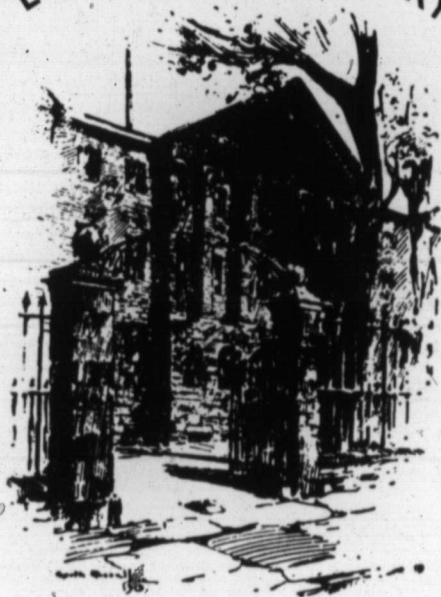

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1851.

In the year 1851, there will be two eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon, as follows :—

I. A partial eclipse of the Moon, January 17, at the time of Full Moon. Invisible on this continent.

II. An annular eclipse of the Sun, February 1, at the time of New Moon. Invisible in the United States. This beautiful eclipse will be visible in the Great Indian and Southern oceans, and a partial eclipse will be seen in New Holland, New Zealand, and the Cape of Good Hope. The central and annular eclipse will begin in long. 7d. 44m. east of Greenwich, and lat 47d. 41m. south, and end in long. 17d. 49m. east; and lat. 23d. 27m. south.

III. A partial eclipse of the Moon July 12-13, at the Full Moon. Visible. Duration at all places, 3 hours and 2 minutes. Magnitude, 8,47 digits on the southern limb. Begins 30 minutes after 1, A.M., on 13th July.

IV. A total eclipse of the Sun July 28, in the morning at the time of New Moon. Visible as a partial eclipse only. This eclipse first appears on the earth at Santa Fe, in New Mexico, at 5h. 8m. in the morning at that place. It leaves the earth entirely in long. 26d. 7m. east, lat. 20d. 28m. north, which point is in the great desert of Sahara. The line of central or total eclipse begins in the Pacific ocean, off Queen Charlotte's Island, long. 137d. 48m. west, lat. 53d. 43m. north, and travels a N. E. direction to the Arctic circle, which it crosses in long. 90d. west. It then takes about an easterly course, and passes through the middle of Greenland; after which it takes a S. E. course, and enters Europe at Bergen, in Norway, and finally ends in the Caspian sea, long. 52d. 50m. east, lat. 39d. 6m. north.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

VENUS will be morning star until September 30th; then evening star until July 21, 1852. MARS will be morning star the whole of this year, and until January 24, 1852. JUPITER will be morning star until April 8th, then evening star until October 27th, then morning star until May 8th, 1852. SATURN will be evening star until April 14th; then morning star until October 24th; then evening star until April 27th, 1852.

MOTIONS, &c., OF THE PLANETS.

Venus will not have a retrograde motion this year, except from the 1st to 5th of January. This planet will be visible in the day time west of the sun, until about the 1st or middle of April. Mars will retrograde from Decr. 16th to March 4th, 1852. Jupiter will retrograde from February 7th to June 10th. Saturn will retrograde from August 17th to December 31st. Uranus will retrograde from August 9th to January 9th, 1852.

The moon will run highest this year, Dec'r. 10, at which time it will be in the 13th degree of Gemini, and have a declination of 22° 25' 47" north. It will run lowest December 23d, to the 12th degree of Sagittarius, having a declination of 22° 26' 33" south. Declination of Uranus in the middle of this year, 12° 18' 41.6" north. Right Ascension at the same time 2 h. 6 m. 53.7 sec. Longitude of moon's ascending node in the middle of this year 177° 15'. True obliquity of the ecliptic at the same time, 23° 27' 26" 57'.

In this season of the year every description of live stock will require attention. Sheep, cattle, and horses would thrive better if they were supplied with common salt in their troughs; attend also to the cleanliness of your animals, and remember that regular good feeding is better than irregular profusion. Much difficulty is sometimes experienced in converting the whole of the annual produce of straw and coarse litter into manure; to expedite this process, confine your horned cattle and sheep in separate yards, each provided with comfortable sheds, and spread a thick layer of straw over the whole of the yards once or twice per week, and at the same time allow the hogs free access, so that the layers may be regularly and thoroughly mixed.

MUCH of the business of the last month may still be continued. Breeding animals now require careful attention. Ewes especially should have a regular supply of roots and hay. It is bad economy to put breeding animals upon short allowance of food, especially during the winter months. It is decidedly a more profitable course to keep a small stock well, than to half starve a large stock, as is too much the practice in this country. Cast your eye along the fences before the month expires, and wherever Boreas has pushed over a panel, take care to have the necessary material, before sledding breaks up, to repair it. Every farmer should provide a couple of hundred poles extra, well piled up in some central place, on purpose to repair fences, which may fall into decay during the current season. Winter is the time in Nova Scotia to lay up a proper stock of fuel and fencing. A good farmer may be known by the state of his barns and stables, precisely as you recognize a good housewife by the state of her kitchen and larder.

