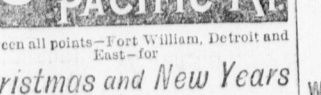

ANOTHER PROVINCE SOLID FOR PROHIBITION.

Prince Edward Island had a plebiscite on the question of prohibition on Tuesday, when the Provincial elections took place. Full details are not yet to hand, but the indications are that prohibition of the liquor traffic has been carried by an overwhelming majority. One report says by a vote of 10 to 1. Manitoba has spoken. The voice of the Prairie Province is decisively for prohibition. Prince Edward Island has followed suit, and is ranged on the side of the prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicants as beverages. The turn of Ontario comes next. On the first Monday in January the banner province of the Dominion will show, by an equally decisive vote, that it, too, is determined to be in the vanguard of national defense and of moral and social progress. Let every patriot do his and her share in rolling up the majority.

—It is pleasant to chronicle the fact that in the powerful state document, drawn up by the Dominion Government to guide its subordinates in the distribution of patronage to newspapers, our esteemed contemporary, the London Free Press, is placed in "Grade A." This enviable position has not been awarded to the St. Thomas Times, the Stratford Herald, and other influential Conservative newspapers, but doubtless they will have their reward if they faint not. By the way, while the ADVERTISER is boycotted by the Conservative Ministers, the Montreal Star is classed with our city contemporary in "Grade A." As a work of "statemanship" this list ranks with the "Facts for Irish Electors" document, issued by the Provincial Conservative leaders some years ago.

—A Winnipeg dispatch to the Toronto Empire says:
 "E. P. Leacock, a justice of the peace, who took a prominent part in the recent election in the Conservative interest, has had his commission canceled by the Greenway Government."

From this report, the uninitiated may be led to the belief that Mr. Leacock has been decapitated because he voted in favor of the candidate doomed to defeat. No one objected to his doing so. What led to the loss of his commission was the fact that he used his position to admit Chamberlain, the Toronto Conservative personator, to bail, thereby enabling that individual to escape to Dakota. Attorney-General Sifton would have been blame-worthy if he had allowed this flagrant failure of justice to pass without reuke.

—Conservative papers having recently asserted that when Sir Oliver Mowat was last elected in North Oxford he declared that he would not seek re-election there, the Woodstock Sentinel-Review points out that the statement is not true. Referring to some talk about a local candidate which had been worked up at the time by Conservative newspapers, Sir Oliver declared that whenever there was a desire among his friends in Oxford for a local man or anyone else he would not only be willing to respect but to anticipate their wishes. "Had Sir Oliver made such a promise as it has been asserted he did, there would long ago have been more than one constituency seeking the honor of being represented by him. And further, if he had made such a promise, it is tolerably certain that his friends in Oxford would have now persisted in his withdrawing it. There is not the slightest probability, so far as we can ascertain, that any local man, even a Conservative, will oppose Sir Oliver in the next contest. He has the profound respect and the personal friendship of men of all classes in this country. There will be a touch of sadness in his next election inasmuch as he has already indicated that it will be his last appeal to the country. The Reformers of North Oxford will never allow their old and honored leader to sever at the close of his life which have so long and so happily bound him to the historic riding which he has represented for 22 years."

OPPOSITION ALMOST BLOTTED OUT.

Premier Peters, the Liberal leader in the Provincial Legislature of Prince Edward Island, who made so excellent an impression at the Ottawa Liberal convention last June, has scored an even greater victory in the election which took place on Tuesday than at first reported. In a House of 30, the Liberals will have 24 to the Conservative 6, and that, too, despite the fact that the last-named had a strong support from the Ottawa Government. The Liberals seem to have carried everything before them, defeating all the Conservative leaders. It is an overwhelming majority, and well earned, for Premier Peters, since he wrested the Province from other rule, has governed wisely and well.

THE WORKINGMEN AND THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

It was to be expected that the British Trades Union Congress would take prompt action regarding the emancipation of the Employers' Liability Bill by the House of Lords. The congress has decided that the bill should have been passed by the Lords as it left the House of Commons, and will issue a manifesto to the workers of the United Kingdom strongly condemning the attempt to destroy the work of the popular chamber.

