These are unmarried men from 19 to 22, the re-maining eighteen classes of unmarried men will be called to the colors at a future day. The new recruiting ef-fort, and the Military Service Bill if necessary, will be utilized to get in the six hundred thousand of unmarried men of military age, before the twenty-two classes of married men of military age, who have attested, are drawn upon. There is thus in sight in the homeland a large body of men who are available for the colors when called upon. The voluntary response to the call in the homeland, since the war begun is marvellous






