CONSOLIDATION IS URGED FOR RURAL SCHOOLS

Dr. J. B. Reynolds Would Overlook Cost in Getting Good Teachers.

Consolidated schools are a necessity in the rural school educational system today, says the message given to the Middlesex Educational Association at its initial meeting of 1921 at the county buildings Friday afternoon.

J. A. Taylor, public school inspector for St. Thomas, declared that the public schools will have to answer for on Judgment Day. "How many children have contracted diseases by sitting at double desks?" he asked.

More Male Teachers. Mr. Taylor did not think that a boy wanted to be under the control of a lady teacher as he had attained the age of twelve years. Primary pupils should not be taught by men, in fact it would be difficult to get a man to teach junior pupils.

Cost Secondary Issue. In matters of education the cost should not be considered, but rather the good that would result. It was up to the country to see that the boys and girls were educated.

President J. B. Reynolds of the Ontario Agricultural College, stated that the cost should not be counted. The little one-room schools should be improved, purpose generations ago, when it was manned by men who chose teaching as a vocation and not an avocation.

Times Has Changed. Times has changed, however. He assured his audience that he was not present to disparage the work of the teachers, but said that the majority of them did not intend to make teaching their life work.

THE PROFIT TAX.

It is not about time for Canada to follow the lead of England in cancelling the business profits tax? When it was introduced there, perhaps, some reason for it, but speaking generally, it does not seem necessary that it be continued longer. In fact, there is plenty of evidence to show that it is acting as a deterrent to trade and industry.

THE RAINBOW 'ROUND THE THRONE.

From the day when Noah looked out over the devastation of a water-logged world and saw in the bow upon the cloud the Divine promise of a better tomorrow, down to the coming afternoon shower of the spring of 1921, the many-tinted circle in the sky has been a source of beauty and of inspiration. The prophet, Ezekiel, likened the glory of the Deity to its brightness, and the seer of Patmos in his visions saw a rainbow beautiful as an emerald round the throne of the Eternal. Not only does its loveliness appeal to every seeing eye, but being an unfolding of what is hidden in the rays of white light, it suggests the charm to be revealed in common things liable to be overlooked in life's modern hurly-burly, from which the earnest Believer seeks especially to be delivered during the present Lenten period.

THE "SLEEPING SICKNESS."

"Sleeping sickness" is a convenient name for the malady which the doctors call "encephalitis lethargica," and it has the merit of emphasizing one symptom of the malady, it has, however, a grave fault of having been applied to a wholly different malady, quite differently caused. In the case of the "sleeping sickness" of Africa, which every body who reads has read much—and therefore his use is more than likely to cause needless apprehension. Encephalitis, as the term indicates, is an inflammation of the covering of the brain, and its mode or path of entrance are not known, but it is not due to a microscopic organism or "germ," infection is induced into the human system by the bite of a fly, as in the case with the African "sleeping sickness," and its mortality is lower.

TAKE THE GUNS AWAY.

Why not "frisk" the floating population and the submerged for guns? It would be a job to clean up, but not more than the police department could do if it set about it seriously. But cleaning up the existing crop would not get us far. The supply should be shut off. To do this thoroughly, legislation would be necessary. The manufacture and sale of revolvers by private concerns should be prohibited. No one but the Government or an agent of the Government should be allowed to manufacture revolvers or issue them. A revolver is not a hunting weapon. It has only one use—that is, to wound or kill men. It should, therefore, be kept under control of Government agencies.

MR. HEARST ELECTS A BISHOP.

