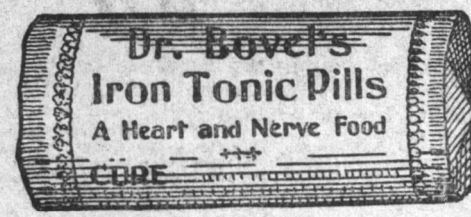

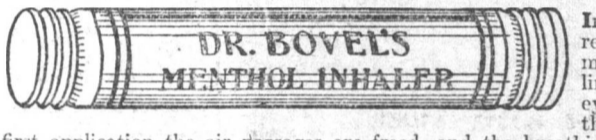

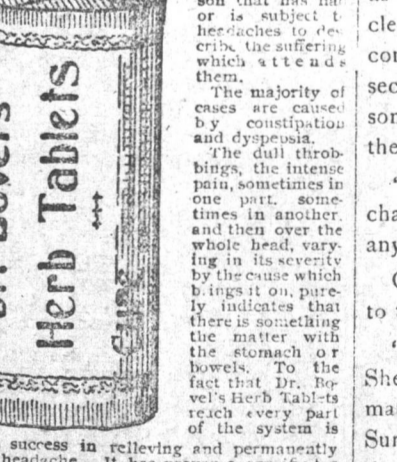

'I'll join you on board before they start. You'll find a cab, outside. Quick!'

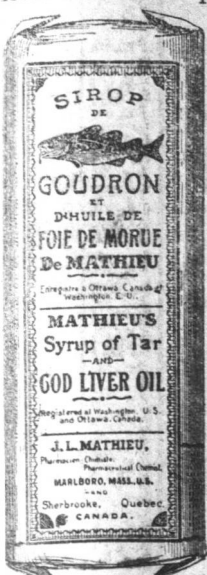

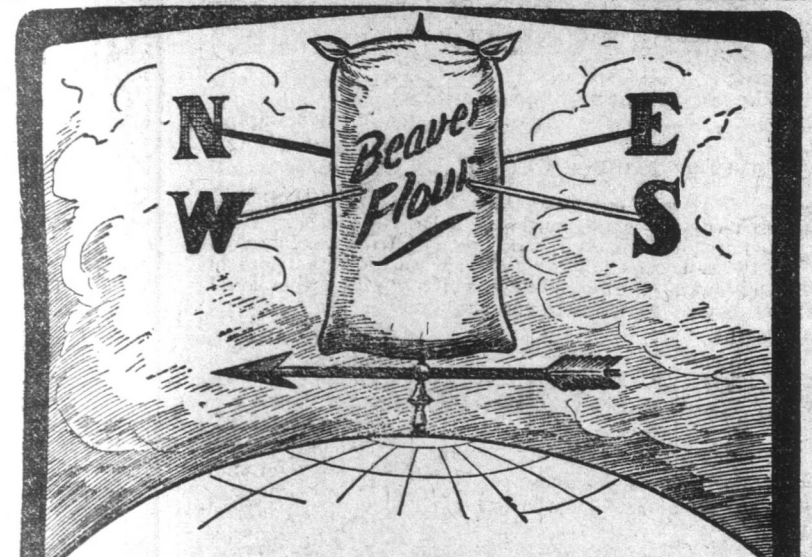

The Tenderfoot Farmer

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

For a dainty and easily made dessert, try slicing oranges and sprinkling a layer of fruit with grated or shredded fresh cocoanut. Let it stand half an hour before serving. Sugar may be added if the oranges are not sweet.

To make a good sweet potato pie, take a cup of mashed sweet potato, a teaspoonful of cinnamon, half a teaspoonful of salt, same of nutmeg and ginger, half a cup of sugar, a cup of milk and one well-beaten egg. Bake for half an hour in a slow oven.

A savory breakfast dish may be made as follows: One large cup of calves' liver and bacon minced, half of a sweet green pepper cut fine, all browned well in a pan liberally greased with butter and then four eggs stirred in until the eggs are set.

To remove grease spots from wall paper, sprinkle baking soda over blotting paper and place over the spot and press with a moderately iron for a few minutes. The blotting paper will absorb the grease and the paper on the wall will be free from spots.

To clean silk and woolen clothes of grease spots, they may be gently rubbed with a cake of magnesia, laid away for several days, and then shaken out. It will not hurt to press the magnesia in with a hot iron, first covering the fabric with brown paper.