THE near approach of Spring should admonish the thrifty farmer, that every operation on the farm, adapted to this season of the year, that can be conveniently executed before the ploughing season arrives, will have the effect of expediting the spring work. Much of the business of this month will consist in preparing for spring seeding. Farming implements must now be prepared if they require it; and where new ones are needed no time should be lost in having them in readiness. Every farmer should be supplied with an ample stock of good ploughs, harrows, drill-barrows and roller. No one need plead *hard times* in excuse for not having supplied himself with these and other useful farming implements. A successful system of agriculture cannot be carried on to any extent upon old cultivated land, without the aid of efficient farming implements.

The work to be done on the farm during this month is of the greatest importance. Much of the success of the farmer will depend upon the manner in which the operations of this month are carried out. Unless the ground be properly prepared, and the seed of a good quality, it is hopeless to expect a profitable crop. If information be more profitable to the husbandman at one season of the year than another, this is obviously the one in which it could be turned to the greatest account. The first thing to be considered is, a judicious system of rotation. Spring wheat may be sown after potatoes, turnips, and peas. If a preference is to be given to either of these crops, it must be in favour of potatoes. The land for this crop should have been ploughed last autumn, and the seed cannot be sown too soon in the spring. The moment the ground is sufficiently dry for the harrows, spring wheat should be sown.

'THIS is truly a joyous month for the farmer; his crops by the close of the month should all be in the ground, and the result of the coming harvest will materially depend upon the mode of tillage and general skill displayed in the operation; it therefore might prove acceptable to the practical cultivator, to advance a few hints, which may be practiced with advantage by the Nova Scotia farmers.

BARLEY.—The different species of this grain cultivated in this country are distinguished as *two-rowed*, *four-rowed*, and *six-rowed* barley; though the six-rowed is the only variety that is grown to any extent. The proper period for sowing barley is, when the forests are putting forth their leaf, which, in an average of seasons, takes place about the first of May.

THE work to be executed this month will, in a large degree, depend upon the size and character of the farm, and the ability and intelligence of the proprietor in executing needful improvements;—and therefore any general directions that may be given, will only in certain cases be applicable. By the close of the first week in this month, the potato planting will be completed, and the ruta baga and other root crops will be sown, and the majority of farmers will fancy that there is scarcely anything more to be done upon the farm until the commencement of hay-harvest; now nothing is more preposterous than this, for any correctly observing farmer must be aware that many of the operations that can be better executed at this season of the year than any other, are of the greatest importance upon a well-tilled and properly organised farm.

THIS is the proper season to extirpate weeds that are injurious to agriculture. Many farms are nearly ruined with weeds, the complete destruction of which would sacrifice a large share of the crops upon the ground; land in this state can only be made clean by a systematic course of rotation of crops, and by drill husbandry, and horse and hand-hoeing. No weeds should be permitted to grow in the fence corners, pasture grounds, or road sides; and if possible, the worst species should be destroyed that may be found among the growing crops of grain. A little attention to this matter would prove of immense importance, and would, in the course of a few years, be a means of doubling the products of the farm. It matters not how perfect the system may be that is practised, if these particulars be neglected it may so happen that the crop will turn out a failure.

By a suitable rotation of crops, by draining wet soils, and by the lessons of academies and schools, the science of agriculture made more available than in former ages for increasing the useful products of the earth. Here in America, much has been done through associations and publications: much yet remains to be done.

EXPERIMENT WITH TAR.—A Farmer thus gives the result of an experiment which he had made with tar in preserving fruit. It is so very simple and cheap, that all admirers of good fruit may have flourishing trees, and a chance for eating good fruit. As soon as the scion attains the size of a man's finger, which is generally about the first of autumn, remove the earth from the root, and deposit around the stock of the tree a half pint of soft tar, rubbing at the same time the body of the scion, for six or eight inches above the surface with tar; then replace the dirt previously removed. This process must be repeated each succeeding year, say in the month of June, increasing the quantity of tar according to the growth of the tree. My own experience, he adds, enables me to say that this receipt is infallible.

AUTUMN PLOUGHING may now be commenced with spirit, and continued until the ground becomes severely frozen with the winter's frost. Clay soils are benefited to a much greater degree by exposure to the action of the frosts than those of a sandy quality. This is the proper period for experimenting in deep ploughing, and none should be satisfied with the long established habit of merely skimming the surface some three or four inches deep, when there is a probability that by ploughing three or four inches deeper their crops might be greatly increased. A few trials by each farmer, even upon a small scale, would more effectually change public opinion on this point than any thing either of an argumental or experimental nature that we may have to advance.

If animals are provided with comfortable quarters, they will require much less food to carry them through the winter than if exposed to the chilling blasts of wind, snow, and sleet, which are invariable concomitants of a Nova Scotian winter. Provender, for cattle is the most expensive item which the farmers of this Province are in the habit of harvesting, and it therefore behoves all to deal out their winter's stock of food with the greatest possible degree of economy. True economy in wintering stock upon a short allowance of food, will be found in giving attention to the comfort of the animals, in regular feeding, and in preparing the food so that they will be induced to eat it without waste.

