READING MATTER MUCH IN DEMAND

Boys in Trenches Cling to Most Meagre Scraps of Printed Paper.

REMINDERS OF HOME

Capt. Pearson Tells Daughters of Empire of Y.M.C.A. Work.

The monthly meeting of the Municipal Chapter of the I.O.D.E. was held yesterday afternoon at 72 West Bloor street, Mrs. R. S. Wilson, regent, occupying the chair.

A touchingly interesting address was given to the members present by Captain Pearson of the military service department of the Y.M.C.A. who has spent twenty months in France in connection with the organization of rest and recreation huts for the troops.

Captain Pearson gave a vivid description of the work carried on at one hut, which was placed in Plug Street Wood, at a dangerous point, which was practically inaccessible to the enemy's machine-guns. During the ninety-one nights which this hut withstood shellfire, between five and six hundred men passed thru it nightly and were provided with refreshments, entertainment and warmth. Some millions of sheets of newspaper alone were given out to the men, an expense not nearly covered by profits made from the hut canteen.

Reading matter was so much in demand that the men clung to the scraps of printed paper, and even incomplete parts of stories would be read and re-read. On one occasion a young soldier was found perusing the pages of an old telephone directory which had been sent to the front by mistake.

The speaker urged all present to keep up sending parcels, however small, to the front, as the tokens contained in them were only reminders of the old home which they have. For many of these boys there was no way home out of France, except upon a stretcher, and the spirit which lived in the men who had gone to the front was so splendid, so heroic, both in life and death, that it had led Chaplain Canon Scott of Quebec to say he felt he could kiss their very boots.

In conclusion, Captain Pearson said he would like to bring one message to the untold women of the manhood of Canada who have already given their lives to the cause; that we arrange our lives in some way to embody some sort of sacrifice making ourselves, our communities and our country better, and that, more than ever, we try to emulate the spirit of the men who have given their all.

Captain Bishop spoke in confirmation of the great work being done thru the Y.M.C.A., especially at the Somme front. The treasurer's report, read by Mrs. Angus MacLennan, showed contributions up to Dec. 1 of \$1881.

It was announced that the ambulance presented by Sir William Osler, center had accommodated 577 lying down cases and 400 sitting during the month of November. Thru the kindness of Mrs. MacLennan a room in the C.P.R. building has been loaned for the business of the overseas tobacco fund, which has been taken over by the order.

The resolutions passed by the national committee, which stated that in view of the grave reports from the theatres of war the increasing number of Canadian overseas forces; the decreasing numbers enlisting and consequent shortage of men; the serious shortage of firing line and the serious shortage of all other things, the committee means upon the immediate and pressing needs, was read by Mrs. R. S. Wilson.

U. S. SENDS STRONG PROTEST TO BERLIN

(Continued From Page 1).

The charge was informed in reply that the policy was adopted as a military necessity, and that Germany regarded it as legal.

Solemn Protest.
The note, with the department's statement making it public follows:
"On Nov. 29 Mr. Crow, our charge at Berlin, was directed to obtain an interview with the German chancellor and read to him the following:
"The government of the U. S. has learned with the greatest concern and regret of the policy of the German Government to deport from Belgium a portion of the civilian population for the purpose of forcing them to labor in Germany and is constrained to protest in a friendly spirit but most solemnly against this action, which is in contravention of all precedents and of those humane principles of international practice, which have long been accepted and followed by civilized nations in their treatment of non-combatants."
"Furthermore the government of the U. S. is convinced that the effect of this policy if pursued will in all probability be fatal to the Belgian relief work so humanely planned and successfully carried out, a result which would be generally deplored and which, it is assumed, would seriously embarrass the German Government."
"The interview has taken place."

Belgians Risk Protest.
Havre, Dec. 8.—Twenty Belgian senators and twenty-three Belgian deputies, now living in Brussels, have taken the personal risk of sending a signed protest to General von Bissing against the deportation. The senators and deputies at the same time sent copies of their protest to Grand Whitlock, the American minister to Belgium, to the Marquis de Villalobar, Spanish minister at Brussels, and to the diplomatic representatives of other countries. Copies of the protest and of the letter to the neutral ministers have been received by the Belgian Government.

Among the signers of the protest are four former ministers, Baron de Favre, president of the senate; Count Woest, Jules Vandenberghe, and Joseph Devolder.

Among the deputies who signed it were Baron Albert Huart and Count de Limburg-Stirum.

