

Represent Province



OUEBEC, Feb. 26—Consideration of the bill which would permit the Government of New Brunswick to carry out the work in the province of Quebec necessary to the development for hydroelectric power of Grand Falls on to St. John River, was adjourned today by the private bills committee of the Quebec House of Assembly until next week.

The bill would incorporate Premier P. J. Veniot of New Brunswick, Hon. Dr. Ernest Smith, president of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, and Hon. J. E. Michaud, minister without portfolio in the New Brunswick Government, and members of the commission, into a company to do the work in Quebec. Hon. Mr. Michaud sat with the committee and explained the ob-

jects of the bill. New Brunswick, through its commission, is developing at Grand Falls, a waterpower development, and to that end it is necessary that storage UIUIAUII reservoirs be created in some of the lakes and rivers tributary to the drainage basin of the St. John River.

### To Be Expropriated.

The power to be developed at this site would be delivered by the agency of a high voltage transmission system to all settled ritions of New Brunswick, and it was anticipated that not only would the entire population benefit thereby through the supply of electrical energy for light and domestic services, but that the energy thus made available would stimulate industrial development through the province. through the province.

### Storage Necessary.

St. John River was subject to very large variations in the rate of flow, the minimum flow near Grand Falls being about eight hundred cubic feet per second, while the maximum flow was 135,000 cubic feet per second: consequently, any scheme for the development of power on the river on a scale commensurate with its natural possibilities, must include adequate storage in the upper reaches and the river as its tributaries.











## The Garden Needs Weeding; Tares Must Be Uprooted - EDITORIAL, MONTREAL STAR-

The Montreal Star in its editorial columns yesterday carried the following:

THERE has been wild talk in the Maritimes of secession. Such talk is, we believe, only the petulant outburst of irritation. The only secession which the Maritimes would ever regard seriously would have to involve remaining within the Empire, and such a move would ring the death knell of this Dominion. It would make the "East and West" policy, for which the Maritimes have fought so persistently, a mere phrase, wholly impracticable. It would drive the trade of Canada into the north and south channels of transporation, which are always open so invitingly. It would mean either which are always open so invitingly. It would mean either the disintegration or the absorption of a mutilated Canada. It would strike a blow at the heart of the Empire.

THE Maritimes have put up a gallant fight, but the odds were against them and in later years the cards have been stacked against them because other sections of the Dominion have been able to offer more in return for the benefits they have received. Today, it is not a question of political bargaining, but of doing something to save the structure of Confederation.

First and foremost, Canada as a whole must give clear evidence of real sympathy with the Maritimes and must be prepared to make sacrifices to aid her, without demanding compensating benefits for their own bailiwicks in return.

THE ports of St. John and Halifax must have preferential treatment over Portland. Freight rates must be adjusted so that there is a profitable market for Eastern coal and fruits and fish and other products in Ontario and Quebec. The immigration policy of Canada must be viewed through a lens that is not always fixed immovably towards the Western Prairies. The Maritimes want British sons and daughters to replace the British stock that the short-sighted policy of politicians has robbed them of. It will not need any gigantic outlay, but it will need the expenditure of certain sums which must be given ungrudgingly and prudently.

THE fathers of Confederation realized that the only policy under which Canada could grow to greatness was an "East and West" policy knitting together the contiguous provinces and using the great ports at the extremeties of the chain as outlets and inlets for Canadian trade. One of the pivots of that East and West policy is the Maritimes, the garden of the Dominion. The garden needs weeding and the tares of selfishness and sectionalism must be uprooted. That is being rapidly done and the gardeners come today to Ottawa to ask for seed from richer neighbors, with tools to hoe and till the soil again. They must not ask in vain.

# Chief Justice Anglin Brings Up Question of Rates to St. John

IS ONE OF MATTERS TO BE SETTLED LATER

Rates Apply to Traffic Between Points Which Were on C. P. R. in 1897.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.-Yesterday's ruling of the Supreme Court of Canada in the Crows' Nest Pass case has raised some new and difficult problems. It settles the legal point that Crow's Nest rates are binding on the Board of Railway Comm sioners, but it leaves removal of discrimination in the hands of Par-

In brief, the courts' ruling finds 1—The Board of Railway Com-missioners is bound by the maxims of the Crow's Nest westbound rates,

2—These westbound rates apply only to points in existence on the C. P. R. in 1897. To other points

they do not apply.

But what of the eastbound rates on grain and flour? These rates have been in effect on all points for a couple of years, and yesterday's judgment rules that the Crow's Nest rates eastbound are binding on the Board of Railway Commissioners.

St. John's Case.

Chief Justice Anglin says: "There remains to be noted, a point raised by counsel for the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, namely that the C. P. R., in tariffs disallowed by the order of October 14, has fixed Megantic, P. Q., as the most easterly point to which it applied the Crow's Nest rates, whereas it is contended those rates should be extended to the port of St. John, New Brunswick, the easternmost point on the C. P. R. as it existed in 1897.

