Mr. Gladstone Starts on His Scottish
Tour.

London, Oct. 21.—Mr. Gladstone will be accompanied by his wife throughout his tour of Scotland. They left Liverpool yesterday morning. Four hundred persons gathered at the railway station at Wigan and Mr. Gladstone was heartily cheered. The crowd shouted that they did not want him to make a speech but wanted him to reserve his voice in order to be able to speak in Midlothian and demolish the Tories. Mr. Gladstone nevertheless made a short speech, in which he said that Midlothian knew what to do of itself. Nothing was left for him to do in that respect. At Preston hundreds of persons gathered at the station to welcome Mr. Gladstone, and he was loudly cheered upon his wrival. When Carlisle was reached a crowd numbering 1,500 was found waiting the coming of the train. Mr. Gladstone delivered an address here. In the course of his remarks he said he had no fear for Scotland and hoped England would do as well in the home rule movement as the people of the former country. When Mr. Gladstone reached Edinburgh he received a large number of leading Scotch politicians. There was a large crowd at the station, and he was given an ovation. He bowed his thanks.

Morley on Balfour.

London, Oct. 21.—Mr. Morley addressed his constituents in Newcastle last evening. He said he had promised when at leisure to write a history of England from 1886 to the next general election, but he despaired of being able to please Mr. Balfour in so doing. Mr. Balfour's arguments in his recent speeches were mainly tuquoque misrepresentations and irrelevancies. The speaker remind Mr. Balfour that the Compensation of Disturbance Bill of 1880, the Arrears Bill of 1882, and the Tramways Bill of 1883 were all due to Parnellite suggestions, and that the Land Bill of 1887 was drafted on the basis Mr. Parnell suggested in 1886. As late as last July Mr. Balfour said in the House of Commons: "I think the member for Cork's suggestions worthy of most attentive consideration." Mr. Balfour's statement that he (Morley) had been only five days in Ireland was absolutely untrue. In addition to bearing the burden of the whole Irish Department during that session of Parliament, doing laborious and incessant work on the Home Rule and Land Bills, and taking part in two election contests in Newcastle during his term of office, he had visited Ireland at Easter and Whitsuntide, and the final visit itself exceeded five days. Three years later, he went to Brazil as a British consul, and in 1868 he was sent to Damascus on a similar mission. In 1872, he was appointed consul at Trieste, where he has just died. Captain Burton was a delightful writer, and his books deoriptive of his many and varied travels have a wide circulation. His work, "A Pilgrimage to El Medinah and Mecca," descriptive of his remarkable visit to the holy cities, excited great attention. Captain Burton was a noted linguist, being able to converse in no fewer than 35

ONTARIO'S NICKEL ORES. This week a party of the Iron and Steel Institute of Great Britain, accompanied by a number of American iron masters and manufacturers, will make a flying visit through Ontario, stopping for a day to see the nickel and copper mines at Sudbury. Next week it is expected that a second party of the Iron and Steel Institute will make a visit to Canada, after completing their American tour, will also visit the Sudbury mines. This party is likely to receive some kindly attentions while in our country, and banquets, lunches and receptions are spoken of at Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal. There are many wealthy men among them, and although they are as capitalists in a number of mines and blast furnaces in the United States, it must not be assumed that they are averse to making investments in Canada if it is shown that we have ores of quality and abundance to attract at-

It is claimed, and we think with good reason, that there are ore deposits in Ontario, of a character second to none on the continent, and there is hardly a doubt that in nickel ore our Province is richer than any country in either hemisphere.

He showed how the tenacity and hardness of steel were in-creased by the addition of small quantities of nickel; how for structural purposes, such as bridges, the alloy was especially suited, as strength and lightness would go to-gether; and how for the plating of battleships it would furnish an incorrodible material, and almost an impenetrable one as against guns of even powerful caliber.

The tests at the Annapolis navy yard fully bear out the claims made for nickel steel by Mr. Riley. Three kinds of plates were used in the trials; two were of Schneider steel, made at the La Creusot works in France, one of which contained 3½

per cent. of nickel; the third was a Cammell mpound plate, such as is used in the construction of British war ships. At the first trial a 6-inch rifled gun 17½ feet long and having an initial velocity of 2,075 feet per second was used, the charge being 44½ pounds of powder and the projectile 100 bound forged steel, with chrome steel points 17 inches long. The Cammell plate was badly destroyed; the fourth shot penetrated it. It cracked in all directions and scaled off 300 pounds of steel from its face, the fragments of which flew everywhere like a hailstorm. CARY'S PERFORMANCE.

Following is the New York Sun's account of Cary's feat at Princeton on Saturday: The sensation of the day at the annual university track athletic games on the 'varsity grounds was the breaking of the world's 100-yard record by Luther H. Cary. Cary won the first heat in ten seconds without any difficulty. In the final heat E. F. Ramsdell, who has run 100 yards in ten seconds, had four yards handicap. Cary realized the possibility of Ramsdell beating him, and made the most desperate eflort of his life. He broke the tape line at exactly nine and one-half seconds, each of the three watches of the timers agreeing. The length of the track was questioned, and Cary called for a measurement. H. S. S. Smith, professor in the School of Science at Princeton, measured the track and found the exact distance to be 300.35 feet, or 100 yards and a little over four inches. F. Ramsdell ran in less than even time, and was but one foot behind Cary. Cary, later in the afternoon, equaled the American record in the 220-yard dash, covering the distance in 22 seconds. 




