

The old Providence depot, Boston, one of the old landmarks of the city, was to have been blown up with dyna-mite on Tuesday morning, under the direction of the division superintendent of the railroad. It was covered with canvas and wire rigging to prevent debris falling into Park Square. It was built in January, 1878, at a cost of \$800,000.