Ordinarily William Randolph Hearst would not be regarded as a highly influential person in the councils of the Protestant Episcopal Diocese of New York, but nevertheless Mr. Hearst seems to have elected a bishop by the simple process of outrageously abusing Dr. Manning because of his English birth, and then sending copies of his newspapers to all the clerical and lay delegates. The reaction that followed the Hearst pro-German Sinn Fein attack made by Manning bishop of New York. 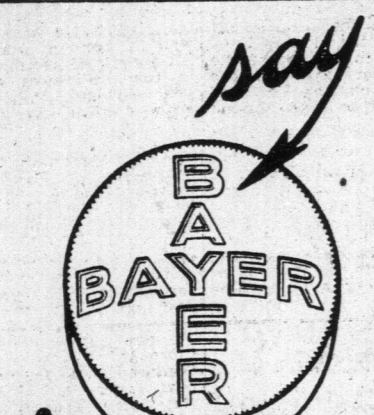

MODERN PUBLIC HEALTH (University Extension Board of Western University.)

BY H. W. HILL, M.B., M.D., D.P.H. Director Institute of Public Health of Western University, London, Ontario, Canada. A Column Devoted to Public Health in All Phases. Questions Addressed as Above Will Be Welcomed.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS. L. M. B., London.—Your questions about diphtheria and anti-toxin may be answered as follows. Of course, a great deal more can be said than is possible in one column. I have tried to answer as directly and concisely as possible what you ask.

Question No. 1.—What is diphtheria antitoxin? Answer.—The diphtheria antitoxin is a substance which the body of a human or an animal manufactures for the purpose of overcoming diphtheria toxin. The diphtheria toxin is the poison of the diphtheria germ. When the diphtheria germ is growing in some one's nose or throat, any toxin (poison) which the diphtheria germ makes will poison that person. UNLESS that person can make the "antitoxin" for it, i.e., the diphtheria antitoxin, that person can make enough diphtheria toxin to kill himself or to kill someone else.

FOUND IN BLOOD. This diphtheria antitoxin, made by the human body for its own use in order to overcome diphtheria toxin produced by diphtheria germs growing in the throat, can be found in the blood of such persons, and can be removed and used for treating other diphtheria patients who perhaps cannot make enough of their own antitoxin themselves. But, of course, we cannot always find, just when we want him, such a person—one who has just recovered from diphtheria by making his own antitoxin in his own body and is willing to donate his surplus antitoxin to a new patient. So we take a horse, and dose him with the diphtheria toxin obtained from a diphtheria bacillus growing in a test-tube or flask, instead of in a throat. He makes antitoxin to overcome the toxin, just as a human would, and there we have a large reservoir of ready-made antitoxin in that horse's body on which we may call at any time. The production of this antitoxin may become a big industry, and one may go to almost any drug store now and buy this antitoxin bottled and all ready to use.

Question No. 2.—How many thousands of units of antitoxin is it safe to use? Answer.—There is no limit at all to the amount of antitoxin that a human being can use, in the ordinary sense at all. It is a natural production of the living body, made to neutralize the toxin. No one yet has ever given too much of it to anyone. The largest dose I happen to remember was 175,000 units. A horse usually produces antitoxin in millions of units of antitoxin in his body at any one time, and yet is absolutely well and healthy.

Question No. 3.—Should a nervous child receive less than others? Answer.—Why? It is not a question of nerves, but of poison. Suppose two children had swallowed the same dose of some metallic poison, such as arsenic. Suppose one knew it needed a cupful of the arsenic antitoxin to neutralize the amount. Would you give only half a cupful of it to neutralize only half the poison, wouldn't it? Would you rather let a child die than give him more than the other, or more than you could give him?

