Tokio, May 26.—Bulletins from the Manchurian war field yesterday afternoon and evening indicate that the preliminary stages of the long-looked-for battle are under way north of the Hun River. Four different points, each of them widely separated, are touched in the bulletins and cover the operation of the troops up to Tuesday evening. It is clear from one bulletin that a considerable Russian force of cavalry which was compelled to retreat southwest on Monday night has not yet escaped from the Japanese lines. This division was attempting to make its way north on the right bank of the Liao River on Tuesday morning, and at that time was fighting at a point south of Talun, seventsen miles west of Fakuman, the headwarters of the Japanese left arms.

The bulletin announces that 300 dead and wounded cavalry were abandoned in the flight across the Liao River. This is the force composed of seven squadrons which last Saturday night attempted to get in the rear of the Japaneses left army, and since has been fighting with several detachments of Japanese troops.

Gunshu Pass, May 26.—Engagements are general along the entire line. Recomaissances in force southeast and southwest have pretty well deterrgined the position of the Japanese army. Lieut.-Gen. Rennenkampit's forces are returning from a brilliant raid on the extreme left. The cavalry penetrated the enemy's lines southwest of Fakuman, but at a cost of several hundred men. On the attempt to return from the southwest three squadrons of cavalry were cut off and finalry had to fight their way across the Liao River, being unable to carry their wounded.

Ferced Japa to Retire.

A Russian detachment of 1,500 mixed troops on Tuesday night made a successful attack on the Japanese trenches built on the heights north of Chengiu, Just east of the milwer, forcing the Japanese from the northerly trenches and thoroughly disclosing their positions there. On the left flank of the Russian army an advance by eight Japanese battalions with three guns was on Tuesday stopped just south of the Village of Sahedze. "Certainly. The Japanese cannot afford to allow Rojestvensky to reach
Vladivostock without an engagement. I
personally expect it to take place in
the near future, though I admit the
Admiralty knows nothing of Rojestvensky's strategy or plans, the Emperor having accorded him complete freedom of action." In response to a suggestion that Togo might intentionally
allow Rojestvensky to get to Vladivostock, contenting himself with torpedo attacks while the Russians are
on their way there, and then try to
bottle Rojestvensky up in Vladivostock,
Admiral Avellan smilled and said:

"The story of Port Arthur will not
be repeated. Rojestvensky will try to
wrest the mastery of the sea from Togo. There are many ways of compelling Togo to accept battle. Rojestvensky will only have te bombard one of
the coast cities to force Togo to appear
in its defence."

Toronto, May 26.—Lieutenant-Governor Clork closed the first session of the eleventh Legislature on Thursday afternoon. The function was in marked contrast to the opening on March 22, when thousands of people gathered to witness an unique event in the history of the Province. Yesterday there were but four Oppositionists in their seats. Messrs. Harcourt, Atkinson, Graham and Kennedy—while the Government benches were also largely empty. Hom Mr. Hanna was the only absent Minister, but the only Conservative "full privater" in the chamber to hear the speech from the Throne were Messrs. Bradburn, Carscallen (Hamilton), Dr. Preston, J. J. Preston, McCowan, Pattinson, Thompson (Simcoe), Smellie, Gamey, Smythe and Lamarche. Judge Sir W. R. Meredith and Judge Hodgins represented the bench, and President Loudon and Prof. McCallum were fhere representing the faculty of the miversity. Fourteen ladies graced the chamber, including Mrs. and Miss Whitney.

Scholfield warned the Council in granting franchises with railway in granting franchises with railway companies not to barter away all their rights or they would live to rue the day they did so. He instanced the Toronto Street Railway Company which, having once obtained franchises from that city, carried proceedings with a high hand and and and almost governed or controlled the city. I would like to raise a warning hand at the present time to the excellent Council of 1905 not give away everything the city owns to the C. W. and L. S. Railway Company. We have granted them a bonus of \$50,000 and exempted them from taxes for a period of years, have given them the right to use several of our streets and the use of Aberdeen bridge, but it seems they are not satisfied with these concessions, but want "in common parlance," the earth. Some of the officers of the company demand of the residents of St. Clair street the right to lay their tracts on the boulevard, otherwise they will expropriate the laws in front of their residences and run their line still closer to their doorways, threatening the said residents with the omnipotent powers which they possess and that if they do not allow them the use of their boulevard they will run over their front lawns. Now, Sir, we are all pleased to have the railway and do not regret the very large concessions companies not to barter away all bonlevard they will run over their front lawns. 

KAISER'S COLLEGE CHUM

DR. VON BETHMANN-HOLLWEG A PRUSSIAN MINISTER.

Fellow-Students At University Bonn, German Emperor and His New Minister of the Interior Are Warmest of Personal Friends-In This Case Kaiser Follows Rule to Take Care of His Friends.

Take Care of His Friends.