This verdict is coincided in by workingmen generally, as well as by the Liberal party in the House of Commons, who are responsible for the proposed law. The measure, as it was sent up to the House of Lords, was a comprehensive one. Home Secretary Asquith, in summing up the debate that preceded the third reading of the bill, contended that though he did not represent it as a complete or final measure, it makes a large and most substantial improvement in the position of the workman. It abolishes, he said, the doctrine of common employment and places the workman on the same footing as a stranger, in relation to risks from negligence. It declares on the face of an act of Parliament that which has hitherto been at the outside a mere matter of doubtful legal decision—namely, that a workman, by entering into and continuing in an employment involving a risk, is not by that act alone held to have voluntarily acquiesced in the risks incident to that employment. The bill also, though the Home Secretary considered it merely defines and declares what is common law, provides that wherever employments are carried on under conditions which involve risk of injury to health, it shall be the duty of the master to take reasonable precautions to obviate or mitigate those injuries, or if he does not take those precautions he shall be liable. It gives to the workman, again, in regard to sub-contracting, a protection which he has hitherto greatly needed, making it impossible for an employer to delegate to a man of straw the liability which the law intends to cast upon him, and which he ought to bear. It prohibits all contracts whereby a workman prospectively relinquishes for all time to come the legal rights secured to him by act of Parliament, but it does not interfere with voluntary arrangements that may be entered into between employer and employe, and which in the past have in many cases been carried out in good faith with positive advantage to both parties to the transaction. Again, the new law enormously simplifies the procedure by abolishing the notice of action and getting rid of the maximum amount of damages which the workman can recover; and, finally, it widely extends the scope of the existing law by, for the first time, providing a satisfactory definition of a workman. By this means, not only the servants of the Crown and all seamen will be brought under the protection of the law, but every class of men throughout Great Britain who work under contract of service and are paid wages. The Home Secretary contended that these are large and liberal changes in the law. They are changes, he added, which the Liberal party believed will not impose on the employer any unreasonable or excessive burden, because they only recognize and give effect to obligations which humane and enlightened employers already themselves observe. "We do believe," Mr. Asquith concluded, "that if this bill is carried into law, as we trust it will be, the time spent on the bill by the House during this protracted session will not have been wasted, because we shall have added to the statute book a measure which, while providing safeguards for the increased security of the rank and file of the great army of industrial workers, will have enlarged and strengthened the resources of the community as a whole."

Some time before this debate took place, Mr. Chamberlain told the electors of Birmingham that the bill was not at all to his taste, and he threatened to try and wreck it on its third reading. He spoke immediately before Mr. Asquith, and to the surprise of everybody, in view of his previous declarations, announced that he would not call for a vote on the third reading. Nor did any other Conservative leader, and the bill passed without a division. This fank of the one-time opponents of the measure, conclusively proved how strongly the bill was indorsed by the country, for if it were the bad enactment that Mr. Chamberlain and the other kickers made it out to be it was their duty to divide the House on its third reading.

The House of Lords has always been opposed to legislation in the interests of the

masses, even though ready to promote any scheme intended to extend the privileges of the classes, and from the first it has been expected that the reactionary majority would endeavor to wreck this bill. They did so by inserting what is known as a "contracting-out" clause, the effect of which would be to permit the mandatory provisions of the measure to be set aside, under certain conditions, in favor of private insurance arrangements with employers. The House of Commons, the overwhelming proportion of the workingmen, and many employers of labor interpret this interference with the bill as an attempt to render its main provisions null and void and to place workmen at the mercy of corporations. The House of Lords certainly had a great deal of assurance to meddle with the act at all. The chamber is not a representative body; it never voices public opinion, either advanced or moderate, and it must have known how strong was the sentiment in favor of the measure when its Conservative allies in the House of Commons permitted the bill to pass without so much as calling for a division. If the Lords persist in their obstinacy there seems to be little reason for delaying the settlement of their ending, or, at all events, of their radical mending.

