London, Nov. 26 .- 3:15 p.m .- It was officially announced here today that the British battleship Bulwark had been blown up off Sheerness. Only twelve men out of the seven or eight hundred aboard were saved.

The British battleship Bulwark, 15,000 tons displacement, was laid down in 1899, and completed in 1902. She was 411 feet long, 75 feet wide, and drew 29 feet of water. Her armament consisted of four 12-inch, twelve 6-inch guns, sixteen 2-pounders, six 3-pounders, and four submerged torpedo tubes. She had a

complement of 750 men. Sheerness is on the Thames, at the mouth of the estuary of the Midway. It is 35 miles down the river

According to the admiralty, the explosion, which resulted in the destruction of the Bulwark, is believed to have originated in her own

The announcement of the disaster was made by Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty. shortly before 4 o'clock this after-

Magazine Explosion.

The explosion which destroyed the Bulwark occurred at 7:53 a.m. A vice-admiral and a rear-admiral, who were at Sheerness, reported that they were convinced the disaster was caused by a magazine explosion. There was no upheaval of the water. When the smoke had cleared away the ship had entirely disappeared.

An inquiry will be held tomorrow, and the admiralty believes that it may throw some light upon the oc-

Loss of Life Terrible.

Mr. Churchill, speaking in the House of Commons concerning the disaster, said: "The loss of the ship does not sensibly affect our military position, but I regret the loss of life which was very heavy. Only twelve men were saved. All the officers and the rest of the crew, which I supoose amounted to between 700 and 800, perished.'

FORCES IN POLAND NOW COMPLETED "MILE OF PENNIES" Official News Received in London Russian Circles Tells of Utter Defeat of Enemy by the Czar's

RUSSIAN ROUT OF GERMAN-AUSTRIAN

London, Nov. 26.-12:35 p.m.-Official news received in Russian circles in London today declares that the rout of the German and Austrian forces in Poland has been complete. The general staff, however, is not yet able to give any de-

tails of this fighting.

LED INTO TRAP. [Canadian Press.] Petrograd, Nov. 26.—Via London, 2:25 p.m.—Semi-official advices received from Poland show that the German defeat at Lodz, culminating in the capture of a German corps, was the result of a Russian manoeuvre by which the Germans were led into an inextricable trap.

The Russian left wing, resting on the River Warta, and the Russian right on the Vistula, both lying along the Warsaw-Kalisz Railroad, moved forward Simultaneously the Russian centre gave ground and the Germans followed,

apparently relying upon a German column from Wielun to repulse the Russian left wing and to form a juncture with the main German forces.

THOUSANDS SURRENDERED. The German pian failed as a result of the battle on November 25, when the German force from Wielun was repulsed. Thereafter the Russian wings ad-

vanced and closed the gap through which the German centre had passed, In the meantime Russian reserves had come up, and they surrounded the Germans, thousands of whom surrendered. Others fought their way north in an effort to join the German left in the vicinity of Lowicz, a town 44 miles outhwest of Warsaw. TERRIBLE CATASTROPHE.

Paris, Nov. 26.—4:01 p.m.—All the newspapers of Petrograd, says a dispatch from that city to the Havas Agency, affrm that the Germans suffered a terrible catastrophe in attempting an offensive movement with five army corps against the Russians between the Vistula and Warta Rivers. The German turning movement against the left wing of the Russians, in the region of Wielun, to the north of Czenstochowa, also is said to have met with disaster. Eleven German army corps are reported to have suffered enor-

mously, one entire division being captured.



#### Took German Officer's Sword And Killed Ten of Enemies

[Canadlan Press.]

London, Nov. 26 .- A Times Boulogne dispatch says: "Havildar Ganna Sing, of the Fifty-seventh Rifles, is the first Indian to be recommended for the Victoria Cross. He has arrived aboard a pital ship, a bundle of splints and bandages, but very cheerful and full of heart. He has five bullet wounds. Havildar, with 15 men of his regiment, was attacked in a trench before dawn. The Germans were stopped for some seconds by barbed-wire entanglements, and lost heavily before they broke through. In the hand-to-hand struggles that ensued, Havildar shot a German officer, whose bullet grazed his head. He took the German's sword and killed ten more men before he was brought down by a bullet in the foot.

"'Otherwise,' he said, 'I should have killed more." "Ganna Sing was the sole survivor of his party."

## IT'S THE TRUTH THAT HURTS A. J. SMALL

Toronto Magnate Has Plenty of Abuse for The Advertiser, But Not One Word as to Discrimination in Prices of Attractions-Why Doesn't Printing of Programs By The Advertiser Job Company Influence Criticisms?

In a statement which was refused publication in the legitimate newspaper to which it was submitted, but which appears in a local weekly advertising sheet. A. J. Small, the Toronto owner of the local theatre, issues a statement supposed to describe the relations of his London theatre and The Advertiser.

The Advertiser wishes to tell the non-resident owner of the local theatre, which he uses to discriminate against London theatregoers, that his claim that The Advertiser attempted to hold up the local theatre for advertising and theatre tickets is a statement false, libelous, and without the slightest basis of truth.

Mr. Small insinuates that he could influence The Advertiser to withhold its "attacks" by complying with a higher rate for advertising, which was put into effect when The Advertiser commenced the issue of a morning edition, AND WHICH EVERY LOCAL BUS-INESSMAN WAS GLAD TO PAY, WITH THE EX-CEPTION OF THE TORONTO THEATRICAL MAG-NATE. HE ALONE REFUSED THE INCREASE.

The answer to this charge that The Advertiser is "attacking" the Grand in the hope of forcing it to advertise and disgorge so many tickets, is this: At the present time Mr. Small is having his programs printed by The Advertiser Job Printing Company. If The Advertiser were afraid of the loss of Mr. Small's business, would it speak the truth about theatricals while it was receiving a large amount weekly for the printing of his programs? Why does Mr. Small not coerce us by threatening to print the program else-

The truth, and the whole truth, is that The Advertiser has never been, and never will be, the tool of Mr. Small. It has always carefully edited the advance notices which were sent in by his local manager, and has been frank in the discussion of the plays presented here. It has not given its columns freely to him to do with them as he willed.

But the theatrical magnate wants to own the newspaper and dictate what shall be inserted.

When Mr. Small refused to meet the rate put in effect because of the largely-increased circulation coincident with the inauguration of a morning edition. The Advertiser stated to his local manager that the matter of tickets could be allowed to stand over, and had previously intimated that in future all advance notices to be printed would be furnished to the public by the newspaper, and not by the theatre.

When Mr. Small refused to accept the new advertising rates, The Advertiser informed him that it was a matter of business, in which no discrimination could be made, and refused to accept further advertising

Since the opening of the theatrical season, The lvertiser has paid the admission of its critic to the theatre, and has been absolutely fair in its criticisms of local attractions. On only one occasion was an attraction severely criticized, this being "Annie Laurie."

We leave it to those who saw the play if the criticism was unfair.

Mr. Small and his local manager were laughing in their sleeves because they could not understand the fairness with which The Advertiser "attacked" them until this paper's attention was called to the rank discrimination practiced against local theatregoers in the appearance of Lawrance D'Orsay. This attraction appeared in St. Thomas at \$1 prices, and in London at \$1.50 prices, and later in Toronto at \$1 prices. All of the theatres played in are the property of the Toronto magnate. When this was printed there was a great howl, but no explanation.

To support the claim The Advertiser published an advertisement from a local paper and from a St. Thomas paper, later from a Toronto paper. The St. Thomas and London advertisements are given below
