

MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

DOMINION SQUARE METHODIST CHURCH, MONTREAL,

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

Organization of Conference, May 31st, A.D. 1882.

THE NINTH SESSION of the MONTREAL ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church of Canada was opened in the Dominion Square Methodist Church, Montreal, Province of Quebec, on Wednesday, the 31st day of May, 1882, at 10 a.m., the President, the Rev. Henry F. Bland, being in the Chair.

The President announced the 753rd hymn, after which the Rev. J. Tallman Pitcher, Secretary, read the 15th chapter of St. John, and the Revs. J. Armstrong and William I. Shaw, LL.B., led in prayer.

The Secretary called the Conference Roll, and one hundred and eighteen responded to their names.

The Conference proceeded to the election by ballot of a President, whereupon the Rev. Ezra A. Stafford, B.A., was chosen.

The President briefly addressed the Conference, and directed them to proceed to the election of a Secretary.

The ballot resulted in the election of the Rev. Marmaduke L. Pearson.

The Secretary nominated the Revs. James Allen, M.A., and Jabez B. Saunders, Assistant Secretaries; and the Rev. William Jackson as Journal Secretary.

These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

1.—REV. EDWARD A. WARD.

Bro. Ward was born in Newton Kyme, Yorkshire, England, September 15th, 1823, and entered into rest, at the home of his nephew, near Montreal, on Monday morning, December 5th, 1881, being thus a little more than fifty-eight years of age. His early life was spent in nominal connection with the Anglican Church, until his seventeenth year, when through the labours of the Rev. John Rattenbury he was led to consecrate his future life to the service of the

Redeemer. It was in a Methodist love-feast where light first came to him in his spiritual darkness. With him to belong to Christ meant to work for Christ, and he answered the command, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might," by devoting himself to city missionary work in Hull and other places. While thus engaged a cholera epidemic swept the town where he laboured and depopulated whole streets, striking terror into the people. Through all he remained at his post, ministering to both bedies and minds diseased, until worn out with labour he was compelled to seek rest for awhile by the sea. Even here his zeal for Christ constrained him to labour as opportunity served, until the spring of 1854, when he turned his face westward to do mission work in Canada. He received, as his first charge, under the Chairman, what was known as the Humber circuit, where for two years he did good work for Christ. The following Circuits were blest with his labours, in the order named: Percy and Seymour, Wesleyville, Huntingdon, Wilton and Odessa, Waterloo, Kingston, Sidney, North Augusta, Maitland, Winchester, Chambly, and Danville, ending his labours in Point St. Charles, Montreal. During the twenty-seven years of his Canadian Ministry we find him doing the work of a faithful Gospel Minister. There was not a charge named above which did not rejoice in one or more glorious revivals during his incumbency. He was known among his brethren as a soulsaving minister, one who was specially endowed with power to stir the thoughtless masses and make men pray. would be safe to say that thousands have been converted to God through his instrumentality. His motto seemed to be

"One thing I do." He set his face strongly against intemperance and other popular vices, and was by precept and example a pattern to the people. His friends cherish his memory for his sterling worth.

His constitution was naturally very strong, yet it was compelled to give way under the heavy strain which was continually forced upon it. In the summer of 1879 he received his first loud alarm, while performing his pastoral duties at Point St. Charles. A rude shock, in the form of apoplexy, so weakened his constitution that he performed his duties on that charge with great risk, and at the conclusion of his term was obliged to ask for rest, in the hope of prolonging his life for future toil, but the Master said, "It is enough." During the summer and fall his feebleness became more apparent, until the morning of December 5th, 1881, he sweetly passed to his rest, without a struggle. The wheel breaking at the cistern gave no sign. not, for God took him. In Mount Royal cemetery his dust reposes, awaiting the resurrection of the just. He rests from his labours and his works do follow him.

2.—JOHN TOMKINS.

Mr. Tomkins was born in the ancient City of Hereford, England, in the year 1797. His early religious training was in the Episcopalian Church, of which his parents were honoured and consistent members. In the years of his opening manhood he was convinced of sin under a sermon preached by an Anglican clergyman, and while in this state of mind he was first induced to attend the Methodist

Church, where he found peace and rest to his troubled soul.

True to the instincts of the new life, begotten within him by the Spirit of God, he began at once to labour for the salvation of others. Feeling that the Great Head of the Church had called him to "the office and work of a minister," after a period of training he was ordained by Rev. Richard Watson, in the old Spitalfields' chapel, London, on the 18th of April, 1827.

His first appointment was to Newfoundland, where he endured many hardships, and once, at least, came well nigh perishing of hunger and cold. After spending nearly six years of arduous toil among the scattered fishermen of Newfoundland, he was appointed to Quebec, whither he removed in 1833. After two years of labour in that city he received his first appointment to the Eastern Town hips, where he spent thirty-four years of his active ministry, and thirteen years of quiet waiting for the summons to go home. Forty-three years have produced wondrous changes in this section of Canala. Mr. Tomkins, in common with all the heroic itinerants of that day, had to endure the toil and discomforts of a new country and large fields of labour.

During his last illness, extending over a period of five months, our aged brother displayed the perfect calmness which come only of a perfect trust. The inspirations of grace were stronger than the instincts of nature; submission to the Divine will than the desire for longer life. He fel asleep in Jesus, at Stanstead on the 21st of September, 1881, in the 84th year of his age, and the 54th of his ministry.

As a man Mr. Tomkins was naturally of a mild and equal temperament, and marked by unusual simplicity and transparency of character, to which were added the adornments and attractions of a truly Christian life. As a preacher he was singularly clear in exposition, sound in doctrine, fresh in thought, and felicitous in expression. The souls who did not grow under his ministry were dull, indeed, and greatly to be pitied. As a pastor he was at once tender and faithful. His whole ministerial and private life were marked by wisdom, diligence, and punctuality.

For many years his integrity and general character led his brethern to entrust to him the Chairmanship of the Stanstead District, over which he presided with affability toward his brethren and the advantage of the general interests of the Church.

With such a nature, sanctified by Divine grace, it is no wonder that Mr. Tomkins has left behind him a name as ointment poured forth. We thank God for so pure a life protracted through so many years, and pray that we may be enabled to imitate the many virtue of our deceased friend and brother. We mourn his departure from earth, and trust to meet him again in the realms of light and glory.

