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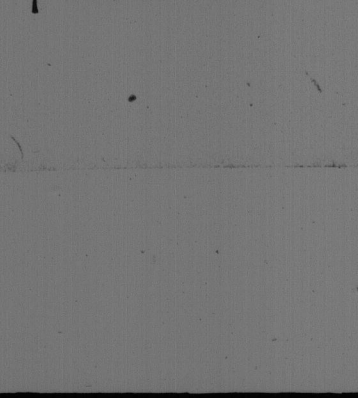
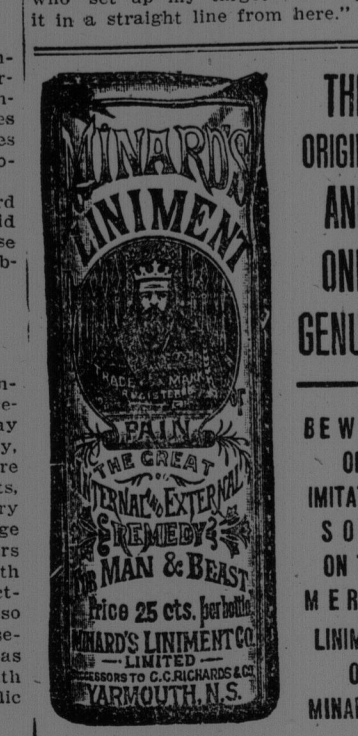

THE WINTER PORT.

Winter port traffic at Sand Point is drawing to a close. The season has been a most successful one and St. John has perhaps never before so fully realized what this business means to it. It is all very well to say that if there were no winter port there would be something else to give employment to thousands of citizens during the winter months. There would probably be nothing of the kind, and certainly during the past season, times would have been pretty hard. Between 3,000 and 2,500 men have found employment in the warehouses or around the steamships. While it cannot be said that any of them are becoming millionaires from the amount of work they have been able to secure, still the fact remains that employment has been more or less steady throughout the entire winter and the longer hours, and others engaged in the different branches, have been in the enjoyment of almost regular wages. The season has been ahead of the last in the amount of freight handled. Who are Nagging Him, Says John Burroughs, the Eminent Naturalist

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 19.—John Burroughs, naturalist and friend of Theodore Roosevelt, tonight entered a protest against those who rail at Mr. Roosevelt for shooting the animals of Africa. Mr. Burroughs who is sojourning in southern California, is quoted as saying: "Mr. Roosevelt entered into his great African hunt purely in the spirit of the naturalist. I have no patience with the wild animalists and the birds are endowed with human attributes. 'It is shameful the way the newspaper correspondents are nagging Mr. Roosevelt. I should say he would have a perfect right to shoot the fellows who will endeavor to destroy the privacy and recreation that rightfully belongs to him.'"

WANTS \$10,000,000 TO TALK TO MARS

Professor Pickering Says His Flash Scheme Could be Put in Effect by July.

BOSTON, Mass., April 20.—If mankind cares enough about it to put out \$10,000,000 there is no very good reason why the human race should not be able to talk with Mars, and that so soon as next July, according to Professor William Henry Pickering, Harvard University's celebrated astronomer. Communication with the Martians will be made possible, Professor Pickering declares, by adopting his method of flashing messages when Mars approaches the earth to within thirty-thirty-five million miles, or about five million miles nearer than ever before.

TO GUARD THE REALMS OF AIR

BRITAIN'S FINANCES.

Great Britain is rather more fortunate than Canada in its financial returns for the past year. It was anticipated that the deficit would amount to several million pounds, owing both to a shrinkage in revenue consequent upon the prevailing depression and to increased expenditure. The returns as recently published indicate that the deficit in revenue will amount to only one and a half million pounds, while at the same time there has been such material saving in expenditure that the net deficit is only £2,000,000. The estimates and supplementaries which it was anticipated would total £115,512,000, reached only £112,789,000, or a saving of £2,723,000. There were decreases in the revenues from excise, estate duties, stamps and post office, and increases from the house tax, income tax, Sugar Canal and on miscellaneous accounts.

