The British Elections and the Government Dispatch.

Last Monday the British Parliament was dissolved. The interval between dissolution and the return of the first batch of members was short. Yesterday fifteen candidates were returned unopposed, eleven to support Balfour and four Asquith. These returns show that these were safe party seats, and that the weaker party declined to waste money and energy on forlorn hopes. The first polling takes place to-day when 70 seats will be filled. Last January they returned 44 supporters of the Government, 36 being Liberals and 8 Labour men, and 26 opponents of the Government. In this batch Asquith had a majority of 18. The value of to-day's results will be in the indication it will give as to the trend of the mind of the Electorate. Will the majority of 16 on this batch be increased, decreased, or will it remain the same?

The cable news available to-day shows how large looms the question of the Referendum and Home Rule in the present campaign. To our intense disgust the Government despatch is worse than ever to-day. There is an interesting item from Boston, sent by American and Canadian sympathisers to the Irish party, which falls off with an item which we read some time ago in an outside newspaper. The despatch from London is the "limit" in drivell. It is little else than a mass of ignorance, muddle and stupidity. It is up to the Hon. R. Watson to see that the "improved" Government news despatch does not "pan out" worse than the former one, and that was often bad enough, as our frequent complaints indicate. But the part under reference is the worst in our experience. It is tantalizing that the breakdown should occur just on the eve of the British Election, and that the Hon. R. Watson had informed us that he had arranged for better things. We hope the honourable gentleman will insist on getting what he arranged for. We shall not be backward in backing him up with complaints about such drivell as we received to-day.

Fishing in Trinity Bay.

The fishermen in Trinity Bay, North Side, have done remarkably well with the fish all November. At Smith's Sound some men have as high as 100 qts. since October for a boat of 2 men. At Britannia Cove, one man who came home from Labrador with only six quintals of fish in October, now has nearly 100 qts. for his hand. There are several crews of three men who have 200 qts. They are selling the fish from salt bulk.

Mr. Hector Ross and his staff of labourers, employees of the Reid-Mild. Co. are now giving the finishing touches to the new car shop, south of the Railway Station.

long and 50 feet wide, 9 feet on the upright. The roof is spanned with steel trusses, and the posts are of steel built in with concrete filled in from top to bottom. There are eighteen steel trusses supporting the roof, each one composed of 24 pieces all forged and put together at the R. N. Co. machine shops. The steel posts go right down to the foundation. All the connections of the trusses are finished with angle iron and plates riveted together, the top plate being of a "T" shape imparting so much strength that there cannot possibly be the least give in the roof. The angle iron, too, give so much additional strength to the roof that there never can be the least budge in it. Strong wooden purlions run from the top of each truss to the next. Transverse to these are rafters of 2 x 4 timber, the whole being roofed with inch board

ploughed and tongued. One of the best features of the building is the lighting. There are 74 pair of gas-lights to light the place, each one having 32 panes of 10 x 12 glass, the total number of panes being 2,360. The foundation is planned to sustain the greatest possible strain. There are double rows of piles on each side running deep under the soil, and on them a two foot wall of cement up to the level of the floor of the building. The walls over ground where there are no pillars are eight inches thick from floor to beam, and where the pillars are they are ten inches thick. The pillars showing on the outside two inches additional, giving the building—looking at it from the outside—a substantial and handsome appearance. The width of the pillars is ten feet. The whole floor is of concrete. The eastern portion of it where the heavy machinery will be deposited is nine inches thick, the western end where the strain will not be so great, the floor is six inches thick. Besides this there are six piles under the floor where each machine will be placed. The concrete foundation on them makes the whole strong that the floor will sustain the greatest possible weight. The pits where the cars will be placed for repairs are made with two rows of piles and a 10 inch floor. The pits which are two in number, and are made for the convenience of getting under the cars to work, are 180 feet long, and will at one time accommodate three passenger coaches and five box cars.