The Committee find that the number of claimants on the Fund is 337, four of whom receive twelve dollars each and one twenty.

The ratable membership is 21.838, which at 38 per member will amount to \$8298 64.

The amount required for the claims of the current year is \$8368.

The Committee recommend that the per capita tax be 38 cents per ratable member, and that \$25 be paid each full claimant.

The Committee recommend that the membership on the Island of Anticosti be exempted.

The Committee recommend that the Rev. T. G. Williams be the Secretary-Treasurer of the Fund.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE, 1882.

Your Committee rejoice to be able to report a year of progress in the Sabbath School work of our Church. While only two new preaching appointments are reported, twenty-six new schools have been organized. Your Committee notice with very great pleasure that the circulation of our own Sabbath School papers has been nearly trebled during the year; and that the use of other papers from the United States and elsewhere has diminished in a corresponding degree

We take this opportunity of expressing our hearty approval of the Sunday School publications of our Church as being admirably suited to the wants of our young people, and urge that they be more generally circulated. We also recommend the more general study of our Catechism.

In addition to the efforts which we are persuaded are being made to add our children and young people to the Church, we suggest to pastors and Sabbath School Superintendents the practice of holding in the Sunday School a monthly evangelistic service with a view to lead such as have not given their hearts to God to turn to him and make a profession of their faith and love.

Your Committee would also affectionately urge on all who love the cause of God, the propriety of organizing Sabbath Schools in all neighbourhoods where they do not now exist; for we are persuaded that the material of the Church of the future in this land is to come mainly from this source.

It is recommended that the Rev. W. Galbraith be appointed Treasurer of the General Sabbath School Fund.

On nomination of the President, the Conference appointed Rev. J. M. Hagar Corresponding Secretary of the Board.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows:—
MONTREAL DISTRICT.

Montreal Eighth.—The application of the Trustees of Douglas Church for permission to sell 25 to 30 feet front by 120 deep on west side of the church grounds, proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of debt is recommended to be granted.

LACHUTE.—In the case of the application of the Trustees of the church at Lachute, for permission to sell the old church, proceeds to be applied in paying debt on said church and the balance to be raised in building a new church in the centre of the village. Your Committee recommend that the application be granted.

LACHUTE.—The application from the same Board for permission to sell the parsonage and lot, proceeds to be used in buying or building a new parsonage is also recommended to be granted.

BROCKVILLE DISTRICT.

Morrisburg.—Your Committee recommend that the Trustees of the Morrisburg church be granted permission to sell the old church property, proceeds to be applied towards liquidating debt on the new church.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.

Mattawa.—In the matter of the application of the Trustees of the Mattawa church property for permission to sell their lot in Mattawa village and apply the proceeds to the purchase of another lot in a more eligible part of the village, your Committee recommend that the application be granted.

QUEBEC DISTRICT.

MARBLETON.—Your Committee recommend the granting of the request of the Marbleton Quarterly Board for permission to sell the present parsonage, proceeds to be applied towards the erection of a more suitable building.

Danville.—Your Committee recommend that the request of the Trustees of Sproule's church, Danville Circuit, for permission to set apart for a public burial-ground the half of the church lot adjacent to the old cemetery be granted.

ROXTON.—The Trustees of the Roxton Mission request the Conference to consent to the sale of the lots upon which the church and parsonage at Roxton Pond were burned, the proceeds to be applied to the purchase of another lot more suitable for a church and parsonage. The Committee recommend that the request be granted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

With profound thankfulness to God, your Committee report considerable vitality and progress in the Church. Numerically there has been a small decrease, but financially. the Church is in a most hopeful state. Attendance at class-meeting is on the increase in some places, and several circuits are able to report growth in grace. Upon the whole the Church is in a better state than it was last year. Still your Committee regret to learn that certain evils exist in the Church which might and should be removed, such as the neglect on the part of ministers to read the rules of the Church, and enforce those which are known to be neglected. A better state of things would be brought about if the people knew more of what they are really required to do, and were shown the danger to their own souls and spirituality by transgressing the rules of the Church. The courage and ability necessary to grapple with the evil customs of the day, and publicly condemn those which are known to be most injurious to the Church are not so common as the safety of the Church requires.

Your Committe not only urge the reading of the rules according to discipline, but recommend every minister to preach on the subjects treated of in the rules. Class-meeting should be regularly mentioned from the pulpit, and in other ways, in order to stir up the minds of the people in reference to their duty and privilege in this means of grace.

It is also believed that something more special should be done for the conversion and spiritual welfare of children. Your Committee, therefore, heartily recommend the holding of evangelistic services once a month in the Sabbath-school, with a view of keeping the subject of personal religion more fully before the attention of the children, and leading those who are living in sin to Christ.

Your Committee also recommend that an evangelisation

society for the Montreal Conference be organized, with a view of employing evangelistic agency in harmony with the doctrines and usages of Methodism, and to meet the necessities of the work. Such society to be composed of all those ministers who volunteer their hearty co-operation and contribute \$10.00 annually for its support, and also such laymen as may be persuaded to assist in the good work.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee regard the temperance movement of our times as of great importance, and as the enemies of this cause are ever active in opposing it, we as Christian ministers should not relax, but rather increase our efforts for its advancement.

We deeply regret that temperance halls are sometimes devoted to the pleasures of the theatre, and the ball-room, rendering it difficult, without a compromise of principle, for the ministers and members of our churches to be present at their assemblies. At the same time we desire to foster, as far as possible, all societies and efforts devoted only to the great temperance reform.

While we do not wish unwisely to enter the political arena, we do earnestly desire to use all proper influence to secure the universal prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating beverages throught our Dominion.

And we devoutly pray, that during the present political struggle, the Great Head of the Church may so control and direct our State affairs that during the next five years this great end may be secured.

The Committee further recommends that the members of the Conference and the adherents of our church should render assistance, as far as may be practicable, in the formation and promotion of the Woman's Christian Temper ance Organization, which in many parts of England, the United States, and Canada has largely contributed towards impressing a truly religious character on the temperance movement, a characteristic which must always be regarded essential to the vitality and permanent success of the cause as a moral enterprise. All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE TO THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE, MONTREAL, Que., JUNE 1st., 1882.

