That the threats of a double suicide made by Mrs. Boyle last night were not mere idle words was shown today, when it became known that a razor, which had been secreted in his clothing, was taken from Boyle today, and that Mrs. Boyle had taken what she said was "enough morphine to kill two people."

The morphine was taken between midnight and daylight. She was rendered partly unconscious during the night, and was very sick this morning. t is believed that it was the effect of the morphine which caused her to collapse in the courtroom.



Dig the corms before the ground freezes, cut off the stalk close to the corm and store in a cool dry place, in baskets or shallow boxes. The old corm may be removed a few weeks later when convenient. It is not necessary to wait until the plant dies down before harvesting the corms, as a few weeks after blooming is sufficient to

mature both for this purpose. Care of the Cut Flowers. As our whole interest centres in the

opens, and place in water without buds soon, as this checks stalk development and throws the strength into the larger and earlier maturing flowers. The end of the stalk should be shortened and the water renewed daily with frequent cleansing of the vases. In shortening the stalk cut diagonally, to insure free absorption of water by the spike without the con-tamination and obstruction, caused by

sediment, if cut at a right angle. The fact that blooming the spikes in the shade of room or piazza modifies the field colors, from bright shades and tints to delicate flushes and shadings, and also reduces the latter types to the faintest tinge of color or white,

s well known to experienced growers. The advent of new hybrids producing the most intense and deep shades violet, purple, crimson and scarlet, hitherto unknown, as well as new ellows and other bright colors, makes desirable that these brilliant compinations be preserved when the spikes are cut for decorative purposes. To Retain Delicate Tints.

To insure this most desirable result place the vases of these highly colored types in the early morning sun for an hour or two daily, preferably after renovation and renewal of the water This practice will also enable the retention and normal presentation of the original delicate tints and shadings referred to in the preceeding paragraph, if so desired.

As it takes about three days after cutting to bring the spikes into strong blooming condition, this should be allowed for in advance of the date of intended use. The spikes can be ship-Attorney-General of British Columbia, ped a thousand miles by standing them on end in suitable baskets or boxes. On arrival, cut off the end of the stalk, and remove the terminal buds before placing in water, they will then revive quickly and with proper care give pleasure for a week or more.







Targets for Cadet Corps.

New regulations appear with regard to cadet corps. Each corps in possession of an Esdale target will get a free annual issue of a roll of target and two thousand paper targets; a bond for \$250 must be given. Arrange-ments must be made for the safekeeping of the machine.

New regulations regarding the medical services appear in militia general orders. It now is provided that: All future appointments to the medical service of the active militia shall be made to the Canadian Army Medical Corps.

Officers of the C. A. M. C. will be detailed for duty with regiments and other units having a medical officer

on the establishment. Officers so detailed will revert to the regimental list C. A. M. C., after five years, for other duty in connection with the medical service. When, majority and are celebrating accordofficer may be detailed for another term of five years to a regiment.

No officer above the rank of major of the C. A. M. C. shall be detailed to regimental medical charge. Officers of the present regimental medical service will remain with their

Training of City Corps.

New regulations appear for the training of city corps. It is provided that it must be distinctly understood that at least eight of the twelve days are given to drill or manoeuvre. It further is provided that credit must not be taken on the drill books, so far as pay is concerned, for classes of instruction for officers, non-commissioned officers and men. New and elaborate rules for the granting of efficiency pay appear.




