STRAIGHTEN TAKES U.S. TROOPS ON BEYOND SERGY

Purpose of American and French Attack Is To Outflank Meuniers Woods As Well---German Artillery Again Active in the Bligny Region.

With the American Army on the Aisne-Marne Front, Wednesday, July 31.-American and French troops launched an attack Wednesday afternoon, from Seringes to Cierges, on the centre of the Marne front, for the purpose of straightening the line and demolishing barbed wire entanglements which the Germans have placed through the hills, forests and open places.

The design of the American and French attack, which is in a northeasterly direction, probably is for the purpose of outflanking the Meuniers Wood and in cutting off the blunt salient in the line between Romingny and Cierges. This salient was made more acute by the American advance north from Cierges to

They scored advances in this effort, the Americans pushing beyond Sergy to within two kilometres of Chamery.

The Allied forces effected their progress against stubborn

German resistance. The Allies brought into action their heavy artillery, their aviators and patrols having reported mile after mile of barbed wire standing along the German lines. The heavy guns soon found the range of the entanglements. Some enemy infantry had dug in behind the wires, but the lines were, for the most part, manned

by machine gunners. The German artillery reply consisted chiefly of shells from the 77's and 105's. The machine guns, with the heavier pieces indicated, were active in an effort to prevent an Allied adv

GALLANT WORKS BY SCOTS.

With the French Army in France, Aug. 1 .- (By the Associated Press, Morning) .- Gallant work was done by the Scottish division which participated with the French and the Americans in the attack on the western pivot of the German line below Soissons. This division, composed of famous Highland and Lowland regiments, entered the line to relieve an American division. It took its place on the front after three days and nights of incessant traveling in lorries and a march of ten miles with full packs. The Scots immediately launched an attack and drove back the Germans on their front.

The conduct of the division has called forth high praise from the French generals.

The American troops, although thoroughly fatigued from many days of constant fighting, lent their artillery to the support of the Scotch, who some days later, in conjunction with the French, attacked and took Buzancy, once more with the assistance of the

American gunners. All the Allied troops are working in the closest comradeship and good-will.





LONDON July 31 -- (Via Reuter's Ottawa agency) .- Speaking at a lunchon given in his honor by Sir Robert Perks today, Sir Robert Borden, the anadian premier, in referring to the eliberations of the imperial war con-erence, divided the results into three

classes.

One class of resolutions, he said, dealt definitely with matters of great moment. Another class commended to the attention of the various governments questions requiring fuller consideration as well as the executive and parliamentary action of each. The third class comprised resolutions which set up standing committees representing the United Kingdom and the Dominions for porting to the governments concerned. This last class included demobilization, regulation of ocean freight rates, control of the raw materials of the Empire.

Important Results.

On the whole, said Sir Robert, the deliberations of the conference had been attended by important results. Moreover, a more perfect understanding had been attained by discussion between representatives from all parts of the Empire. It would be of inestimable value if the imperial war cabinet took up still more urgent and more vital work. These deliberations were necessarily secret, as vast and complicated problems arising from the world war had to be considered and determined. When the ministers from the dominions arrived in London, continued the Canadian premier, they were confronted by an enormous mass of documents partly covering the deliberations of the war cabinet and its conclusions since May, 1917. New developments had arisen.

GERMANY ATTEMPTING TO JUSTIFY BOMBING OF ETAPLES HOSPITAL







Didn't Think Minister Could Keep Promise.

M.P. Says Government Made Mistake in Refusing the Farmers Exemption.

WOODSTOCK. July 31.—At a large-ly-attended picnic of the farmers' clubs of Oxford, held at Fairmount Park, Beachville, yesterda; R. W. E. Burnaby of Jefferson. Ont., who is president of the United Farmers of Ontario, was the chief speaker.

Mr. Burnaby said the farmers' clubs got a very "raw deal" from most of the papers of the country, and informed his hearers that in the very near future the farmers would have a paper of their own.

E. W. Nesbitt M.P., was also a speaker. He said he never did think General Mewburn would be able to carry out his promise of exempting farmers. He declared that prior to his election he had not promised exemption, but merely quoted Mewburn. Mr. Nesbitt lamented the fact that there were some men carrying out the M.S.A. who were not capable of their positions and used too much red tape.

Mr. Nesbitt referred to the lack of patriotism shown by the various strikes lately reported. It was distressing, he said, to think that the men receiving