SQUADRON OF EMPIRE CRUISERS

One of the most interesting features of the new scheme for the redistribution of the British navy, shortly to come into operation, says the London Daily Chronicle, relates to the Second Cruiser Squadron, now attached to the Atlantic fleet. It was this squadron of four ships which, under the command of Vice-Admiral Sir Percy Scott, recently visited South Africa, and South America, much to the delight of the British communities in those parts.

It is probable that the four fine cruisers of the Warrior class will be chosen for the service, although they are such powerful vessels that they might be better employed at home. The alternative suggestion is for four cruisers of the Devonshire class (10,800 tons) to be detailed.

The naval distribution, which came into partial operation on March 24, when Admiral Sir William May took command of the fleet in the Mediterranean by the replacing of obsolescent by more modern ships.

Now that the centre of naval activity has shifted to the East Coast—to say nothing of friendly relations with France and Russia—it has become possible not only to reduce the strength of the Channel Fleet, but also to abolish altogether the Atlantic Fleet—the functions of which was to reinforce the Channel of Mediterranean Fleets. This will be done as opportunity offers.

The eight battleships of the Formidable class of 15,000 tons will, it is understood, form the nucleus of the fleet to be based on the new Scottish base at Rosyth, while the eight King Edwards, of 15,300 tons, will remain in the Channel.

ST. LAWRENCE IS NOW OPEN TO NAVIGATION

MONTREAL, April 19.—To the Montreal belongs the chief credit of making possible navigation on the St. Lawrence between Montreal and Quebec, open today.

Since the 12th of January last this 2,400 horse power ice breaker has been "bucking" against ice, in a record attempt to clear the St. Lawrence.

Today the work was completed and navigation is open ten days earlier than last year. But for the good work done by the Montclair, it might have been two weeks yet before the channel was clear.

Next year, with equal facilities, it may be possible to open the St. Lawrence for navigation by April 10. The whole route to the sea is now open and ready for any steamer to come up to Montreal.

ANOTHER SEARCH FOR THE OAK ISLAND TREASURE

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S., April 17.—For the first time the recovery of the treasure supposed to have been hidden on the island of St. John's, N. S., by the British captain, Lord Cornwallis, in 1781, is being undertaken by expert engineers.

The "nature protection" designed by the old pirates has proved too much of an enigma for the crude methods heretofore used, but must quickly yield to modern scientific equipment.

TO MAINTAIN THE BRITISH SUPREMACY

(W. T. Stead in Daily Mail, London) The nation, at last roused to a realising sense of the fact that its naval supremacy is seriously threatened, will do well to concentrate its attention on the one vital point—viz., What standard of our naval strength is adequate to secure our national safety and the existence of our Empire? All other questions are subsidiary. Let us decide once for all what is the "right" standard, and then keep to it, without further falter. Matters of life and death ought not to be left open for discussion.

Hitherto it has been declared that a two-Power standard was essential, and, all alarmists notwithstanding, we have maintained that standard for years past, and still maintain it. Measured by any class of vessels, and most of all if measured by Dreadnoughts, we have not merely a two-Power standard, but something more—a three-Power standard.

DISREGARD THE FINANCIAL QUESTION! Of course, this will not be tolerated for one moment. There is no need to argue that point. It is only necessary to bring out the facts in clear relief of the matter to secure a prompt and practically unanimous decision that at all costs, without even counting the cost, our naval supremacy must be placed beyond all possible rivalry or dispute.

It is idle to ask where the money is to come from. It will come, we are all rightly, from the pockets of those whose pockets would be emptied for ever if we lost command of the sea. Lord Rosebery's Drednought type, which, as Mr. Asquith has told us, "will gradually exclude all other effective competitors" of other vessels.

THE IRREDUCIBLE MINIMUM. The only question to be asked is, What is the irreducible minimum of naval supremacy that is necessary to maintain our national independence and our imperial existence? This is not a question for party or for passion. We are up against one of those issues upon which the instinct of self-preservation speaks the decisive word.

THE DISPUTED STANDARDS. If we must reject the two-Power plus 10 per cent. formula, we must equally but regretfully abandon the status quo formula put forward at the Hague Conference.