GRANTED COMMISSION.
Brantford, Dec. 8.—Gunner J. F. Simmons, who went overseas with the 4th Artillery Brigade, has been granted a commission and has left for France. He is a son of Fred Simmons, messenger of the Bank of British North America.

LIQUID CONTAINED HIGH PERCENTAGE OF ALCOHOL.
Brewing Firm Fined for Breach of Ontario Temperance Act.
Brantford, Dec. 8.—Upon complaint of License Inspector R. J. Eacrett, the Hamilton Brewing Association, Berlin Lions Brewing Co. and Hamilton Importing Co. were charged before Police Magistrate Livingstone in the police court this morning with selling liquor for resale. The case heard was that of the Hamilton Brewing Association, which lasted all morning, a fine of \$200 and costs being imposed. The case arose over a test of some porter taken from the New American Hotel recently by Mr. Eacrett, which upon

analysis by the government was found to contain 3.4 per cent. alcohol in place of the stipulated two and one-half per cent. alcohol required under the new temperance act. A Biggar for the company, submitted that the porter, according to the company's inspection, was only 2.01 per cent. when it left the premises, and held that for some reason or other, either uncleanliness or by reason of renewed fermentation thru the porter being brought in contact with a higher temperature the percentage of alcohol had been increased. The case will be appealed.

PRESENT GREAT PICTURE AT LEADING PLAYHOUSE
"The King Visits His Armies in the Great Advance" Coming Soon.

SPECIAL DEPARTMENT FOR CHILDREN IN LIBRARY
 Carnegie Branch at Kew Beach Complete in Every Particular.

The chief item of interest reported at the public library board, held at the central building, College street, yesterday afternoon, was the new branch of the library which will open on Wednesday evening next, when it is expected that Mayor Church, who was deeply interested in securing this branch for the people of the district, will be present.

The architecture of the new library is of the 17th century style. It will be complete in every particular with a "special department for the children 40 feet by 30, with a large fireplace and altogether apart from that of the adults. The library is one of the finest of the Carnegie gift and has not cost the city a single cent. It is in one of the most attractive parts of the city, being in Kew Beach park.

Regarding the cell during the month for books, Dr. Locke reported that the branch lately established in Parkdale had issued 8,484 volumes, just 1000 less than the number issued by the Church street branch.

Attention was drawn to an old unaltered catalogue of the library during the past month. The volume bears the imprint of Kingston, H. C. James, Macfarlane, 1851. It is entitled "The Cook Not Mad, or Rational Cookery" and embraces a number of selected and original recipes which in view of the present high cost of living are liable to be in great demand by the economical housekeeper.

THIS YEAR'S FUND FAR EXCEEDS LAST
 Ontario's Red Cross Contribution Still Growing Rapidly.

BELLEVILLE DOES WELL
 Hamilton Sends Hundred Thousand Dollars—Double Last Year's.

Ontario's contribution to the British Red Cross is \$2,500,000 in excess of last year's collection. It has been supplemented in the last few days by additional subscriptions amounting in all to \$40,000. This brings the total amount received by and reported to the organization resources committee to \$1,640,000, which compares with a total of \$1,515,000 contributed in 1915.

Among the larger subscriptions reported recently is that of the City of Belleville, where the campaign was held on Tuesday, College street, raised, which is \$2500 in excess of the amount contributed in 1915. Cornwall has given \$2284, as compared with only \$1204 last year.

A cheque for \$35,000 was received by the treasurer yesterday from the City of Hamilton, which, with the \$45,000 sent at the end of October, brings Hamilton's contribution to \$100,000. This is almost twice the amount contributed last year.

CHIVINGTON IS OUT HICKEY THE PRESIDENT

New Leader for American Association—Favor Series With International.

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 8.—Thos. J. Hickey of St. Paul was today elected president of the American Association, defeating President Thomas M. Chivington, who was a candidate for re-election. Hickey was the first president of the association when it was organized in 1902. The vote was five to three. Up until an early hour this morning it appeared that Chivington would retain his position, but O. H. Wadsworth, president of the Louisville Club, who held the balance of power, decided to vote for Hickey, and Hickey would support the Minneapolis candidate.

According to gossip this morning, the proposal for a series of inter-league games between the clubs of the International League and those of the American Association will be approved. This means that if the International League takes the same action the playing schedules of the two organizations will be much shorter than usual.

About the only other business to come before the meeting is the question of placing a limit on players' salaries and the number of players a club may carry. It is understood there is a strong sentiment in favor of reducing the salaries now paid in the association.