The white of an egg, slightly beaten and the crushed shell of the egg

is enough to clarify a quart of strained soup. Stir the soup constantly after adding the egg and shell, let it boil hard for a few minutes, set it on the back of the range to settle, and then strain.

When it is desired to carry a candle into a drafty cellar or attic where there is danger of it blowing out or setting the clothes on fire, a short candle should be placed in a tumbler, being fastened there by its own wax. It will then burn steadily and safely.

Bananas are rarely found in this country ripe enough to be digestible, although they may be perfectly yellow. To properly ripen them so that they will be excellent food, buy a bunch and hang it up in a dry place with the stem in water. In a few days they will be much improved.

A piquant salad dressing may be made of sour milk or cream. Take the yolk of a hard boiled egg and rub it until it is quite smooth. Then add half a cupful of sour cream and a tablespoonful of vinegar with sufficient salt, pepper and sugar to overcome any unpleasant taste of the cream.

To make beeswax, place the honeycomb in a coarse muslin bag and put in a small stone to weight the contents. Put into a kettle, cover with water and boil. The wax comes to the top of the water and the sediment remains at the bottom of the kettle. When the water is allowed to cool, the wax forms a solid cake.

World.**

Mrs. James Holt, at St. John, N.B., celebrated her 107th birthday on March 16th. She was born in Ireland.

A Portuguese barque bound to the United States was recently lost off the Azores. Forty emigrants were lost, while twenty-three of the passengers and crew were saved.

Dr. Roddick, a native of Hr. Grace, who has won a warm place in the hearts of the Canadian people, presided at the lecture recently given in Montreal by Capt. Bob Bartlett.

Mr. William Mackenzie, who is in London, recently expressed the opinion that the Hudson Bay Railway would be running in three years. Mr. Mac is President of the Canadian Northern Railway.

Edward Payson Weston, who is walking from Los Angeles to New York had arrived at Newton, Kansas, on March 18th, nine days ahead of time. On St. Patrick's Day he walked forty-four miles. His age is nearing the three-score and ten.

Miss Annie Forsell, while being wheeled in a semi-unconscious state from the operating room, after being operated on, was caught between the elevator and the ceiling and crushed to death. An order was arrested and held on a technical charge of homicide.

A British officer who had been enjoying a holiday in Canada, thought he would visit some friends of his in Chicago. He was disappointed, however, as the Immigration Officer would not allow him to enter the U. S., on the grounds that he was not a desirable person.

On the 18th March four hundred children arrived in Halifax on the Allan Line. They are from the Barnado Home in the Old Country, and were on their way to Ontario for distribution. The party comprised 320 boys and 80 girls. Twenty-two thousand boys and girls have crossed the ocean for new homes under the same auspices since 1882.

Victoria, B.C., March 15.—A report has been made to the Marine Department by Captain Heater, of the whaling steamer "Orion" that the steamer fouled her cable while taking a whale, six miles south of Uclueluel, on Vancouver Island, on what seemed to be a submerged wreck, and Captain Heater is of the opinion it may prove to be H. M. S. "Condor," which foundered in December, 1901, with 104 officers and men. The location of the supposed wreck is in fifty fathoms of water.

Killed the Bill.

De Cosmos Talked it to Death in 26 Hours.

Mr. De Cosmos, a member of the Legislature of British Columbia, certainly deserved the medal for lung power, and he won it seemingly in a good cause and at grave risk to himself. The situation was becoming serious. He certainly held the floor and seemed likely to keep it. All sorts of plans were tried to get him to stop, but eloquence poured from him as water from a mountain spring. He was not allowed to halt for food, though he was permitted to drink.

The speaker insisted on keeping to the question before the House and objected to him repeating himself. Through the watches of the night De Cosmos talked on and successfully evaded all traps of "order." He went manfully on with his speech as the

20,000 SEALS Accounted For!

GOOD NEWS RECEIVED FROM THE FRONT—FLORIZEL, BELLAVENTURE, NEWFOUNDLAND, EAGLE AND ALGERINE WITH GOOD TRIP—BEOHIC, BONAVENTURE AND ADVENTURE IN FAT—VIKIN STRIKES SANDBANK, WORKED OFF UNINJURED.