The Mails for the United Kingdom are despatched from Halifax every alternate fortnight in the months of January, February, March and April; and in every fortnight during the remaining months of the year. The Mail Steamers leave Boston for Halifax every other Wednesday in May, June, July, August, September, October, November and December, and every fourth Wednesday in the other months of the year, and arrives at Halifax from Boston on Thursday evenings, or very early the succeeding mornings, and leave immediately for Liverpool. The Mails are closed at Halifax on Thursday evenings at 9 o'clock. Should the Steamer arrive before that hour, the Mail is closed immediately upon her arrival. Letters are forwarded *via* United Kingdom, to Austria, Azores, Australia, Baden, Bavaria, Belgium, Bohemia, Brazil, Buenos Ayres, China, Constantinople, Cracow, Denmark, Egypt, France and Algeria, German States, Gibraltar, Hamburg, Hanover, Heligoland, Holland, Hong-Kong, Hungary, East Indies, Ionian Islands, LaPlata, Lubec, Madeira, Malta, Mauritius, Naples, New Grenada, Northern States of Europe, New South Wales, New Zealand, Oldenburg, Papal States, Poland, Portugal, Prussia, Sardinia, Spain, Turkey, and Van Dieman's Land.

The Mails for the United States are made up immediately on the arrival of the Mail Steamers from Liverpool.—Postage on letters $4\frac{1}{2}$ d. and newspapers, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d.—Must be *pre-paid*.

The Mails for Bermuda are made up on the arrival of the Mail Steamers from Liverpool, bound to Boston.

The Mails for Newfoundland, (and Cape Breton during the Summer months,) fortnightly, are made up on the the arrival of the Mail Steamer from Boston, during the months of May, June, July, August, September, October, November and December; and on the arrival of the Mail Steamer from Liverpool during the months of January, February, March and April. Letters for St. Pierre and Miquelon are forwarded to Sydney, C. B., from whence they are despatched by the French Packet.

The Land Mails (by Eastern route) for Amherst, Antigonish, Arichat, Guysborough, Londonderry, Merigomish, New Glasgow, Parrsborough, Port Hood, Pugwash, Plaister Cove, Pictou, St. Peters, Sydney, Truro, Wallace, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Canada, and the United States, are made up on Wednesday and Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock; and for Gays River and Shubenacadie, on Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock—arrive from on Monday and Friday morning, at 10 o'clock.

* It was hoped that the new postal arrangements would have come into operation in time to have had a place in the Almanacks for 1851; but owing to the delay that has occurred in perfecting the measure, we are compelled, reluctantly, not only to publish (*but to pay under*) the old system.

All letters conveyed by Post in British North America, are charged by weight. The scale of weight is the same as that by which letters to and from the United Kingdom are charged, viz:—for a letter not exceeding half an ounce, one rate—one ounce, two rates—two ounces, four rates—three ounces, six rates—four ounces, eight rates, and so on, adding two rates for every additional ounce.

The rates of postage are, for a letter not exceeding half an ounce, or one rate, (without regard to the number of enclosures,) conveyed 60 miles or under, 4½d—61 to 100 miles, 7d—101 to 200 miles, 9d—201 to 300 miles, 11½d—301 to 400 miles, 1s. 1½d—401 to 500 miles, 1s. 4d., and so on, adding 2d. sterling for every additional 100 miles. Letters to and from the United Kingdom, Quebec, Montreal, and all parts of Canada, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, Bermuda, and New Brunswick, are subject to a uniform charge of 1s. sterling, or 1. 1½d. currency per single letter. Newspapers to and from the United Kingdom, free. British Newspapers can be re-posted in Nova Scotia and sent to any part of British North America, subject to one half-penny postage. United States Newspapers, if re-posted, become liable to full letter postage. Colonial Newspapers, not exceeding two ounces in weight, sent by Post to any Town in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Canada, or Prince Edward Island, one half-penny per sheet; pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender; To the United States by Land route, 1d—by mail steamer, 2 1-2d, must be prepaid.

SHIP LETTERS.—The rates of postages on letters conveyed by private ships, are taken at the uniform rate of 4 1-2d. under half an ounce.—Under an ounce, *double*.—Under two ounces, *quadruple*.—Under three ounces, *sextuple*, and so on. Owners, Consignees, and Shippers of Goods on board vessels inward bound, are entitled to receive their letters free from sea postage, to the extent collectively of 6 ounces in weight, by any one vessel to any one such person. The Owner, Charterer, or Consignee, must be described as such on the Address and superscription; and in the case of Owners, Shippers, or Consignees of Goods, it must also appear by the ship's Manifest that they have Goods on board the vessel. Such persons are entitled to have their letters which come within the above conditions, before the master of the vessel delivers the other letters in his charge to the Post Office. * * * Every person falsely superscribing a letter to evade postage, is liable to forfeit for every offence, £10.

If printed and mailed in the United States, they are liable on delivery in this Province to the same rate of 1d. per ounce; but if re-posted, they are charged full letter postage. Pamphlets and other Publications printed in the Provinces sent to the United Kingdom, are charged full letter postage.

British re-prints from the United States by Land Mail or Steamer, are liable to full letter postage.

Newspapers, Pamphlets, Publications, and Parliamentary Proceedings, must be sent with the covers open at both ends. If this is not done, or if there be any marks or writing on them beside the address, they will be charged full letter postage.

