## **Carpets Cost More**

Carpets Cost more In studying the trend of business in house furnishings a curious anom-ality is found when the Carpet De-partment is reached. The average buyer has come to take price reduc-tions as a matter of course. He looks for a cut in rug prices as confidently as he does in furniture or clothing or other necessities, and recurrent bar-gain sales planned to move slow stocks and broken lines add to this assurance. An examination of the situation in its broader aspects, how-ever, reveals the fact that if retailers followed manufacturers' prices faith-would advance this year instead of decline. It is not anticipated that they will advance, but if prices are head down it will be because mer-chants are content with a smaller margin on their sales.

margin on their sales. Generally speaking, manufacturers' ish and Canadian makers, are an ad-vance on those of last year, and these prices will cover goods marketed well into the latter part of the year. In view of the tremendous reduction in voollen prices, this statement on the face of it takes some explaining. In the first place it is well to remember that a manufacturer of carpets and rugs, like any other manufacturer, must keep his supply of raw material ahead of consumption. He must provide reserves of wool to insure continued operation of his plant. These reserves naturally were bought in the main before banking pressure forced holders of wool to move their tremendous stocks.

One of the large departmental stores in Toronto, anxious to get a line on the probable trend of prices, secured opinions from practically all the great British firms. While a number of them were agreed that the cost of carpets must ultimately come down, not one held out any hope that a cut on the ruling quotations was due for many months. Since orders placed up to the first of January rep-resent deliveries about the middle of the year or a little earlier, it is evi-dent that reductions, if they do come within six months in the producing field, cannot be passed on to the pub-lic this year. The fact that new stocks will cost them more is bound to have a re-straining influence upon price-cutting other than bargains for the purpose of attracting trade, and a further curb is the fact that stocks of rugs held by house-furnishing firms are not generally large.

### A Better Business Tone.

The general trend of the news and of the co tusiness is reviving in many directions and in many lines. Factoric that were closed down are starting up with reduced number of employes some on half-time, and in instances at reduced wages. There is more tendency in the States than in Canada to reduce wages. But, an upward movement is quite visible.

There is also a reduction in prices to the great encouragement of buy. ers of many lines of staples. Clothes boots, sugar, rice, bread, flour, oatmeal; in several of the building materials, including lumber, brick, stone steel and hardware.

There is no falling off in interest, in taxes, in house rent. in fuel. But the universal tendency is downward. We are militarily shattered, politically impotent, and economic-Profits are being cut in percentage.' A period of readjustment is to be seen ally gasping for a little all along the line

all along the line. The note is one of reviving business under new conditions. And those trying to do business show a much friendlier attitude toward the cus-tomer. 





Humanitarian Policy in Dealing With Newcomers From Japan and China Will Avert Danger of Serious Friction, Says Prof. W. G. Smith, at Open Forum.




