EXPECTED TO BE UNSATISFACTORY.

The consul-general of the South African Republic, Mr. Montagu White, said to a reporter of the Associated Press:

"I have gold authority for believing that the Transvaal reply will be unsatisfactory to the British government."

Whatever the nature of President Kruger's reply, it is probable that several more clages of diplomatic processes will be gone through with before there is definite war or peace, unless, of course, President Kruger should take the initiative and raid Natal. The hardest worked washerwomen in the world are the Coreans. The Egyptian washerman stands on the banks of the Nile and slaps the west clothes, with a noise like the shot of a pistol, on the smooth stones at the edge of the running water, and such fellah women as wash pound the dirt with paddles, often slamming the clothes upon stones, as the Egyptians do.—Washington Star.