CANADA, (East and West.)—Specie par of Exchange, 9 per cent. In Lower Canada, when the navigation is open, the Bank rate of Exchange is generally 1½ to 2 per cent. above the New York rate. In Upper Canada, 2 and 3 per cent. ditto. When the navigation is closed, the difference between the rate of Exchange in New York and Canada is seldom less than 3 and 3½ per cent.

NEW-BRUNSWICK.—Specie par of Exchange, 8 per cent. When the steamers are running between the States and New Brunswick, the Bank rate of Exchange is generally 1 per cent. above the New York rate; during the winter months about 2 and 3 per cent.; but in consequence of British Silver being legal tender to any amount at 8 per cent. premium, and being a very inconvenient remittance to the United States, the rate of Exchange in New Brunswick is less governed by the rate in New York, than would otherwise be the case.

NOVA SCOTIA.—Specie par of Exchange, 12½ per cent. The rate of Exchange in Halifax is seldom under 12½ per cent., and is sometimes 14 and 14½ per cent.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—Specie par of Exchange, 8 per cent.; and under which rate the Bank seldom draws. Generally in July and August the rate is 8 and 8½ per cent., unless exchange is under par in New York. In April, May, October and November, the rate for private Bills is generally very low: 4 to 6 per cent.—The quotation for Exchange in Newfoundland is not the same as in the other Colonies. £100 sterling realise £120 currency (8 per cent.) the Newfoundland quotation would be 20 per cent. prem.

UNITED STATES.—Specie par of Exchange, within a fraction of 9½ per cent. When Exchange is above 10½ per cent. and the rate of interest in England 5 per cent., specie can be remitted at profit of about ½ per cent. When the rate of Exchange is 6 per cent. and the rate of interest in England is 5 per cent., specie can be imported at a profit of ½ per cent.—In New York, the rate of Exchange is generally lowest in the months of January, February, and March, when the cotton bills are in the market for large amounts.

British Silver is a legal tender to the amount of £50 Currency, in one payment. Doubletons, of full weight and fineness, are a legal tender at £4 Currency each. Good Copper Coin is a legal tender for One Shilling and Three Pence, in one payment.

To bring Sterling Money to Nova Scotia Currency, add one-fourth.
To reduce Currency to Sterling, deduct one-fifth.

NOVA-SCOTIA.

HALIFAX HARBOUR, (*Maughers' Beech*).—A fixed light, erected in 1831. A circular white building, 48 feet in height; the lantern 58 feet above high water; the light is red; it is shown all night, and is seen ten miles in clear weather. Lat. 44 36 5 N, long. 63 35 40 W.

SAMBRO.—A fixed light, erected in 1783. The building is white octagon, 60 feet in height; the lantern 132 feet above high water; light is shown all night, and is seen 20 miles in clear weather. Lat. 44 26 17 N, long. 63 35 16 W. If a gun is fired during a fog, it will be answered from the island.

LUNENBURGH, (*Cross Island*).—Two lights, the upper revolving, with 1 min. interval, the lower fixed—erected in 1832. The building is red, 50 feet in height; the revolving lantern is 90 feet above high water—the fixed, 60; they are shown all night; the upper is seen 14 and the lower 8 miles in clear weather. Lat. 44 22 N, long. 64 6 W.

LIVERPOOL, (*Coffin's Island*).—A revolving light, interval 2 min., erected in 1812. An octagonal building, red and white horizontally, 58 feet in height, the lantern 90 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 16 miles in clear weather. Lat. 44 1 50 N, long. 64 40 49 W.

SHELburne HARBOUR.—Two fixed lights in one tower, vertical, 30 feet apart—erected in 1759. The building is black and white vertically, 70 feet in height; the upper lantern, 90 feet, the lower 60 feet above high water; the lights are shown all night; the upper is seen 18, and the lower 10 miles in clear weather. Lat. 43 37 21 N, long. 65 16 30 W.

YARMOUTH.—A revolving light, interval 1 min. 15 sec., erected in 1839. The building is red and white vertically; its height is 58 feet; the lantern is 185 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 20 miles in clear weather.

PICTOU HARBOUR.—A fixed light, erected in 1834. A wooden building, coloured white and red vertically, 55 feet in height, the lantern 65 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 13 miles in clear weather. Lat. 45 41 30 N, long. 62 39 57 W.

CANSO GUT, (*North entrance*).—A fixed light, erected in 1842. A square white wooden building, 35 feet in height, the lantern 110 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 18 miles in clear weather. Lat. 45 41 49 N, long. 61 29 20 W.

GUYSBORO' HARBOUR.—A fixed light, erected in 1846. A square white beacon 20 feet in height, the lantern is 30 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 8 miles in clear weather. Lat. 45 22 N, long. 61 31 W.

CANSEAU.—Two fixed lights in one tower, vertical, 35 feet apart—erected in 1822. The building is alternately white and red horizontally; it is 60 feet in height; the lantern is 88 feet above high water; the light is shown all night; the upper light is seen 15, the lower 9 miles in clear weather. Lat. 45 20 N, long. 60 55 41 W.

SYDNEY.—A fixed light, erected in 1832. The building is an octagon, painted red and white vertically; it is 51 feet in height; the

SCATARIE ISLAND.—A revolving light, erected in 1839. The building is octagonal and white, 60 feet in height; the lantern 90 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 15 miles in clear weather. Lat. 46 2 17 N, long. 59 41 W.

