This Is Total Number of Prisoners Captured This Week By Marshal Haig's Men - Ploegsteert, Neuville-Bourjouval, Clamecy, Braye, Missy-Sur-Aisne, Guiscard and Other Places Taken.

London, Sept. 5-Marked progress was made by the British last night along the Flanders front, according to today's war office report. Ploegsteer village has been captured, as has Hill 63, southwest of Messines.

On the Lys front the British hold the general line of Voormezeele, Wulverghem, Ploegsteert, Nieppe, Laventie

From Neuve Chapelle southward to Givenchy the British have reached the line which they held until the Cerman attack on April 9 last, while to the eastward of Givenchy sections of the old German positions have been taken.

On the battle line in front of Cambrai an improvement in the British position south of Moeuveres is reported. The positions to the east of Hermies, near the Canal Du Nord, just to the south, also have been improevd. Still farther south the British have captured the village of Neuville - Bourjouval, east of the Canal Du Nord.

More than 16,000 prisoners and more than 100 guns have been taken by the British in the last four days.

Paris, Sept. 5.—Today's war office announcement shows that the German retreat before the French northeast of Noyon continued during the night. The French troops kept in touch with the enemy rear-guards and pushed after the retreating foe east of the Canal du Nord.



"The commission has caused the accounts of the company to be examined by Messrs. Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery, a firm of certified public accountants familiar with public utility accounting. It appears from their report that the company is not today earning its operating expenses, to say nothing of any return on its investment. The net operating income has entirely disappeared in the recent increase in operating expenses, which our accountants report to us to be at the rate of \$177.041 per annum in the two items of coal and labor alone.
"Counsel for the city is carrying on, with the aid of experts, an extended inquiry into the valuation of the properties. The commission is affording every facility for this inquiry, and regards it as an important factor in any final determination of rates. It is apparent, however, that the present earnings of the company are entirely inadequate to pay a return on its investment computed on any theory or even to guarantee the continuance of service.
