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The Proposed St. Lawrence Canal

The engineers appointed by Canada and the United States to jointly investigate the feasibility of the proposed St. Lawrence canal, and to estimate the cost, have reported to their respective governments. The project is regarded as practicable, and the cost is placed at \$253,000,000 in round figures.

The Times' Attack

With the London Times' opinion that Lord Curzon would not be a suitable representative of Great Britain in disarmament negotiations, especially where the United States is involved, there perhaps will be little contention.

The estimate cost must be viewed in the light of experience. Very seldom has any large public undertaking been carried out for the sum estimated by the engineers. The history of canal building the world over is peculiarly the history of human inability to foretell the cost.

Canada now has one of the finest systems of inland waterways in the world. The depth of the St. Lawrence route was increased to fourteen feet in 1900 at a large cost. Traffic did not, however, materially increase.

Vessels go westward practically empty. Our canals could quite easily handle five times the traffic which has been offered in any year since 1900, yet one of the fundamental objections to artificial waterways is the fixed limit of their capacity.

The effort to increase transportation facilities in Canada has, on the whole, brought such trouble to the country—as witness our railway problem at the present time—that the people at large might be excused for demanding very thorough consideration of the proposed St. Lawrence canal on its full merits before any additional conditions are made to our national responsibilities.

City of London Gives Freedom to Mr. Meighen

London, July 15.—With all the pomp and circumstance with which tradition surrounds the ceremony, the freedom of London was presented to Premier Arthur Meighen today.

These are powerful, immutable facts and because they are facts, we have to shape our plans to meet them. True it is that we share each other's security and the peril of one is the consideration each Dominion must determine its policy in the light of the conditions that surround it.

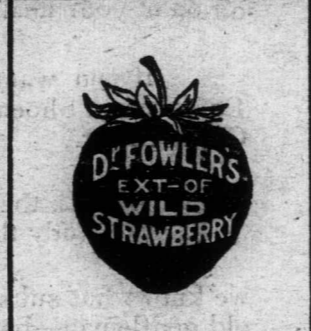
A Little Child Shall Lead Thee

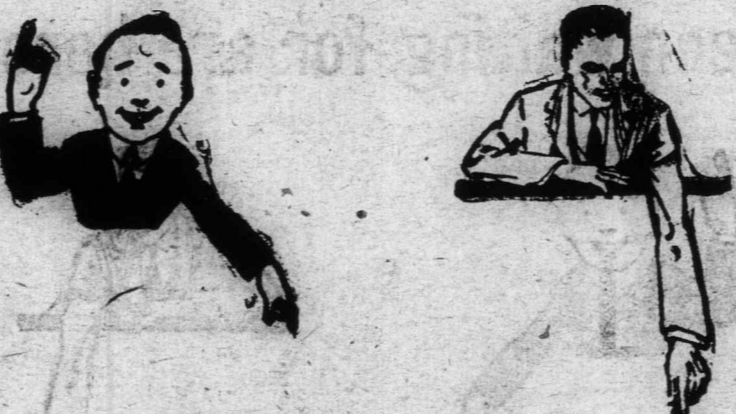
