Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, in his budget speech. He was able to point out that despite the coal strike, the bad harvest and the trouble in the Balkans, last year was the most prosperous in the history of British trade. Along with this there was a considerable increase in the wages of the lowest paid workmen. Nor did the boom in trade reach its climax last year. 

Charlie Mitchell, the Former British Champion, Not All In

By TOM ANDREWS

London, May 20—The New York Yacht Club definitely accepting Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge for the America's cup.

Recently there have been stories floating around that Charlie Mitchell, one of the cleverest and greatest boxers England ever turned out, had been in dire straits and about ready to "cash in" his checks. Mitchell toured the States on more than one occasion and was always popular with the sporting men throughout the country. These same followers of the game will no doubt be pleased to know that the great fighter is not in such bad straits as rumored. An old friend in London writing me about the matter says:

"Charlie Mitchell, the old-time fighter, is ables to get about again, and though still shaky from the effects of his recent illness, he looks to have many years of life in him yet. It is thirty years since he met John L. Sullivan in New York, and nineteen years since he fought his last ring battle, with Jim Corbett at Jacksonville. Most of the modern writers declare Mitchell to be the greatest boxer, or rather fighter, that this country ever pr duced, but it seems to be overlooked by these enthusiasts that Mitchell never succeeded in Beating Jack Burke, the Irish boy, though they met on five occasions. Burke was a wonderful fighter and under modern conditions of training would have made a world's champion beyond doubt.

"Mitchell's greatest feat was a draw of thirty-nine rounds at Chantilly, France, with the great John L. Sullivan. The Britisher at that time was little more than a middle weight, indeed he rarely exceeded 170 pounds at any time, whilst Sullivan was a big, strong heavy weight. In the course of a long fighting career extending from 1878 to 1895, Mitchell lost only three battles. His first defeat was the three-round affair with Sullivan in New York, away back in 1883, the second was at the hands of Dominick McCaffrey, a year later, also in New York, and the last was at Jacksonville in his last fight with Jim Corbett.

NEW BRUNSWICK MAN

DEAD IN BANGOR

William Hale, one of the oldest residents of Bangor, died on Monday at the age of 91 years.

Mr. Hale was born in Ireland, coming to New Brunswick when he was 15 years of age. He moved, some 60 years ago, to Bangor where he has since resided.

Mr. Hale was remarkably well preserved and retained his faculties to the last. He had an excellent memory and chatted most interestingly of matters that happened some 60 or 70 years ago. He recalled very clearly the events of the bloodless Aroostook war and had a somewhat personal knowledge thereof as he worked for the engineers who established the boundary line between the United States and New Brunswick under the Ashburton treaty.

In his early days Mr. Hale worked as a woods boss and as a boss stevedore on Bangor wharves, including a position as head dock man for James Walker & Co. For a period of 21 years he was fish warden of the Bangor salmon pool and was well known to the older local fishermen. He retired from that position some 15 years ago.
