The funeral of the late Emperor of France took place at Chischurst on Wednesday morning. On both sides of the hearse were the funeral arms, surrounded by the letter "N." The funeral procession started for the chapel at cleven o'clock, in the following order:—Man bearing, a tri-colour, borne on an ash slick, cut at the hast moment before the cortege moved; the deputation of working firm from Paris, with uncovered heads, bearing their wreaths; the chapalain of the family bearing aloft a golden crucifis; the hearse drawn by eight horses, driven by a postillion; and the mourners, who numbered 809 in all. The Empress Eugenie was too ill to attend the funeral. The collin was covered withinmortelles and voilets. There was no funeral sermen at the chapel.
