The town council met in regular session on Monday evening. Present, Mayor Magee and Aldermen, Craig, Bogue, Kent, Cawley, McKenzie and Mestlin. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Alderman McKenzie handed in the report of Police Magistrate Johnson which was read and approved. The following bills were presented and referred to respective committees, John Maxwell labor, \$23.13, Wm. Maxwell labor, \$23.63, St. George Pulp & Paper Co. \$1.75, James Fraser labor, \$1.75, Arthur Maxwell labor, \$29.15, Edwin Maxwell labor, \$5.25, Wm. Spianey labor, \$8.75, Alfred Spianey labor, \$8.75. After being examined by committee the bills were ordered to be paid. It was moved by Alderman Craig and seconded by Alderman Mestlin that an order be drawn on the town treasurer to the amount of \$100 to cover the amount voted for the Campbellton fire. Carried.

General News.

Glasgow, Aug. 6.—Scotland's first big aviation meet opened today and will continue through the coming week. The meet is international in character, the entries including many of the foremost aviators of Great Britain and the continental countries. The list of prizes offered aggregates \$40,000.

Under the marriage law of New Jersey which goes into force next month applicants for licenses must swear and prove that they are not epileptics or of unsound minds, and that they have never been inmates of insane asylums or institutions for the indigent. This ought to do good.

Hopewell Hill, N. B. Aug. 7.—Rev. W. A. Snelling, who has been pastor of the Hopewell Baptist church for the past two years, and who some time ago sent in his resignation to take effect in three months, announced today that he had accepted a call to the St. Martins church, recently tendered him, and would enter upon his duties there first Sunday in September. Mr. Snelling has been a devoted pastor of the Albert field and a great temperance worker.

The farther Sir Wilfrid Laurier goes the further he seems to get. His speech at Saskatoon, in which he gave voice to his earnest desire to see in his lifetime Canadians of all races united in devotion to the cause of Canadian nationality, was up to the standard of his finest oratory. No wonder the great Northwest is welcoming the chief with open arms. Sir Wilfrid understands the West, and the west appreciates his worth as a man and a statesman.

Halifax, Aug. 7.—There are busy scenes along the waterfront these days fitting out the sealers for their long trip to the South Atlantic and Indian oceans. The fleet this year will be the largest yet, seven stamach schooners making the trip. The latest addition to the fleet is the Nova Scotia schooner Isabel May, built for A. J. Betchell, of Victoria, B. C.

The sealers will sail the end of the month and will be away a year. Two hundred men will make the trip.

The settlement of the Grand Trunk strike, through the good office of the Hon. Mackenzie King, assisted by Sir Frederick Borden, will be welcomed by the country at large. The Grand Trunk has agreed to take back all the men who have not been guilty of rioting or disorderly conduct, at the rate of wages offered by President Hays before the strike and to per the standard rate of wages in force a year earlier than originally proposed. Mr. Hays appears to have acted very generously under the circumstances. The Minister of Labor stuck to his task with dogged determination, in the face of the most unscrupulous and unscrupulous tactics of the strikers. It is a success for him to see the strikers

Census of Agriculture.

The next census of agriculture will be taken under date of June 1911. The area, product and value of field crops, harvested in 1910 will be enumerated for fall wheat, spring wheat, barley oats, rye, corn for husking, buckwheat, beans, peas, flax, mixed grains, hay and clover, alfalfa or lucerna, corn for forage, other forage crops, turnips mangolds, sugar beets, other field roots, tobacco and hops; and grass seed, red clover seed and alsike clover seed will be enumerated for product and value. Grain and other field crops for the harvest of 1911 will be taken by areas only, as none of these crops will be ripe at the taking of the census. The products of these crops will be gathered later in the year from the report of these correspondents. Animals and animal products, also under the head of agriculture, will include the number of horses three years old and over, horses under three years, milch cows, other horned or neat cattle, sheep, swine, turkeys, geese, ducks, hens and chickens, and hives of bees held or owned by each person at the date of the census on 1st June 1911. The number of horses, milch cows, other horned or neat cattle, sheep, swine and poultry sold in 1910 will be recorded, as well as the wool, milk, home-made cheese, eggs and honey products of the year, and the quantities of milk and cream sent to factory or sold. Pure-bred animals registered, or eligible for registration, which are owned at this time of taking the census will be enumerated for horses, cattle, sheep and swine, but their number will also be counted with all other animals.