In presenting their Annual Report, your Trustees take pleasure in stating that the Debt is diminishing, that the Endowment Fund Subscription List is increasing, and that marked prosperity has attended the operations of the Institution during the past year.

The Report of the Secretary-Treasurer shows that since the inauguration of the debt movement in 1878, at the Brockville Conference, the following amounts have been received towards paying off the liabilities:

There was collected up to May 22nd, 1881, the sum of \$24,691 50 Collected during the past year the sum of 5,055 56

Total amount received on debt is \$29,747 06

Your Trustees are devoutly thankful that so large an amount—about \$30,000—have been paid on the subscrip-

tions. Also, they do respectfully, but earnestly solicit the continuation of liberality on the part of the patrons of the College, that the debt may be entirely liquidated at an early date.

Your Trustees are thankful to say that \$18,500 have been promised towards the Endowment Fund, and that it is confidently expected that in a short time this sum will be increased to \$20,000.

The Reports of the Principal and Executive Committee show that much interest was awakened throughout the neighbouring municipalities by an educational meeting which was held in the College last August. This meeting, and a more liberal use of advertisements and calendars, and more active personal efforts for securing students have resulted in an increased patronage.

There are upon the students' roll 195 names, an increase over last year's attendance of 60 per cent. This is the

largest number that has ever been enrolled in one year. The average attendance has been 130. The number of boarders has been nearly double that of the past year, and larger than that of any previous year, except 1875.

The Teachers have been faithful, and the conduct and progress of the students satisfactory, winning high com-

mendation from the Provincial Inspector.

The general health of the resident day pupils has been good.

The curriculum has been carefully revised and improved,

as may be seen by a reference to the new Calendar.

The financial results of the operations of the School for the current year have been very satisfactory, though the rates for tuition and board have been considerably lowered. The earnings of the School, exclusive of Government aid, have more nearly equalled the expenditure than ever before. This satisfactory result is due to increased patronage, and to economic re-adjustment of the staff of instruction and supervision. The efficiency, however, of the Educational Department has not been sacrificed, and the excellence of the board has not been diminished, notwithstanding the lower rates and the higher cost of supplies

Your Trustees are glad to be able to say that the deficit for the current year is estimated at only \$302 84, and that the Pierce Improvement Fund has been made available for certain material improvements in the building, which has greatly promoted the safety and comfort of the inmates of the Institution. A tabulated statement of Revenue and Expenditure for each year since the Institution was founded, plainly indicates that an Endowment Fund is necessary for the maintenance of the College in a

state of efficiency.

The Board having learned that \$18,500 have been conditionally subscribed to the Endowment Fund, and it appearing highly probable that this can be raised in a very short time to the sum of \$20,000, and there being no immediate prospect of securing the specific amount of \$25,000,

and the exigencies of the College, as well as the uncertainties of life, rendering the completion of the Endowment most desirable; it is recommended to the Conference that the basis of the Endowment be reconsidered, with a view to recommending the subscribers to concur in so modifying the conditions of their subscriptions that the same shall become valid when \$20,000 shall have been subscribed to the Endowment Fund.

Your Trustees recommended the Conference to re-appoint the Rev. A. HARDIE, M.A., as Moral Governor and Secretary-Treasurer, and the Rev. A. LEE HOLMES, M.A., as Principal of the College

They further recommend that the following gentlemen be appointed as Trustees for the ensuing year:

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

The Committee, appointed by the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, at its Session in 1881, to consider "the present relation to this Conference of the Stanstead Wesleyan College" and all matters relating to the said College, and also "the Endowment project, and to determine finally whether it shall be immediately carried into effect by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Trustee Fund,"

beg leave to report as follows:—

1. The Committee met in Montreal on the 21st day of June, 1881, and having heard a full statement of the conditions and prospects of the Endowment Fund, after mature deliberation, in accordance with the power given to the Committee, authorized the continuance of vigorous efforts being made on behalf of the said Endowment Fund during this year in its present form and that the work of the College be continued.

2. The Committee again met in Montreal on the 26th day of May, 1882, and received from the Secretary-Treasurer, and Principal of the College, very full and explicit statements of all the interests of the Institution, financial and educational. The Committee thereupon unanimously re-

solved, that:

1. We have heard with much gratification the reports presented by the officers of the College, showing greatly increased patronage and prosperity during the past Session, and a degree of prosperity never before attained.

2. We recommend the continuance of the work of the

Institution in its present form.

3. We express the hope that by personal effort on the part of each member of the Conference, the patronage of the Institution may be further increased.

With reference to the important matter of the legal re-

lation of the College to the Montreal Conference, and to the Methodist Church of Canada, the following presentments, prepared by Rev. W. Scott and C. C. Colby, Esq., M.P., are respectfully submitted:—

The Committee find, 1. That the title of the Stanstead Wesleyan College is at present vested in Trustees who have power to convey the same either to the General Conference

or to the Montreal Conference.

2. That the improved financial condition of the College, by reason of the diminution of the debt, its increased patronage and income, and the progress already made in the Endowment scheme, together with the exceptional condition and needs of the Institution, would seem to justify the hope that the General Conference might now be disposed to assume a measure of responsibility in connection with this

3. That in the opinion of the Committee the interests of the College would be best promoted by a transfer of the property of the College to the General Conference, and of its management and control to the Montreal Conference.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend, that the Montreal Conference take the whole subject into reconsideration, and appoint a special committee, with a view to placing the exceptional claims of the Stanstead Wesleyan College, before the next General Conference, in order that the General Conference may accept the title of property, and that the Institution may be recognized for a limited period, as a part of the Educational system of the Methodist Church of Canada. But, if such proposal shall not be accepted by the General Conference, then the said Committee of the Montreal Conference shall be authorized to obtain such legislation as will invest the ownership, management, and control of the College and its property in the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada.

The Committee, in conclusion, recommend that the subscribers to the Endowment Fund be respectfully requested by Conference to make the minimum amount of subscriptions for this fund to be \$20,000, instead of \$25,000, in order that its proceeds may be made immediately available for current expenses, inasmuch as there is ground for hoping that before long the amount of \$20,000 will be secured, and with such an investment it is thought the College will be placed on a safe financial basis.

REPORT OF THE FRENCH METHODIST INSTITUTE.