Disgraceful Condition of South Side Road.

Dear Sir,—The South Side Road at the present time is in a disgraceful condition, and has been so for a long time; and we are beginning to wonder if we have a Municipal Council or if it is only a dream. The weather during the past month, no doubt, has had a lot to do with making the road as bad as it now is; but in the first place it was not properly finished. The car loads of yellow clay which were dumped there a few months ago and spread over with shovels is now just like soup, from Morley's to the Long Bridge, and if you happen to make a false step you are likely to "sink to rise no more." Then again, there is more soup from Harvey's to Ford's Hill, and the residents have desisted cleaning boots or wearing good clothes, and there are plenty of them over there at present—you must run to the hill for shelter, or else get splattered up to the neck with "mud juice." We cannot remedy the weather, but the least we can expect is for the Council to make the road passable, anyway. The Councillors make a great fuss at the meetings but they only forget if they forget they ever had a meeting. Councillors Mullaly and Coaker particularly were going to look after the South Side if they were elected. They were elected, but they, too, like many of their predecessors, forgot by this time that St. John's has a South Side. At any rate we have seen very little of them since the elections. There is lots of work over here for the Road Inspector and Health Inspector both, but they come so seldom they hardly know how to get back again. Wake up, Councillors, and do what we elected you to do; and wake up Health Inspector, and give this locality a visit once in a while and see what you think of the gratings (if you can see them) and ash dumps, etc. which are as numerous as the public houses on Water Street. The people of the Higher Levels and other back streets are always complaining of the filthy condition of their localities; but if they only visited the South Side (I don't think they would be able to get down now) and saw the condition of things over here they would think themselves well off and not complain any more. Trusting that the Council will remedy this state of things before any one gets lost in the mud or gratings I remain, Yours truly,

THE FIGHT FOR HOME RULE. Special Evening Telegram, Dec. 2. On the eve of the British elections to-morrow, the United Irish League of America, through its Treasurer, Thos. Fitzpatrick of this city, forwarded to-day to the Irish National Party another remittance of \$10,000.

those in this country and Canada who have been upholding the hands of the Irish Party. John E. Redmond, M.P., M.P., T. P. O'Connor, David Lloyd George, Winston Churchill and other leaders both English and Irish, in the light against the Lords, have struck back with good effect because of these attacks. Lloyd George defending the right of Ireland's friends in America to aid their kindred at Mile End, London, a few nights ago said: 'Many a noble house tottering to its end has its foundations underpinned and its walls buttressed by a pile of American dollars.'

'Improved' Message. The Worst Yet. (As we received it.) LONDON, Dec. 3. The few days discussion in the election campaign leaves it clear that the Liberals as a party will have nothing to do with referendum in tariff reform. All the Liberal leaders, from the President of the council Morley down to the opposition leader of his willingness to leave tariff to a referendum as being the only way to Great Britain and Ireland to destroy the responsibility of representative institutions. Meaning of the Liberal party and press in the matter and Mr. Balfour's co-sponsoring secured for his an excellent prospect of victory for party. It is a curious fact that at the time of the capture of the recent veto conference an inspired statement in the times asserted that both sides to the conference had rejected the idea of a referendum. If that be the case Mr. Balfour's decision must have been an after thought and it is asserted in well informed quarters that he first consulted Chamberlain and secured his acquiescence before proceeding temporarily to shove tariff reform by arguing recourse to a referendum. Campaigning was again in full blast last night. Mr. Balfour in the course of a speech at Grimsby declared that no Irishman would thank people for an independent Irish Parliament without a British subsidy. Edward Grey, the Foreign Minister, in a speech at Derby said 'the great measure of revolution necessary to save the House of Commons from perishing by the congestion of business and to save its reputation as an Imperial authority.'