THE SOLUTION OF THE PROBLEM. This, then, is the irreducible minimum which the nation should demand of the Executive of the day.

GOVERNMENT TOO LIBERAL WITH THE DRUMMONDS. Royalty Provisions Lasting for 80 Years Severely Criticised—Company Also Gets Big Water Privileges—Game Act Passed.

FREDERICTON, April 19.—Replies were given to a number of inquiries. The House was called on to discuss and considered the bill in aid of the development of the Gloucester iron deposits.

Mr. Byrne said he wished to correct an impression that seemed to have gone abroad that he was opposed to giving assistance to the Drummond Iron Company. He was at all times desirous that the company should have every encouragement, but he did not intend to support the bill which fixed a royalty of five cents a ton for a term of 80 years.

Mr. Tweeddale said that the history of iron mining everywhere showed that the privilege of erecting a dam in the Nepesqui River was under discussion.

PROVINCIAL RIGHTS UPHeld BY LAURIER

OTTAWA, April 19.—This was the day in the House of Commons when Mr. Foster proposed that today's session should be set apart for the discussion of the New Brunswick Royal Commission report he introduced with out the member for Thunder Bay and Rainy River.

Mr. Laurier concluded by stating that "If we pass this bill we will interfere directly with that policy and therefore under such circumstances holding as I have always held to sacredness if the word is not too strong, of provincial rights, although I have power to evade those rights, it is a question of whether or not we should do so, and it is a question which I would commend to the consideration of the promoter of the bill."

TOOK UP THE DAY. The debate in question of respective jurisdiction of federal and provincial government to pass the bill in question took up practically the whole of the day.

They had, he said, been engaged for about six hours in discussing a bill and checking the passage of other bills, and it was evident from the temper of the house that it would not go through tonight if at all.

THE HOUSE ADJOURNED AT 11:15 AFTER clearing off order paper so far as private bills are concerned. Tomorrow Mr. Fielding will make his budget statement.

WOULD NULLIFY COURT'S ACTION

MONTREAL, April 19.—None of the seven amendments passed on Saturday by the court of review attempted to take their seats at today's meeting of the City Council, though most of them were in attendance in the ante-room, and from that point of vantage listened to their former fellow members debate on an application to the legislature for an act nullifying the decision of the court restoring the aldermen to their former position and regularizing the objectionable expenditure.

This resolution was passed unanimously. In the meantime the civic funds remain tied up. The approval of the finance committee is necessary before the council can pass the expenditures, and as there is no finance committee this approval cannot be secured. It is hoped the legislature will lend a willing ear to the cry of distress and place the unsettled aldermen once more in good standing and thus enable the city to meet its obligations.

Voting started as soon as the polls opened this morning and continued briskly all day. A very heavy vote was polled early in the day and the indications are that the total will be one of the largest recorded in many years.

Workers representing the various candidates and the different interests were at the polls in force. Vigorous efforts were made to get out every last vote, and pretty nearly everything that had wheels and that bore any resemblance to a coach or a carriage was impressed into the service.

Realizing the difficulty of this contest most of the candidates had their forces better organized than usual, and the campaign for ballots was waged with unusual briskness.

The civil servants and the labor unions who entered the contest with knives out for a number of the candidates on account of their stand on the tax exemption issue helped to make the campaign a lively one, and as a result of the over zealousness of some of the workers several clashes were reported.

The temperance forces were largely engaged in the ward option contest but most of them found time to take a "whack at the aldermen who turned them down in the common council when their petitions were presented."

Every candidate who had signed the petition for the temperance plebiscite and all those whose sympathies were known to be that way were marked by the liquor people and the latter did all they could to spoil the chances of these gentlemen reaching the council.

So many were the counter interests at work in every part of the city that it was harder this year to predict the result than any of the recent elections. With so many different issues at stake almost every candidate has a fair chance of winning, but the bulk of the opposition seems to be going against the unprogressive members of the old council. From the way the ball was cast today it looked as if there will be quite a number of changes in the new board of aldermen.
