He had been working at it for some time, when a piercing scream was heard by C. G. Potter, a fellow student employe, who was busy in an adjoining room in the building. Potter rushed to the aid of the young man, and found he had been stricken by a current of electric-

Daring possible electrocution Potter seized the body and it fell to the floor, thus breaking the circuit.



Daring Attempt to Kidnap a British Colonel.

Sensational Adventure With Brigands in the Wilds of the Balkans.

London, Aug. 27.-Telegrams received from Salonika on Saturday give a sensational account of an attempt made by brigands to capture a British staff officer while on special duty in Turkey, in Europe, and of the remarkable fight that saved him.

Colonel Elliot was the British staff officer in charge of the work of gendarmerie reorganization in the Drama district of Macedonia.

In the course of a tour in his district Col. Elliot arrived on the afternoon of Tuesday, July 30, at the Bulgarian village of Gyuredjik, situated about seven hours from Drama, on the road to Nevrohop. It seems clear that a Bulgarian band had planned to cary him off from the house in which he passed the night, and that this project was frustrated only by the vigilance of his escort in guarding the place.


