IMPORTANT CHANGE IN FILM SERVICE

After This Week Imperial Serial Features Will Be Shown at the Opera House.

The statements appearing elsewhere in this issue relative to a change in direction of the Imperial Theatre will no doubt be of considerable interest to Campbellton theatre-goers.
Lack of time makes it impossible to definitely announce the new policy of the house in this issue but further details are promised for next week. However regarding the serial features which have been running at the Imperial Theatre—"The Iron Test" and "The Lightning Raider"—it is announced that the remaining episodes will be shown at the Opera House on the same days as formerly, excepting that in the event of road shows or other attractions at the Opera House, the picture program will be presented in the Imperial Theatre.

"The Crimson Gardenia" which has been advertised for the Imperial for next Monday and Tuesday will be shown in the Opera House instead. The Imperial Theatre will probably be closed on Monday and Tuesday next but open on the following Wednesday and Thursday when the Opera House bill will be a big Griffith production ("The Great Love") which commands advanced prices. The Imperial will be open with an attractive picture program at usual prices.

Further than this it is impossible to say at the moment but as mentioned above details will be forthcoming very shortly.

LEVIATHAN FOR AMERICAN LINE

Former German Steamer Will Run Between Southampton and New York.

LONDON, November 23.—The Government has directed the Pacific Steam Navigation Company to take charge of the German ships, both steam and sailing vessels, which were interned in Chile during the war. It is officially announced that the former German liner Vaterland, later the transport Leviathan, had been assigned to the American line and that it was proposed to put her in the Southampton-New York service.
It was announced in Washington on November 5 that the Leviathan would be operated by the American Line when placed in readiness for trans-Atlantic service probably next summer.

ROSEBERRY STREET SCHOOL GUTTED

Fire Does Heavy Damage at Fine School Building—The Insurance.

Last Thursday night at 10 o'clock an alarm was rung in from a fire in the Roseberry Street school. When discovered the flames were bursting through the roof and the entire west end of the building was on fire. The firemen responded promptly but despite three heavy streams the fire gradually worked to the other departments and also to the new end in course of construction, and the entire building was completely gutted, only the walls left standing.
The Roseberry Street School which held four classrooms for the primary departments, was erected three years ago at a cost of about \$25,000. As it was not large enough to relieve the congestion at the Grammar school an ell, with six large classrooms, was planned and in course of construction when the fire gutted both buildings. The contract for the new ell was let to Messrs. J. & D. A. Harquail at \$32,650 and was well along towards completion. The both buildings were covered by \$50,000 insurance with \$3,000 on the furnishings. The loss is figured at about \$40,000 which is fully covered by the insurance.
The basement and walls are in good condition and the School Board has taken the matter in hand and are now at work cleaning up and salvaging any material. The insurance adjusters have been here and made a very satisfactory adjustment.
The School Board plans to roof the buildings and close them in. Some alterations will be made in the plans, and the whole interior of the building rebuilt this winter.
In the meantime the scholars are being accommodated at the Grammar school. Some departments, having session from 9 to 10:30 and from 1:30 to 2:30, while others begin at 10:30 and 2:30. The assembly hall is being again divided and more rooms provided there.

ONE ON THE JANITOR.
Friday morning early the janitor of the Roseberry Street School was on his job as usual. He came to the building and in the darkness saw signs of fire therein and promptly rang in an alarm from box 32, not knowing that the school had been gutted the previous evening. The firemen had a run for nothing just a short time after they had got home.

PRINCE OF WALES TO THE PILGRIMS

Confidence and Good Will Felt By People in U. S. and Canada.

York, Nov. 22.—The Prince of Wales attended the Pilgrims' dinner, on Friday night, wearing the uniform of captain in the navy. More than 1,000 guests were present. His appearance occasioned tumultuous applause. After the excitement was subsided, Right Rev. Charles Sumner Burch, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of New York, said, grace. Chancellor M. Depew, President of the Pilgrims' Society, was toastmaster.

