A Western member is in receipt of an interesting letter from the front from a prominent Canadian officer who has always been a strong Liberal and has been offered and refused a Liberal nomination in the coming election. He writes:

"I have been taking a very keen interest in the conscription question. Sir Robert's attitude has pleased me immensely. He has taken the bold course and the right one. Private information received over here indicates that he made a very liberal offer to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. This offer, I understand, has been turned down and Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the offitial Liberal party proposed to passively resist conceription; first sug-gesting alternative schemes and then deliberately oppos the measure on the ground that the plans were not first given a trial.

"If this is the care - y of us will have to break abs and away from the official Liberal party. We will not cease to be Liberals but we will deny the right of the Laurier French-Canadian group to make use of that name, and we will assert our independence of their leadership. In the meantime if conscription goes through we will give our support to the party