This question is the chief one before the electors of Accrington, a large manufacturing and railway town, in the bye-election which takes place next week. The Liberal member for Accrington has been appointed recorder of Manchester, and hence must seek re-election. There is a narrow and fluctuating majority, normally Liberal, of about 250 in a poll of 12,000, and the decision has a unique interest, as tending to show whether or not the local popularity and wealth of the Conservative candidate can overcome the undoubted antipathy to the party that finds it necessary to go to the non-representative, non-progressive chamber for aid to retard the passage of progressive measures.

The argument of pessimism is an old one, and a very foolish one. Cleveland was a pessimist the other day while he was denouncing the McKinley Bill; now McKinley is a pessimist. Corden was a pessimist when he denounced the Corn Law; Hopden was a pessimist when he denounced the ship money impost. All reformers are pessimists, concerning the particular evils which they denounce. It is by such pessimism reformers are wrought.

A WAR-LIKE APOLOGY.

(Goderich Signal.)

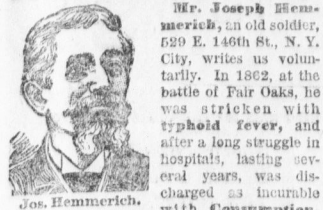

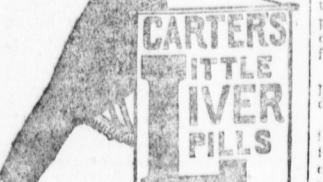

A Woman Dies as a Result of Cutting Her Finger. Broke His Neck by a Fall While Moving a Pig from One Yard to Another.

The ice bridge opposite Montreal is forming rapidly. La grippe is on the increase in Winnipeg, and is becoming a very serious matter. Thunder Bay was frozen over solidly this year three weeks before its usual time.

J. H. Land, a well-known Hamiltonian, and a prominent Royal Templar, is down with the grip. Senator McInnes, of Hamilton, who has been seriously sick, is improving, though not able to be out yet.

Miss Eliza Weeks, Alberton, N. S., cut her finger a few days ago and died on Wednesday. Blood poisoning. The Grand Trunk Railway and the town of Gananoque, three miles apart, are being connected by electric railway.

The scheme to run a continuous line of railway from Gaspe Basin to Sauli Ste. Marie has been revived in Montreal. Charles W. Hamilton, a promising young business man of Port Arthur, died suddenly of heart failure on the 13th. He leaves a widow.

Miss Nora Clench has been requested to play at a private concert to be given at Rideau Hall, the Governor's residence, on the 20th inst. Wm. Howe, who has been in the tin-smith business at Lindsay for years, was taken with a violent fit of vomiting and died in a few minutes.

The case of John R. Hooper, accused of the murder of his wife by administering prussic acid, comes up at the Joliet Assizes to-day (Friday). Subscriptions are being taken in Kingston for a chime of bells in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in that city. Liberal responses are given.

The liquidators of the defunct Commercial Bank at Winnipeg are anxiously searching for important books which have mysteriously disappeared. Michael McCarvell, Char'ottetown, laborer, aged 69, while moving a pig from one yard to another, fell on the ice and broke his neck, dying instantly.

There was a Chinese wedding in Montreal this week. Sang Kee, a greaser in that city, was married to Miss Chu Lee, a newly-arrived Chinese girl, of 18 summers. Mr. E. Schiverea, the noted evangelist, has closed a series of very successful revival services at Kingston. The meetings continued over a month and some hundreds professed conversion.

A Women's Protective Association has been organized at Ottawa, with Miss Etta Breen as president; vice-president, Miss Kennedy; secretary, Miss Villeneuve; treasurer, Miss Carroll. The partners and stock of the old Chown & Cunningham foundry, at Kingston, are being removed to the Smart factory at Belleville. The foundry was one of the largest and oldest in Kingston.

Rev. George Kennedy, of Ingersoll, a retired Methodist minister, was expelled from the church three years ago for bigamy, and now sees the church for his superannuation allowance since that time. A representative of a Chicago steel wheel and wagon company has been visiting Hamilton with a view of finding a good location for establishing a Canadian branch of their works. Of course, "inducements" are being looked for.