Thomas M. Chivington has been president for seven years and he has filled the position with credit and to the best advantage of the association. Mr. Chivington is a newspaper man, having worked in St. Paul, Denver, Kansas City, Milwaukee, Chicago and Louisville. By a strange freak he is ousted by the vote of the owner of the club for which he won two pennants.

After the election of Thomas J. Hickey of Minneapolis to succeed President Thomas M. Chivington of Chicago, the American Association took action which practically assures a series of inter-league games with the International League. The question of a third inter-league, as proposed, to consist of four American Association and four International League clubs, was discussed informally. President Hickey, who took the chair shortly after being elected, announced that the magnates did not take the proposed league seriously.

President E. G. Barrow of the International League, in a telegram, approved the plan for an inter-league series, and invited the American Association club-owners to attend the International League meeting in New York next Monday. President Hickey wired Mr. Barrow that a committee, consisting of himself, Wadsworth, Cantillon, Thumme, J. C. McGinn and John W. Norton, would attend, with power to act for the other three club-owners, Roger Bresnahan, George Tobey and E. M. Schoenborn, who could not make the trip.

The plan for the inter-league series, as explained by President Hickey, calls for each club in the two leagues to put up \$500, a total of \$2000, before Aug. 1, this to be apportioned at the end of the series among the seven clubs winning the greater number of games.

HARNESS HORSE LAW REMAINS UNCHANGED

Unique Protest Against Judges' Ruling in Heat Race Allowed.

New York, Dec. 8.—The proposition to revise the rules of harness racing and make them uniform on all tracks on Tuesday action of committees of the National Trotting Association and American Trotting Association may not succeed, officers of the National Association declared yesterday, owing to the apparent failure of the western association to clothe its rules committee with full authority to act.

The western association sent word that it had appointed a committee of six to meet with a committee chosen on Tuesday by the special congress of the National Trotting Association here and abroad that meetings of the joint committee shall take place not later than the middle of December. Up to the time the National Association adjourned it had received no reply to a telegram asking whether the western committee had power to act.

Pierre Lorillard, Jr., of Tuxedo Park, New York; Horace Roy of Pittsburg, Pa., and Reese Bizzard of Parkersburg, W. Va., were elected to fill vacancies on the board of review of the National Association.

In the docket of tort litigation the only case of general interest decided was one from Sacramento, Cal., involving the ruling of last summer in a race for the Occident Cup for three-year-olds. The race was trotted on a head-to-head system and by the published conditions was to end after three heats. When three heats had been trotted, however, two heats were tied for first money and the cup. The judges ordered another heat, but one of the owners protested the ruling and appealed to the turf court. The protest was sustained by the board in an order to the judges to divide first money and either give a cup to each colt or let the drivers draw lots for the one in dispute.

GOOD JOBS FOR SOLDIERS.

The soldiers' aid commission placed 233 returned soldiers. Vacant positions offered numbered 342. The salaries were, one at \$40 a week, three at \$30, one at \$28, one at \$27, four at \$25, six at \$24, nine at \$22, twenty at \$21, three at \$20, eighty-four at \$18, eighty-six at \$15. The average weekly wage for the month was \$16.11.

FLIGHT LIEUT. ROGERS MET DEATH HEROICALLY

Son of Elias Rogers Was Killed in Air Battle With German Aviator.

OBSERVER TELLS STORY

Shot in Two Places, Airman Guided Machine Until Mortally Wounded.

A letter just received by Alfred Rogers, tells of the heroic manner in which Flight-Lieut. Clarence E. Rogers, son of Elias Rogers, met his death in a fight with a Fokker aeroplane, three thousand feet above the earth. The message was sent by Sergt. H. Taylor, who was the lieutenant's observer, but is now a prisoner of war in Germany.

Up to the receipt of this letter Lieut. Rogers' relatives had clung to the hope that he might still be alive. The letter states he died the death of a brave man, who despite the fact that he was shot in the neck and thru the legs, managed to keep control and manoeuvre his machine for a fighting position, until shot thru the head.

For bravery and untiring effort in work among wounded Canadians, for a period of 27 months, on the western battlefield, Col. (Dr.) E. B. Hardy of 685 Euclid avenue, was awarded the D. S. O. He returned home yesterday on six weeks' special leave. He states he was very proud to get the D. S. O. but did not know what he did to deserve it.

