Enemy Armies In Danger of Capture Or Destruction by Blotting Russians

Austrians In Flight; Russians Pressing On After Them

Retreat Along Whole Front From Sereth River to the Dniester

Czar's Troops Catch up With Flanks and Cut Deeply in--Possibly Another Sedan--French Win Trenches on the Meuse

New York, Aug. 15.—The London correspondent of the Tribune cables as follows: Von Bothmer is continuing his flight over the whole front, from the Sereth River to the Dniester. The armies of Generals Sakharoff, Letchinsky and Cherbatschiff are drawing closer to the retreating Austrians every hour. Already they have struck at the Austrian flanks along the railroad to Potutory and apparently have cut deeply into the enemy's forces. Today the Russian swept forward across the Ziota Lips at several points, making it perilous position for the Austrians to hold, and pressed southwest from the Sereth district, and northwest from the Stalaslac region. Halitz is now within range of the heavy Russian guns, and the southern part of the southern gateway to Lemberg is expected within a few hours. Military critics here are already discussing the possibility of another Sedan. It is firmly believed that neither Von Bothmer nor Planzer can escape from the Russians with their armies intact, and some observers favor the capture or destruction of the main part of both forces. Reports from unofficial sources say that Von Bothmer has already lost half of his army of 150,000 by the swift flank advances of the Russians immediately after the Stripa line was abandoned. The Russians have now straightened out their lines in front of Halitz, and are closing in on the city rapidly. It was the fall of Halitz to Brusiloff's army at the beginning of the war that enabled Russia to sweep forward and capture Lemberg and observers here look for the same sequence of events.

French Win More Trenches

Paris, Aug. 15.—French troops captured German trenches on a front about 800 yards long, and 100 yards deep, north of the Chapel of Sainte Fize, at the intersection of Fleury and Vaux roads on the right bank of the Meuse, in the Verdun sector, last night, says the war office statement today. On the Somme front, the French artillery was very active at B-loy, Estrees and Lihons. Elsewhere the light was calm.

Official Russian Report

St. Petersburg, Aug. 15.—The rapid Russian advance in Galicia continues. Russian troops are crossing to the western banks of the Zlota Lips, and the Bystritsa-Saletvina, and are advancing along the Upper Stripa. This the war office announced today.

Italians Win Again

Rome, Aug. 15.—On the Carso Plateau and to the east of Gorizia, along the Isonzo front, the Austrians have suffered further reverses at the hands of the Italians, today's official statement says. Austrian entrenchments in both these regions were captured.

What They Think About the Further Duration of the War of Nations

New York, Aug. 15.—A London cable to the World, dated yesterday, says: Despite the prominence given in Belgium as well as in neutral countries to the economic problems after the war and the rapid growth of plans by commercial and banking institutions preparing to meet such problems, Lloyd's brokers are not reducing quotations on the ending of the war in the near future. Ninety per cent (9 to 10) was quoted today on the possibility of its ending by December 31, which was held to be a prohibitive rate, and the possibility of its ending by May or June of next year, was quoted at 40 per cent. (4 1/2 to 10). Information reaching American business concerns here, from representatives in Holland, Scandinavia and other neutral countries, indicates the growing belief that marked consideration of economic matters foreshadows the approaching end of the war, although a majority of the prognostications of the actual date still lean toward the spring of next year. Termination by this November, however, is not a rare speculation. In the meantime, however, neutral business interests are losing no time in perfecting arrangements for the problems after the war.

British Retake Trenches

London, Aug. 15.—Nearly all of the remaining trenches northwest of Pozieres, on the Somme front, in which the Germans gained a footing on Sunday, have been re-taken. The War Office announces this today.

GOOD REASONS FOR HOLDING UP OF THE MAILS

Many Reasons to Traffic in Contraband

SOME INSTANCES GIVEN

Explanatory Statement to United States Precedes More Comprehensive Reply to American Representations, Coming From Great Britain and France

Washington, Aug. 15.—An explanatory statement of how Great Britain's examination of mails is being conducted was presented yesterday to Secretary of State Lansing by the British ambassador. It is preparatory to a more comprehensive reply to American representations now being prepared jointly by the London and Paris foreign offices. Figures given in the statement show that the average time for examination of intercepted mail is from one to three days. The minimum delay to mail between the United States and Holland is given at two days, and the maximum at seven. Danish mails have been delayed from seven to ten days, when it has been necessary to remove them from a ship; otherwise only four days. "It is admitted," says the statement, "that of this entire neutral correspondence in which enemy interests were in no way concerned, was subjected to a (Continued on page 2, seventh column.)"