William Everett, of Beamsville, received a telegram from Niagara Falls a few days ago saying his father had been assaulted and badly injured. He went to see, and found him well. On his way back he was stopped at a lonely part of the road and his money demanded, but he escaped. A plot to rob him is now suspected.

Liberal Tariff Platform.

We, the Liberal party of Canada, in convention assembled declare: That the customs tariff of the Dominion should be based, not as it now is, as a temporary principle, but upon the requirements of the public service.

That the existing tariff, founded upon an unsound principle and used as it has been by the Government as a corrupting agency, whereby to keep themselves in office, has developed monopolies, trusts and combinations.

It has decreased the value of farm and other landed property; It has oppressed the masses to the enrichment of the few; It has checked immigration; It has caused great loss of population; It has impeded commerce; It has discriminated against Great Britain.

In these, and in many other ways, it has occasioned great public and private injury, all of which evils must continue to grow in intensity so long as the present tariff system remains in force. That the highest interests of Canada demand a removal of this obstacle to our country's progress, by the adoption of a sound fiscal policy, which, while not doing injustice to any class, will promote domestic and foreign trade and hasten the return of prosperity to our people.

That to that end, the tariff should be reduced to the needs of honest, economical and efficient government. That it should be so adjusted as to make free, or to bear as lightly as possible upon the necessities of life and should be so arranged as to promote freer trade with the whole world, more particularly Great Britain and the United States. We believe that the results of the protective system have grievously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy.

IN LABOR'S DOMAIN.

Sovereign Says the Tramp and Dude Must Go. Iron Workers' Wages Cut—The Toronto Cigar-makers—Labor Notes.

New York, Dec. 14.—General Master Workman Sovereign, in a recent address, said: "While the organized monopolies are marching on freedom, I appeal to you to rally to the rescue. Go out into the highways and hedges and call the weary wanderer and marshal the hosts of toil for a final triumphant struggle for everlasting freedom from the thralldom of greed."

"We will bring the great avenues of distribution within easy reach of the masses, elect all legislative, executive and judiciary officers of the general government, take away the veto power of the President and destroy the avocation of corrupt lobbies by establishing the initiative and referendum. Thus we will give to the world our industrial system not menaced by a tramp at one end and a princely duke at the other."

IRON WORKERS' WAGES CUT. Troy, Dec. 14.—The Burden Iron Company called its men, 1,500 in number, together and asked them to submit to a reduction of 10 per cent. in wages, with the assurance that when business improves an increase of 10 per cent. will be made. The men accepted the terms, and the mills are running today. This is the first reduction in ten years at these mills.

EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYERS UNITE. New York, Dec. 14.—It is not often that an association of workmen and an association of employers unite in a fight against non-union men, but such a case was reported by the Journeymen Stone Cutters' Association. This association has decided that no member shall work for any employer who is not a member of the Master Freemasons' Association.

CIGARMAKERS STAND FIRM. Toronto, Dec. 14.—Dull times have seriously affected the piano workers, marble cutters, polishers and other small organizations, but the Cigar-makers' Union bravely holds its own, and has been very successful in securing the adoption of union rules in most of the city factories.

OTAWA, Dec. 14.—At a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council here three delegates, who were charged with having identified themselves with politics by attending the recent Conservative convention were expelled from the council. The delegates concerned are President E. A. Connel and Delegates Leggan and Martin. It is said the delegates will appeal in the event of the decree of expulsion being made absolute.

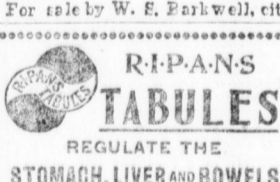

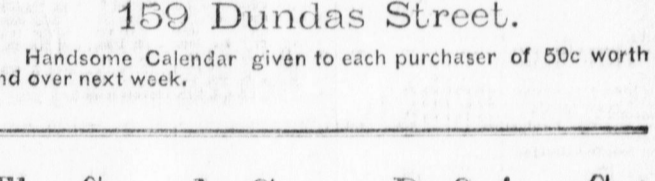

The bozar held in Wesley Hall during the past two days was concluded last night. It has proved a grand success, the amount realized being \$170. This handsome sum will go to the Mission Circle to aid in the work being carried on by that organization.