Emperor William has called one of his college chums to the Prussian Cabinet. He has just appointed Dr. you Bethmsua-Hollweg to the important portfolio of Prussian Minister of the Interior, vice Baron von Hammerstein, deceased. The new Minister is one of the Kaiser's warmest personal friends, dating from the days when they were students together at the University of Bonn.

They were not only follow-students but fraternity brothers, being members of that historic and ultra-exclusive "corps," the Borussia, to which most of the princes and noblemen of Germany have belonged in university days. The Kaiser, following the ideal upon which is supposed to rest the success of politicians, has always "taken care of his friends" since he became emperor. Dozens of them are filling military, naval, and civil offices of importance and rich emoluments, of importance and rich emoluments



and he delights to honor them. His majesty's recollections of Bonn are among the happiest of his life, and the intimacies formed beneath the alms

among the happiest of his life, and the intimacies formed beneath the elms fringing the Rhine at that picturesque spot are cherished by him.

Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg is two years the Kaiser's senier, being 48 years old. He is a Prussian, born in the province of Hohen-Finow, and has the province of Hohen-Finow, and has advanced rapidly in various departments of the government service since ments of the government service since entering it in 1879. His latest position, from which he has now been advanced to cabinet rank, was that of president of the province of Brandenburg, in which Berlin and Fotsdam are situated, and therefore the most important district of its kind in the empire. He was a member of the Reichstag for one term, representing a moderate-conservative constituency. His grandfather was a Prussian minister of education and worship.

HOW TO LIVE LONG.

Limit of Activity Should Be Ninety Years, Says Dr. Wiley. Dr. H. W. Wiley, chief of the United States bureau of chemistry, declares that science has done much fer the human race in the way of increasing the average length of life. Progress in science, he says, will soon put the limit of activity up to ninety years. "Start with a good pedigree, then live rationally," is Dr. Wiley's summing up the propulsates three laws

live rationally, is Dr. Wiley's summing up. He promulgates three laws of health the observance of which will put any naturally healthy individual in a fair way to realising the truthfulness of the scientists' theory. These are temperance, work and play.

"To live long one must live moderately both as to eating and drinking," says Dr. Wiley. "Youthful dissipatere die between thirty-five and forty-five years of age. Age hardens the veins. Tissue is not built up then as in youth. When the veins harden they are liable to snap without warning. This causes a large proportion of the sudden deaths.

"Babies should not be too fat. It is "Babies should not be too fat. It is

deaths.

"Bables should not be too fat. It is a handicap to later development. Starting with a strong, healthy body and living temperately, the next requisite is work. Idlers rust out. Workers should exercise their talents in a way te prolong life by following great endeavors by periods devoted to play. Recreation is an essential part of the recipe for old age. Amusement is as necessary as sustained endeavor if one looks for mentality and health in old age.

one looks for mentality and health in old age.

"To achieve this desired end science is working hard. It is exposing the fake medicines, which do harm and no good; it is discovering new means of preventing diseases and advanced methods of checking such ravages. It is appalling to think of the number of babies who die because of improper faeding and dosing. Science is winning out against such scourges as diphtheria, consumption and contagious diseases.

"These scientific facts and develop-ments give assurance that the average human life of usefulness will be in-creased to seventy years instead of forty and that the maximum of ordi-nary activity will be increased from the present threescore years and ten to ninety years. Then there will be more examples of men who have lived properly who will reach a century of life.

"What used to be regarded as a generation was thirty-three and a third years, but now it is more than forty years."

LOCAL LABOR TO BE SECURED

Big Delegation of Wrathy Workmen Secure Satisfactory Assurance From Radial Road

Visited Mayor Cowan in a Body and Talked Violently—Mr. Warburton Relieves Misunderstanding

Mayor Geo. W. Cowan had an in teresting and busy time this morning when a deputation of city workplaint re the construction of the electric railway.

The members of the deputation claimed that a number of foreigners have been brought into the city by the railway authorities to work by the railway authorities to work on the construction of the railway along the Baldoon Road while the men in the city were allowed to go unemployed. The deputation was made up of about 15 men, white and colored, and they made a very strong complaint and hinted that they intended to use yielence if necessary to keep these foreign working men from usurping their rights. Things looked very threatening as the present state of affairs stood and the men spoke as if they were ready to get up in open riot at a moment's notice.

Mayor Cowan heard their complaint and said he

get up in open riot at a moment's notice.

Mayor Cowan heard their complaint and said he would take the matter up at once and get at the facts of the case, telling the men to call again later in the morning.

In the meantime Mr. Cowan interviewed Mr. Warburton, general manager of the road, and found that some outside men had been brought in by the company, but these men were men who were prepared to go out in the country, live in tents, and put up with what board they could secure and work on the company's road, something that the laborers of Chatham were not prepared to do for any money, and work that the company would not ask the higher class of laborers to do. In fact these outsiders are the only men the company can get for this kind of rough labor. There are about 15 men doing this work now in Dover, and they are all men who are used to this kind of inferior labor.