LOUISBURG HARBOUR.—A fixed light, erected in 1842. A square building, white with black stripes, 35 feet in height; the lantern 85 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 16 miles in clear weather. Lat. 45 53 N, long. 59 50 W.

BEAVER ISLANDS.—*E. Island.*—A revolving light, interval 2 min., erected in 1846. A white building, with two black balls seaward; 35 feet in height; the lantern 70 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 12 miles in clear weather. Lat. 44 49 N, long. 62 61 W.

NEW BRUNSWICK.

MIRAMICHI BAY.—*Escumenac Point.*—A fixed light, erected in 1841. A white wooden building, 58 feet in height; the lantern 78 feet above high water; the light shown all night, and is seen 14 miles in clear weather. Lat. 47 4 36 N, long. 64 47 46 W.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

HILLSBOROUGH BAY.—A fixed white light, erected in 1845. A white brick building, 50 feet in height; the lantern 68 feet above high water; the light is shown all night, and is seen 13 miles in clear weather. Lat. 46 3 15 N, long. 63 2 35 W.

BAY OF FUNDY.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the Compass. A very dangerous Rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called **BLONDE ROCK**, lies 34 miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this Rock and the Island there are some dangers; the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about a half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof.—A plain White Light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next Light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the West side of Digby Gut, from Brier Island North-Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is, therefore, chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin.—A White Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands of Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

BEARINGS AND DISTANCES BY COMPASS FROM THE GANNET ROCK LIGHT HOUSE :—

This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island N. N. W. $\frac{3}{4}$ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock of White Head Island, N. E $\frac{1}{2}$ E 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N N W $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N W $\frac{1}{2}$ N $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of do., called St. Mary's Ledge, WSW 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W and by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light-House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor N & by W $\frac{1}{4}$ W $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of Cape Sable Seal Islands S and by W $3\frac{1}{4}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed WHITE Lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about 45 feet above high water, and bearing from each other E S E and W N W distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other Lights upon the coast, British or American. Both the buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings, by Compass, from them :—

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E S E easterly.

“ Gannet Rock Light, E by S $\frac{1}{4}$ S 13 miles.

“ Southern Head of Grand Manan, E by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

“ Northern Head of Grand Manan, N E $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

“ North-East Rock, distant 2 miles, N E by N.

“ Little River Head, N by W.

“ Libby Island Light House (American,) N W by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights into one, as they will be then not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the E. of the Lights.

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan, and the plain white Light (American) on the West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North-East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the Main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also, at all times, to enter Head Harbour. It is a fixed white Light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head-land two Lights are placed, one above the other in the same house, and distant twenty eight feet. Both Lights can be seen from every point of the Compass

where they may be useful—both are fixed and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established above fifty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white Light, and the Light House is painted red and white in vertical stripes. The Light was enlarged in November, 1846.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a spit or bar which extends about half mile SSE off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of St. John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the Harbor at all hours of the night. A fixed white Light. The House is painted white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco Light.—A revolving white Light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, shewing twice full and twice dark in a minute. The Light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. The House is about 120 feet above the tide mark, and is painted white—a plain white Light.

Black Rock Light.—At Black Rock Point, on the south shore of the Bay of Fundy, in Lat. 45 12 N, Long 64 39 W, shows a plain white Light, 45 feet above sea level, at high water, (rise and fall about 50 feet) The building is square and painted white. Small vessels resort for shelter (at high water) to Kennedy's Breakwater, $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile east of it, and at Givan's Breakwater, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles westerly. It will be a guide for vessels in clear weather making Spencer's Island anchorage and the channel leading into the Basin of Minas. The following are bearings of the prominent head lands within view from the Light:—

- To Long Point, south shore, S 86 $\frac{1}{2}$ degrees west.
- To Givan's Breakwater, S 81 degrees west.
- To Isle of Haute, N 49 degrees west.
- To Cape Chignecto, N 21 degrees west.
- To Cape D'or, N 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ degrees east.
- To Spencer's Island, N 35 degrees east.
- To Cape Split, N 66 $\frac{1}{2}$ degrees east.
- Range of shore towards Hall's harbour, N 89 degrees east.

Apple River Light.—On Hetty Point, or Cape Capstan, in Lat. 45 35 N, Long. 64 42 W, being the north side of the entrance of Apple River, on the south shore of Cumberland Bay, about 5 leagues above Cape Chignecto, shows two Lights, horizontally, when approaching it from the westward or seaward side. The lights are about 40 feet above high water, sea level, (rise and fall about 55 feet.) The building is square and painted white, and is a conspicuous Beacon in day time to mark the entrance of Apple River. The following bearings are given from the Light:—

- To the Sisters' outermost head, S 61 degrees, west.
- To Salmon River, N 9 degrees, west.
- To Cape Enrage Light, N 41 degrees, east.
- To Grindstone Island, N 51 degrees, east.
- Along shore, easterly, N 62 degrees, east.

