




The plans of the new battleships have already been den Governme The plans of the new battleships have already been received at Portsmouth and Devonport dockyards. This new type of ship will be 700 feet long, and will have a displacement of 30,000 tons. For propelling, high power geared turbines are to be used, giving a speed of about twenty-nine knots—a phenomenal speed for a battleship. The guas will probably be of 14-inch calibre, an advance upon the 13.5-inch weapons of the super-Dreadnonght such a way that an all-tound fire can be maintained. The first new ship of this class will be completed within two years.