The Committee to whom was referred the question of the relation of the French Methodist Institute to the Wesleyan Theological College of Montreal, beg leave to report:

It appears from the Constitution and Regulations of these Institutions that they in no wise conflict with each other. The Wesleyan Theological College of Montreal is devoted almost entirely to the education of English students; while the French Methodist Institute is engaged chiefly in the work of primary instruction and preliminary oversight of French youth and young men:—the design being also to ascertain from among the pupils in the Institute which of them may show qualities and dispositions worthy of further culture, and of assignment to the superior education and theological privileges of the College. The Committee, therefore, conclude that it is desirable that the relation of these Insitutions should be more closely formed and more clearly defined.

The Committee find that during the past two sessions the teaching of French theological students has been chiefly carried on by the Rev. Mr. Beaudry, Principal. With these students associated in classes with junior pupils of the Institute, we feel that this work cannot as effectively be performed as if conducted under the direct control of the College, especially as Mr. Beaudry is at the same time engaged in faithful pastoral and missionary work. therefore, hoped that as soon as the buildings of the said College are completed, steps will be taken for the accommodation therein of all French students who give substantial evidence of fitness for our work, and that an additional Instructor be employed, who shall be responsible with the other Professors of the College for the thorough training of such students in the French language. The primary department of the Institute, if continued, is to be conducted as a mission school.

In the meantime, until it is possible thus to amalgamate the French and English work, that is until the occupancy of the new College buildings, we recommend that the work of the Institute be continued in its present form.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

The Memorial Committee having considered the various resolutions and memorials referred to it, reports its findings as follows:—

1. On the resolution of the Brockville District, praying the Annual Conference to recommend to the General Conference the addition of the question, "Do you consider these binding upon you through all your future ministry?" after the question to probationers concerning snuff, tobacco,

or drams, and to require a distinct answer in the affirmative —

Your Committee do not think there is any need of change in the Discipline on this subject, as we consider it sufficiently

explicit already.

Upon the consideration of this clause by the Conference, it was moved in amendment,—That the General Conference be requested to amend the Discipline, so as to make the negative answer to the question binding through the whole of life.

The amendment was carried.

2. On the resolution from the Brockville District, asking the Conference to formulate a scheme to secure more adequate provision for our Superannuated Ministers,—

Your Committee recommend that a committee be appointed by the Conference for this purpose, to report to

this Conference.

3. From the French District, asking the Conference to memorialize the General Conference to appoint one or more agents to collect funds for extending the premises of our French churches and schools,—

Your Committee are of opinion that such are the number and importance of the interests now before our people, calling for their liberality, that the launching of this scheme at the present would certainly prove a failure.

The Memorial from the Woman's Missionary Society, requesting the Conference to commend the formation of such societies to their congregations.—

Your Committee recommend that the ministers be requested to give encouragement to such societies wherever

practicable.

A second from the French District, asking that the General Conference be memorialized to issue an abbreviated and cheap edition of the Discipline in French.

In view of the large expense involved in this proposal, and the small number of Disciplines needed, and the fact that all, or nearly all, the French Missionaries understand the English language, your Committee do not deem it necessary to recommend this request.

It was moved in amendment to this clause of the Committee's report,—That the General Conference be requested to have printed, in an alienated form, the Discipline of the Church in the French language.

The amendment was adopted.

A third resolution from the French District, asking the General Conference to grant a revised course of study for probationers in the French work,-

Your Committee recommend the adoption of the request.

The Quebec District resolution, asking for an extension

of the term of ministerial service on a circuit, -

Your Committee recommend the Conference to memorialize the General Conference so to change the law as to allow a minister to be appointed to the same circuit for a fourth and fifth year, when the minister concerned consents; provided the Quarterly Board, by a two-thirds vote of those present, requests such appointment; and the Annual Conference, by a two-thirds' vote, grant the Stationing Committee permission.

The petition of the French Church and School in Sherbrooke, praying for release from financial obligations.—

We recommend that the Central Missionary Board be requested to relieve the Trustees from their present financial difficulty, and provide for the saving of the property to the Church.

A resolution from the Brockville District, asking the Conference to express its judgment on the abolition of the Children's Fund,—

Your Committee do not deem it desirable to recommend such proposal.

Brockville District recommended that permission be granted to the Superintendent of Cornwall to collect funds for relief from the financial burdens of Church trust, by applying to circuits in the Conference generally,—

Your Committee recommend that the request be granted.

Resolution from Quebec District on the rights and

privileges of Annual Conferences,—

Your Committee not having time fully to consider this question desire to recommend that the whole subject be referred to the General Conference to enumerate and definitely specify the rights and privileges of the Annual Conferences.

Mr. Chambers moved in amendment,—

That the whole subject be referred to the General Conference, and request the said General Conference to enumerate and definitely specify the rights and privileges of the Annual Conferences, and if in any subsequent legislation a majority of the Annual Conferences shall declare their rights to be invaded, then the vote of the majority of the Annual Conferences at their next ensuing sessions, shall render such legislation ineffective, and be a final determination of the questions at issue.

It was moved by the Rev. S. Bond in amendment to the

amendment,-

That as in the opinion of this Conference the acceptance of the interpretation put upon the articles relating to the rights and privileges of Annual Conferences by the amendment now before the Conference would make the General Conference as the representative legislative court of the Church to a large extent powerless, and would also tend to place the laymen and ministers in antagonism to each other, and raise an agitation for the introduction of laymen into the Annual Conferences. We, therefore, reaffirm our deliverance of 1880 on this subject as follows:—

1. That in the opinion of this Conference the articles relating to the rights and privileges of the Annual Conferences found in the Discipline and in the Basis of the Union, placed the General Conference in a position where it was invested with the power and was under the necessity of determining what were the rights, powers, and privileges vested in it, and as the rights, powers, and privileges of the Annual Conferences cannot be determined without the rights and privileges of the General Conference being first ascertained, the act of the General Conference determining its own rights, powers, and privileges, decided what were the rights, powers, and privileges of the Annual Conferences so far as related to this issue.

2. That as the Basis of Union was an agreement entered into by three different Churches and by the separate action of the ministers and laymen of each, giving the laymen equal representation in the General Conference, it would be unreasonable and unjust to grant to the ministers now separately the power so to determine their rights that they would also have the power to determine the rights of the highest court of the Church and of the laymen of the whole Church.

