

N attempt against allied and neutral shipping in the north At-A lantic is revealed by the British Admiralty in the announcement that a German armed commerce raider, disguised as a neutral merchantman, was sighted in those waters on Dec. 4. Since that date, the admiralty says, nothing has been seen or heard of the raider. No reports of vessels destroyed, captured or missing in that part of the ocean have come to hand. The fact that the admiralty is alert and is plainly hunting her is a good sign that no room exists for German surface craft upon the seas. Before being run down this craft, however, may inflict some casualties in ships to which no admiralty warning has penetrated.

### REMINDERS OF HOME

Capt. Pearson Tells Daughters of Empire of Y.M.C.A. Work.

A touchingly interesting address was given to the members present by Captain Pearson of the military service department of the Y.M.C.A.. who has spent twenty months in France in connection with the planning and organization of rest and recreation huts for the troops.

Captain Pearson gave a vivid description of the good work carried on at one hut, which was placed in Plug Street Wood, at a dangerous point, which was practically inaccessible to the army field kitchens. During the ninety-one nights which this hut withstood shellfire, between five and six hundred men passed thru it nightly and were provided with refreshments, entertainment and warmth. Some millions of sheets of notepaper alone were given out to the men, an expense not nearly covered by profits made from the hut canteen. Reading matter was so much in demand that the men clung to the most meagre scraps of printed paper, and even incomplete parts of stories would be read and re-read. On one occasion a young soldier was found perusing the pages of an old telephone directory which had been sent to the front by mistake with magazines.

Links With Home.

The speaker urged all present to keep up sending parcels, however small, to the front, as the tokens contained in them were the only reminders of the old home which they have. For many of these boys there was no way home out of France, except upon a stretcher, and the spirit which lived in the men who had gone to the front was so splendid, so heroic, both in life and death, that it had led Chaplain Canon Scott of Quebec to say he felt he could kiss their very boots.

In conclusion, Captain Pearson said he would like to bring one message to the would like to bring one message to the

In conclusion, Captain Pearson said he would like to bring one message to the united women of Canada by the memory of those thirteen hundred graves of Canadians who have already given their lives to the cause; that we arrange our lives in some way to embody some sort of sacrifice by making our homes, our communities and our country better, and that, more than ever, we try to emulate the spirit of the men who have given their all.



### A National Government for

The time has come to look our situation in the face. We are in the midst of a great war which is going none too well, and may last for years. We have a government at Ottawa which is probably as strong as a party government could be expected to be under the circumstances, but which the people believe to be lacking in driving force, moral power, and stern resolution. We have an opposition hanging on the flank of the government as an enemy, exposing its blunders and mistakes, and calling for its expulsion from power. We are confronted with the constitutional commend for an early general election, and that election will be preceded by the most virulent campaign in Canadian history.

The government says, with some appearance of reason, that it should not be required at a time like this to busy itself with a federal election. A year ago it asked and obtained an extension of the parliamentary term for one year. The speeches made on that occasion by Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier were well tioned and patriotic. But considerations of party politics were not altogether absent. The leader of the opposition granted the extension grudgingly, and sought to obtain a pledge the granting of the extension would be construed as an agreement to have no election under any circumstances until after the war was over. To this the prime minister could not, or at any rate would not, assent, and party politics soon again divided the old-time bitterness.

The supporters of the government on the other hand say that it would be madness to entrust the destiny of the country at this time to the leaders of the opposition. Those who attend Liberal meetings hear the government of the day arraigned as dishonest and incompetent, while those who attend Conservative meetings find the Liberal leaders accused of disloyalty. An electoral campaign at this time would. bring forth such startling charges and recriminations that the country would be divided into hostile camps.

Yet, as The Christian Guardian says, the mass of the people care nothing about the fortunes of either political party. They want a strong, fearless government, supported by a re-united parliament, and a truly united people. A mere coalition government might accomplish little. Mr. Pugsley, succeeding Mr. Rogers as minister of public works, or Mr. Lemieux, succeeding Mr. Blondin as secretary of state, would not greatly change the situation. Dividing up the political patronage at Ottawa so as to quiet criticism is not the statesmanlike way of solving the problem.

Who holds this or that office, which party gains or loses, is unimportant. We have now reached that stage where none must be for the party, and all must be for the state. As The Christian Guardian truly says:

The war is not over, and not nearly over, and everything indicates that there are many months, and probably some years, of it still ahead of us. And the need for greater efficiency and aggressiveness in government and people will increase as every month goes over our head.