Referring to the toast, the Prince referred to the part played by the Americans in the great war. "There is one other thing to which I should like to refer to-night," he continued, "and only because it has impressed me with new force during my travels on this continent, but also because it is an actual and visible example of the object and aims which the Pilgrims' Society was formed to promote. I do not think anywhere else in the world, two nations three thousand miles long except on the North American continent, will you find a frontier between with no extensive physical barriers, no military defenses, no other division lines than a boundary determined by mutual confidence and good will. As a Britisher and as a Canadian, I take a high pride in that boundary, the international frontier between Canada and the United States, for it seems to me to illustrate in a very striking and practical way the objects for what Americans and Britishers fought in the great war. Just think of it! The ideal which appears so difficult of attainment elsewhere has been an actual and positive reality in North America for over a hundred years."

"I have asked myself how that ideal has been attained here so much in advance of international conditions in other parts of the world, and I think the answer is quite clear. It has been attained because you, on your side of the international boundary, and we Britishers on our side, have under somewhat different forms, the same political faith, the same human aims, the same practical ideas.
"These two self-governing peoples, living side by side, each confident in the goodwill of the other, have given this splendid example to the world."
The Prince was presented with a silver loving cup containing a bouquet of roses. It bore a suitable inscription attesting to the fact that he had been elected an honorary member of the Pilgrims of the United States.

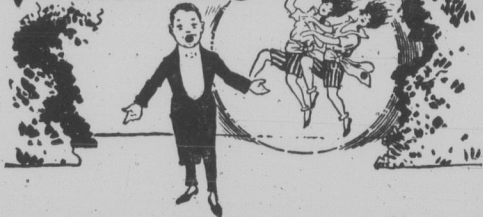

BONAVENTURE VICTORY LOAN

Was Very Successful and Large
Number of Districts Win
Flags and Crests.

The Victory Loan campaign in the County of Bonaventure was under the following organization:

Hon. Chas. Macil, M. P., and Mr. R. L. Montgomery of New Richmond, Honorary Chairmen; Hon. John Hall Kelly, K. C., and Mr. F. Bugeaud, M. P., active chairmen; Messrs. J. C. Grant and P. P. Barrett of Mont-real, joint divisional organizers; Mr. M. O. Harris, County organizer; Mr. J. E. Levesque, County Secretary, with headquarters at Paspébiac, Que.

The campaign proved a great success all through the county, the total number of subscriptions being 373, and the amount subscribed \$151,250.

Besides this, the proportion credited to this County by the divided subscription of the Province of Quebec and the Alliance Nationale being \$26,850 thus making a total for Bonaventure County of \$178,100 as compared with total of \$129,700 subscribed in 1918. WELL KNOWN MAN DEAD

Louis Comeau of Shediac Died Suddenly Saturday Morning.

The death of Louis Comeau, well known throughout the province, occurred at Shediac Saturday morning after a brief illness of pleuro-pneumonia. Mr. Comeau was a popular citizen of St. John and for a number of years was in business there. He was formerly connected with the firm of McIntyre & Comeau, and afterwards started the firm of Comeau & Sheehan with Humphrey Sheehan. Recently, he established the Shediac Beverage Company at Shediac, of which he was the proprietor. A few days ago he caught a chill while driving, and pneumonia followed with fatal results. Deceased was forty-eight years of age and is survived by his wife, three sons and three daughters, also four brothers and one sister. The daughters are Misses Corinne, Rose and Germaine; the sons, Edmond, recently returned from overseas service; Gerard, Louis, Dr. F. X. Comeau, of Carleton Place, and Thomas, of Moncton, are brothers and there are two other brothers in the United States. Mrs. E. LaPlante, of Tracadie, is a sister. Mr. Comeau was born in Petit Rocher, Gloucester, and located in St. John about eighteen years ago.