Lieut. Irving Hall, who was wounded during the battle of the Somme, is now on his way home on leave of absence. His father resides at 180 Crescent road. He went away with the 37th Battalion but was transferred to the C. M. R. Before enlisting he was employed by Mackenzie and Mann.

Capt. H. P. Rogers of the Royal Army Medical Corps, who was in Mesopotamia with the imperial forces, when General Townsend was forced to surrender at Kut-el-Amara, returned home yesterday for two weeks, being part of a six weeks' leave of absence, visiting relatives at 21 Lindsay avenue. He stated the daily average temperature in the summer, in Mesopotamia was 122 degrees. It was far too hot, he said, to remain there. The opposing armies just sat down and looked at each other. He says the "activities out there" are in charge of a Toronto man, Capt. Dixon, son of Rev. Canon Dixon.

CITY HALL NOTES

Preparatory to the electors voting on the proposal that the municipalities combine to go ahead with the Chippewa power scheme, meetings will be held all over the city to thoroughly explain the proposition. The hydro commissioners recommend that city council grant \$2,500 towards the expenses of the campaign.

"Unless something unforeseen happens, I'm definitely in the field for election as mayor," Harry Winberg declared yesterday.

Judge Morson has secured an order staying all further proceedings by the city in the collection of income tax amounting to \$124.00. The judge declares he will take the case to privy council.

According to Finance Commissioner Bradshaw's figures, ward 8, the money ward, has almost three times the amount of outstanding taxes as any other ward. Over \$417,000 was uncollected on December 1. Ward 6 is next with \$184,124 outstanding.

The municipal abattoir is expected to show a surplus this year after two years of operation. The annual maintenance charges are \$15,000, while the total revenue to the end of October was \$170,000.

City Clerk Littlejohn will have another list of firms to deal with under the federal order in council regarding the high cost of living.

Ald. McBride says the city should either paint their hydrants red or withdraw the bylaw making a motorist who leaves his car within ten feet of one liable for a \$10 fine.

The works committee decided yesterday to lay a permanent pavement on Davenport road.

"Maybe in ward 6, I haven't decided yet," Ald. McBrien said yesterday, when asked where he intended running. "I may upset the dog and run for the board of control," he added. "It's the most popular way I know of to keep out of council."

Mayor Church says he will hold a conference with Attorney-General Lucas in connection with the east end sewage. Residents have asked that the government be made a third party in the suit instituted against the city. The memorandum to be submitted to Mr. Lucas declares that if the injunction is granted conditions will be infinitely worse than they are at present.

Local Council of Women to Open Lunch Rooms.