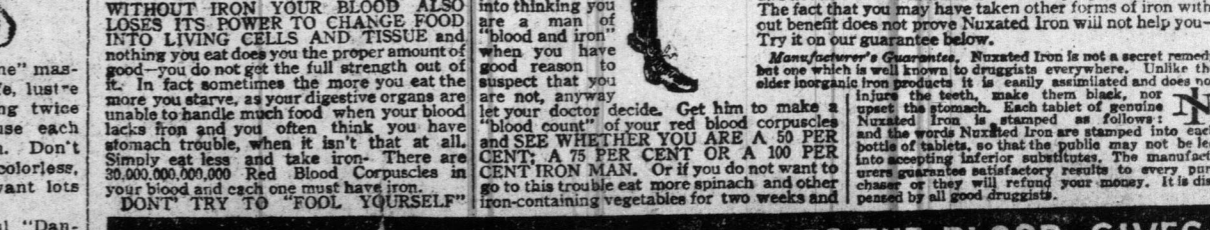

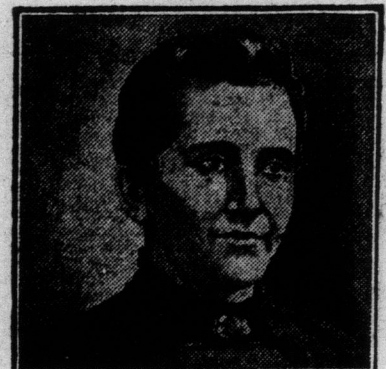

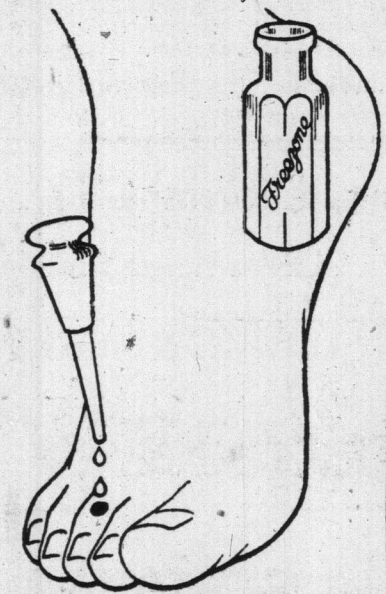

CURRY SCORES ILLEGAL SALE OF WHISKEY

Would Spend Every Dollar To Stamp It Out, He Says.

[Special To The Advertiser.] TORONTO, Feb. 11.—Condemning illicit whiskey selling as an offence comparable to murder, burglary, theft and arson, J. W. Curry, K.C., Liberal, S. E. Toronto, in the Legislature today, justified the employment of liquor "spotters" in the enforcement of the O. T. A. If he had been honored with the attorney-generalship he said he would spend every dollar in the province to stop illicit liquor sales. "It is well within the knowledge of many connected with the administration of the law generally that inspectors in Toronto were in the pay of the bootleggers," he declared. Two of these officials, he said, fled the city, and the others were dismissed from office. In reply to members' questions, the member who had served Toronto declared he certainly would employ men of the Hallam type to hunt for liquor in the streets and countenances upon the coast. Urges Co-operation. Mr. Curry charged that there was a determined effort among men of standing in the province to discredit the O. T. A. It was the disregard of the law by such men, he declared, which encouraged the bootlegger in his business. Instead of casting aspersions at the attorney-general, he declared, it was the duty of every right-minded citizen to hold up his hands and help wherever possible in wiping out the liquor business. Mr. Curry explained the mystery of how the recommendation for O. T. A. appeal to high court judge came to be in the report of the special committee which that committee had voted unanimously for appeal to county court judges. As a member of the sub-committee appointed to draw up the conclusions of the main committee, he said, he drew up his own conclusions and sent them forward when he became apparent that the sub-committee was not meeting together. No Amendments. Mr. Curry's was the concluding speech in the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne, which was carried without amendment. Hon. A. E. Ross, Conservative, Kingston, who preceded him in the debate, advised that little latitude be regarded to intoxicants be allowed to dwellers in cities. He thought it might be well to meet the views of city dwellers and leave the law in the country as it is.

SINN FEINERS MURDERED 21

Some Victims Apparently Killed After Having Been Wounded.

DUBLIN, Feb. 11.—The official survey of conditions in Ireland during the week ending February 5, issued today, states that the campaign of outrages against the crown forces was continued with intensity, entailing 35 casualties among these forces during the week. 21 cases involving mortal injury. The most extensive operation, it is recounted, was the big ambush at Branganagh, County Limerick, when eleven of the police were killed. The survey says the appearance of some of the bodies of victims of the ambush suggest the men were killed in cold blood after having been reduced to helplessness by wounds. The feature of the week, it is declared, was the increased frequency of bomb attacks on police and military forces on the streets of Dublin, showing a callous disregard for public safety. There were seven such attacks during the week. The effects on the crown forces was slight, but one boy was killed and fourteen other persons injured. The survey stated that Sinn Feiners assassinated four civilians during the week. Ninety-seven arrests were made for outrages and political offences.