BEACON LIGHT ON PETER'S ISLAND, WESTPORT.—The Light Beacon erected on Peter's Island at the south entrance of Westport, on the east side of the Bay of Fundy, lit on the night of the first of November, inst., will show *two* lights, horizontally placed (to distinguish it from Brier Island) at an elevation of 40 feet above high water mark. This Beacon is intended to lead vessels into Westport, or through Grand Passage, and will be seen on the approach from Seaward and St. Mary's Bay; until shut in by S. W. point of Brier Island, bearing from it S. 54° W. and Dartmouth Point on Long Island side 25° E., and on the north side (coming out of the Bay) between north 11½° E. and N. 25° East—when in the passage, or fairway through, the light will be seen all round, and can be passed on either side, but the Eastern Passage is the deepest and widest, and is recommended to strangers. The best anchorage is on the Brier Island, or western side of the Harbour. Lat of Peter's Island, N. 44° 15'; long. W. 66 19 80; var. 16½°; rise of tide, 19½ feet. Course to Cape St. Mary's, S. 12½ E. dist. 12 miles.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

CAPE BONA VISTA.—A revolving light, interval 2 minutes, erected in 1843. The building is red and white alternately; the height of the lantern is 150 feet above high water; the light is shown all night. Lat. 48 42 N, long. 52 8 W.

HARBOUR GRACE.—A fixed light, erected in 1837. The light is shown all night, and is seen 21 miles in clear weather. Lat. 47 42 20 N, long. 49 58 23 W. (There is some uncertainty as to the position.)

St. JOHN'S HARBOUR.—A fixed light, erected in 1834. The light is shown all night. Lat. 47 33 50 N, long. 52 40 50 W.

CAPE SPEAR.—A revolving light, interval 1 min.—erected in 1836. The building is of timber, coloured white or stone; the lantern is 275 feet above high water; it is shown all night, and has been seen 30 miles. Lat 47 30 20 N, long. 52 37 5 W.

CAPE PINE LIGHT.—On S. coast of Newfoundland will be exhibited after 1st January, 1851, brilliant revolving Light, three times every minute, 302 feet above the sea, visible 30 miles. The Tower is painted red and white, alternately.

BERMUDA.

GIBB'S HILL, BERMUDA.—A revolving light, interval 58 sec., erected in 1846. The building is 130 feet in height; the lantern is 362 feet above high water, and is seen 24 miles in clear weather. Lat. 32 14 54 N, lon. 64 52 W.

Vessels in the Government employment are exempt from Light Duties.

Small ball out and large one in, a Branch Packet, or Merchant Vessel repeated.

Large ball out and small one in, a Man-of-War Steamer, or Royal Mail Steamer repeated.

When an English Packet arrives between evening and morning gun-fire, a red triangular flag will be kept flying at the mast-head from 7 till 8 o'clock.

British, Irish, and Continental Railways.

The true Railway is an invention of the nineteenth century; the lines constructed before 1800 were merely tracks of wood, stone, or iron, along which waggons were dragged by horses, and confined chiefly to collieries. An Act for the first public railway in England was obtained in 1801; in the year ending June, 1843, the income derived from passengers on British and Irish railways was \$28,000,000, and from freight of goods, \$20,000,000. In 1843, 1,191 miles of railway were completed and open for traffic in the United Kingdom, of which 289 miles were in Scotland, and 151 in Ireland. By the opening of the Chester and Holyhead railway, the mails are conveyed between London and Dublin in 17 hours. Parliament had authorized 12,012 miles of railway to be made, of which 7,000 were not opened, and of these, 4,000 would probably not be made, as proposed.

On the 1st of July, 1848, there were 4,443 miles of railways open in Britain and Ireland: on the 1st of January, 1849, 5,007 miles were in operation, viz., in Ireland, 361; in Scotland, 728; in England and Wales, 3,918; and during the six months to said 1st of January, they produced a revenue of \$28,000,000, or at the rate of \$56,000,000 a year. Taking the average of miles open during those six months at 4,756, the receipts for each mile would be nearly \$5,000, or for the year \$12,000: but this average differs on the principal lines for the half year; on the London and Northwestern it was \$12,000, and thence down to \$6,500 on the Midland, and to \$2,300 on the Great Southern and Western, of Ireland.

The expenditure on the construction of railways, up to January, 1849, is estimated by the government commissioners at about a thousand millions of dollars: in a few years it will have exceeded \$1,500,000,000. Railway bills have passed increasing the expenditure to \$1,700,000,000, were the railways to be all made. Not long ago the value of railway shares fell \$300,000,000, but have risen again, with other stocks. On July 3d, 1847, the average price of shares in the four greatest railways in England, was 148½, consols being at 89. On April 20, 1849, the shares in same railways averaged but 95, while consols were at 92.

The frauds that have been practised on the public by speculators, have induced parliament seriously to consider whether it would not be expedient to appoint commissioners on behalf of the government to audit all railroad companies' financial transactions, by way of public protection. Were this done, the utility of the plan would depend on the men chosen as auditors.

The capital actually invested, including loans expended in some of the English railroads may be thus stated: London and Northwestern, \$124,000,000; Midland, Bristol, and Birmingham, \$67,576,210; Eastern Counties and N. and E., \$58,081,000; Great Western, \$57,327,800; Southeastern, \$38,721,000; Lancashire and Yorkshire, \$41,569,030; London and Southwestern, \$36,300,000.

