

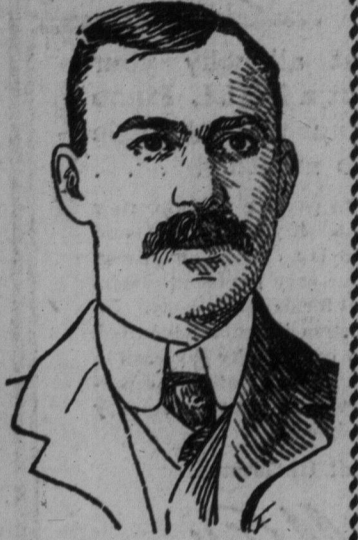
Gamey Scores Triumph in North Renfrew Beachburg Audience Clearly With Him

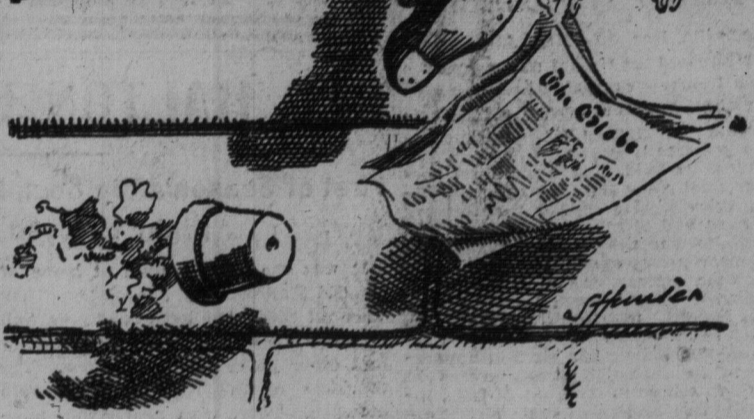
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PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHT FOR BORDEN IN THE WEST

J. A. Magee of Yorkton, N.W.T., Says Conservatives Will Win Six Seats in Territories.

Prospects are bright for the Conservative party in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, according to J. A. Magee, a well-known westerner of Yorkton, N.W.T. Not One Out of 47 Trains Was on Time Yesterday

Wind Storms and Cold Weather Have Disastrous Effect on Schedules.

The railways are experiencing the most trouble in their attempt to run on time in the face of wind storms and cold weather. Yesterday not one of the forty-seven trains coming into the Union Station was on time. Frozen engine pipes, strong head winds, bad connections and a variety of other excuses were offered, as the direct cause of the delay.

As a result of the incoming train's lateness all time for the outgoing one had to be changed. The C.P.R. due here at 7:30 a.m. did not arrive till 9:30 a.m., and did not leave again till 1:30 p.m. The Winnipeg connection, which was to arrive here at 10:30 a.m. on Friday, was probably a record-breaker in so far as the number of trains were concerned.

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Spevers Buy "Soo" Assets Theirs Was the Only Offer

Personnel of Those Behind New York Syndicate, Now Owners of Vast Properties.

Speculation is rife as to the future of the collapsed Soo industry. The property was disposed of at auction under the Speyer & Co. loan in spite of all assertions to the contrary. There were protests by other creditors against the sale. The entire property was declared sold to the holders of the mortgage for \$4,500,000. Therefore, not sufficient was realized to satisfy the mortgage, and the defunct company is confronted with a judgment of \$1,050,000, and all its assets have been sold in addition.

Opinion differs materially in Toronto as to the effect of the sale. Messrs. Shildie, Connor, B. J. Christie, Coyne and others from the Soo were in conference with the government authorities during the day, and with their lawyers. They unite in the assertion that the sale is not valid and will not effect a winding up of the Soo as a Canadian corporation. But lawyers are not so sure that the sale will not make a difference in the assets of the company. It is not sufficient to satisfy the mortgage, and the defunct company is confronted with a judgment of \$1,050,000, and all its assets have been sold in addition.

As the properties stand to-day they are in actual possession of Speyer & Co. Their representatives have actual control of the properties on both sides, and the sale covers all. The government is interested in the extent of the \$250,000 advanced in wages. It is said to be applied correctly. In just what this security consists is not clear, but the locality of the variety of available concessions being in the balance would naturally force any purchaser to satisfy the government of the propriety of proceeding to reorganize the company.

It is practically assured that there will be no effort on the part of the government to pay off the claims against the property. The only interest the government seems to have in getting the works re-opened, is to get the property back into the hands of the government. The failure of the solemn statements was done to the creditors near the safe. The store was damaged and the thieves lost their nerve and placed the safe in a position that it would seem as though it had fallen from the main staircase.

Reorganizing syndicates represented by Messrs. Drummond and Clarke claim to have secured a \$200,000 toward the underwriting of the new company, supplied chiefly by New York capitalists. James Connor, secretary of the syndicate, said that the basis of the underwriting plan provides for a reorganization of the company of \$1,000,000, and it is proposed to issue \$400,000 stock and \$100,000 bonds. The balance of \$500,000 will get for their \$800,000 of \$100,000 stock, that will leave \$300,000 of treasury stock. Old shareholders can come in on the arrangement by paying an assessment of \$5 a share.

No Effect of the Sale. James Block, representing Speyer & Co., said that the winding up order could have no possible effect on the validity of the sale under the mortgage.

The pretended anxiety of some of the former owners of the Soo property to get the company for a little more time in conducting the reorganization is regarded as moonshine in the eyes of the reorganizers. It is pointed out that the history of the Consolidated Lake Superior Co. from its inception has not been one of success. The company has been a failure from the start.