At 8.30 Thursday night Mr. J. S. Munn, of Bowring Bros., had a wire from Capt. Wm. Bartlett, jr., who was then at St. Pierre, stating that the Viking had run aground of Soldier's Point on the island of Miqelon at 11 a.m. Thursday. When the news got abroad there was intense excitement in the city and the telegraph offices and Messrs. Bowring Bros.' premises were besieged with people eager to hear all possible information. The captain asked for assistance to lighten the ship, which it was found difficult to float off. The place where she struck is not a very dangerous one in calm weather, and as it consists mostly of sand banks the belief was that when lightened a bit forward the vessel would float off at high tide, and this proved to be correct. The Viking was taking the short cut through the run between St. Pierre and the main land when the accident occurred. Capt. William Bartlett, jr., rowed to St. Pierre with three men to telegraph the news and seek assistance. In answer to a message from Mr. Munn the captain wired at 11.30 Thursday night that the ship was on a sand bank, making no water, and that the chances for floating her were good if the weather remained as it then was. This allayed the excitement of the people about, especially those who had friends in the ship, and they all went home. The Portia was then got ready to go up to the Viking's assistance and left here at 1 a.m. yesterday in command of Capt. Fitzpatrick. Mr. Tasker Cook took a run up in her. Yesterday at 8.30 a.m. Mr. Munn had a message saying that the ship had floated off without outside aid, that she made no water, and reached in St. Pierre Roads. She left for this port at 11 a.m. yesterday. The ship did not leave Channel until 8.30 Wednesday night, and up to the time of the accident had been out fifteen hours. She thus covered the distance, which is nearly 150 miles, at the rate of nearly 10 miles an hour, which surprised her owners. Had she escaped the mishap Mr. Munn expected to see the vessel in port yesterday afternoon. It was fortunate that the accident occurred in fine weather or a tragedy might have resulted. More than likely a considerable number of the seals were jettisoned from the forward hatches, but they were so secured that they could be hoisted on board again when the ship came off.

WIRELESS FROM FLORIZEL.

At 11 o'clock last night Mr. Munn received the following Marconigram from the Florizel via Cape Race in reply to one sent by him to Mr. Eric Bowring, who is on board—

"Well done Viking. Seals will average 48 lbs. Struck the patch 70 miles southeast by east of Northern Grey Island. Fifteen thousand since last report; twenty-five thousand on board. Eagle reports 21,000; Algerine, 13,000; Newfoundland, 25,000; Bellaventure, 40,000, with 24,000 on board; Beohic, Bonaventure and Adventure in the seals; no report from them. Ice very heavy. ERIC."

From this it would appear as if the Florizel has 45,000 seals, for on Saturday night last she reported for 10,000 on board and 20,000 planned, while this message gives her an additional 15,000 since last report. This will be by far the largest trip of seals ever brought to this port, the late Hon. Capt. S. Blandford holding the record for 42,000 in the Neptune several

ST. PIERRE, Miq., March 25. Sealing steamer Viking, Capt. Wm. Bartlett, returning from icefields in Gulf of St. Lawrence with a full cargo of twenty-four thousand seals, at 11 a.m. yesterday ran on submerged sand bank at Soldier's Point, north-east corner of Miqelon Island. The crew worked strenuously all day with boats and hawsers and finally succeeded in floating ship. This was to a large extent effected by captain using his large crew of one hundred and ninety men to rush en masse from side to side, thus causing ship to roll and work out. Captain and Viking arrived here 1 a.m. to-day and is now sailing for St. John's; all well. Ship uninjured. FRECKER.

Heroic Scientist.

CATANIA, Mar. 25. Mount Etna is in violent eruption, and from the top of the old Crater volumes of white smoke are issuing to-night, while from the new Crater which have formed, lava is issuing and large lighted masses are exploding with loud noises and emissions of black smoke. From Catania and along the entire railroad surrounding Etna thousands are watching the volcano, following with telescopes the progress of the eruption. The streams of lava have already surpassed in volume those of the eruptions of 1892 but changing their course just as they reached Belpasso and Nicolosi, they have invaded the main roads near these two villages which seem thereby now to have been saved from destruction. Many people are still fearful. In both villages soldiers are camped in the squares to avert a panic, while the Mayor's aids are heroically administering to the needy. Cardinal Francis Nava who returned to-day to the scene of the eruption promised to bring back to the people the Veil of St. Agatha, which they believe has the power to stop the advancing lava. The Director of the Observatory on the volcano despite a narrow escape from death to-day has returned to the lava fields. To those who advised prudence he replied: "my post is there now." It has now been ascertained that the openings from which the lava is issuing number fourteen.