The late Mr. Comeau was one of the best known business men in the province and also one of the successful Acadians in the Maritime Provinces. Since becoming a resident of Shediac he had been one of the most enterprising men in the seaside town. He had great faith in Shediac and had become a large real estate holder there. He built the Comeau Block on Main Street and occupied part of it in his business. He was very popular and his death will cause widespread regret throughout the province. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Albina Bourque, of Shediac, three sons and three daughters. He was a brother-in-law of Dr. L. N. Bourque, of Moncton.

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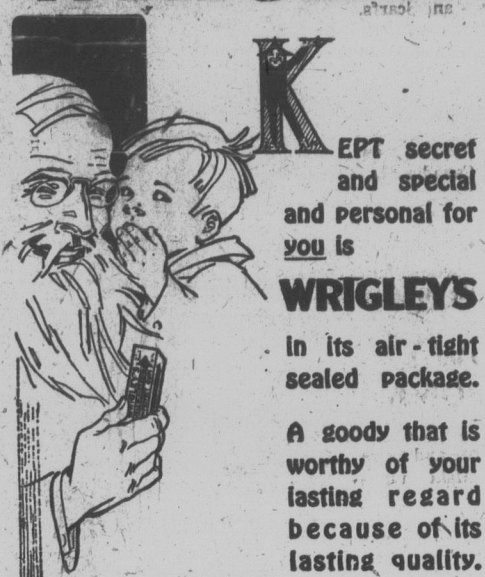

All concerned have finally come to the conclusion that it was useless to continue the operation of two picture houses in Campbellton, particularly under separate management or control.

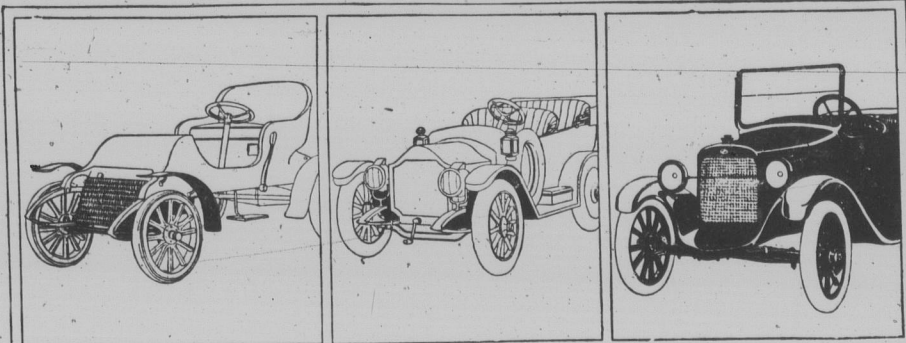

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, N. B. THE COLLECTION OF VITAL STATISTICS.

THE PUBLIC WILL PLEASE NOTE that that part of the Public Health Act and its amendments providing for the reporting of Births, Marriages and Deaths as they occur in the province of New Brunswick, will go into effect on the first day of January, 1920.
This scheme for the collection of such information is, briefly, as follows:—
In each parish and in each incorporated city and town there will be appointed an officer by the Sub-district Board of Health concerned, known as the sub-deputy registrar, to whom all reports of Births, marriages and deaths occurring in the parish, city or town for which he is appointed, will be sent.
All physicians, nurses, parents or house-holders as the case may be, having primary or official knowledge of such occurrences shall send to said deputy registrar reports of such births, marriages or death, upon forms furnished by the Department of Health to such persons, through the sub-deputy registrars.
Posters, in prominent type, will be put up throughout the province, notifying the date of the inception of this service, together with the name and address of the sub-deputy registrar of the parish, town or city in which any such poster appears.

TUXIS BOYS MET AT NEWCASTLE

Interesting Program Carried Out Last Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

(Crowded out last week.)

