Rome, Jan. 27 .- With the body of the late Pope Benedict laid away beneath the flagstones of St. Peter's the interest of the Sacred College and the Vatican household turned today to the election of his success conclave has been called for Feb. 2 to choose the new pontiff.

Cardinal Gasparri, the camerlenge or acting head of the church, are known to favor continuance of Benedict's policy, which was understood to have been directed toward a resumption of relations with the Quirinal; twenty members of the Sacred College are thought to be just as strongly oped, while nine are classified as neutral.

Maffi Boom Declines.

The attitude of the United States cardinals-O'Connell of Boston and Dougherty of Philadelphia-is unknown at the Vatican, but the opinion is expressed that, unless a comis reached, never has there been such an opportunity for a foreign cardinal to be elected pope. The majority enjoyed by the Italian members of the Sacred College is so evenly divided that Vatican officials admit all depends upon the attitude of the foreign cardinals.

The boom for Cardinal Maffi, archbishop of Pisa, who was mentioned as favored by the Government, appears to be on the decline, while Cardinal Gasparri and Cardinal Archpriest Merry Del Val, respectively leaders of the peace party, and the irrecon-cilables, are acknowledged by the supporters to have little chance of being elected themselves.

## ITALIAN BIRTH RETURNED MEN FAIL TO CLAIM BALANCES DUE

MAFFI BOOM DIMINISHES Nearly 1,000 Heroes of Great War Are Creditors of Government.

NAMES WILL BE POSTED

G. W. V. A. Arranges for Publication and Wide Circulation of Lists.

Ottawa, Jan. 27.-Although more than three years have elapsed since the conclusion of the Great War, nearly 1,000 accounts of soldiers and dependents in the department of militia of defence at Ottawa, remain unsettled, with credit balances, due principally to the lack of proper addresses, to which closing-out checks could be forwarded. More than \$300,000 is involved, covering balances of Pay and allowances for services, soldier's gratuity, war which was payable upon discharge from the army, separation allowance and assigned pay, due to dependents of ex-service men, as well as dependent's portion of war service gratuity. More than half of the amount is payable to dependents. Result of Campaign.

These particulars were brought to light through a campaign, undertaken recently by the Great War Veterans' Association of Canada, to secure final adjustment of all claims arising from war service. Since last October this organization has succeeded in securing settlements in hundreds of cases, not only in the Militia Department, but also of pensions, for nospital treatment and other matters under the jurisdiction of the department of Soldiers' Civil Reestablishment; beside claims in other government departments, and maters outside government circles.

The Great War Veterans' Association has decided to publish the names of ail those to whom credit balances are due on the books of the militia department in the hope that the proper addresses may be secured and settlements effected. Will Publish Names.

Starting Jan. 28, the official magazine of the association. The Veteran. will publish a fresh list of the names every week. All former soldiers have been requested to scan the lists and report the addresses of any of those they may know. The lists will be posted in G. W. V. 

### ORDER DELORME STATUS SIFTED

MONTREAL, Jan. 26 .- An audit of the financial affairs of Raoul Delorme, murdered Ottawa student, and of his estate has been ordered by the attorney-generai's department at Quebec. The audit, it is understood, began this morning. Rev. Father Delorme, half-brother of the deceased student, will be asked to produce all the books relating to the estate, of which he is administrator.

When the father of Father Adelarde Delorme and Raoul Delorme died in 1916, Father Delorme was appointed administrator of the estate He testified before the coroner's court that when the father died in 1916 the estate had been assessed as valued at \$165,000. As the bulk of the estate comprised dwellinghouses, and in view of the increase in rentals and property valuations, the estate is now considered to be worth nearly three times that of the original

From the estate, Father Delorme stated, he would receive in the neigh-borhood of \$7,000 annually. Raoul, the murdered man, would receive about \$10,000, as his share was greater than that of his brother.



ASK UNDERWRITER'S VIEW

TORONTO, Jan. 26.-Unless the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association can show good ground why the select committee of the Ontario Legislature respecting insurance should modify its views, that committee fill make very strong representations to the House when it meets next month.

The recommendations that the committee is unanimously disposed to make are as follows:

That there should be an immediate substantial reduction in the rates fixed by the fire underwriters for the insurance of private dwellings and their furniture contents.

That mutual companies should be admitted to membership in the Can-adian Fire Underwriters' Association. That insurance maps and plans should be made available to unassociated companies at a reasonable

That the commissions paid to fire nsurance agents are too high and are inequitable, and should be regulated by the associated companies if action is not to be forced on the Legislature. On instruction from the commit-tee, Attorney-General Raney, the chairman, is giving the fire underwriters the opportunity to say why the committee should not report as above. The committee wants the

answer to be in writing.