Many of the railways of Britain and America have united, either by amalgamation, purchase, or lease. Parliament, in July, 1849, gave \$2,400,000 to complete the railway from Dublin to Galway, across Ireland; she will also soon have a complete line from Waterford to Londonderry.

In very favorable situations, English railways, with double lines of rails, have been made for \$49,000 a mile; in very unfavorable location,

\$240,000 have been paid; seldom has a mile been made below \$58,000. In America the average cost of railways will scarcely reach \$22,500; many of them are only single line. Prussia has constructed 652 miles of railway for \$34,000,000; less than \$49,000 a mile. Austria has paid \$54,000 per mile for 495 miles; and the small German states have completed 541 at an average cost of \$91,960 per mile. All Germany has completed of railways 2,294, of which 716 are in Austria, 677 in Prussia, and 176 in Saxony; 1,748 more miles are in progress. France has built 1,360 English miles; Belgium, 347; Holland, 110; also four lines in Italy, 60 miles in Switzerland, and 18 in Spain. Sweden greatly encourages railways. The cost of railways in operation October 1, 1849, is thus estimated: Britain, 5,200 miles, \$1,000,000,000; Germany, 2,294 miles, \$250,000,000; France, 1,360 miles, \$150,000,000; the rest of Europe, 1,600 miles, \$1,000,000.

The British railways have first, second, third, and parliamentary class passengers, who pay different rates; the class from whom the greatest revenue is derived is the second. The Blackwall railway cost \$1,400,000 per mile, the Crovdon \$400,000, the Manchester and Leeds \$3,000,000. In many cases, \$40,000 up to \$80,000 per mile has been paid for the land through which the railway had to pass. In 1848, fifteen railways paid nearly a million of tax to government, besides \$1,400,000 of local rates and taxes. Connected with the railways there are 16 tunnels, the length of which, added, make 14 miles.

The number of passengers on the British and Irish railways in 1848, was 57,855,153; of these 219 were injured, and 202 killed. Of the killed, 9 were from causes beyond their control; 13 servants of the companies, do.; 41 were trespassers; 12 passengers and 125 servants of the companies from want of caution. There were 188,177 persons employed by all the railroads in progress, ay, 1848; and 75,688 officers and laborers on the railroads open for traffic, among whom were 4,360 clerks, 3,206 engine drivers, 10,814 artificers, 2,475 policemen, 7,630 porters, 1,391 plate-layers, 1,110 foremen.

RAILROADS IN EUROPE.—At the end of 1847 there were 3,816 miles of Railroad in use in Britain and Ireland, of which 780 miles were opened that year, and 595 in 1846. The distance between London and Exeter, via Bristol, 220 miles, is regularly run over in 4½ hours. A new rail, with a convex surface, is much admired. The average cost of British Roads is \$140,000 per mile; of Mass, ditto, \$40,000. The receipts on 3,506 miles, January to July, '48, were \$21,216,000, being less per mile than in '47. Britain expended 156 millions of dollars on Railways in 1846, of which one-third would go to the excise and customs for taxes. There are 3,000 miles in progress of construction, each of which will require 700 tons of cast and malleable iron, equal to 820 tons of pig; or, in all, 2,460,000 tons. France in 1844, had 1,241 miles of Railway finished. The Zoll Verein had 1,731 miles. Britain has already expended 827 millions of dollars on Railways.

Railroads in the United States.

There were in operation, in the United States, in 1848, lines of Railroad extending at least 5,250 miles. Twenty years before that (viz. in 1828,) there was not a mile of Railway in the Union. Train-roads had been used previously for transporting coal, stone, &c. The capital employed in constructing and improving Railroads is said to exceed 225 millions of dollars.

The rate of fare charged to passengers on many of the lines is very high, yielding enormous profits, which the Legislatures have generally reserved the power to curtail. The Utica and Albany Company have placed on their Line night cars, in which passengers repose with comfort, on richly-furnished seats, with inclined semi-circular backs. In New York, New England, and Pennsylvania, many Roads have been recently relaid with heavy T. or H. Rail, and their foundations improved. From her 900 miles of Railroads Massachusetts derived, in 1847, an income of \$5,200,000, on a capital of 40 millions. Railroads to connect the St. Lawrence with Boston are in progress; also a great Road to unite Pittsburgh with Philadelphia; the Hudson River Railroad was opened in 1849. The United States pays Railroads about \$600,000 a year for carrying the mails, and they form a powerful means of defence in war, and of internal commerce at all times.

The Commissioners for consolidating the Laws of the Province will have perfected their labours before the meeting of the Legislature. The Laws now occupying four ponderous folio volumes, which reach to the year 1835, and sixteen loose numbers stitched in pamphlet form, will, it is confidently affirmed, be embraced within a quarto, about the size of one No. of Burns' Justice.

THE PROVINCIAL CONSTITUTION.

The Government of Nova Scotia is administered by a Lieutenant Governor, by and with the advice of an Executive Council. The Executive Council consists of nine members; five of these hold seats, at present, in the House of Assembly; the remaining four are members of the Legislative Council. There are four Public Departments, which are presided over by leading Members of the Executive Government; these are the Attorney General, the Provincial Secretary, the Financial Secretary, and the Receiver General. The Surveyor General presides over a fifth Public Department, which has not hitherto been treated as Political. All the Heads of Public Departments, as well as the Solicitor General, are ex-officio Members of the Executive Government.