The Tuxis Boys' Conference for the northern part of New Brunswick was held at Newcastle Friday, Saturday and Sunday. The first speaker was Rev. Dr. King of Mount Allison, who spoke on "Aims and Objectives." He explained that the boys' movement was thoroughly co-operative among all Protestant denominations, and was under the immediate supervision of the Y. M. C. A. The Tuxis work is a programme not an organization, therefore it does not require any new organization upon any church. The aim of these conferences is: (1) Religious education for our boys; (2) Training in Christian citizenship. The programme is based on the character and personality of Jesus. The Tuxis boys are a hero worshiper, and the greatest of heroes is Jesus Christ. A boy should not be intellectually, physically, morally or socially lapsed. All sides of his nature should be trained equally well. Why do boys and girls leave school just before entering high school? It is because the high school does not offer a progressive programme. The trouble with too many of the colleges today is that the curriculum is too cramped. Too often the boy learns nothing but what is on the curriculum and comes out without an adequate view of life. The "group" and "team" instinct is stronger than the "gang" instinct. If worked properly, boys properly handled will help the forward and all other movements. The boy naturally wants to get out around in his teens, and he should be guided at that age. The Tuxis movement may properly be called school extension. A. M. Gregg, assistant secretary of the Maritime Y. M. C. A., spoke on "The Personal Interview" and explained the process of charting the boy. After a vigorous address by the chairman the boys' conference, properly opened at 8 o'clock, Rev. E. A. McKinley presided, conducted devotional exercises and gave an address on "The Personal Interview." Rev. L. H. MacLean gave an address of welcome and Mr. Gregg spoke on "The Tuxis Boys in the New Era." The following officers were elected: Grand master, Edwin A. Stuart, Newcastle; grand scribe, Alvin R. Metzler, Campbellton; grand deputy master, Elmer Mowat, Campbellton.

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NO IMPORTATION OF LIQUOR ALLOWED YET

An Ottawa despatch, says that: People who are shipping liquor from Quebec into New Brunswick and Ontario, and the number of seizures indicate that they are many, are wholly astray in their conclusions that the war measure restrictions let up with the anniversary of the armistice. The lid is on as tightly now as ever. As frequently explained it will be lifted only when peace is officially proclaimed by the King. Even that proclamation in itself will not affect the order, but it will be the signal for the Governor General to issue a proclamation suspending the war measures act. It is expected before Christmas. It would appear from all reports that tons of liquor await the advent of the wet season before being shipped to arid areas. Some of the more venturesome have taken a chance and shipped or imported since Armistice Day. The result has been a material increase in the stock of concealed liquors in the hands of the Ontario authorities and a corresponding enrichment of the treasury by heavy fines.

McIntosh apples grown on the farm of G. G. Dunphy at Devon sold at a record price of \$12 a barrel to a dealer in Montreal last week.

These apples were part of a carload shipped by the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association, and the price is said by officials of the Department of Agriculture to be the highest price ever received for this variety of apples. There were five barrels of McIntosh apples in the shipment which sold at this price, but there were also ten barrels of No. 1 Fameuse which sold at \$10 a barrel to the same dealer. The rest of the shipment was made up of a low grade apples, the average price of which was over \$5 a barrel.

This is the third season that the New Brunswick Fruit Growers' Association has shipped apples to Montreal, and the prices which are being received for New Brunswick's apples there this fall will encourage other growers to ship their fruit in to the Montreal market when there is such a heavy crop of apples in this province.

**GREAT STORM COM-
ING IN DECEMBER**

Weather Prophet Says the
Greatest Storm in Centuries
Will Arrive on December 17.

(By Prof. Albert F. Porter.)
Noted Sunspot Forecaster and dis-
coverer of Porter's weather glass.
Owing to strange grouping of six
mighty planets such as has not been
seen in a score of centuries, the United
States next December will be
swept by the most terrific weather
calamity experienced since human
history began.