3. That the Basis of Union did not assign to the Annual Conferences such an extent of rights, powers, and privileges as would enable them to control the size of the General Conference Committees and of the General Conference itself, but gave them control over the ministerial composition of the Annual Conferences, the reception and expulsion of ministers and candidates for the ministry, the determining of ministerial status, the administration of "all business appertaining to the circuits, stations, and missions," and the representation of the laws relating to these matters.

The amendment was adopted.

Resolution from the Quebec District endorsing a petition of the Quebec Quarterly Board requesting that such change be made in the transfer law as shall facilitate the transfer of ministers -

We recommend the Conference to urge on the General Conference the favourable consideration of this petition.

Resolution from the Pembroke District, recommending that the claim of the Children's Fund for about sixty German members, who were transferred to the Evangelical Association, be paid by the Missionary Committee out of the funds at its disposal.—

We recommend that the Missionary Committee be re-

quested to grant this request.

8. From Stanstead District, requesting a change in the Constitution of the Contingent Fund, so as to give the Contingent Fund Committee power to make the appropriations directly and finally to Circuits.—

Your Committee do not deem this proposed change

desirable.

9. From Pembroke District, asking the Conference to memorialize the General Conference to secure the publishing of the *Missionary Reports* not later than the 15th of November of each year, in one volume, and with the names of subscribers of four dollars and upward only in the report,—

We recommend the Conference to endorse the prayer of the memorial, so far as relates to the time of publishing,

and to the number of reports.

10. From Brockville District, in regard to the reporting of the number of conversions on Missions during each year in Missionary Report,—

We suggest that this request be sent to the Missionary

Secretary.

METHODIST UNION.

The Methodist Union movement, including Memorials and Resolutions adopted by the Kingston, Brockville, and other District Meetings, having been formally brought under the attention of the Montreal Conference of the

Methodist Church of Canada, assembled in the City of Montreal, in June, 1882, so as to call forth the sentiments of this Conference touching this grave and vital question; the large Committee to whom the subject has been referred, respectfully recommend the Conference to adopt the following Resolutions:—

- 1. That we hail with devout satisfaction the earnest expressions and efforts in favour of merging the Methodist Church of Canada, the Methodist Episcopal, the Primitive Methodist, and the Bible Christian Churches of Canada in one United Methodism for British North America.
- 2. That while we recognize the conflicting opinions and interests to be harmonized, and the compromises that will be necessary in conducting this Union movement to a successful issue; especially considering the serious changes in our Church polity, which some have recommended, and the expediency of securing the hearty concurrence and co-operation of the Eastern Sections of our Church, where Methodistic divisions are now practically unknown; and although we are strongly attached to our present methods of operation, upon which God's blessing has very abundantly descended in past years, yet we do not regard any or all of these things as constituting insurmountable obstacles to the success of the Union movement.
- 3. That we hereby most respectfully and heartily commend the whole question to the deliberate judgment of our approaching General Conference, devoutly hoping that gracious wisdom will be so vouchsafed that such terms of union may in due time be agreed upon, as will enable the said Churches to drop existing differences, and honourably and zealously to organize themselves into one United Methodist Church.

The report as amended was adopted.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON SUPERAN-NUATION FUND.

Your Committee on the Superannuation Fund beg leave to report, that in view of the lamentable deficiencies from their legal claims suffered by the superannuated ministers, during some years past, we respectfully request the General Conference to adopt such a scheme as will secure to each superannuated minister his full claims, either from the proceeds of a greatly increased endowment of the funds; or partly by this means and the remainder by an equitable assessment upon the salaries of efficient ministers.

It was moved in amendment, that the last clause in the report be struck out, and the following substituted: "That a more earnest effort be made through the present methods of annual application to the members and friends of the Church." The amendment was carried. The report as amended was adopted.

Your Committee wish to call attention to a resolution passed last year, and printed in the Minutes, namely, "That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified, as correct, before handing them to the Conference authorities."

There are seven districts that return a decrease in membership and four that return an increase. The total membership is as follows:—

Resolved,—That we hereby express our unfeigned regret at his removal from our midst, and desire to place on record our high appreciation of his sincere piety, his charming eloquence, and the abounding loyalty to our beloved Methodism.

THE LATE DR. G. W. CAMPBELL.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Douglas, and seconded by the Rev. Dr. Elliott.

That this Conference having heard of the sudden death, in the City of Edinburgh, of Dr. G. W. Campbell, cannot but record its deep sorrow at the solemn and unexpected event.

His great qualities as a man, his acknowledged preeminence in his profession, his abounding charities and sympathy with affliction in its lowliest surroundings, and the generous consideration which for more than forty years he extended to the ministry of Methodism in the free tender of his great professional skill, all united create a sense of loss which the lapse of time can never efface.

To the bereaved family this Conference expresses its profound sympathy, and assurance of prayer to Him who bindeth up the broken of heart, that all grace may be given to them in this their darkest hour.

Senator Brouse, M.D., who for years past has taken a deep interest in our various Church enterprises, especially our missionary and educational schemes, and that we also desire to express our deepest sympathy with Mrs. Brouse and the family, and assure them of our prayers for their present and eternal interests.

WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

Moved by the Rev. G. H. Davis, and seconded by the Rev. H F. Bland,

Whereas,—By the noble generosity of our friends in the City of Montreal, with the consent and approval of the Conference held at Montreal in 1872, a Theological College, for the instruction and training of young men for our ministry, was, some years since, established here; and,

Whereas,—Said College has, it is believed, being doing excellent and efficient work, of which this Conference has expressed its approval; and.

Whereas,—A princely and noble effort is now being made in the erection of suitable buildings, and the consummation of an endowment to place the College upon a permanent basis, so that it may be worked for all time to come without being pecuniarily burdensome to the Church at large; and,

Whereas,—It is intended in said College to interest and train the French Canadian young men designed for the ministry among the French Canadians of this country, this Conference considers that such liberality and efforts on the part of our distinguished laymen deserve our most grateful and respectful appreciation and commendation, and the College our earnest support.

THE REV. E. H. DEWART.