There is nothing in John Redmond's Home Rule proposals which is not in full force in the Canadian Provinces. Chief Secretary for Ireland, Birrell, criticising the referendum proposal in a speech at Bristol said that it would have to be accompanied by universal suffrage. There were other questions he said beside the tariff and Home Rule. Are the Tories ready he asked to submit to referendum the questions of Army and Navy conscription, capital punishment, the nationalization of railways, and the budget. One of the amusing episodes of the campaign was one to-night at Ipswich where David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, repudiated the assertion of the Nationalists, that he had sold his estate in Sussex for \$150,000 and invested the proceeds in American securities. John Burns president of the local gov. board in an address at Plymouth expressed the belief that Mr. Balfour is a cunning old free-trader at heart.

(Daily News Message) LONDON, Dec. 2. The nucleus of the next House of Commons was formed to-day by the unopposed nomination and election of the return of 11 Unionists and 4 Liberals. There has been a steady decline in the stock exchange since the opening of the campaign. Starting at 120 as the probable majority for the coalition of parties, the figure has dropped until now it ranges in the neighborhood of 70. The brokers are well inspired, the chances that the present struggle will settle the great constitutional questions now before the country seem remote. Should Asquith and his Labourite and Nationalist allies be returned to power, with anything like so reduced a majority as here indicated, it is freely predicted that the Premier will resign. In that case, Balfour would presumably be invited by the King to form a new cabinet, and everything would again be thrown into the melting pot, as the only course open to Balfour would be another appeal to the country. Old campaigners think that a sudden push, such as would result from a turnover in seats soon to-morrow's elections might easily start a landslide. If this occurs, the indications are that it is more likely to be in favour of Unionism than Liberalism.

MANCHESTER, Dec. 2. A. A. Haworth had an unexpected walkover in South Manchester, the Unionist candidate, Glazebrook, turning up six minutes after the time for filing nominations had expired. Glazebrook explained that he had 'roughed the hours for filing nominations were from noon to 2 o'clock; but his protest was disallowed, and Haworth was declared elected.

LONDON, Dec. 2. To-morrow will be a very busy day. The constituencies are so scattered throughout the Kingdom that the result should furnish a fair index of the feeling of the country. Of the 7 seats, 56 were formerly held by Liberals, 26 by Unionists and 8 by Labour men. In many cases the candidates were very small. The verdict in January last may be easily reversed. One Unionist forecast a gain of 20 seats. Unionist optimists see the possibility of an Anglo-Government landslide, although the confidence of the Liberals of their return to an unwholesome coalition majority is not shaken.

Thanksgiving at the Kirk. To-morrow will be observed as Thanksgiving Sunday, at the Kirk, Rev. J. S. Sutherland, M. A., will preach a special sermon at the morning service and the music will also be given to the occasion. There is plenty cause for gratitude although it has not been all sunshine lately, and it is hoped that a liberal offering will be given as it is much needed. Strangers cordially welcomed.

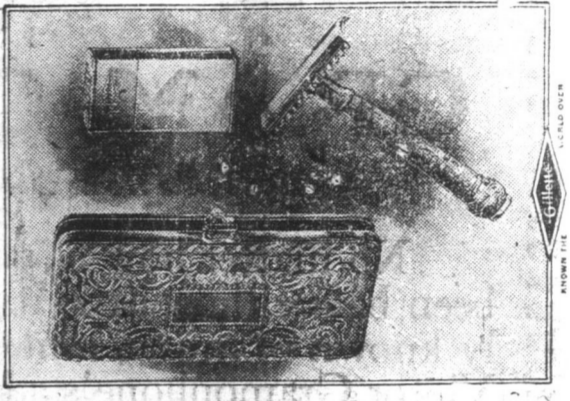

Excellent Athletic Exhibition.

Cullen concluded the exhibition with a boxing contest of three rounds and both showed themselves to be pugilists of no mean order. To Young Olson, the instructor of the members of the club, and these latter we extend our congratulations, for their exhibition was an excellent one of the kind and well worth seeing.