As a matter of fact, after the Council passes the by-laws for the company will start right to work with their city construction and then there will be more demand for city laborers than the city will be able to provide. The company are desirous of giving the outside laborers the work in the city to city laborers.

for work. Last week a number of

the railway company is not neglecting them and that their complaints
will be satisfactorily overcome when
the company starts its city construction.

MR. DUNSTAN ON STAND. Gives the Bell Side-Obliging in City of Toronto.

Gives the Bell Side—Obliging in the City of Toronts.

Ottawa, May 26.—Mr. Dunstan, the local manger of the Bell Co. in Toronto, was examined at the special committee on telephone yesterday. The witness, who was called by the Bell witness, who was called by the Bell people, gave some details regarding the contract between the city and the company. The contract was not satisfactory to the company. After the contract expired the city advertised for a plant. The Bell Co. was always willing to have good relations with the city, and he so informed all the mayora. There were 13,600 instruments in the city, and of this number 2,300 were the old Blake transmitter. There was no difficulty with the city about routes. The policy of the Bell Co. was to put wires underground. The company moved poles at the request of the city, although not under contract to do so. As to rates, they were fixed by the head office. The Blake transmitter was not more expensive than the long-distance transmitter. New subscribers could have the Blake transmitter. The number of calls in Toronto had increased 50 per cent.

Mr. McFarlane, Montreal, general superintendent of the Bell Co. was snaxt examined. He repudiated the idea that the companyadid not desire to extend the service to rural districts. The Bell Co. was anxious to have a continuous service all ever British North America, but the difficulty was to get capital to do this. He cited the efforts that had been made in Ontario to give rural telephones. There were 2,000 rural telephones out of 2,500 miles of line. Sir William Mulock: What is the lowest rate for rural telephones you charge?

Mr. McFarlane: \$15.

Sir William Mulock instanced the case of Ohlo, with a population of a little over 4,000,000 people, and with an area-less than two-thirds that of Canada had 90,000 telephones.

Mr. McFarlane answered that the telephone development in certain States of the republic was extraordinary. It was a case of "Dog eat dog." There would be a slump some day. Sir William was not willing to accept this statement, but advanced the opinion that the lack of development on the part of the Bell was due to the high rates charged.

Mr. McFarlane was not able te give any opinion as to the automatic system.

He admitted that in the territory covered by the Bell the number of "phones in use in rural districts amounted only to I to I,246 of the population. The electric light powerhouse was badly acorched. Large pleces of burning timber were carried across the Maitland River and the carriage factory, owned by J. C. Cober & Son was entirely consumed. The fire burned itself out and was subdued. Wingham and Listowel fire brigades arrived about 50 clock. The loss is estimated at about \$35,000; insurance unknown.

JEWS FIGHTAT WARSAM

Eight Are Dead, 100 Are Wounded, 19 of Them Seriously.

Bundites Began Work of Reform, and the Respectable Element Turned Out to Demolish the Property of the Disreputable Classep—No Pillaging, But the Destruction of Property Has Been Absolute.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, May 26. Warsaw, Russian Poland, May 26.—
The Jewish disorders here Wednesday night arose from an attempt of the Jewish Socialist organization, called the Bund to purse the Hebrew district of Warsaw of all disreputable persons. The Bundites with the view of expelling their undesirable co-religionists commenced to wreck disorderly houses, tences, and other resorts. The lighting spread to the surrounding streets, continued until midnight and recommenced yesterday morning. The Bundites have been permitted to carry on the work of destruction without any interference on the part of the authorities. Fourteen of those wounded Wednesday night are reported to be dying.

Eight Killed: 100 Wounded.

The disturbances continued all day and were still in progress late last night. Eight persons have already been killed and 100 wounded, 19 seriously. The damage to properly has been considerable. There has been no pillaging, but the destruction of the furniture in the houses has been absolute. The mob, armed with axes, smashed the doors and windows and brought the furniture out on the streets, where they broke it into small pleces. The owners of the furniture, in attempting to save their belongings, were attacked, beaten and even killed. Late last night Cossacks fired on the crowds at two points, wounding four persons. The police did not interfere actively during the day.

The affair is a conflict between the respectable Jewish social classes and the disreputable Jewish element. The report is that the respectable Jews, tired of hearing the members of their race called opprobrious names, resolved, as the police were receiving bribes for protecting disreputable houses and persons, to take the matter into their own hands. Another report has it that Jewish roughs, in the guise of members of the Bund, were levying blackmail upon shopkeepers.

Extraordinary scenes were witnessed late last night when the crowds visited the better section of the city and demollahed apartments filled with costly effects.

The affair was carefully organized. The leaders were supplied with the addresses of the owners of disreputable houses and scarcely a single resort in Warsaw escaped destruction.