### The Munitions Advertising

The advertising campaign being carried on at present by Mr. Mark Irish, director of munitions labor, for the purpose of increasing the output of nunitions is commendable. Several times thruout the war the government has been wise enough to lay its needs before the public by means of modern advertising. The enormous response to the different war loans has shown the soundness of this policy. The British Government during the

war has advertised to an unprecedented extent. The English newspapers have been crowded with advertise nents for recruits, munition workers exhortations to the public to be economical, and dozens of other war matters. In fact the advertising columns have been made the official messengers between the government and the people. The excellent results that have been obtained show the success of this method. When the war first started Sir Hedly le Bas, an expert in advertising, was given charge of official publicity, and he has been most successful. The necessity of living economically, of increasing the munitions output, and most important of all, the need for recruits, has been laid before the nation in a convincing and authoritative manner. That the Canadian Government should have emcongratulated upon the excellent way in which he has put the munitions situation before Canadians thru the medium of the newspapers.







It is possible that Les Darcy will show in this country before Carpentier is ready to mill. If he does, he may get the match. Rickard would except thru purchase. "By the drafting plan," says Fultz, "many minor league players go to the majors each year and make good. If the draft rule were not in force the minor league club owners could keep them in the minors as long as they pleased and stop the youngsters chances for prometion.

chances for prometion.

"The club owners could also hold up the major league clubs for high purchase prices and control the service of the player unless they were paid. Again, if the majors are deprived of the draft it will mean that there will not be as much new talent in the majors every season for the improvements of the game. This new suggestion of the minors would tend to stagnate the playing talent. I think that the major leagues will strongly oppose the removal of the draft rule."

This might be so to a degree, at least, if the proposition were to abolish the draft altogether, but it is not. It is merely a request on the part of the three Class A A leagues, the International, American Association and the Pacific Coast, which are near major leagues, that the draft be abolished as far as they are concerned. It is not purposed to abolish the draft rule, and the Class A A clubs would also still exercise the draft from leagues of lower classification, so there would not be much damper on the ambitions of the players, and it would be better for players who have graduated into Class A A company and made good to be sold from there to the majors than to be drafted. The magnates in the big cities of the Class A A cities feel that the public is entitled to see a club maintained intact if the management so desires. Unique Protest Against Judges' Ruling in Heat Race Allowed.



FLIGHT LIEUT. ROGERS MET DEATH HEROICALLY

Son of Elias Rogers Was Killed in Air Battle With German Aviator.

**OBSERVER TELLS STORY** 

Shot in Two Places, Airman Guided Machine Until Mortally Wounded.

A letter just received by Alfred Rogers, tells of the heroic manner in which Flight-Lieut. Clarence E. Rogers, son of Elias Rogers, met his death in a fight with a Fokker aeroplane three thousand feet above the earth. The message was sent by Sergt. H. Taylor, who was the lieutenant's ob server, but is now a prisoner of way

Chicago. Dec. 8.—Increased activity of German submarines and a rapidly-growing list of differences between Washington and Berlin as to the status of some of the vessels which have been sunk did a good deal today to force prices down. The market closed nervous, %c to 4½c net lower, with May at \$1.74% to \$1.74%. and July at \$1.47½ to \$1.74%. Other leading commodities, too, all showed losses—corn 1%c to 2%c, oats 1%c to 1%c, and provisions 10c to 20c.

Right from the outset, the chance of a break in diplomatic relations of Germany and the United States exerted a bearish influence, which was emphasized by depression growing out of the stoppage of apparent export sales and by the extention of railway embargoes east of Chicago. Later the bulls succeeded in rallying the market for a brief time, because Baltimore was said to be bidding for wheat to be shipped from St. Louis in the first half of January. The effect on prices, however, was soon more than offset by word that recent foreign government buying had in some cases anticipated requirements as far ahead as next March. Fears were also expressed that owing to an Anglo-French blockade, wheat purchasers of late in the United States for Greece could not be shipped.

News of the sinking of the Caledonia and of numerous other steamers brought about especially heavy selling of wheat in the last thirty minutes of trading. In this connection, notice was taken of the facts regarding the steamship Arabia in particular, the Washington authorities also showed grave concern as to the facts regarding the steamship Marina, involving the loss of six American lives. Predictions of a farthcoming enlargement of the stock of corn here weakened the corn market. It was said no lake ressels would be loaded after Dec. 15, and that the car supply in the west would then probably be much improved. ressels would be loaded after Dec. 15, and that the car supply in the west would then probably be much improved.

Oats fell in value with other cereals. Demand was only of a scattered sort.





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
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