The committee intimates to the underwriters, through J. A. Roberton, their secretary-treasurer, that it has been impressed by the informa tion submitted by the superintendent of insurance, showing the great disrepancy in cost of insurance of private dwellings and their furniture contents between Ontario cities and towns and the cities and towns of New York state, and in particular between Toronto and Buffalo. committee desires the associated companies to submit details of actual experience of premium income and osses paid on private dwellings and their furniture contents in Ontario towns and cities, in order to enable the committee to form an opinion as to whether the rates at present charged by associated companies are justified by the circumstances. The committee desires to know the

views of the association as to whether or not it might reasonably be required that all licensed insurers ndertaking fire insurance in Ontario should be required to keep a record of premium income and losses experi nced according to a uniform mini num classification to be determined by the department of insurance in conference with insurance company representatives and that such records should be available to the Legislature and the government if and when re-

## DECLARES UNITY NEED OF CANADA

S. R. Parsons Makes Eloquent Plea in Address At Empire Club, Toronto.

DEPLORES LABOR NEEDS

Asks Employers To Cultivate Spirit of Goodwill Toward Workers.

TORONTO, Jan. 26 .- S. R. Parsons made an eloquent plea for national unity at the close of an address to the Empire Club here today on "The Third International Labor Conference at Geneva."

After paying a worthy tribute to the soldier dead in Flanders' Fields, Mr. Parsons said: "Dying for principle is all right, but living for principle is both harder and better."

There was no way to realize

national unity, the speaker continued, while French-Canadians, English-Canadians, foreigners, protectionists and free-traders, Protestants and Roman Catholics, farmers and manufacturers, employers and employed, socialists and constitutionalists, and men and women were all arrayed against each other, unwilling to get

together around the national table. "What we need in Canada is roice ringing through our national life calling us to that united purpose and sentiment and enabling us to stand unitedly on a platform as broad as our vast Dominion. This is the time to build up, and not to tear down; the time for co-operation, and not opposition; the time to act unselfishly, and not to be moved by greed; the time for national unity, and not discord; the time to fight our battles bravely, and not lose faith in God that right, and not might, shall rule

Asks Labor To Get Back. Organizations were losing members rapidly, especially on this continent

continued Mr. Parsons "We must get back, it seems to me to the condition which characterized industry a great many years ago when the employer, knowing his men met with them and was friendly with them. As long as we have organizations of employees and employers we have two standing armies facing each other ready for the conflict. We have got to get together in each individual unit of industry, and the employer who does not cultivate spirit of goodwill towards his men is making a great mistake. The only way in which we will bring about industrial peace is the working of each individual unit of industry in such a way that the men and the company are not opposing each other, but are together, and that can be

Unemployment Insurance. The number of unemployed in Great Britain approached two millions, a large number of whom were said to be unemployable, and another large number were said to be leaning more or less heavily on the state unemployment insurance fund. When the question of unemploy ment insurance for agricultural workers was brought up at the Genoa conference the British delegates could not support it on the

ground that the nation's burden for unemployment insurance could not possibly be increased. "I mention this particularly because there is in Canada a feeling on

the part of some that the governments of the provinces, and of Ontario particularly, should bring in some measure of unemployment insurance. Now while we are passing through times which are altogether exceptional, when the whole world is necessarily out of joint owing to war conditions, it seems to me a poor time to bring in any such measure, for in a new country like Canada, generally

speaking, men who are anxious to work can find it."

Cost of High Taxation. Touching on the fact that Great Britain recently obtained no part of a contract for three or four million dollars worth of railway supplies for the Chinese government despite the fact that the commissioners desired Great Britain to get the order, Mr. Parsons ascribed the reason to high taxation owing to the high rates of wages and restrictions of output, etc. Notwithstanding these things and the large army of unemployed he had no doubt that Great Britain would weather the gale, but a time must come when labor unions and employers would work together to enable the old land to obtain her fair share of the world's business, because unless she was great in her export business she was not great anyway, and she must have such business in order to maintain her supremacy as one of the world's great producing and manufactuing countries. Already there was a great scheme for stimu-lating trade and industry, for Great Britain was guaranteeing the principal and interest on £25,000,000 for

organizing new industries Fill Long-Felt Want. The new Canadian Chamber of Commerce in London would, the speaker declared, fill a long-felt want




