We noticed an unusually large par-

A paste which will stick anything
is sold by Professor Winzell to be
made as follows: Take two ounces
clear gum arabic, one and a half
ounces of fine starch, and half an
ounce of white sugar. Dissolve the
gum arabic in a quart of water as
the starch indicated. Mix the starch
and sugar with the mucilage. Then
cook the mixture in a vessel suspend-
ed in boiling water until the starch-
bed comes clear. The cement should be

A LETTER FROM MANITOBA.

SNOW FLAKE, MAN., Oct. 27th, 1890.
DEAR EDITOR.—A friend has re-
cently sent me a copy of your paper,
and as I read different paragraphs
that it contained, recalled to my mind
so very vividly the scenes of long ago
around the town and Sheldon's Cor-
ner that I felt impelled to address a
few lines to your paper, hoping that
in your generosity you will find
space for them. I might say that it
was just fifteen years last Dominion
Day since I boarded a western train
at old Brockville and turned my back
upon dear old Leeds and the scenes
of my boyhood that are so dear to us
all, and what changes those years
have wrought, not only in the
lives of us all, but in the progress
of our fair Dominion, and especially my
adopted province, viz: Manitoba.
Although I have been a resident of
Manitoba for nine years, my mind
often goes back to the old familiar
scenes and the first time when a small
boy that I visited Athens for the first
time in company with my father, but
who was removed from those earthly
scenes in Jan. '85, and how vividly I
remember the old school house and
play ground at Sheldon's, and Mr. John
Yates, instrument of torture in the
shape of a thorn persuader of
rather large proportions, and what
Ellisville it was at handling the
same. If my memory does not fail
me I think he was of Irish parentage
hence his capabilities in swinging the
thorn, and if it was not the good
black thorn, there was no mistake
that it could produce a black mark,
and I almost fancy I can hear the
hammer strike the anvil in Mr. Thos.
Wilson's blacksmith shop across the
way from that ever to be remembered
old play ground.

For fear that I may trespass too
much on your space in recounting
those scenes that have such a peculiar
interest to me I will confine myself
to addressing a few words to the
young men and young ladies that
may be thinking of coming to Mani-
toba to better their worldly prospects.

After a nine years experience in
Manitoba I would say to the young
men who are not at heart, and great
and have a few hundred dollars and
are inclined to agricultural pursuits
by all means come to Manitoba. In
some parts of Manitoba and the
Western Territory homesteads can
be obtained by paying a nominal fee
of \$10 and complying with homestead
law, this entitles him to 160 acres of
land and ready for the plow, and should
be wanted to buy a few acres of
railway, good land can be obtained
from \$2.50 to \$5.00 per acre in close
proximity to schools, churches, rail-
road depot and good roads, and
settled mostly by Ontario people,
Winnipeg, and would be pleased to
inmate. I know very few Leeds
men in my district, I might say one
that I know and he has prospered in
Mr. Smith Curtis, who is a law part-
ner of our Attorney General, and the
Winnipeg Free Press says that they
have made lots of money by using the
Attorney General's public position to
attain it. But be that as it may there
are many chances here for young men
that Ontario does not offer. To the
young ladies I would say there are
hosts of chances for them to become
the wives of merchants, lawyers, far-
mers, etc., and those of you who are
not matrimonially inclined, as sales
women, and any amount of good
openings for millinery and dress-
making shops. At one issue last
spring the Winnipeg Free Press con-
tained two solid columns teachers
wanted. Some lady teachers are re-
ceiving \$450 per annum, and the cost
of living very little higher than
Ontario.

I would advise all young men
wanting to better their worldly pros-
pects where to come to Southern Man.,
viz: C. P. B. South Western Branch, and

edly the garden of the West.
