He went to the gailows, a primitive schair, erocted in the woman's yard of the jail, with a smiling face. He walked to his death as unconcernedly as most men would walk to their dinner table. Up to the last he protested his innocence, and to outward appearances died perfectly happy. The execution was performed by Radeliffe, who hanged Birchail three years ago. Luckey's nock was broken and he died instantly.

The CRIME.

His crime was committed about 30 miles from here on Oct. 8. With an axe he killed his three victims, then dragged their bodies to the farm house, their home, and set fire to the building. He was first tried for the murder of his sister. He was acquitted on this charge, but was econvicted on the charge of murdering his father.

The evidence in his case went to show that his family discounded him after he had been convicted and sent to prison. THE WORKINGMEN AND THE HOUSE OF LORDS

It was to be expected that the British Trades Union Congress would take prompt action regarding the emasculation of the Employers' Liability Bill by the House of Lords. The congress has decided that the bill should have been passed by the Lords as it left the House of Commons, and will issue a manifesto to the workers of the United Kingdom strongly condemning the attempt to destroy the work of the popular

chamber. This verdict is coincided in by workingmen generally, as well as by the Liberal party in the House of Commons, who are esponsible for the proposed law. The neasure, as it was sent up to the House of Lords, was a comprehensive one, Home Secretary Asquith, in summing up the debate that preceded the third reading of the bill, contended that though he did not epresent it as a complete or final measure. it makes a large and most substantial improvement in the position of the workman. It abolishes, he said, the doctrine of common employment and places the workman on the same footing as a stranger, in relation to risks from negligence. It declares on the ace of an act of Parliament that which has hitherto been at the outside a mere matter of doubtful legal decision-namely, that a workman, by entering into and continuing in an employment involving a risk, is not by that act alone held to have voluntarily acquiesced in the risks incident to that employment. The bill also, though the Home Secretary considered it merely defines and declares what is common law, provides that wherever employments are carried on under conditions which involve risk of injury to health, it shall be the duty of the master to take reasonable precautions to obviate or nitigate those injuries, or if he does not take those precautions he shall be liable. It gives to the workman, again, in regard to sub-contracting, a protection which he has hitherto greatly needed, making it impossible for an employer to delegate to a man ot straw the liability which the law ought to bear. It prohibits all contracts whereby a workman prospectively relinquishes for all time to come the legal rights secured to him by act of Parliament, but it does not interfere with voluntary arrangements that may be entered into between employer and employe, and which in the past have in many cases been carvantage to both parties to the transaction.