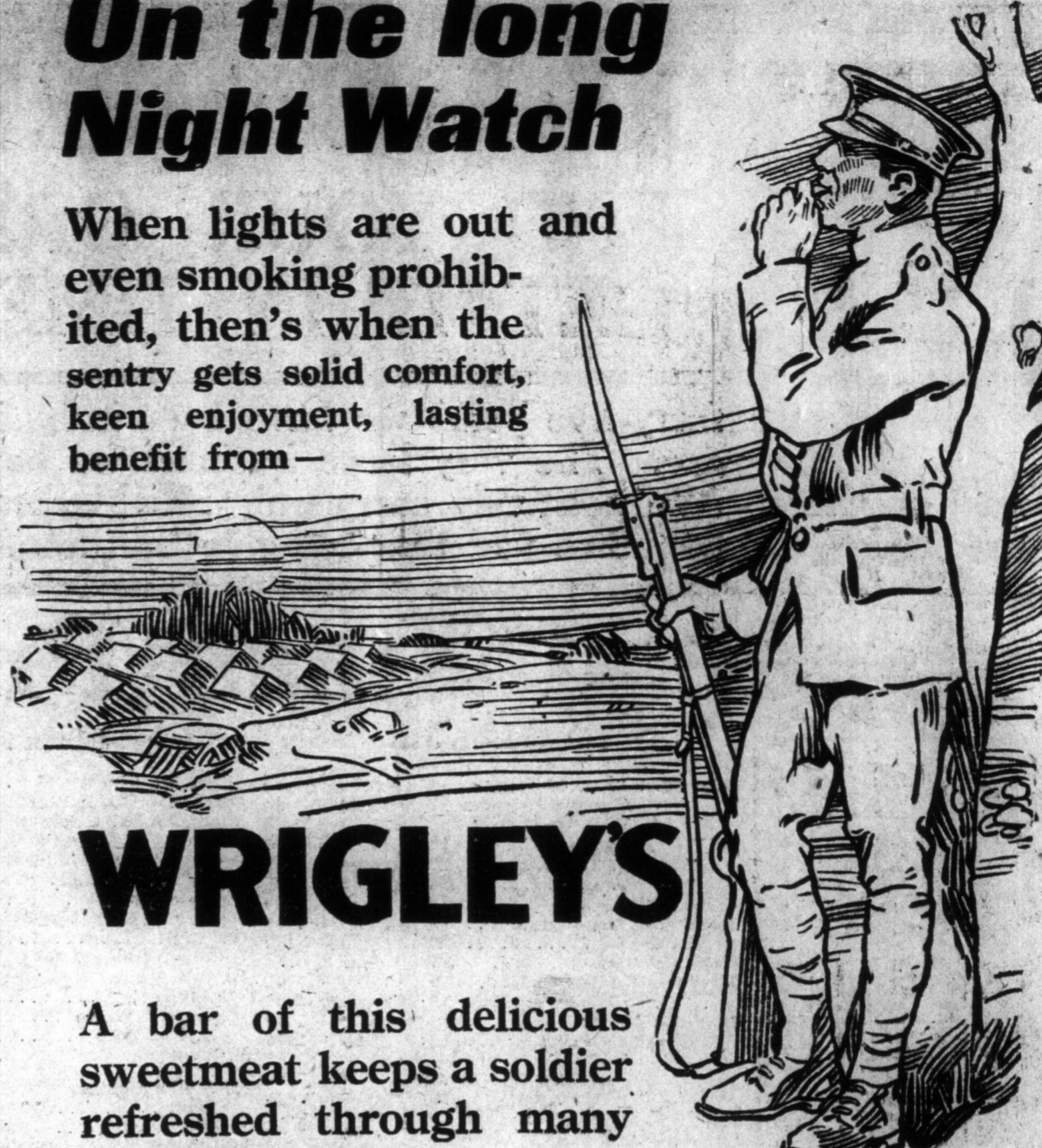

Newray Buyers Hold For Large Profits.

Seldom in the history of stock market records has that of the Newray been excelled. When the company was first floated last May the price of the shares in the market was in the thirties. During the whole of this time no purchaser has had occasion to see the share price below that paid for even a day, and any shorts who may have entered the market have had no opportunity to cover except at a loss. The steady advance in an absorption record of complete confidence and the action of the stock stands out in marked contrast with many others. The conclusion drawn from this record is that investment rather than speculation has participated in the Newray shares, and that the buyers are willing to await the large profits which accrue to buyers in a real mining venture rather than in a mere speculation. In the aggregate represent only a small proportion of the ultimate profits.

"Do you know," he asked, "that the Apex company owns 80 acres between two of the Porcupine mines, the West Dome Consolidated and the Dome Lake? That the company has \$35,000 in hand with more than sufficient to prove up by diamond drill the whole property and still has 40,000 shares left in the treasury? This Apex is worth to say that the property was well equipped with machinery and that the strike of a vein at depth would permit the company to sell the balance of the treasury stock at 50c a share, thus providing sufficient funds to make the mine a producer.

PROMISING FORMATION FOUND AT INSPIRATION

H. B. Wills in his weekly market letter has the following on Inspiration Gold Porcupine, after he said: "My confidence in this immediate neighbor to Hollinger Consolidated making good in a big way was strengthened more than I can expect a few days ago, when my engineer wired me: 'Drills already passed through three foot vein showing gold in cores.' He adds that the formation now being pierced is quartz porphyry with basic schist intrusions, also that no other formation has been obtained in the Hollinger section above a depth of 300 feet. It is highly important that the Hollinger, Porcupine Crown, McIntyre, Schuchmacher and other large producers of this camp, wherever the basic schist comes in high-grade gold values are encountered.

HARGRAVES STEADY ON PROFIT-TAKING

Hargraves was one of the steadiest market issues yesterday, the decline on profit-taking being limited to within a point. Before the new financial interests came into the company the shares could be had in quantity around \$5 a share. Within two weeks the price has been quadrupled, and the inducements for quick returns are being low levels. Present buyers are sufficient to let these temporary holders out, but with this stock off the market it may be found a good deal more difficult to buy, and any news from the property on new developments will create a demand that will only be satisfied by one of the many advances seen in the mining market. It is thought on the street that the new financial interests which have brought into the Hargraves Company this stock will not be able to pay higher prices, and will buy all offerings until their limit has been reached.