Report of Andrew Elliott, Delegate to Summer Meetings for the New Brunswick Department, June 13 to July 23, 1910

Hon. D. V. Landry, Commissioner for Agriculture. In representing to you my report of work done June 13 to July 23, 1910, allow me to acknowledge the completeness of preliminary work. I found that the meetings had been well advertised and arrangements for meetings placed in careful hands. I am pleased also to note that quite a number of members of the legislature attended meetings and gave addresses, among whom were Premier Hazen, Dr. Landry, Commissioner for Agriculture, Mr. Dixon of Hillsboro, Mr. Woods of Welsford, and a number of others whose names nor addresses I did not catch. One thing particularly pleasing to me was the fact that not once was there the remotest hint as to the political alignment of the persons who spoke, all alike expressing their appreciation of the importance of a better agriculture throughout the province.

To me these meetings have been particularly encouraging. They were well attended by an enquiring people and I am hopeful that the foundation is being firmly laid for a general uplift of the agriculture of the province. Perhaps by no means can this be done so effectively as by bringing before the people—all the people—at all times, the tremendous importance of the soil as the only foundation of Provincial and Canadian greatness. Compared with the soil every other avenue of wealth sinks into insignificance.

From my observation, I think that the best time to hold these meetings is during the summer between seedtime and having. If I may be allowed to suggest, I think it would be a move in the right direction to have a woman delegate along to give separate talks to the women during the afternoon and address joint meetings in the evening. I have to acknowledge the valuable assistance I received from Mr. John Woods of Welsford, who was with me for six days, also from Rev. J. B. Daggett with whom I went to Deer, Campbell and Grand Manan Islands. At most of the places visited meetings were held at 29 different points, 99 different addresses were given and there was a total attendance of 3857 people, an average attendance at each place of 133 and a total meeting of 32 persons. Every where I met carefully attentive people. Again thanking you for your arrangements, which did so much to make my work a pleasure, I remain, Yours respectfully, ANDREW ELLIOTT.

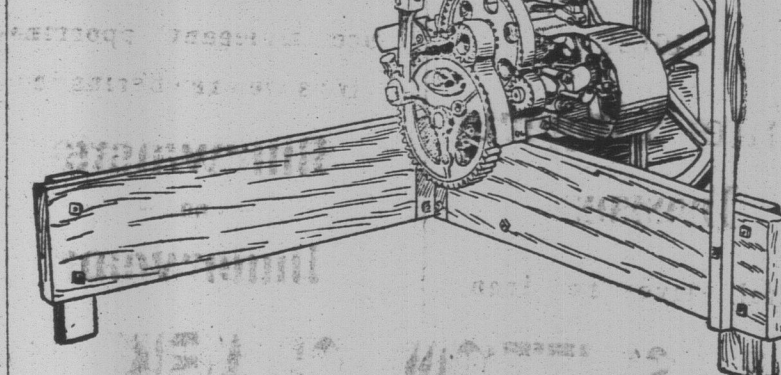

The Leaning Tower of Pisa

The Leaning Tower of Pisa is one of the world's wonders, and thousands who have never seen Italy know it for a familiar thing. For this reason, and because, like all fine things, it is a possession not only of the town in which it stands but of those who love art everywhere, the disquieting information concerning it which was made public last week must be received with very real concern all over the world. The substance of the news is that the lean has increased; to be precise, that whereas eighty years ago it leaned fifteen feet and a half an inch out of the perpendicular it now leans ten and a half inches more. There is danger, it seems, of its suffering the fate of the famous Campanile in Venice, its rival among the bell towers of Italy, and one day tumbling to its foundations. They have stopped the great bells from ringing and are striking the smaller ones with a hammer lest tolling them should make the building sway to destruction. The history of its building is one of the romances of architecture. One Giovanni di the city began it seven centuries ago with the help of a German, a certain William of Imbrunco. While they were working on it the foundations slipped and the building was abandoned, standing unfinished like a second babel for a hundred and fifty years. About 1340, just at the start of the Hundred Years' War in England, it was completed by Tomaso Pisano, the son of the famous Pisano sculptor Andrea. So is established the strange fact that the lean which has given it its fame, and gave Galileo an experimental station for his researches in dynamics, was accidental and no part of the original scheme.

JAPS "WEDDED" AFTER DEATH

A strange story comes in a recent mail from Japan of a tragic ending of a love story in Tsuzuki, a seaside village in Shizuoka. It appears that a young man named Ono Matsunoski, aged 20, and a girl named Ono, 19, of the same village fell in love with each other and sought their parents' sanction to their union. For some reason this was withheld in the case of the girl, and the couple resolved to commit *shinjū* rather than be separated.

