





German Theologi

A Reply from Anglican and Non-conformist Churchmen. (Canadian Press Cable.)

London, Sept. 29 .- In reply to the appeal addressed by German theologians to "Evangelical, Christians abroad," a manifesto was issued here to-day, signed by the heads of the established Church of England and by Non-conformist leaders, justifying England's action in connection with the European war.

The manifesto refers to the authors of the German document as "men whose honesty, capacity and good faith, there can be no question," but expresses amazement that such men 'should commit themselves to a statement concerning the political causes of the war which depart so For those who weak and broken lie plain facts in this grave hour of European history.

"It is upon these facts we rest our assured convictions that for men who lesire to maintain the paramount obigation of fidelity to their plighted word and their duty in defending weaker nations against violence and wrong, no possible course was open but that which our country has tak-