WORKING ON METHOD FOR PREVENTION OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS

New York, Aug. 15.—Family physicians were advised today by Dr. Abraham Zingher of Willard-Parker Hospital, to try the use of "normal" blood serum obtained from parents, as a method of rendering their children immune to infantile paralysis. Many cases of this disease have been treated in Willard-Parker Hospital during the present epidemic. The theory on which Dr. Zingher and his assistants are working is that the blood of the normal adult contains the anti-bodies which neutralize the virus of poliomyelitis, or infantile paralysis. So physicians believe the presence of these anti-bodies is due to the fact that the parents have had the disease in an unrecognized form. It is said that if the blood serum treatment may prove as effective in preventing infantile paralysis as vaccination is in preventing typhoid. "The treatment is entirely harmless and the experiment is worth trying," said Dr. Zingher.

INDICT DR. ATWOOD FOR MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE

Boston, Aug. 15.—Dr. Eldridge D. Atwood, osteopath, who shot and fatally wounded Dr. Wilfred E. Harris, president of the Massachusetts College of Osteopathy, is accused of murder in the first degree in an indictment returned here.

Canadians Going Into Big Fight

Dominion Troops Taken From Ypres Salient and Transferred to the Somme

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 15.—Canadian troops have been withdrawn from the Ypres salient, after occupying the position for upwards of a year. The salient has not been abandoned, but other British troops have been assigned to its defence of it, while the Canadians have been sent to the Somme district, to assist in the general defence there. Canada has now four divisions at the front, the fourth division, which for several months has been undergoing training in England, has now gone over to France. These arrangements were conveyed in a cable this morning, to the militia department from the minister of militia. It is fully anticipated that the Canadians will now take place with British and Australian troops in the big British offensive in the Somme district. The fourth division is commanded by General David Watson of Quebec.

"I DIDN'T DO IT," SAYS THE KAISER

Disclaims Responsibility For Starting of the War

SAYS HE ACTED IN GOOD FAITH

Strove Hard For Peace, Adds German Ruler, and Says Next Generation Will Be More Just in Apportioning Blame

London, Aug. 15.—(Toronto Mail and Empire cable)—A statement by the German Emperor on the responsibility for the European war is published in the Daily Mail. It is contained in a despatch from Bern, which gives an "impartial neutral" account of an audience with the Kaiser in Berlin. The Kaiser is quoted as saying: "I suppose the British think that I am responsible for this war, even though I am not. It is curious how this theory seems to fascinate my enemies, yet the people who accuse me of having caused the war are the very people who previously testified to the earnestness of my desire for peace. "I do not deny the man who has the responsibility for this war upon his conscience. Let at least, not that man, I think history will clear me of that charge, although I do not suppose history will hold me faultless. "This is a grave, even civilized man in Europe must have a share in the responsibility for this war, and the higher his position the larger his responsibility. I admit that, and yet I claim that I acted throughout in good faith and strove hard for peace, even though war was inevitable. "Why do you neutrals always talk about German militarism and never about Russian despotism or the French craving for revenge or English treachery? I think the next generation will strike a more just balance in apportioning the blame."

ITALIAN DREADNOUGHT AFIRE, BLOWS UP AND SINKS; 300 DROWNED

Fire Spread to One Magazine Before it Could be Flooded—Believed Battleship Can be Re-floated

Paris, Aug. 15.—The Italian dreadnought Leonardo Da Vinci caught fire and blew up in the harbor of Taranto, Italy, and 300 of her crew were drowned, says a Turin despatch to the Petit Journal. The date of the disaster is given only as a day in August. The fire, says the despatch, was discovered in the dreadnought's kitchen and spread rapidly. The captain ordered the magazines flooded and tried to beach the battleship, but one magazine exploded before this could be done. The vessel turned over on her side and a large number of the crew was thrown into the sea. It is believed that the battleship can be righted and refloated.

DEATH KNELL OF AUSTRIA-HUNGARY

Downfall of Empire Looked For, Says Milan Writer

CONTROL FROM BERLIN

Count Andrássy, Who Idolizes Kaiser, is Likely to be Appointed Foreign Minister—Desperate Hour