Moved by the Rev. T. G. Williams, seconded by the Rev. J. T. Pitcher,

That this Conference has listened with great pleasure to the Rev. E. H. Dewart, Editor of the *Guardian*, concerning the position and influence of our Church paper, and that we desire to thank God for the restored health and strength of Rev. Dr. Dewart, and trust his life may long be spared to serve the Church with that marked ability and success which have hitherto attended his efforts.

THE BOOK STEWARD.

Moved by the Rev. J. Elliott, D.D., and seconded by the Rev. H. F. Bland,

We have listened to the Book-Steward's Report with unmingled satisfaction, and we sincerely hope the prosperity of the future may exceed the past, and we pledge ourselves, according to our power, to forward the interests of our Book-Room.

THE PROTESTANT TEACHERS OF MONTREAL.

Moved by the Rev. J. B. Saunders, and seconded by the Rev. G. Forsey,

This Conference having heard with deep regret of the dismissal of the Protestant school teachers, of this city, through the failure of the Provincial Legislature and City Council to levy the nece sary taxes for the efficient carrying on of this work. Therefore, be it

Resolved,—That this Conference desires to express its profound sympathy with the Protestant School Commissioners in their embarrassment, and its earnest hope that the Protestants of this city will not permit the grand Protestant school system of this city to be imperilled, and its commercial and social status dishonoured by the overthrow of its educational system.

STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

Moved by the Rev. Wm. Scott, and seconded by the Rev. G. McRitchie,

That this Conference concurs in the recommendations of the Special Committee, appointed by the last Conference, in reference to the affairs of the Stanstead Wesleyan College, and requests the President to nominate the Committee, suggested by the Special Committee, whose duty shall be to prepare a memorial to the General Conference on this subject, and to initiate the legislation which may be hereafter deemed necessary for the conformation of title in the General Conference, or in the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada.

Moved by the Rev. Wm. Scott, and seconded by the Rev. G. McRitchie,

That this Conference receives with great satisfaction and gratitude the report of the Secretary-Treasurer and Principal of the Stanstead Wesleyan College, and rejoices to learn that the financial and educational position of the Institution have greatly improved, inspiring confidence and hope for the future. The Conference, therefore, cheerfully adopts the Reports read, and pledges itself to continued sympathy and co-operation for the prosperity and permanency of the Stanstead Wesleyan College.

Moved by the Rev. L. Hooker, and seconded by the Rev. T. C. Williams,

That the kind offices of the members of this Conference in securing patronage, are most respectfully solicited in behalf of Stanstead Wesleyan College, and that the Revs. R. W. Whiting, A. B. Chambers, LL.B.; J. T. Pitcher, A. Campbell, C. R. Flanders, B.A.; Wm. Timberlake, and A. Lee Holmes, B.A., be a Committee, in conjunction with the superintendents of the various Circuits and Missions, to take steps as may secure the desired increase of patronage.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. Douglas, seconded by the Rev. F. H. Bland, and

Resolved,—That the Rev. Charles A. Hanson, who is at present visiting in the Old Country, be authorized to collect subscriptions on behalf of the Stanstead Wesleyan College.

CONFERENCE SERVICES.

Resolved,—That the Sabbath evening of Conference Sunday be given to the preaching of the annual sermon of the Theological Union.

Resolved,—That a meeting for the Promotion of Holiness be held on the Saturday evening of the Conference week.

READING OF STATIONS, ETC.

Moved by the Rev. D. V. Lucas, M.A., and seconded by the Rev. Alex. Campbell,

That this Conference requests the General Conference to change the law respecting the Special Reading of the Stations and Election of Chairmen, so as to make this the last item in the Order of Business of each Annual Conference.

FORMATION OF A NEW CONFERENCE.

Moved by Rev. T. G. Williams, and seconded by the Rev. Wm. Galbraith, LL.B.,

That in view of the rapid development of Manitoba and the North-West, this Conference recommends the General Conference to form an Annual Conference for the management of our Church work in that part of the Dominion of Canada.

FRENCH MISSIONS.

Moved by the Rev. Wm. Scott, seconded by the Rev. L. N. Beaudry, and

Resolved,—That, whereas, the Constitution of the Children's Fund declares that "The claims of children whose fathers are employed on the French, German, and Indian Missions, or in Japan, shall be paid by the Missionary Society," this Conference calls the attention of the Central Board of Missions to this fact, and regrets that the law is not complied with, to the great embarrassment of missionaries labouring on the French District.

Moved by the Rev. Wm. Scott, seconded by Prof. Shaw, and

Resolved,—That as the Rev. L. N. Beaudry may, for the purpose of partial rest, visit some portions of the United States, this Conference authorizes him to receive subscriptions and donations in aid of our French work in Montreal.

EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES.

Moved by the Rev. T. G. Williams, and seconded by the Rev. Geo. McRitchie,

That the General Conference be requested to amend paragraph 167, page 59, of the Discipline, reading thus, "If it be not convenient for the candidate to attend

the District Meeting," &c., &c., so as to read thus, "If the Chairman of the District deems it not convenient for the candidate to attend the District Meeting," &c., &c.

REV. JACOB FRESHMAN.

Whereas,—This Conference learns that our Brother, the Rev. Jacob Freshman, has commenced evangelical labours among the Hebrew people of New York, and, as he feels called upon to work among the 80,000 of his own brethren in that city, we hereby express our hearty sympathy with him in this work of faith, earnestly praying that his labours in the future, as in the past, of his ministry may be abundantly blessed of God. We also commend him to the confidence and generosity of the Christian Churches.

THE NEXT CONFERENCE.

On motion, it was

Resolved,—That the next Annual Conference be held at Ottawa, in the Dominion Methodist Church, to commence at the hour of ten o'clock a.m., on the last Wednesday in May, 1883.

Resolved—That the hearty thanks of this Conference be and are hereby presented to the friends in this city for their princely hospitality, so cordially extended to the ministers of this Conference during our stay at their homes, and that the pastors of the churches be requested to read this resolution to their congregations next Sabbath.

Thanks to the Proprietors of the "Daily Witness."

Moved by Prof. Shaw, seconded by the Rev. L. N. Beaudry,—

Resolved,—That the thanks of this Conference are hereby tendered to the proprietors of the Montreal Witness for supplying the members with copies of the daily issue of said journal during this session.

Thanks to the Montreal Pastors.