The Legislative Council is composed, at present, of twenty-two Members. Twenty-one is the number beyond which the Lieutenant Governor cannot appoint, without special leave of Her Majesty. They are supposed to hold their seats during life, if solvent and of good behaviour.

The House of Assembly consists of fifty-one members; 27 of whom sit for Counties; the remaining 24 for Townships.

The Executive Council hold office only while they command the confidence of the Representatives of the People; and are liable to be displaced at any moment from all offices strictly political, by a formal vote of the Assembly. General Elections occur once in four years, and come off simultaneously in all the Counties and Townships. The fourth and last session of the present Assembly is that which transpires in 1851, immediately after which the present House will be dissolved, preparatory to a General Election. The qualification of Elector and Elected is a forty shilling freehold; if held by Deed or Grant it must be duly registered six months before the date of the issuing of the Writs for the Election.

THE WEATHER—STORMS.—Professor Henry addressed a circular to many persons, in November, 1848, requesting their aid to establish an extended system of observations with reference to storms on this continent. When the *mercury* in a barometer is very low, expect high winds and storms; its fall in sultry weather indicates thunder. A citizen of New York, who noted the highest and lowest degrees of the thermometer there, the daily mean, and the quantity of water from rain and melted snow, for the first three months in each of the last four years, gives the results in each of the months, and of each first quarter, showing that there was no great difference, although we often hear it said, "I never knew such weather." Dr. Lardner, in his lectures, tells us that careful observation disproves the assertion that the moon exerts an influence on the weather, and that a change of weather may be looked for at the epochs of new and full moon.

PUNCTUALITY.—Melancthon, when he made an appointment, expected not only the hour but the minute to be fixed, that no time might be wasted in idleness or suspense; and Washington, when his Secretary being repeatedly late in his attendance, laid the blame on his watch, said: "you must get another watch, or I another Secretary."

THE WIFE.—It needs not guilt to break a husband's heart; the absence of content, the mutterings of spleen; the untidy dress and cheerless home; the forbidding scowl, and deserted hearth; these, and other nameless neglects—without a crime among them, have harrowed to the quick the core of many a man, and planted there, beyond the reach of cure, the germ of dark despair. Oh! may Woman, before that long sad sight arrives, dwell on the recollections of her youth, and cherishing the dear idea of that tuneful time, awake and keep alive the promises she then so kindly gave; and though she may be the injured one—the forgotten, not the forgetful wife—a happy allusion to that hour of peace and love—a kindly welcome to a comfortable home—a smile of love to banish hostile words—a kiss of peace to pardon all the past, and the hardest heart that ever locked itself within the breast of selfish man will soften to her charms, and bid her live as she had hoped, for years in matchless bliss—loved, loving and content—the soother of the sorrowing hour—the source of comfort and the spring of joy.

MARRIAGE.—I never knew a marriage expressly for money that did not end unhappily. Yet managing mothers and heartless daughters are continually playing the same unhappy game. I believe men more frequently marry for love than women, because they have a free choice. I am afraid to conjecture how large a portion of women marry who think they will never have a better chance, and dread being dependent. Such marriages no doubt sometimes prove tolerably comfortable, but a great number would have been far happier single. If I may judge by my observation of such matters, marrying for a home is a most tiresome way of getting a living.—*Mrs. Child.*

SELF RELIANCE.—Bad luck, as well as mischance and misfortune, are all the daughters of misconduct, and sometimes mother of success, prosperity, and advancement. To be thrown on one's resources, is to be cast into the very lap of fortune. Had Franklin entered Philadelphia with a thousand dollars in his pocket, instead of one shilling and ninepence, as he did, in all probability he would have gone on a "spree" instead of hunting up employment—and died at thirty-five, from driving tandem teams and drinking brandy-smashers, instead of living to the green old age of eighty, and dying a philosopher, whose amusement was the taming of the thunderbolts and bottling up lightning. Had Napoleon's father been the owner of a princely estate, his son would never have got to be emperor. A good kick out of doors is better for a boy than all the rich uncles in the world. 'I will,' was her reply. And I said I would devote my life to make her happy. She deserved that I should—she gave me thirty-four years of the purest happiness that man ever enjoyed. My uncle was desirous that I should obtain a much larger fortune, and I thought he would disinherit me. But I did not care for that."

"And your profession made you independent?"

"Yes,—the first year I was at the bar I made £58; the second year about £150; the third year £200; the fourth year about 300 guineas. I then advanced rapidly; and the last year of my practice I got £9,000, (\$44,000), although I lost one term."

"Did your wife reside in Tralee?" "She did, with her grandmother; and it was my delight to quiz the old lady, by pretending to complain of her grand-daughter's want of temper. 'Madam,' said I, 'Mary would do very well, only she is so cross.' 'Cross, Sir? My Mary cross? Sir, you must have provoked her very much! Sir, you must yourself be quite in fault! Sir, my little girl was always the gentlest, sweetest creature born.' 'And so she was,' he added, after a pause. 'She had the sweetest, the most heavenly temper, and the sweetest breath.'"