Milan, Aug. 15.—(By Amice Beaumont in the Toronto Mail and Empire)—A meeting between the German Imperial Chancellor, Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German foreign minister, Dr. Von Jagow, and Baron Burtan, the Austrian foreign minister, in Vienna, will renew rumors of the impending nomination of Count Andrássy as Austrian foreign minister, a move which creates a somewhat transcendent political impression as preparing in the Austrian capital. Count Andrássy represents the party of absolute surrender to Austria to Germany. He idolizes the German emperor and is idolized by him. It is likely that pressure has been brought by Berlin to force the acceptance of Andrássy as foreign minister, as a sort of compromise to the appointment of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg to the command of the Austro-German armies in the east. Thus, if Andrássy is appointed successor to Baron Burtan, it will mean a closer union between Vienna and Berlin. Andrássy has been back and forth between Vienna and Berlin frequently, figuratively speaking, to meet at the feet of the Kaiser. As if to counteract the policy of Andrássy, the Hungarian party of independence, under Karolyi, has received a considerable extension. Numerous addresses pour in from the provincial cities. Vienna papers, on the other hand, deplore Karolyi's movements, and hail the arrival of the German chancellor with delight. These are decisive hours for both the German and Austro-Hungarian empires, says the Neue Freie Presse. The collapse of Austria means the imminent downfall of Germany and therefore Austria-Hungary must be saved at all costs, even at that of handing over its position as well as its military direction to Berlin. Amid it all, one can hear the death knell of the Austro-Hungarian empire sounding.

AMERICAN LAKE AT JORDAN SANITARIUM HAS BEEN COMPLETED

Another Fine Gift From Mrs. Jordan—Cost \$30,000 to \$40,000

The large concrete dam across the Pollet River at The Glades is nearing completion, and the fine artificial lake at the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium will be a reality some time this week. As an experiment the lake was flooded for a day. The erection of the dam, and roadway at its apex, costing \$30,000 and \$40,000, forms another magnificent gift from Mrs. J. C. Jordan, widow of J. C. Jordan, of the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium. The roadway or bridge on the top of the dam is several hundreds of feet in length and while it is not so broad as the ordinary public bridge, its width is sufficient for the passage of a team or automobile. The driveway is heavily railed at either side with concrete posts and heavy metal rods and presents a handsome and substantial appearance.

HON. CHAS. DALTON HONORED BY POPE

Knight Commander of the Order of St. Gregory the Great

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Aug. 15.—By brief dated June 15, Hon. Charles Dalton, member of the provincial government, has been made Knight Commander of the Order of St. Gregory the Great by the Pope. This is the first time the honor has come to the maritime provinces. The reason given for conferring the honor is the charity shown by Sir Charles Dalton in his generous benefactions towards education.

GLORIOUS DAY THIS FOR TORRYBURN PICNIC

St. Peter's and Holy Trinity annual Sunday school picnic is being held today at Torryburn and thousands of people are in attendance. This morning at 8:00 o'clock the children of the Sunday schools assembled and, led by the City Cornet band, marched to the Union station, where they boarded a train for the picnic grounds. The children in their picnic attire and carrying flags of the allies presented a pretty appearance as they marched to the station. Trains left at 10 o'clock, 12:30 o'clock and 2:30 o'clock, and all were filled to capacity. The last train took the largest crowd to the picnic grounds. At 7:30 o'clock this morning a special took members of the committee and a box car filled with refreshments to the grounds, and when the children arrived on the scene everything was in readiness for them.

Wilson to Bid For Votes On Ground That he Has Kept United States Out of War

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 15.—The issues upon which President Wilson will base his fight for re-election were outlined by Secretary of War Baker to members of the democratic county central committee at a convention here last night. He specifically told them those were the arguments they could advance in behalf of the president. Keeping the United States out of the war, he said, is to be the principal claim of President Wilson for re-election. "The fact we are at peace," said Baker, "is to be the greatest argument of all to President Wilson." The other issues are composed for most part of the democratic legislative accomplishments. As outlined by Baker they are: The Federal reserve bank to the rural credits bill, amendment to ship registry act, the Underwood tariff bill, preparedness policy, and the child labor bill, now pending in congress.



The Second Great Crisis of the War

New German Drive, Sharpened by Spur of Desperation, Expected Before Long; If It Does Not Come Then Her Own People Must Realize War is Lost

(By Frank H. Simons in New York Tribune) The time has perhaps arrived when it is wise to recall that so far in the history of the present conflict insufficient and one-sided views of several situations have contributed to leading the mass of observers in all camps into very grave errors. For example, in the earliest days of the war, after the Allied defeat at silence, the world actually had nothing to go by but the German official reports, which, naturally interpreted the overwhelming and almost incredible sequence of German hope and expectation. Between the Battle of Charleroi and the decision at the Marne, there was absolutely no light from Allied sources.

WHAT'S NEW AT THE MOVIES

IMPERIAL SHOWS FOUR FAMOUS STARS

"The Prince Chap" a Splendid Production by Big Folk of Stage; Edward Peeples' Noted Story

Since it is impossible for the finite to be perfect, it may be said at the start that "The Prince Chap" in pictures has points of minor importance, but these are certainly lost sight of as one assembles in mind's eye the many fine points of the photoplay.

The adaptation by Gibson Willets, of Edward Peeples' story at the Imperial, affords a tale in which the hero's innate kindness of heart on various occasions causes the outpouring of good will for him from the spectators, while scenes of pathos and deep heart interest are intermingled with touches of humor and broad comedy that keep the mind well balanced between the grave and the gay.

