

A GREAT BIBLICAL FIND.

The eminent Hebrew scholar Moses Gaster describes in the Times a discovery which he believes on good account to be the authentic text of a Samaritan version of the Book of Joshua, which has been lost to the world for 2,000 years. Three hundred years ago Scaliger obtained an Arabic chronicle, based on this text. from Samaritans at Cairo, but he failed to secure the original, the existence of which has been denied by biblicat scholars. Gaster, however, in 1907, while visiting Samaritans at Cablius, was presented with a copy by a high priest, and purchased a second copy from the verger of the sanctuary.

The text of the Samaritan version is substantially identical with our canonical or Massoretic version to the end of the thirteenth chapter. After this there are radical differences, omissions of incidents in sacred history derogatory to or discrediting the claims of the Samaritans.