It will be caused by the highest sun-
spot on record—a sunspot that will be
visible to the naked eye. Since men
first began to make records of events
no sunspot has yet been large enough
to be seen without the aid of instru-

**FIGHTING 26TH AS
PARENT UNIT**

Recommendations that it Should
Include All Infantry
Regiments.

(Crowded out last week.)
St. John, Nov. 10—Major-General
Sir William D. Otter, K.C.B., C.V.O.,
Major-General W. G. Gwatkin, G.B.,
C.M.G.; Major-General Sir E. W. B.
Morrison, K.C.M.G., C.B., D.S.O., and
Brigadier-General Andrew G. L. Mc-
Naughton, were in the city yesterday
in connection with the plans to re-or-
ganize the Canadian militia. Senior
officers of the various provincial mili-
tary organizations were in conference
with them yesterday afternoon and
made recommendations as to what
they considered should be done with
the units in New Brunswick.

For the infantry, it was advised that
one regiment, known as the 26th, to
include all the present militia regiments
as battalions, would be acceptable
here.

For the artillery, the old name of
the 3rd Regiment was favored with
the various battery numbers as used
in France.

For the cavalry it was suggested
that a cavalry brigade, to be known
as the 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles,
be formed to embrace all the cavalry
units in the Maritime Provinces. The
present units would retain their num-
bers as before.

Recommendations were also made
for the engineers and the other
branches of the service.

The committee is to visit different
parts of Canada and see the ideas
of the senior officers, after which they
are to make a report to militia head-
quarters in regard to a scheme of re-
organization.

THE TRIUMPHANT LOAN

"Where did all the money come
from?" was the query heard from
many lips yesterday as citizens ex-
pressed the significance of the success of
the Victory Loan campaign. The total
realized—\$473,000,000—seemed to
be above almost everyone's expecta-
tion, and there had been predictions
of 600,000,000 by some of the more
sanguine. It is a real mystery to many
as to how the money was raised, but
the Victory Loan workers in the thou-
sands throughout the country know
what it meant in sustained, well-or-
ganized effort. A statesman was
heard to say: "Now, no one will pay
his bills for six months," as he con-
templated the drawbacks of a credit
crisis, with not a few people pay-
ing all their ready money in Victory
bonds' funds. But he was an exception.
The general feeling was one of satis-
faction. Some expressed real anxiety
that extravagance would be found in
some quarters, but against that was a
vigilant public opinion, and surely a
watchful government. High Victory
Loan officials were heard to say dur-
ing the campaign: "The government
will look to it for us, and a lot of
us to point to anything that might
have been saved, and we were forced
to admit we could not. There is no
doubt much of the money plied for
Victory bonds has yet to be earned,
and this applies not only to individ-
uals, but to corporations. Therefore,
there should be a large measure of
thrift from this cause alone in the
next few months, until the bonds are
fully paid up. This year's organiza-
tion is generally declared to have been
a considerable improvement on last
year's. The mistakes of a year ago
were lessons for this campaign, and
altogether the machinery ran much
more smoothly.

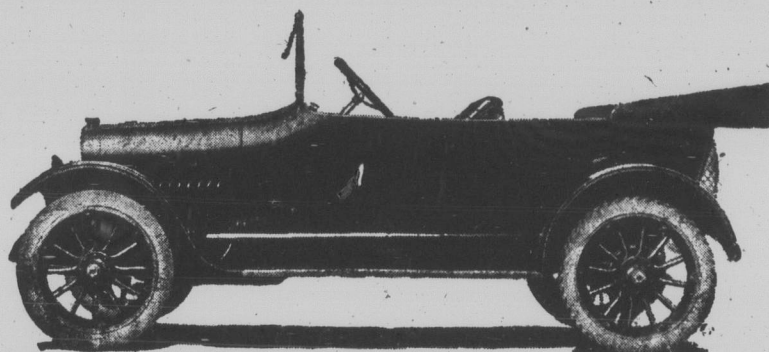
