The Sealing News.

The anxiety prevailing on Thursday night when it became known that the S. S. Viking had run on one of the sunken sandbanks off Miquelon, and that the S. S. Portia was going to her assistance, was allayed when it became known that Capt. William Bart-lett had worked her off and that she was safe and uninjured in the roads of St. Pierre.

A despatch from our correspondent at St. Pierre gives some details of the Viking mishap and recovery. This pleasing news of the Captain's success in working the Viking out of a dangerous predicament was received yesterday morning and was followed late at night by excellent news from the front received from Mr. Eric Bowring who is on board the S. S. Floriel a wireless message reporting 144,000 seals for five steamers with three other powerful steamers in the seals. This gives over 200,000 seals for eight steamers. If other steamers have any luck at all. there is every prospect of a "bumper"



Bartlett, jr., who was then at St. Pierre, stating that the Viking had run ashore off Soldier's Point on the Island of Miquelon at 11 a.m. Thursday. When the news got abroad there was intense excite-ment in the city and the telegraph of fices and Messrs. Bowring Bros.' pre mises were besieged with people eager to hear all possible information. The captain asked for assistance to lighten the ship, which it was found difficult to float off, The place where she struck is not a very dangerous one in calm weather, and as it consists mostly of sand banks the belief was that when lightened a bit high tide, and this proved to be cor-The Viking was taking the short cut through the run between St. Pierre and the main land when the accident occurred. Capt. William Bartlett, jr., rowed to St. Pierre with three men to telegraph the news and seek assistance. In answer to a message from Mr. Munn the captain wired at 11.30 Thursday night that the ship was on a sand bank, making no water and that the chances for floating he were good if the weather remained as it then was. This allayed the excitement of the people about, especially those who had friends in the ship, and they all went home. The Portia was then got ready to go up to the Viking's assistance and left here at 1 a.m. yesterday in command of Capt Fitzpatrick. Mr. Tasker Cook took a run up in her. Yesterday at 8.30 a.m. Mr. Munn had a message saying that the ship had floated off without outup in her. Yesterday at 8.30 a.m. side aid, that she made no water, and reached in St. Pierre Roads. She left

for this port at 11 a.m. yesterday. The ship did not leave Channel until 8.36 esday night, and up to the time of the accident had been out fifteen hours. She thus covered the distance, which is nearly 150 miles, at the rate of nearly 10 miles an hour, which surprised her owners. Had she escaped the mishap Mr. Munn expected to see the vessel in port yesterday afternoon. It was fortunate that the accident occurred in fine weather or a tragedy might have resulted. More than likely a considerable number of the seals were jettisoned from the forward hatches, but they were so se-cured that they could be hoisted on board again when the ship came off. 

A Story of the " Koh-i-Noor."

Sir John Lawrence (after Lord Lawrence), according to the accepted belief, saved India for the British Crown in the Sepoy rebellion. Some weeks later came an official letter from Lord Dalhousie ordering that the diamond be sent at once to Her Majesty. The president received the message during meeting of the board, and Sir John advised him to send it off promptly "Why, you've got it," said the senior member. Sir John's clear intellect took in the full horror of the situation, and he feared he was a ruined man, for the gem had never been seen by him since the day it had been given in his keeping. Yet, without a sign of perturbation, he casually replied: "Oh, yes, of course; I forgot all about it," and calmly proceeded to discuss the business before the meeting without any sign of preoccupation. At the conclusion of business he hurried in search of his servant, who chanced to remember taking a small box from his master's discarded clothes. He explained where he had put the worthless box containing the bit of glass and the Koh-i-noor was safe.