Accordingly, the girl left her home and joined her lover at a trysting place. The two then embarked on a fishing boat belong to the young man's father. At a point some distance from the shore the couple bound themselves together with some cloth brought with them for the purpose and threw themselves into the sea.

The following morning the couple were missed and the matter was communicated to the police. Later the bodies of the young couple were washed ashore and, after the official examination delivered to the parents.

On learning the tragedy the mayor of the village was much affected, and calling upon the bereaved parents, proposed that the wedding ceremony be performed over the dead bodies, so that the deceased might be united in the other world. The parents agreed and the ceremony was carried out in due form, even to the exchange of parents between the two families.

The ceremony was legally registered as it had taken place before the deaths had been officially entered on the register.

Cheap Rates to Dominion Exhibition

Transportation Companies Vying With one Another in Excursion Figures

All roads will lead to St. John, N.B., during the Dominion Exhibition, September 5th to 15th. The I. C. R. Railway will make very attractive concessions from all points on the line, not only previous to and on some days after the big show, but on special excursion days they will reduce fares to as low as one half first-class one-way ticket for the round trip. This will apply to the Prince Edward Island Railway also. The C. P. R. Company will not be outdone by the other transportation companies, and the Exhibition Association has issued a neat table of excursions and rates which can be had for the asking. The Dominion Atlantic Railway Company in both traction and steamship lines will have one fare rates, so will the various smaller lines throughout the Maritime Provinces, both steamship and railroad, whilst the Eastern Steamship Company and D. A. R. boats running to the city of Boston and intermediate coast-wise points will approximate half rates.

Wins Snail-Pace Record.

Boston, Aug. 1 The lumber laden schooner *Lodaska*, Capt. Small, arrived in port yesterday, and being up a new record for slow passages, having been 52 days coming 262 miles. The schooner left Grand Manan early in June, and on her passage, and on her passage which averaged but five miles a day the pumps and calking iron were her principal instruments of navigation.

Wider Pleads Guilty.

New York, Aug. 3—Edwin J. Wider, the young cashier of the Russo-Chinese Bank in this city, whose stealings from the bank's security box resulted in a loss of upwards of \$500,000 to the institution, pleaded guilty today to the indictment found against him in connection with the embezzlement. Wider was remanded for sentence on August 10.

He quotes special officials reports from every port of entry in the west showing that the number of dissatisfied who are returning in 1910 has actually been less than in any years since the big American rush started.

He saw a canoe capsized and quickly divesting himself of his clothing rescued two canoeists from drowning. When the hero returned to shore he found that small boys had gone through his pockets and skipped with \$18. The men whose lives were saved evidently did not think the salvage worth \$18 and refused to reimburse the rescuer. Unless the Carnegie fund will make good is one here in Connecticut who has gone out of business.

The Westward Call.

We now arrive at the time of year when the West is calling our young men to go and reap the harvest which if all reports are true will not be as abundant as in recent years. We venture the opinion that there will be fewer applicants for this year on the harvest excursion and that the drain on the Maritime Provinces will be less than for many years. The novelty of the Harvests Excursion has worn off, the charm is lost.

In past years men have gone west only to find lack of work, one of the enemies to greet them on their arrival. They found that it was with the greatest difficulty three years ago that they could find enough money to procure their return ticket. This year there is a strong possibility that the occurrence of three years ago will be duplicated.

From nearly every quarter comes the same story of a short crop in the West and those who propose taking the trip had better get prepared for the worst. The report comes that the hay and vegetable crops of Manitoba are complete failures. If this be so, high prices for these will be in order.

These things being as they are it does not seem that this year is the best time for our young men to think of going West unless they have more definite employment in view than working in the harvest fields. A harvest hand out West is a harvest hand, and those who are expecting of big pay for little work will be sadly mistaken. Now is the time to think of these things and not when the harvest excursion has reached a point thousands of miles from home.

We cannot see why our men find it necessary to make the trip westward when our own farmers are crying out for help, and are offering from \$30 to \$40 per month and board to steady farm hands. If men are anxious for work, here is an opportunity right in our own provinces, and under conditions with which they are familiar. For those who are assured of a position upon the arrival of the harvest excursion it may be a good thing, but otherwise home is the best place.