The Tariff Trouble.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 25. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance of the Dominion of Canada, arrived in Washington yesterday, and was the guest of President Taft at dinner to-night. The arrival of Mr. Fielding has renewed the predictions that the tariff differences between the United States and Canada will be overcome at the approaching conference, and the way cleared for a mutual understanding. Only seven days remain under the Payne Law in which the maximum and minimum provisions of the tariff may be observed. It is probable Mr. Fielding will have a conference with the President to-morrow.

Menelik Dying.

ADDIS ABABA, Abyssinia, Mar. 24. King Menelik's health is no longer such as to permit him to carry on State business, and to-day Ras Tseama, the Regent, with the approval of the principal chiefs, took over the reins of Government. The Regent is the Guardian of Prince Lidj Jeassu, grandson of the King and heir to the Throne of Abyssinia. The King this afternoon was said to be dying. In accordance with the decision of the chiefs the Empress is to be deprived of all power of interference in the affairs of State. All her appointments made among her favourites have been annulled.

Schooner Collides.

The short voyage from Gloucester, Mass., to this port, was beset with difficulties for the schooner Silver Spray, while rounding Cape Anne at the entrance of Gloucester harbor yesterday, the schooner collided with a lighter, and had her starboard main chain plates and anchor carried away, shortly afterwards it was discovered that she was leaking. To-day while trying to make this harbor, she went ashore on the flats.

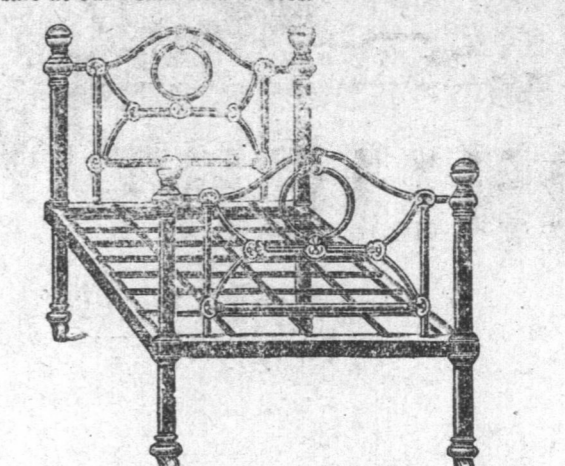

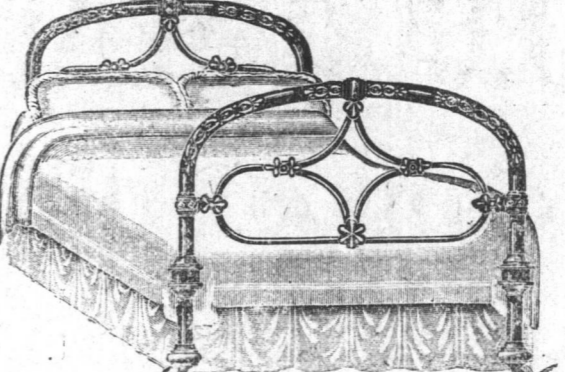

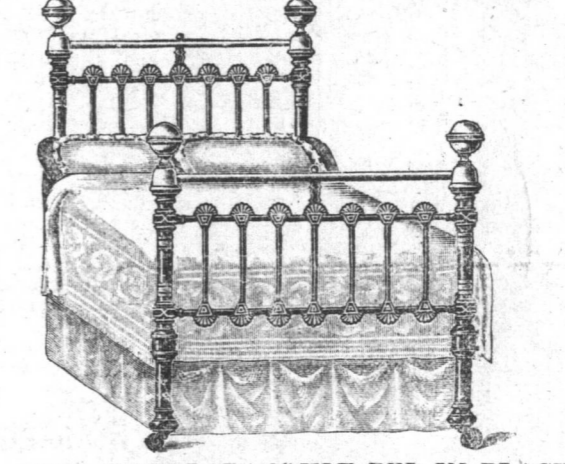
