#### RIDDING A CITY OF SLUMS.

According to the United States consul at Liverpool, that city has made great progress towards the abolition of slums and in the better housunder town-planning sytem. The housing committee of the council has charge of the work. presenting recommendations to the council based on reports of the medical health officer and the surveyors Thus far 18,000 insanitary houses within the city limits have been dedown to make way for business enterprises, while 12,000 have been removed by the municipality at the publie expense. On the sites of the latter and on others which have been acquired for the purpose, the city has erected 2.170 dwellings, which are now under the council's control. During the past five years 260 insanitary courts and alleys have disappeared. and in their places there now stand dwellings that afford comfortable homes for the poor. In the work of demolition and reconstruction nearly \$5,000,000 has been spent, and about 10,000 people, mostly former occupants of the destroyed sections, are housed under healthful and comfortable con-

There still remain standing in the city some 4,000 insanitary houses, and the authorities have obtained parliamentary powers to acquire six unhealthy areas, under the provisions of the housing of the working classes act of 1890, on which will be erected new dwellings to accommodate 2,828 persons. The plans provide for 89 fourroom houses, 188 three-room houses. and 277 two-room houses. There will also be four shops, and the 558 dwellings will contain 1,480 rooms. It is necessary, in order to carry out the scheme, to acquire 118 property interests, all but 27 of which have already been secured. The total cost of the land amounts to \$505,000, and the sum of \$590,490 will be required for buildings. Of the total of 43,993 square yards to be acquired, 5,556 will be devoted to street improvements and a recreation ground.



Commissioner Pocock was enthusiastic over the suggestion. "We should have all the wires down-town underground," said Mr. Pocock. I think the businessmen would agree to pay a little each year towards underground work to do away with the unsightly poles and wires. There is great danger in case of fires from There is these high-tension wires, and of this the merchants are well aware



Ice Prevents Rescue.

Patrolman VanNortwick says the crew of the ferry Promise did everything they could to rescue the woman, but the numerous cakes of ice in the river prevented the ferry from getting close to her and when a small boat was launched it was unable to make any progress through the ice.
