Troublous Times for Salisbury.
Writing under date of June 19, the day on which a meeting of the Salisbury Cabinet Council was held, to consider as its principal Parliamentary business the further progress of the Education Bill, the London Times said: "Not much hesitation, as it seems to us, need be entertained as to the general character of the course to be pursued. It is dictated by common sense and by the elementary facts of the Parliamentary situation."

MANY AMENDMENTS.
With fourteen pages of amendments to the Irish Land Bill, the contentious Scotch and Irish Rating Bills, and several other troublesome measures, it is not deemed possible, outside of Ministerial circles, to adjourn Parliament at the time proposed by Mr. Balfour. He will give notice of a motion to apply closure to the Land rating bills on Monday. The motion will be fiercely opposed.

FRANCE VS. BRITAIN.
France has opened the expected diplomatic campaign against Great Britain by presenting a communication to Lord Salisbury through Baron de Courcel, the French Ambassador, proposing the termination of the British occupation of Egypt within two years, subsequent to the neutralization of Egypt, no one power to exercise an armed protectorate over the country without the assent of the others. This form of condominium, of which much is said to be heard of in the future, has the support of Russia, and is the subject of active negotiations between France and the other powers. It is understood that Lord Salisbury, with good reason, relies upon Germany, Austria and Italy to back Great Britain in so prolonging the negotiations as to practically defeat the Russian move. The Soudan expedition is being more than ever accelerated. This expedition will involve a large expenditure on the part of the British treasury, and probably somewhat heavy loss of British troops. This will give Great Britain a firm grip on Egypt, which nothing short of a European war can remove. It is probable that the French Government has contemplated such an issue. The proposal seems to have been made rather to gratify and amuse the French people, as M. Hanotaux, the French Foreign Minister, must know that there is no chance of the negotiations being successful.

BELETTING "LI".
Li Hung Chang will not receive in London the ceremonial state reception with which he has been greeted in Berlin. The English foreign officers have no confidence in the prospective value of his mission. It is said, indeed, that he is not authorized by the Emperor or the Tsung Li Yamen to make any definite proposals whatever. His credentials to the respective chiefs of state, with whom he confers, recite his numerous Chinese titles, but do not accredit him as an envoy authorized to make treaties. Whatever may be the Berlin belief, in the importance of Li Hung Chang's visit, it is by no means shared in London. Pekin diplomatic advisers represent him as undertaking the tour of the European capitals as a kind of personal diplomatic speculation. He has promised the Pekin Government to obtain the consent of interested powers to the modification of commercial treaties, notably an increase from 5 to 8 per cent in the custom duties. He promises in return the opening of more ports, extended freedom of inland navigation for foreign vessels, extension of railways, reduction of transit dues, etc., but he has no power to pledge his government to any of these promises. These Pekin advisers add that the majority of members of the Tsung Li Yamen want to complete the downfall of the old statesman, and are prepared to do so by felling and discrediting any success he might obtain in Europe or America.

WILLIAM STUDYING THE CURRENCY QUESTION.
During his long cruise along the coast of Norway, the Emperor William will devote his time, apart from current business, to the study of the currency question. He is taking with him an extensive library bearing on the subject, including 120 English books and pamphlets, in addition to a large number of German, French and Italian works. Directions have also been left with the chief of the royal library at Berlin to forward his Majesty any new books, magazines or papers bearing upon the subject, and they will be sent so as to meet the Emperor at various points he will touch at. Baron Von Kiderlin-Waechter, the German Minister to Copenhagen, and a corps of Foreign Office employees, have been detailed to make extracts from the writings on the currency question and submit them to the Emperor, with remarks and a comparative glossary. In official circles it is expected that a fresh attempt will be made by Germany to arrive at an international understanding on currency matters. The preparatory work in anticipation of this course will be done during the summer by a high official of the Foreign Office.

Tupper's Palace Train.
Who is going to pay the railway companies for the special train with which Sir Chas. Tupper, Bart., cared through Ontario and the Maritime Provinces during the election campaign? It ought not to be a public charge, and if the account is paid out of the Dominion Treasury, steps should be taken by the incoming Government to have the Treasury recouped. No political party has a right to charge the costs of an election campaign to the country. It would never be tolerated in Great Britain.

French Diplomatic Campaign Against Great Britain.
"Li" is Not Going to be Much of a Lion in England—Russia's Big Strike.

TALK OF A SPLIT.
London, June 28.—Although the withdrawal of the Education Bill has lightened the task of the Government, the "stranded whales," as John Morley characterized the "Unionist" majority, goes floundering from shallow into shallow. The blame is laid by Conservatives themselves on Balfour's defects of leadership. They accuse him of having had either no heart for the work of forcing the Education Bill through, or privately rail at him for want of grit in countering the Opposition tactics, and want of tact in guiding the Government forces. Conservative chagrin over the failures of the session is so keen that lobby talk turns upon the advisability of superseding Mr. Balfour in the leadership of the House. They crave for the strong hand and daring guidance of Mr. Chamberlain, but fear to risk committing themselves to the leadership of a man who has not yet shaken off radical ideas, and who might constrain the Conservative party into lines of policy divergent from all Conservative traditions. Mr. Balfour himself privately expresses himself disappointed over the situation, but says he will persist in carrying out his programme for the session against internal malcontents and external foes. The Liberal papers talk of the probability of a split in the Government ranks, and even of an early dissolution.