Moved by the Rev. R. Wilson, seconded by the Rev. John Davis,—

Resolved,—That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to the pastors of the Methodist Churches in Montreal for their kindness in providing homes for its members during the session.

Standing Resolutions.

Ministers Changing Circuits.

Resolved,—That this Conference requires that every minister changing Circuits be responsible for the pulpit work on the Circuit which he is leaving until after the second Sabbath after the close of the Conference.

Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Financial Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference; it was

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairman to the above resolution.

(3) That this Conference direct the Financial Secretaries to settle with the Treasurers of the several Funds on the basis of the Returns in the District Financial Schedule, and the Treasurer of each fund to affix his signature underneath the total sum, in attestation of its agreement with his account; and that the Statistic Committee compile the returns for the printed minutes from these attested Schedules only.

Treasurer and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary, either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock p. m., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

Chairmen and Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Probationers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Probationers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full Connexion and their ordination are thereby deferred.

The Book-Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those Funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of

the Chairman of each annual District Meeting to make inquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Systematic Beneficence.

Resolved,—That this Conference earnestly recommends each of its Ministers to bring the subject of Systematic Beneficence before the congregation under his charge at least once a year.

Youth of the Church.

Resolved,—That whereas provision is made in the Discipline for the spiritual culture and welfare of the children of our congregations; and, whereas, notwithstanding, in too many instances they are permitted to wander away from the fold to which they legitimately belong, and are either lost in the world or become absorbed in other churches, the claims of the children, as provided for in the Discipline, should be wisely and conscientiously responded to.

French Missions.

Resolved,—That our French Missionaries be required, before taking up or continuing any English work, to obtain the expressed sanction of their own Chairman and the English Superintendent within the bounds of whose Circuit or Mission the proposed work is situated, as well as that of the Chairman of the English District.

Registration in the Province of Quebec.

Resolved,—That the attention of Ministers stationed in the Province of Quebec be respectfully drawn to the observance of all legal requirements in the Registration of Births, Marriages, and Burials, as shown in the Report of Prof Shaw, M.A., and J. Model Deed.

Resolved,—That the attention of Superintendents and Trustees be respectfully drawn to the Report of the Committee on the Model Deed, as found in the Minutes of this Conference, for the year 1878, and that we recommend that Church Property, in the Province of Quebec, be brought under the tenure of the Model Deed for uniformity and correctness of administration of trusts.

COURSE OF STUDY

TO BE

PURSUED BY CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Preliminary—English Branches: English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History (Schmitz'), Modern History (Collier's British Empire). Biblical History: New Testament History (Smith's). Theology: Wesley's Sermons, i. to iii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conferences as Probationers, shall not be lower than fifty per cent., of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a public school teacher's certificate of the second class, or a certificate of having passed a matriculation examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to be examined on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an examination on the subjects of Biblical History and Theology—two and three, Preliminary Course—before the Examining Board of his Conference, or for the College at which he may be pursuing his studies.

First Year.--Biblical Instruction (Angus' Hand-book, Pt.i.); Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament History); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, Chaps. i. v.)

Second Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Watson's Notes on Matthew; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation,

Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii. Chaps i. to xvii.)

Third Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Rhetoric (Whately's); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts ii., Chap. xviii. to the end); Pearson on the Creed.

Fourth Year.—Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts iii. and iv.) Apologetics (Hopkins' Evidence of Christianity; Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Logic (Whately's); Metaphysics, Hamilton (Bowman's American Edition); Stewart's Active and Moral Powers; Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR GRADUATES IN ARTS.

Candidates who have proceeded to a degree in Arts, or who may do so prior to Ordination, shall pursue the following Course of Study:—

Preliminary.—Theology (Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection); Biblical History (Smith's New Testament).

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Part i.); Theology (Fletcher's Checks i. to v.)

Second Year.—Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament); Theology (Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity.

Third Year.—Exegesis (Gospel of Matthew and John in Greek; Wesley's, Watson's, and Whedon's Notes on Matthew and John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., Chaps i. to xvii. inclusive, and Parts iii. and iv.)

Fourth Year.—Exegesis (Epistles to the Romans in Greek;

Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation; Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., Chap. xviii. to the end); Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR PROBATIONERS AT COLLEGE.

All Candidates on Probation, except Undergraduates in Arts, who are recognized by their Annual Conference as such, on being appointed to College, shall pursue the following Course of Study:—

First Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis; the Greek Language; Homiletical Studies; Rhetoric and the English Language; Logic; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies and Elocution; Metaphysics; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Third Year.—Historical Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies; Ethics and Evidences; Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science.

The option allowed in No. 5 each year shall be determined by the Faculty of Theology according to their judgment of the circumstances and ability of the student.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates, before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

Preliminary.—Elements of German Grammar; Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; the Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows:—

First Year.—Jacoby's Compends of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Justification; Kurtz' Sacred History; Webster's General History; Wurst's Grammar.

Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. ii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection; Fletcher's Appeal; Saucer's Church History; Wurst's Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic; Luthard's Apologetics; Harless' Christian Ethics; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the Course of Study.

All Candidates before being recommended to be received on trial for the French work, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects:—

After admission on trial they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows:—

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course

and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year; and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman not later than the second Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and, further, no certificate shall be issued unless the Candidate has reached the passing point of thirty-five per cent. in each subject, and an average of fifty per cent. in all subjects, except in cases where the papers have failed to come to hand.

STANDING REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person before being received as a full Local Preacher shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District

Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meeting shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed for our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conference.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER OUR PASTORAL CARE.

Dearly Beloved,—We again greet you in the name of our common Saviour and Lord. "Grace be with you, mercy and peace, from God the Father, and from the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father, in truth and love." "And this we pray, that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment, that ye may approve the things that are excellent, that ye may be sincere and without offence until the day of Christ; being filled with the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ unto

the glory and praise of God."

