MUST HAVE OUR MUTTON. Prof. Thomas Shaw, of the Minne sota State School of Agriculture (and formerly of the Ontario Model Farm, Guelph), put the following interroga-tion: "Can it be true that 250,000 sheep and lambs are imported from Canada into Buffalo every year in the face o a high duty? Can it be true that 'Canada mutton' is still read in great large letters on the butchers' wagons in New York city.
