STATEMENT BY THE SESSION.

The year covered by this report has been full of reminders to our congregation of the shortness of time and the transitoriness of all things earthly. There has been an unusual amount of sickness among our people. Many with whom we took sweet counsel together, and walked unto the house of God in company, have removed to distant parts. Among those we have to regret the removal of two highly respected members of the Session, Messrs. James Bell and John Ferguson, men greatly beloved. Death has taken from our midst not a few, long tried and familiar friends whom we can ill spare.

Yet amid these and other subjects of regret, the Session feel constrained to bless the Lord for the light of his countenance and the manifold tokens of his favor, which, during the year, have been granted to us as a congregation. In the gracious arrangements of Providence, as one star sets another rises, as one source of usefulness is closed another opens; so that in increase of numbers, of liberality for the maintenance and furtherance of the gospel, and of Christian work, the year just closed is not without evidences of prosperity and progress.

of Management desire to render their sincere thanks to our Heavenly Father for the many blessings and privileges which we have enjoyed, as a congregation, during the past year. Our esteemed pastor has been in the enjoyment of good health, which has enabled him the more efficiently and faithfully to discharge the heavy and responsible duties connected with our large congregation, and Mrs. Murray, who, for some time past has been in a delicate state of health, we are now happy to state, is gradually recovering, and we hope will soon have her health and strength fully restored.

2nd. The Board of Management have the sad duty of referring to the sudden death of Mr. Alexander Purdom, who, for the last nine years has been an active working member of our Board, and for three years its highly respected chairman. On the 9th of January, 1883, he presided at the Board meeting and received the necessary information to prepare the Annual Report, but was taken ill on the morning of the 11th, and at 8 o'clock p.m. the same day he departed this life. We are thus reminded of "the uncertainty of life," and that we should faithfully and diligently discharge our respective duties, from

day to day, as "We know not what a day or an hour may bring forth." The Board wish to record their high respect for Mr. Purdom's character, as an upright man and a consistent member of the Church, and the hope that being now "absent from the body," he is present with the Lord. His mourning widow and family have the deep sympathy of the Board and congregation in their sudden and heavy bereavement, and our prayer is that the Lord may sustain and comfort them in their affliction.

ard. In the last Annual Report, the retiring Board recommended their successors in office to take steps to get the church re-frescoed, the seats upholstered, and the woodwork painted, &c. The Board is now in a position to report that the said improvements have been successfully carried out. Before undertaking the work, "The Ladies' Aid Society" kindly offered to assist the Board in raising the necessary funds, sewing the cushions and carpets, etc., and they, and many other ladies of the congregation came heartily forward when required to assist in the work as promised, and deserve the hearty thanks of the congregation for their valuable services. Mrs. John Elliot, President of the Ladies Aid Society, with other ladies assisting her, canvassed the congregation, and collected for the improvements the handsome amount of \$1423.80, as per list of subscribers annexed.

4th. Mr. John Ferguson secured all the materials for the upholstering and the carpet at the lowest wholesale price, and his son, Mr. James Ferguson, cut all the materials to fit each seat, and superintended all the upholstering, which was done by Mr. John Ferguson's men, and we think all will admit the work as having been finished with skill, and in a substantial manner, and if the Board had to pay for the same would cost over \$200, which Mr. John Ferguson and his son gave as a subscription towards the Improvement Fund.

5th. Mr. Donald McDonald gave his time and assistance in overseeing and attending to all matters in connection with the work from the commencement until finished, which was worth at least \$50, as his subscription to the improvement fund.

6th. In addition to the great improvement done inside the church, the roof of the church and manse were painted with fireproof paint, costing \$150. The wooden plank walks from the street to the church doors having become worn out and dangerous, were removed and new asphalt walks laid down, costing \$140.85. Part of the church ground was sodded and the whole ornamented with Norway Spruce trees, &c., and the appearance of the Church and grounds are now a credit to the congregation. The Board would recommend that during this year steps should be taken to pay off the balance due on last year's improvements, the amount having been found too heavy to pay for in one year.