In reviewing the records of the year now closed, we have to regret a small decrease in the number of our members; the total membership of our Conference being 22,313, including 478 children under twelve years of age, the decrease on the year being 267. This record, however, does not imply that our spiritual toils during the year have been unblest and unfruitful; it reminds us rather of the vast emigration movement which is taking with it a large number of our members to the Great North-Western Provinces of the Dominion. Yet, instead of regret it should excite devout satisfaction that those fertile regions are now providentially witnessing the rapid extension of British civilization, and of the beneficent institutions of the Church of The growing success of our Missionary undertakings is, indeed, cause for sacred joy, and a source of inspiration and encouragement to our Church to support and prosecute the most vigorous measures for "the spread of Scriptural holiness," not only through our Domestic Circuits and Missions, but also among our French fellow-citizens, the Indian tribes of our country, and the inhabitants of

the Japanese empire.

With reference to our Educational interests, we trust you already realize the importance, in the estimation of our fathers, of education as a powerful agent in furthering the Gospel, and the fact that when the Church has been most active and useful, it has shown the most interest in superior education.

Victoria University, at Cobourg, we are happy to say, has reached a position of honour and influence second to that held by no University in the Dominion. Its graduates adorn all the learned professions and are becoming distinguished in commercial and public life. The need of funds for its more perfect equipment has been felt by many of its friends, and generous contributors are being given to found a chair in philosophy, to be known as the Ryerson Chair, thus honouring the name of a man, who of all the sons of Canada, has exerted the most powerful influence for Christianity, for Methodism, and Education.

The Wesleyan Theological College, in Montreal, is giving evidence of growing influence and usefulness. Its benefactors, with most commendable liberality and enterprise, are placing at the disposal of the Church costly and convenient buildings, for the erection of which ample means have been secured. The Conference, after full consideration of our educational interests, expressed itself in terms of commendation of the efficiency of the Institution, and strongly recommended that with it be incorporated the work of the French Methodist Institute, in Montreal, so far as it relates to the training of candidates for French evangelization.

Our College at Stanstead is showing signs of unabated vigour, and during the past year it was favoured with a larger patronage than before. Its hopeful report will be found elsewhere in our Conference Minutes.

You will, of course, feel interested and deeply gratified,

as we are, by the assurance that our Book and Publishing House in Toronto, with the Branch House in Montreal, has now become more enterprising and successful than ever before. The Christian Guardian exerts its elevating influence in a larger number of homes, and our Magazine and Sabbath-school periodicals are winning a wider patronage. Yet permit us to remind you that it would considerably augment the intelligent piety of our people as a whole, and likewise the usefulness of our Sunday-schools, if our Periodical, Catechisms, and Selected Libraries were still more generally and freely used in our homes and schools.

The righteous dead, who have recently entered the Paradise of God, include some distinguished names that will ever continue embalmed in the heart of our common Methodism. Among ourselves two venerable and beloved ministers have finished their course with joy,—their saintly and useful lives admonishing us all to "lay up for ourselves"

a good foundation against the time to come."

And, now, suffer us to address you as the elect of God, holy and beloved, and to declare our prayerful anxiety that you should apprehend all that for which you have been apprehended of God in Christ. Forget not that the highest dignities and honours pertain to you. In a spiritual and heavenly sense you are to "reign in life by One, Jesus Christ." Thus you are to be "kings and priests unto God." Now it would ill become a potentate of earth to degrade himself by disreputable associations or ignoble pursuits; or a priest to defile himself with sinful habits or courses. you, as Christians, are to avoid all that is low or base or iniquitous, and to walk worthy of your high vocation. the spirit of faith and love you are to be one with Christ, abiding in perpetual union with Him. God, and the "things above," are to be the objects of your daily pursuit and delight. Against all evil powers and influences you are to wage a perpetual warfare; and the promotion of the prevalence of Truth and Righteousness in the earth is to be the grand and ultimate object to which all your time, talents, and

callings are to be made subservient. As Christ's people you are to be associated with them in the enlightenment

and regeneration and elevation of the nation.

Cherishing these sentiments, and with these objects in contemplation, you will see the great importance of securing for your children and for the youth of the country at large a suitable religious education. Secular education is valuable; but incomparably more valuable, as eternity in importance exceeds time, is a truly religious education. Indeed, on this to a very considerable extent depends the future of this rising country, of the Church, and of the world. An education of their nature must be primarily parental; it must be begun and fostered and cultivated greatly within the range of home influence and authority. Next to importance to home culture will be the influences and services of the Church. See to it that your children attend from their earliest days, not only the services of the Sabbath-school, but those of the sanctuary also.

It the day-schools of the country likewise, use all your influence to secure the regular reading of suitable portions of God's precious Word. Co-operate with your fellow Christians of other churches, in promoting a general acquaintance with the Holy Scriptures; practically remembering that nations, like individuals, are to be "born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, even the Word of the

Lord, which liveth and abideth forever."

Then there is the Holy Sabbath, with its rest, and calm, and quiet. How much depends upon its proper and sacred observance! It was made, says Christ, "for man;" for man universally, for man in all ages, to secure for him a day of rest from ordinary toil, and time for Divine worship and religious culture. This precious boon, however, like religious liberty and other inestimable blessings, needs to be guarded with a constant vigilance against the intrusion and demands of secular powers and interests. Attempts are constantly being made by rail-roads and other companies, under pretences of necessity, yet really from motives that

are pecuniary, to press the Sabbath into the service of Mammon. Let all such attempts be opposed by you in every legitimate and proper manner. To this end combine with other churches of the land, and so make your influence In Committees and Boards of Management, as Stockholders and Directors, insist upon the right—that all men, especially the labourers of the country, be allowed and have secured to them this blessed period of rest, the Lord's But while yourselves and families are calling "the Sabbath a delight," a day to be piously and joyously observed, we earnestly trust that your continued appreciation of those means of grace and of spiritual fellowship which distinguish us as a branch of the Church of Christ, will be manifested by a persistent and regular attendance upon the same. Hungering and thirsting after an exalted and habitual "fellowship with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ," and enjoying daily the promised "unction of the Holy One," you will not merely evince a practical disregard and even disrelish for such worldly and dangerous recreations as are condemned by the Discipline of our Church, but you will regularly seek increased spiritual vigour, and supremest satisfaction of soul among "those that are planted in the House of the Lord, and who flourish in the courts of our God."

In closing our address we will remind you of our approaching General Conference, and request your fervent and repeated supplications on its behalf; having in view the legislation required in the interests of our growing Church, and especially in view of the important Union Question, which is already engaging the Christian anxiety and practical sagacity of the leading minds in Canadian Methodism.

"Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and

peace shall be with you."