"Count on us and Sir Wilfrid" ---So Say 500 Germans

"God bless our German fellow-countrymen in their declaration. Count on us," he began. "Oh, that we older citizens of our country were inspired by the same grand spirit! At this moment, yonder in the older East, among my own compatriots, I am being denounced as a traitor to my origin because I stand by the Canadian Navy my German fellow-Canadians are prepared to man. How my act is treason to my native land I cannot understand. Then they go to English-speaking Provinces and declare I am seeking to separate Canada from the British Empire, that I am aiming towards independence. They would create prejudice against me among both races, the French and the British. They would fan into flame the dying ashes of race preju-

dice and race foment, all to create a feeling against me

"Fellow-Canadians all, beware of the appalling danger of arousing these passions. As for myself, I am accustomed to misrepresentation of that kind, and I do not fear for myself any such appeals. When I was called upon to deal with the Manitoba school question I was denounced as a traitor to my race and religion. When the Autonomy Bills were introduced I was denounced by those who would arouse the extreme Catholic in Quebec and the extreme Protestant in Ontario, but I was not afraid of the result.

A THRILL OF PRIDE

"I have tried all my life to stand on the broad principle of Canadian citizenship, and I have learned to rely at all times on the support of reasonable and fair-minded men. I have done what is in me, my best for Canada, for our country. Men there are today, men there were yesterday, men there will be tomorrow who will ponder to passion and prejudice in Canada. Thank God my soul is conscious of no such feeling. Yes, I thank God tonight, with the sunrise of tomorrow, when the telegraph flashes to the outermost parts of the civilized world the news that the German citizens of Canada were the first to give assurance that the Canadian navy could count on them, sir, there will be a thrill of pride all over Canada and the British Empire. A lesson for certain bigots is to be found in various parts of our country and Empire.

New Brunswick is a great resort for hunters of big game. This fact will be better understood in the light of a despatch from Moncton. It is stated that a farmer, living not far from that town, visited the chief of police and complained that his crops were being destroyed by moose and deer. He had seen six moose and thirteen deer in his one time, and had found it necessary to set his dog on the animals to drive them away. The guardian of the peace informed the farmer that he should make his complaint to the game warden. Next autumn these moose and deer will afford rare sport for the hunters. The story just told must not be understood to convey the idea that the province is largely peopled by moose and deer. These animals flourish because there is a game protective association and a guide's association, and because it is the policy of the provincial government to protect the game and get revenue from the hunters, who come from other parts of Canada, the United States and even the Old Country.

Does Farming Pay?

Notwithstanding the fact that the country is being cleared up, that substantial dwellings are being erected on farms to replace the original humble structures, that the farmers come to town in carriages driving fine horses, that some of them own their motor cars, that nearly all of them have excellent farm machinery, that many of them carry comfortable bank accounts and they all have plenty to eat and sufficient to wear, it is the easiest thing in the world to find a man who will insist that farming does not pay. A farmer will charge against his crop the interest on the cost of his land, his own labor at the price which he would have to pay for another man's farm, and he calls the balance what he has made or lost as the case may be. Figured out this way the profit is likely to be very small, but why should he charge himself with the interest? The interest is a part of his profit. The price of his labor and the labor of his team are also a part of his profit. We have seen a set of farm accounts which the farmer showed conclusively that he lost money on everything he raised, yet, by an unaccountable process, that is unaccountable to him, he always had more money at the end of the year than at the beginning.

The keeping of farm accounts is quite a complicated matter. A merchant buys goods, pays freight and insurance on them, knows exactly what his rent and clerk hire amounts to, knows the price for which he sells them and how much interest he has to pay, and no very great skill is needed to let him know from month to month whether he is making or losing. It is said at the close of every day in the great department stores, the bookkeeper's figure up exactly what the profits on the day's business have been. But a farmer cannot do this. The ramifications of his business are too intricate. He may, for example, charge him self with the labor of his teams when putting in his crop at what he would have to pay for some one else's team to do the same work, but the work does not really cost him any such amount. He may charge up his own labor at so much per month, but it really does not cost him the same as he would have to pay some one else to do the same work. A man sometimes says, "I worked so many days on such and such a crop and my team worked so many days, and both together came to \$100; I sold the crop for \$125. If I allow myself interest at 6 per cent on the cost of my land, I have only two or three dollars to show for my work. But this is wrong. He has \$125 to show for it. The wages of himself and his team are a part of his profit, and so is the interest on the cost of the land. We say this because a fairly well informed gentleman only a few days ago said that, after conversation with several farmers, he had reached the conclusion that farming could not possibly pay on Vancouver Island. He said that he had heard of several cases in which, after charging themselves up with their labor, that of their teams and their living expenses, the farmers did not have a profit of ten per cent on the cost of their land. When he was asked if a merchant who, after paying all his living expenses, netted ten per cent on his investment would not be thought to be doing pretty well, he said that it had not occurred to him to look at it in that light.