The service of praise to-night, of which full particulars may be seen in the amusement column, promises to be a great success musically. It is hoped a very large audience will be present for this, the first sacred concert in London under the direction of Mr. W. J. Birks.

The Maple Leaf Pleasure Club held their second semi-annual bus party and assembly at Mr. Fraeclick's hall, St. Johns, Wednesday evening. About 75 couples took part in the grand march, and a very enjoyable evening was spent under the management of the following committee:

The Canadian Jubilee Singers, who gave one of their delightful concerts last evening in the London Methodist Church, will sing at a concert in Adelaide Street Baptist Church. They will also take part in the musical portion of the services at the Queen's Avenue Methodist Church on Sunday night, and on Monday evening a concert is to be given in the last-named church under the auspices of these marvelous musicians.

Mr. Robert Pearson, of the M. C. R. freight department here, was united in marriage to Miss Lettie Weston, of this city, on Wednesday by the Rev. Mr. Rigg. Miss Sarah Hutton, sister of the bride, acted as bridesmaid, Mr. A. E. Wickes as best man. Mr. Pearson's co-workers presented him with a handsome lamp and pair of vases. Mrs. Pearson's presents were beautiful and numerous. The happy couple left per M. C. R. train for Detroit and points west, amidst showers of rice and good wishes.

The Wanderers Return. Part of the electric deputation arrived home yesterday unannounced and unheralded, and made a short cut for their respective homes to change their meeting clothes and get down to business. Those who returned were Mayor Essery and son, Ald. Stevely, Ald. Heaman and Engineer Graydon. Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald, Ald. Prichett and Ald. Farrell are not expected home until to-day, they having stopped over to continue the inspection. The party went to Milwaukee and as far as La Pierre, Wisconsin, where the Siemens-Halske low tension system is in operation. A good time is reported, and as the mayor and those who accompanied him made copious notes of what they saw an interesting technical treatise on volts, currents, amperes, high and low tensions, arc and incandescent lights, insulated wires and pale cut-offs may be expected at the coming election.

Ald. Stevely denies the statements made by the Free Press to the effect that he said that he would not go on the deputation at all if the C. P. R. had been selected as a route.

A Committeeman Feels Insulted. Chairman A. L. Garratt became quite emphatic in his use of the Queen's English in employing small Anglo-Saxon words not generally admissible in polite society—

at a meeting of No. 2 committee last evening. The immediate cause of the outburst was a note from County Clerk T. E. Holson, stating that a committee had been appointed by the County Council to enter with the City Council in order to devise some scheme to furnish labor for the prisoners in the jail, and that it was desirable that both committees should meet next Saturday to consider the matter.

When Clark Bell finished reading this document Chairman Garratt began: "I do not propose to accept any such intimation. We have to pay 60 cents on every dollar that is expended in connection with the maintenance of the jail. During the whole year the county authorities have entirely ignored the committee. I construe such an oversight as an insult to this committee, and, as chairman, I resign the document to the waste basket." The resignation was sent to the council.

Mr. D. W. Hart wrote asking that John street be opened further. Referred to next year's council. A claim of R. Logan for \$16 75, on account of damages to his buggy through a ditch constructed by city employees at the corner of Colborne and Huron streets, was allowed. Mr. Chas. Bartlett wanted to know why the sidewalk in front of the Foresters' Hall, Dundas street, had not been relaid. The chairman pointed out that the work would be proceeded with as soon as the floor was raised. Mr. Bartlett contended that the sidewalk could be immediately relaid without any trouble or expense. He would not, however, consent to shoulder any responsibility if the work was laid under existing circumstances, and the engineer was instructed to take the levels and proceed with the work as proper fall to the curb could be secured. Those present were Ald. Garratt (chairman), Ald. Taylor, Ald. Shaw, Ald. T. Jones, Ald. Draney, Assistant City Engineer Ironsides and Secretary Bell.