Settled Later. "Of this matter it need only be said that it does not fall within the scope of questions of law and jurisdiction submitted, and as indicated in the opinion of the learned chief commissioner, it would appear to be one of the other manifold subjects remaining for consideration after the settlement of the main question and undetermined by the present decision of the board it is not before the court on the present appeal.

### Discrimination Question.

"As to any resulting discriminations, Chief Justice Anglin, in his reasons has this comment to make:

"The alleged fact that, if applied to the limited extent for which clauses D and E distinctly provide, the maintenance of the Crow's Nest Pass rates will produce discrimination and inequality which would ordinarily be in clear violation of the anti-discrimination sections of the Railway Act, would not justify an exclusion of their application such as the appellants press for. Discriminations so authorized by parliament itself cannot be regarded as unjust or prohibited.

"We therefore think it clear that the application of the Crow's Nest rates is confined to traffic between points which were on the Canadian Pacific Railway in 1897."







# SPOKESMEN DEMAND POLICY TO ENSURE EAST GETS RIGHTS

I am not going to speak about the history of Confederation, but when the Maritime Provinces entered that pact they hoped for advantages that have not been theirs. Our industries have largely been transferred to Quebec and Ontario. That was largely the outcome of economic conditions over which we had no control.

'As to secession, I am not here to preach it or advocate it, but the burst of applause that this morning greeted the reference to a suggestion of such a course shows that there is some real talk and feeling of this kind at this time. It must be recalled that in 1886 Mr. Fielding carried an election in Nova Scotia on the issue of the repeal of the British North America Act, and three years ago Hon. William Pugsley, as Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick, speaking in St. John, said that if Canada persisted in spending millions of dollars to build up United States ports it was time for the Maritime people to get out.

"The Members of Parliament should understand that prominent men have uttered such sentiments, and if those sentiments are given encouragement you may some day have a prairie fire in the Maritime Provinces.

# Along the Sport Trail

BIG BILL WAYNE, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, is starting to reap the reward of his victory over Ed. "Strangler" Lewis. He is considered a big attraction and has received an offer of \$100,000 to meet three of the leading contenders for the title. Munn is from Nebraska, the home of many of the greatest exponents of the mat game. Included among them are the Stecher brothers, Charley Peters, John Pesek and Farmer Burns. As this was practically a physical impossibility Mandell should have been awarded the crown when Leonard arrived. It will be recalled that Mandell refused to enter the tournament for several reasons. Mandell won the Terris fight in convincing fashion, but unfortunately injured his left shoulder quite badly. Aside from George Chaney of Baltimore it is doubtful if there is a contender in the tournament in Mandell's class. It will be interesting to fans to watch the developments.

WILLIE HOPPE is certainly making an impressive showing in the 18.2 billiard balkline tournament in Chicago. In his match against Welker Cochrane he made two high runs, the second of which was close to the 200 mark. His work is a surprise because he practically deserted balkline play for three-cushions and for several months was practising for a special match with Cannefax. S., district fruit and vegetable inspector for the Maritime Provinces under the Federal Department of Agriculture. He predicted that some day the St. John Valley would be one of the Iargest apple producing centres in Canada. He also referred to the potato embargo, which he said was likely to cause a drop in the price of this comcause a drop in the price of this com-

### Fruit Growers.

Mr. Vroom came to the city yesterday from Fredericton, where he hattended the meetings of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association. The association was doing a great deal of good for the growers, he declared. It aided them greatly in buying supplies, having stocks on hand all the time and buying in quantities so that the members could avail themselves of the opportunity to get what they needed quickly and at wholesale prices.

New Brunswick Apples.

The New Brunswick growers were now raising between 30,000 and 50,000 barrels of apples yearly, and were packing them in an exceptionally good manner. He had been informed in Montreal that the apples from New

Montreal that the apples from New Brunswick were the best packed that were received in that city.

The St. John Valley was now producing some of the best apples in the world, he said, while the amount raised was not large as yet it was being increased. He had predicted several years ago that the valley would some day be the greatest apple growing district in Canada, and he believed the prediction was some day to be fulfilled. Best Of Its Kind.

The MacIntosh Red apple, raised in the valley, was the best of its kind he had ever tasted, he declared, and he be-

lieved it to have the finest flavor of any apple that had come to his notice. He had eaten apples from Australia, Tasmania and many other parts of the world, and had never met anything better than the New Brunswick ones.

The market for Nova Scotia apples had been very fair all season, he said, about 1,000,000 barrels having already been exported. There were now only about 100,000 barrels still in the province. The prices had been good, ranging from \$3 to \$5.50 and \$6 a barrel, and in some cases being even higher.

A great many of the culls were being taken care of in the evaporators, which had been usually busy this year. He believed that, by the end of the season, about 250,000 barrels would have been used in the dehydrator, evaporators, cider mills and vinegar factories.