RE BAILEY LITIGATION.

Editor of the World: Will you kindly publish in The World a brief statement as to the present status of the Bailey Cobalt litigation, and oblige.

The litigation in connection with the affairs of the Bailey Cobalt Mining Co. is being held up by the inability of the shareholders to bring A. E. Benson, the defendant in the action into court to get his evidence. Efforts have been made for some time to no effect. Up to the present time the shareholders, represented by a committee of Buffalo and Toronto men, have been successful in the courts in their case against A. E. Benson, but the Lawyers' Title & Trust Co. of New York to whom Mr. Benson turned over the interest in the company shortly after the action was commenced succeeded in having the case reopened. No progress has been made since then, and because of the non-appearance of the aforementioned A. E. Benson.

TECK-HUGHES STRONG JUMPED TEN POINTS

Vipond Gained Ground Which Was Lost Later—Apex a Strong Issue.

The mining market yesterday was again active with stocks generally in good demand, but the trading was not so heavy as in the earlier part of the week. Especially was this true of the silver issues which attracted so much attention.

Interest seemed to swing more into the medium-priced gold stocks, by far the majority of the business being done in the Porcupine and Teck-Hughes. The outstanding features in the gold stocks were Apex, Vipond and Teck-Hughes, all three of these issues making gains on good buying, while the remainder of the Porcupine held very firm with one or two possible exceptions.

A strong demand for Teck-Hughes from New York and Buffalo sources was responsible for the advance of this stock to a new high level at 92, a gain of 10 points from the opening. Forcupine Vipond jumped 5 points from the opening to 55, but the advance was not maintained, the stock closing at 50 bid. The early buying was most likely occasioned by the rumors that the merger with the North Thompson. It is understood that this matter is fast coming to a head after months of negotiations between the two companies. The difficulty has been due to the fact that the North Thompson shareholders are largely English. The basis for consolidation as reported on the street is share for share, the new company having a capitalization of \$3,000,000, each of the parties getting 1,125,000 shares, the remainder to stay in the treasury.

The arrangement, if satisfactory to both parties, should result in a more economic operation of the properties which are adjacent and have identically the same formations. A step was stronger, making a new high record for years past. The demand for this stock was due to the fact that active prospecting is to be done in an effort to prove it up. McIntyre was fairly active and steady at 182 to 184, with 185 paid for a small lot. McIntyre Ex. held steady at 65 to 65 1/2, while Jupiter was firm at 80 to 80 1/2. Holly was unchanged at \$6.25. Investors expected a couple of points from the opening to 35.

Schumacher was rather quiet at 80 to \$1, and Newray sold at the top at \$1.30. West Dome Com. after heavy pressure forced it down to 32, rallied to 33 1/2. Kirkland Lake was active at 54 to 55. It is said that large blocks of this stock have been taken out of the market for investment purposes. Great Northern was the shining light in the silver stocks, making a new high at 16 1/2, closing well up to the top at 16 1/4. The strength of this stock is due to the fact that it is a large owner of Teck-Hughes stock, and also has a large number of Ophir shares, and the zinc property in Joplin, Missouri. The zinc property is now being developed. It is rumored on the street that the last named source of revenue of Schumacher will be made over to the Great Northern, amounting to as much as \$5,000 a week, it is reported.

Kenabek came in for a fair share of the trading. It opened at 20 1/4 and closed fractionally lower at 19 1/4. Nipissing sold up to \$2.25, ending off after to \$2.00. Timiskaming was quiet but firm at 45 to 45 1/2. Kenabek continued its reactionary movement the previous day, casting off further to 44 1/2. Profit-taking in this issue has been more possible than in any other owing to its rapid advance and the decline is considered a reasonable one. With this speculative interest tied up a new demand might easily force the price at a rapid pace again.

KENABEK TO MAKE SHIPMENTS VERY SOON

R. E. Kemerer in his weekly market letter has the following:

Again this week the outstanding feature of the Cobalt list has been the stock of Kenabek Company, which on Tuesday recorded a new high level at 70 cents per share. The advance, in the first instance, was brought about by very heavy buying from the north by a very wide range of investors. This was inspired by the remarkable improvement that has been in the vein recently discovered on the property; subsequently a very wide range of developed in the stock and buying orders were received from all quarters. According to the last reports which we have received, the new vein which has a width of about 20 inches of very high grade ore.
