

MUNIGIPAL DEPARTMENT.

Mr. Willis Chipman, C. E., of Toronto, has lately ocen engaged in investigating a peculiar trouble in connection with the Brant avenue sewer at Brantford. It appears that a number of fungi are growing in the pipes, and that they threaten to-create a stoppage at one or two points. Mr. Chipman states that spring water is growths. He hopes to be able to check the favorable to the production of these trouble, which if not speedily handled may create a great deal of trouble.

Railway and overhead railway bridges are to be raised by a law passed by the last New Hampshire Legislature, and the state board of railway commissioners is now hearing the chief engineers of the various lines on this subject. Under the law the commission can compel this raising of bridges under a penalty of \$50 per day for non-compliance. The expense of the improvement is to be paid by the railway company; though the cost outside the railway property may be recovered as an ordinary debt from the town or city, if the commission so decides on petition. No covered bridge shall hereafter be constructed in the state with less than 21 ft. between the top of rail and lowest point of the overhead structure, except under special written permission of the commission. No railway company shall hereafter receive or haul any freight car exceeding 14 ft. in height from top of rail to top of running-board.

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