THE STRIKES IN RUSSIA.
Many interesting reports are coming by mail from Russia about the big strike in the cotton and woolen mills in and about St. Petersburg. At one time, it is said, 40,000 workmen were out, and apparently half that number are still idly waiting. The censorship will allow nothing to be telegraphed about it or to be printed in the Russian papers, which fact, perhaps prompts the correspondents and others to exaggerate the importance of the thing. It seems, however, that the secret proclamations of the Nihilists, which have been circulated among the strikers, and their discovery of a way by which the police can be defied by the organized protesters, has created a great impression in Russia. The strikers, simply by keeping away from the mills and even declining to go and get the wages due them, have baffled the authorities. The latter would have known well enough how to deal with any assemblage of the people—by turning loose on it the mounted Cossacks with their whips—but they are powerless to deal with a moujik who merely stays at home. The plan whose adoption is believed to be likely is to send all the strikers back to their native villages, with their personal rights to travel in the Empire abridged, but this will only spread the story of a successful labor demonstration all over the country, and put a swarm of new ideas in the heads of the rural peasantry.

THE CANADIAN FIREMEN.
The Canadian firemen who have been taking part in the international tournament here, are generally pleased with the reception which has been accorded them. At the close of the tournament, today, they will visit Paris, and will not start for home before taking in the sights on the continent, which will probably postpone their departure to the middle of July at the earliest.

LADIES IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.
The feminine invasion of the House of Commons terrace has been overdone. Over 500 ladies sometimes invade the spot every day, for the quiet repose of members, and they bring their children, whose occasional squallings break in upon the proceedings in the very corners of the room. Protests from members have become so numerous and fierce that it is proposed to restrict members to introducing two ladies per session. Members will hail the restriction as a boon.

CABLE NOTES.
The Saxon Industrial Exposition at Dresden has been opened. Albert Grant, an ex-millionaire, has been declared a bankrupt, and a receiver has been appointed. Ambassador Bayard will occupy the chair at the Fourth of July banquet of the American Society in London. During the last three months 32 Prussian generals, including Gen. Von Lenke, all under 90 years of age, have been retired. Current reports that the Duke of York has decided to visit the United States, Canada and Australia may have a great effect on the public mind, expressed desire to make a tour in this direction, but it cannot come off this year. GERMANY'S "STRONG" GOVERNMENT.

During the past week all sorts of strategems were resorted to in the efforts to keep the Reichstag together. The Center party, which was to establish its capacity as a Government party by engineering the adoption of the civil code in spite of all obstructions, even went so far as to deny the parliamentary rights of the minority. Some of President Von Buelow-Barenberg's decisions were grossly arbitrary and were hotly denounced by the Radical press. A large portion of the German press, including the Hamburger Nachrichten, is condemning the majority in the Reichstag for whipping through the Imperial Code Bill, and scores of popular protests are reaching the Reichstag asking for more liberal provisions for the property and civil rights of women and married women's rights. But they have all been unheeded.

Coal Mine Horror
Caused by a Cave-In and Explosion.
Some 137 Men and Boys Shut Up in the Pit.
It May Take Several Days to Reach Them—Many Lives Lost.

Pittston, Pa., June 29.—At 3 o'clock yesterday morning an explosion occurred in the twin shaft colliery by which 137 men and boys were entombed. The fearful and distressing news spread through the rapidly, and soon the head of the shaft was thronged by thousands of men, women and children. The hours following the alarm were full of harrowing scenes.

DANGEROUS WORK.
It appears that several days ago the officials discovered that the rock between the fifth and sixth veins had commenced "working," and to prevent an accident all day Saturday and Sunday night the full complement of day men and such others as could be pressed into service were at work pilaring and propping the sixth vein so that they might be able to work Monday. Saturday night the regular night force was working at a point about three miles from the pit.

PROBABLY 100 LIVES LOST.
The new force of men enlisted in the work were placed at a point between the fifth and sixth veins, and the terrible news brought to the surface by the four men, who likely will be the only ones to live to tell the tale of the disaster, was that all of those 100 or more men had been caught and either crushed to immediate death or imprisoned to perish a death more horrifying.

CHARGED WITH MURDER.
Patty Sound, Ont., June 29.—The preliminary investigation before Judge McCurdy into the circumstances of the murder at Seguin Falls on June 11, was concluded here on Saturday, and the prisoner, Christian Hanson, was committed for trial. The murdered man was proved to be James Mullin, from the township of Ploeg, and was evidently murdered for the few dollars that he had about him. He left a family of eight at home, the youngest being an infant 4 months old. The trial takes place here on July 14, before Justice Ferguson.

BURNED OUT.
Brighton, Ont., Has a Blaze—Valuable Mill Plant Destroyed.
Brighton, June 29.—The barns of the tractor house, which included three houses. The contents were insured. The rear of the tractor house was badly damaged. The fire spread to adjoining buildings, and did considerable damage. The first to go was the Salvation Army barracks. This building was uninsured. The storehouse of J. W. Freeman went next.