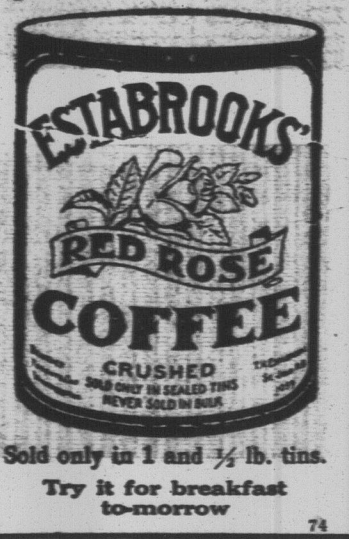
Drowned at St. Andrews.

If there is no regular day for silver cleaning the hostess will frequently be mortified by that sign of bad house-keeping, dingy table silver.

The cook who knows how to make good soap clears it with the white of an egg. It gathers all small solids, as it does when dreamed into coffee, making it clear.

Knives that are used in peeling or cutting an onion should be immediately plunged into boiling water, then rubbed with sand soap and well rinsed or they may flavor the next thing that is cut with them.

Low Heading

John Isaacs, writing in the Orchard and Farm, states that an old apple grower, whose trees branch out about two feet from the ground, remarked a short time since, that with his experience and appreciating the advantages of a low tree, if he were planting a new orchard he would not start his trees over a foot from the ground. The most successful peach orchards are started as close to the ground as this, and this is the outgrowth of experience with Californian conditions and those prevailing in the peach sections of Oregon and Washington. Apple growers all over the country are following in the same lead.

To sum up the advantages of this system: Low pruned trees are more resistant to the attacks of insects than high pruned ones; they are stronger and bear their burden of fruit better, as they are formed in a compact mass; their fruit is more easily gathered, as it is well within reach; the fruit is better, as the best fruit is always borne on the lower branches of the tree; they shade the ground and prevent the evaporation of its moisture—a great desideratum in a hot climate. Britain's Abounding Wealth

For partisan political purposes it has been the habit of many English editors to write about the alleged financial decadence of England. To read them you would think that England was on the verge of bankruptcy. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, on the other hand, in introducing his Budget for next year, said that the country never was so prosperous, and that there was a big boom in trade everywhere.

To judge by the unprecedented amount of new capital that London found in the first six months of this year England is far from being broke. The Economist shows that in the first three months of this year \$99,355,000 was invested in new undertakings, and in the next three months \$88,721,000.

These figures are indicative of a great boom in business, and, of course, of speculative activity. Rubber companies total, and oil companies for \$8,500,000. The tabulated statement in the Economist shows that a fair proportion of the new capital is for the home market, but the larger proportion was invested in enterprises abroad.

There is no reason for disquietude in this fact, it is asserted. What the figures of new capital indicate is the enormous wealth of the United Kingdom. The stream of British capital still flows over the earth like a fertilizing stream. Of the increase in the amount of capital sent abroad the bulk of railways and the development of agriculture or industry. London correspondent New York Sun.

To Keep Food Clean

The campaign against unclean foods should be made to reach not only grocery stores and meat shops, but hotels and cafes, and delivery, huckster and milk wagons as well.

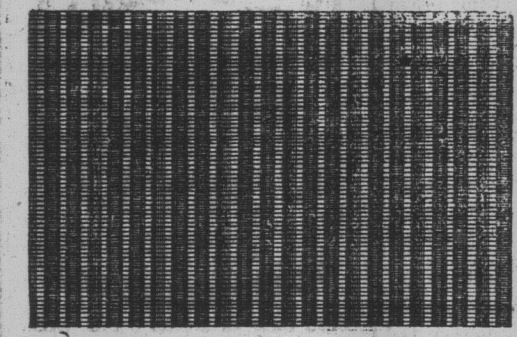
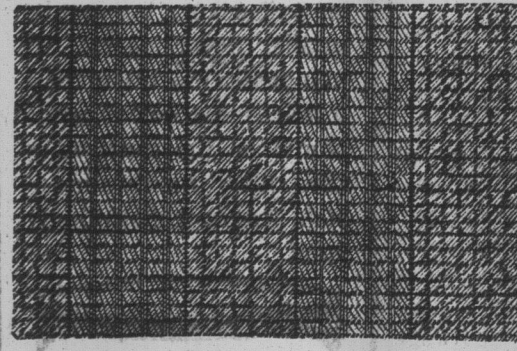

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence and cultivation, of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres, erect a house worth \$300.00.