WANT DECEPTION MADE AN OFFENCE

Ontario Horticulturists Protest Against Nursery Stock Misrepresentation.

TORONTO, Feb. 11.—Miss Mary Yates, of Port Credit is the first woman chosen as head of the Ontario Horticultural Society. Miss Yates was elected president of the society at the annual meeting here today. The other officers elected are as follows: Rev. W. M. McCarty, Weston, first vice-president; J. E. Jaffray, Galt, second vice-president; C. A. Henson, St. Catharines, treasurer; J. Lockie Wilson, Toronto, secretary and editor. The directors are: Rev. A. H. Scott, D. D., Perth; H. A. Middleton, Lindsay; Charles W. Wilson, Port Williams; T. D. Dockery, Toronto; W. D. Burry, St. Catharines; Wm. Hartney, Seaforth; Dr. F. E. Bennett, St. Thomas; J. E. Carter, Guelph, and J. E. Brown, Kingsville. The Ontario Horticultural Society decided to request the legislature to punish misrepresentation and deception regarding the sale and distribution of diseased or mis-named nursery stock; also to ask the Dominion Government to appoint a competent person to inspect all bulbs imported into Canada, and to deal with any diseased bulbs as such officer might deem advisable.

WESTERNERS SEE FAMOUS SHORTHORN

Visit Guelph Farm and Inspect \$35,000 Bull From Scotland.

GUELPH, Feb. 11.—A number of Western Canada Shorthorn breeders who have been in Toronto this week attending the annual meeting of the Dominion Shorthorn Breeders' Association, came to Guelph today and visited the farm of J. J. Elliott to see the record Shorthorn bull, purchased in Scotland last year for the record price of \$35,000. G. E. Day, secretary of the Shorthorn Breeders' Association, met the party at the station and accompanied them to the farm. The police have received two telegrams from Winnipeg regarding W. H. Bibby, now in custody here, on charge of passing worthless checks. According to the Winnipeg police, W. H. Bibby, alias W. H. Handwork, alias Buster Handwork, has a bad record in the West, and several warrants are out for his arrest. Chief C. H. Newton of Winnipeg has asked the local police to hold the prisoner following his trial here. The Winnipeg police learned of his arrest in this city after Bibby had communicated with a woman in the western city for money with which to pay his fine.

DECLARES DECISION SETTLES ISSUE OF MIXED MARRIAGES

Protestant Clergymen Hail With Delight Judgment of Privy Council.

[Special To The Advertiser.] MONTREAL, Feb. 11.—(By Canadian Press.)—The news of the privy council's decision on the Tremblay-Despatte marriage case was received tonight by the ministers of the non-Roman churches with great delight that found expression in many mutual congratulations, and these were intensified when it was found that the judgment had also covered the vexed question of "mixed" marriages in this country. Bishop Farthing, Montreal commented that the judgment was "most satisfactory." It definitely settled, he said, everything for which we have contended for a long time past. It is, in my opinion, one of the most important decisions we have ever had. Had it been otherwise, it would undoubtedly have occasioned prolonged trouble, which would have served to accentuate the religious differences of this province. Definitely Settled. C. H. Davidson, chancellor of the Montreal diocese, was satisfied when he saw the dispatch that the entire issue of mixed marriages was definitely settled. Protestant clergy can now, he said, not only minister to their own faithful, but even a couple where both were Catholics. He emphasized the point that the privy council judgment confirmed the judgment of the supreme court of Canada. "Emminently satisfactory" was the comment of the Rev. Dr. Hanson, who has been convener of the special committee of the Montreal Presbytery which has been studying the problem. "The judgment preserves the civil status of Protestant ministers and the rights of the people," he said. Rev. Father J. O'Rourke, chancellor of the archdiocese of Montreal, in a statement issued tonight says that the decision of the privy council does not alter the decisions of the Catholic Church in interpreting her law on behalf of her subjects. If the civil authorities in London have decided differently that is another question, but does not in the least alter the church's decision. All these expressions of pleasure and satisfaction from other beliefs seem strange and uncalled for, when the case in question is one of the interpretation of the Catholic marriage law in regard to two Catholics.

