

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Special Telegrams to the Tribune.

The Government sustained by a Majority of Thirty-one—Debate on Increasing and Equalizing Judges' Salaries—Other Business—The Wrath of the Critics at the Summary Rejection of the Want-of-Confidence Motion.

Ottawa, April 3.

A thrill of expectancy passed through the House yesterday when Mr. Huntingdon rose to move his want-of-confidence resolution. The galleries were crowded and the benches nearly full. The motion was made without any remarks whatever from the mover, and the Government side called "question" immediately. The division was—yeas 76, nays 107—majority for the Government 31.

Mr. Palmer said he had never used the words "better terms." The Maritime Provinces did not want better terms, but simple justice, and that equality of position in the Confederation which they were entitled to. The lower salaries of Judges in the Maritime Provinces was one instance of injustice. Their position being the same, and their duties the same, their salaries should be the same as those of Judges in the other Provinces.

Mr. McDonald, of Pictou, thought the present scale of salaries of Judges in all the provinces was an inadequate remuneration. The salaries should be sufficient to secure the best talent in each province.

Mr. MacDonald referred to the great difficulty of settling this question. The cost of living was higher in one province than in another. In the Province of Quebec the Judges in the rural districts received less salary than those in the cities. There was a perfect equality of position but a difference in circumstances. He believed the time had come when the Judges should receive salaries commensurate with their position, and Government would bring in resolutions upon the subject.

The House went into committee on the bill introduced by Mr. Mills amending Costigan's act against dual representation. It virtually provides that the Returning Officer shall not have anything to say about a candidate's qualifications for the Commons. The bill passed its second reading, but will probably be amended.

Mr. Morrison's bill requiring railway officials to give notice of the delay of trains and their whereabouts was yesterday.

Members evidently felt disinclined to work after the excitement of the afternoon, and the House adjourned at 10.

In the Senate yesterday, in answer to Carrell, Hon. M. Campbell said the Imperial Government had not yet appointed a Commissioner to sit on the Fishery Claims Commission at Halifax, and would not do so till the American Government named their Commissioner.

Mr. Adams thought the Legislature had no power to deal with such a bill, and would oppose it. Mr. Napier supported it. The Secretary argued at length favoring the bill, contending that the individual having lands bordering on the water had the right to the soil to low water mark and by the passage of the bill private rights would not be interfered with. The House rose.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

The bill to incorporate the Carleton and Victoria Steamboat Co. was amended, requiring 50 per cent. of stock to be paid up, and agreed to. The bill to diversify the Varley fund to the endowment of a Professorship at Saskivee was discussed and progress reported. Hon. Mr. Seely and Hon. Mr. Jones opposed the bill. Progress was reported. The St. John special assessment bill was amended, reducing the amount from \$10,000 to \$5,000. The Lancaster Lands bill was agreed to with amendments.

To-day's Proceedings.

The bill legalizing the assessment of Burton Parish, Sunbury County, passed the Council on divisions. Mr. McInerney and Hamilton opposing.

The bill amending the act incorporating the St. Martins and Upham Railway Company passed.

The Atlantic disaster created a profound sensation here, and all eyes are turned to the subject. It is believed that the wreck of the steamship Atlantic, which was lost on the coast of Newfoundland, is the first disaster of the kind since the sinking of the ship "Titanic."

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HALIFAX, April 2.

Steamers have returned from the wreck and report that 480 were saved. Among them were the following saloon passengers: P. D. Mackay, Nicholas Brandt, New York; S. W. Nick, Wilmington, N. C.; J. S. Richmond, Detroit; Adolphus Jung, New York; Daniel Kimmie, Springfield, Ohio; James Brown, Manchester, Eng.

THE FIRST officer clung to the rigging long after the others had been rescued, or been saved, calling for help, but the sea was too rough for boats. Finally the Rev. W. J. Ancient, Church of England clergyman, swam out, passed a rope around him, and they were both drawn on board a boat.