7th. The insurance on the church and furniture, in order to get it done on the most favorable terms, was lately paid for three years in advance, costing \$186.65.

8th. The Secretary-Treasurer's books have been regularly audited and found correct, and a certified statement of the receipts and expenditure for 1882 will be found annexed to this report.

9th. The Board desire, on behalf of the congregation, to thank Mr. Freeland and the choir for their regular attendance, and faithful and efficient services.

10th. The members of the Board of Management whose term of office now expires are Messrs. Alexander Tytler, James Smith, James Gillean, Donald McDonald, Donald Fraser and David Denham, who are eligible for re-election. Two additional members shall be elected for one year, in room of Mr. Alexander Purdom, deceased, and Mr. Wm. M. Moore, who finds it impossible this year to attend our meetings.

FOR THE YEAR 1882.

In respect to our Sabbath School the past year has been one of quiet, prayerful work on the part of the officers and teachers.

We have had a delightful and profitable course of Bible studies from Mark's gospel upon the life of Christ, and appropriate religious exercises in connection therewith, which appear to interest the entire school, and with God's blessing must have advanced both teachers and scholars in scriptural knowledge as well as spiritual life.

Although we cannot report a very great increase in the membership statistics, the records show that the school has been steadily maintained with a slight gain upon last year. It is with regret that we have to report one senior class broken up and partially disbanded from lack of a suitable teacher, and we would take advantage of this opportunity to appeal to those members of the church who have qualification for teaching, and also to parents who appreciate the work of the S. S. teachers to co-operate more heartily with us during the coming year. There have been a great many changes in the school roll during the past year, especially amongst the teaching staff, as may be noted by a comparison of the list of teachers at 31st December, 1882, with that of 1881.

ST. ANDREW'S COT.

The special monthly collections for furnishing and maintaining a room and cot in the Children's Imfirmary of the Protestant Orphans' Home, which was started at close of last year, has been regularly taken up this year. It aggregated \$43.46, of which \$43.04 have been expended.

LIBRARIES AND PAPERS.

Under the direction of Messrs. Stevely and Hunter, the care and circulation of the books have been well attended to. No new books were added to the Library this last year, and we would strongly urge that this matter receive necessary attention before re-opening the Library. During the year an excellent children's papers, "Early Days," has been supplied to the infant class. Knowing it to be the wish of many of the teachers, we recommend that the "Canadian Band of Hope" be substituted for it this coming year.

BAND OF HOPE.

Some pleasant meetings under the auspices of the Band of Hope, were held during the year; but much requires to be done in order to make it more active and efficient.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS AND VISITING.

It is recommended that Teachers' Meetings for business be held as regularly as possible on the first Mondays of January, April, July, and October, or at least quarterly, and that more systematic visiting of the scholars, especially absentees, be undertaken by the teachers, so far as their limited time will allow, so that quarterly reports by the teachers upon the state of their respective classes shall be made at each quarterly meeting.

BIBLE CLASS.

The Bible Class continues its work with unabated interest, and it is to be hoped with increasing spiritual benefit to the young people of our congregation. Some 130 young men and women attend its ministrations. The subjects of study, selected for the term, are lessons from the lives of eminent scriptural characters, with an occasional doctrinal theme from the confession of faith. These, so far, have received most marked attention from every member of the class. The Pastor and other office bearers are highly gratified with the admirable order which, without any effort on their part, is maintained by the students. The increased efficiency in the praise part of the services is a special feature of attraction. During the year, along with the whole church building, the old Bible Class room-which for years had fallen into disuse-has been completely renovated. The ceilings and walls handsomely trescoed, the floor carpeted and seated with chairs, and the ventilation, as far as possible under the existing system of heating, improved. It is now one of the best furnished, most convenient and beautiful rooms in the church. The necessary expenses entailed for these improvements have, with commendable enterprise, been assumed by the class. This they have been enabled to do by specially liberal terms granted them by Mr. John Ferguson, to whose kindness they are further bound in gratitude by the handsome gift of a chair and desk for the use of the Pastor in his class work.

The aforementioned facts will explain why the class cannot for the past year, as formerly, apportion their contributions to the schemes of the church.