WHITE STAR BUYS MONSTER LINER

LONDON, Feb. 11.—The White Star Line has purchased the steamship Bismarck, the largest vessel in the world, for its New York service. The Bismarck, a vessel of 55,000 tons, was built at Hamburg for the Hamburg-American Line. Last fall it was reported that fire had badly damaged the vessel while lying at her docks in Hamburg. The Bismarck was to have been delivered to the Allies under the terms of the peace treaty.

SUSPENDED SENTENCE

Indian is Allowed to Go On Payment of \$60 Costs.

BLENNHEIM, Feb. 11.—The Indian, Tom Johnson, who was arrested by Provincial Officer Love, came up for sentence and for examination before J. C. Whittington, J. P. Crown Attorney H. D. Smith conducted the inquiry into his case for striking the other Indian, Pearce, with an axe and biting his finger. There seemed to be little sympathy for all that he had dealt the blow, as he had previously borne a good reputation with those he had worked for. His father said this was the first time he had ever been in trouble. His wife and four small children were present. The court, after pointing out the seriousness of the case, warned him, and let him out on suspended sentence, with a fine and costs amounting in all to \$66, which were paid. He is required to report every month for a year to the justice.

Young People's Contempt For Manual Labor Grave Menace

High Prices Due To Lack of Production On the Farm, Declares Prof. Reynolds of Guelph—Canada's Greatest Asset, He Says, Is Her Rich Productive Soil.

[Special To The Advertiser.] CHATHAM, Feb. 11.—Provision of properly trained help to aid in bigger and better production of grain and foodstuffs on Ontario farms was the keynote struck in an address to the Men's Canadian Club today by Prof. J. B. Reynolds, M.A., president of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. He declared that one of the gravest dangers facing Canada today was the lack of proper food production on Canadian farms. The speaker declared that the trend of the rural population to the cities was one of the principal causes of the high cost of living, and that the serious danger of the rural districts in food production is one of the greatest menaces to the country's future. "This action on the part of the rural population is having a great effect on the material welfare, social character and political stability of the country," he contended. "I believe that the cause can be cleared up by the rural districts and for fostering industries other than agriculture. These methods have placed the farmer at serious disadvantages in the produce, money and labor markets. Our biggest and best asset, our most enduring resource, is the top six inches of our Canadian soil," stated the speaker amidst applause. Don't Like Work. He went on to show that the extreme apathy of the rising generation to the tillage of the soil was in a great many cases due to their ill-concealed contempt of the manual labor necessary to the success of this work. "The rapid trend to the cities has lost thousands of tons of food produce that would be the saving grace in this time of high prices," he stated, and submitted that the rapid increase in food prices and a corresponding increase in all prices, while precipitated by the war, has been actually caused by the non-production of the essential foods on the farms of Ontario. Disruptions among the labor element came in for strong criticism from the speaker, who stated: "As long as there is disension in the ranks of labor and the farmers live in cities and towns, caring very little about the productivity of their farms, there is

bound to be and will continue to be the high prices that we are trying to pull down." DR. JOHN McCRIMMON DIES OF PNEUMONIA KINCARDINE, Feb. 11.—Following an illness of four weeks with pneumonia, the death occurred of Dr. John McCrimmon, aged 86, one of the most widely-known medical men in the county. The funeral of Daniel McKenzie, who died very suddenly while driving to market, was held today at Lochmahel. He was 73 years old and a former resident of Ashfield Township.

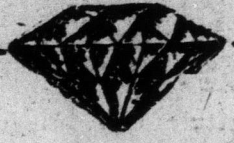
