The St. John Exhibition.

A meeting of the Exhibition association of St. John was held on Saturday last, at which it was decided to hold an Exhibition in that city next fall, to open September 22nd, and close Oct. 2nd.

Fire Losses.

The insurance people state that already this year they have paid out in losses by fire in the city of Halifax some \$300,000. The premiums paid for the whole year was \$400,000 so that within only three months of the year gone they are facing the fact that they have paid out about seventy-five per cent of what they have taken in.

Considerable legislation is being necessary at present to control the tendency to fraud among manufacturers of cheese, etc. Large numbers of filled cheese have been sent across to England and have given the country a decidedly bad reputation, driving the American article altogether out of European markets.

May 8th will be a busy day. The day should be fittingly observed by our school children. The Council of Public Instruction leave the celebration optional, and heretofore it has been often decided to be easier to let the occasion pass unobserved.

A fog-making and frost-fighting machine has been invented and used with success in the orchards about San Jose, Cal. Frost is the orchardist's most dreaded enemy, and heretofore when one has been expected all the available help has been kept busy maintaining brush fires about the orchards and vineyards.

What about our band? We have heard very little of it of late. The balmy spring evenings are at hand and open-air concerts will soon be in order. To keep up a band means a great deal of hard work and self-sacrifice on the part of its members, and they should receive substantial encouragement.

The date of the general election has been fixed for Thursday, June 23rd, nominations a week earlier, on the 16th. It was expected the parliament would be dissolved this morning. The writs will be made returnable July 15th and the new parliament will be summoned to meet the same day. We may expect a lively campaign during the next two months.

Kings Co. District Meeting.

The Baptist Kings Co. District meeting was held according to notice in the Cambridge church on Monday evening and Tuesday last. The first service was evangelistic, led by Pastor Williams, of Gasperon, and participated in by Pastors Read and Simpson and Evangelist Norwood and others.

The morning service opened at 10, Pastor Simpson in the chair, and consisted in appropriate music by the choir, prayer, reading and exposition of scripture by the President, followed with practical suggestions by Revs. Martell, Bishop, Rand, A. Coburn, Williams and a number of "lay" brethren. This service occupied about an hour's time.

Then followed reports from the churches represented by the pastors and delegates present, as follow: Rev. E. O. Read, Cambridge; Deacon Bowley, Tremont; Deacons Vidito and Margeon, Kingston; Deacon W. C. Shaw, Berwick; Deacon H. Sweet, Billtown; Rev. Martell, Canard; Rev. J. Williams, Gasperon; Rev. A. Coburn, Wolfville and New Minas and Evangelist G. Norwood, for Burlington. The secretary, Rev. M. F. Freeman, read reports from a number of pastors unable to be present. These reports showed additions to membership to most of the churches and increased improvement in financial standing in several instances.

The afternoon meeting opened at 2 o'clock. A larger gathering than in the morning. A number of venerable women came, among whom were noticed Mrs. William Craig, Mrs. Saml. Pineo, Mrs. Sawler, Mrs. Woodman and others. Interesting papers were listened to from Rev. E. O. Read, on "The Relation of the Church to the Denomination," Rev. Martell on "Church Discipline," and Rev. A. Coburn on "What the Baptist Denomination stands for."

The evening session consisted in platform missionary speeches by pastors and others, interspersed with scripture reading, excellent music for the occasion by the choir and prayer.

Messrs. S. B. Chute & Co., of South Berwick, have bought from Mr. Geo. Aeroid twenty acres of land on the Cleveland road, about a half mile south of the P. T. J. Webster, of Cambridge, in the presence of the clergy and others, who attended the District Meeting, formally turned the first sod on the spot where he is to erect his residence, with religious ceremony, on Tuesday morning. This public and formal invocation of divine blessing on the founding of the new home, is highly commendable. In these times when there are so many distracting influences and associations outside, the home has small chance of getting more than a very superficial attention. More attention ought to be given to the formation of character in the home, than less only need be made in the attempt at reformation elsewhere.

Dr. Sexton's Lecture.

Dr. Sexton was greeted with a large audience on the occasion of his lecture in College Hall, on Monday evening last. Mr. Denton, president of the Atheneum Society, presided. The subject: "The Origin of Man, Creation or Evolution?" was treated in a very able manner, and whether or not they could agree with his ideas, all admired the lecturer's great force and eloquence. He pointed out the various inconsistencies and weak points in the theory of "Evolution" in a very convincing manner, and referred to Herbert Spencer and Professor Huxley and Drummond in a manner which was not at all flattering. But as Professor Huxley is dead, and the other two gentlemen are not in this immediate vicinity, probably nothing serious will result from the criticism. At the close of the lecture an opportunity was given for any who wished to ask questions, which privilege a number availed themselves of. These were all answered readily and satisfactorily, showing the Doctor to be thoroughly familiar with his subject. The lecture was greatly enjoyed by all present.