The story is one of split, and the close brings a sense of happiness, because one is convinced that faith and the right have triumphed in the main.

Mr. Marshall Neilan has succeeded well in conveying the atmosphere of the London studio, in which William Peyton (Prince Chap) has struggled for recognition as a sculptor.

That concert in the den of Runion, the piece of driftwood which has seduced on the position of valet to stay its wanderings, is so fine a scene that one carries it away with him. The arrival of Phoebe Puckers (the maid of all work) at the Rodney studio, to assist the over-worked housekeeper, is quite a comedy event, but the introduction to Peyton and his model while they are at work in the studio is a screen.

The contrast between the quarters of Prince Chap as a struggling sculptor and those in which we find him when luck turns and his pile is coming in, as shown by Director Neilan, will attract the observation of all. The elegance of the interiors of his home, in his days of affluence, shows the refinement of art, just as the interior of the old quarters showed art in the nude.

The acting of every one in the cast deserves praise. The hairdresser appeared as the mother of Claudia (the heroine of the story) and afterwards as that young lady when about eighteen years old. The first was a trying role, but—artist that she is—Miss Charlson was always the time-worn-out wife and mother. No need saying that her Claudia is a beautiful, lovable girl, manifesting at various times the lack of a mother's over-care in her up-bringing.

Beattie Eytton's Alice Travers is another well-drawn character. Miss Eytton shows that Alice really loved the Prince Chap, as much as her shallow heart would permit; but her love was not strong enough to resist idle talk or the wealth of another suitor.

George Fawcett's Runion is a big hit of the photoplay. Runion is never permitted to see the Prince Chap, but he is in the role of valet, in Mr. Fawcett's artistic care. Whether it be in his gentle "caring" of Phoebe Pucker when he finds her blowing on his beloved foot, or peeping through the keyhole of Prince Chap's studio and receiving a splutter of ink in his eye for the liberty, or ironing the undergarment of Baby Claudia while that young scamp hid her dimpled anatomy within a large vase until the lingerie was ready, he always delighted. The baby actress made a sure hit with everybody. She was "simply dear" as the ladies say nowadays.

THE CANADIAN RED CROSS DEPT. AT SHORNCLIFFE CAMP

The chief Canadian Red Cross warehouse is located in London, but a depot is also located at Shorncliffe, in a strategic position in the midst of a great hospital area. From Shorncliffe thirty hospitals in Kent have received Canadian Red Cross supplies according to their needs. Almost all of them have wounded Canadian patients. A new recreation room is being erected at Moore Barracks Hospital, and the wards are supplied with flowering plants and ferns. With the consent of the War Office a private home has been erected for outside

Russian Sweep Continues; Last Of Austrian Landsturm Called Out

Petrograd, Aug. 14, via London, 6.50 p. m.—The retreat of the Austrians from the Strips continues, with the Russians pounding the Austrian rear guard. Podgiczy, on the Koropiec, has fallen, and General Count Von Bothmer's forces are taking up positions on the west bank of the Zlota Lips.

The line of the Austrian defence, as it appears today, runs from Resestek through Sheurovits and Stahatavzky, along the head waters of the Styr, northwest of Brody, and through Olesko-Zhoroff to Bressany, forming a zig-zag to the upper Zlota Lips; along that stream to Koszow, ten miles above its junction with the Dniester; thence west to Jasopol, at the mouth of the Bystrizza-Maidan, ten miles northwest of Stanislau, thence south to Solovins, ten miles northwest of Nadvorna.

In other words, the Austrians, contracting the circle about Lemberg, are withdrawing to a line between the Carpathians and the Pinsk marshes, the short length of which will compensate them, in some measure, for the tremendous losses they have suffered since the beginning of the Russian advance. Military critics look for the eventual withdrawal to the line of Kaniouka, Lemberg, Mikuloff and Strjz as their logical line of defence.

The surrender of Mirampol by the Austrians has enabled General Letchitzky to straighten the front of his advance toward Halicz, this now forming an almost direct east and west line only seven miles from that town at the nearest approach.

The Red, in its summary of prisoners and booty taken by the Russians during last week's operations, estimates that 83,200 men and 1,720 officers were captured and sixty-nine guns and 342 machine guns and bomb-throwers taken by General Letchitzky.

New York, Aug. 14.—A Berne, Switzerland, despatch to the Journal says: "That the Austro-Hungarian armies have been seriously crippled by their losses on the Russian and Italian fronts is evidenced by Vienna despatches which announced today that Hungarian Landsturm forces of all years from 1885 to 1897, inclusive, have been ordered to report for active service on August 28. This call will furnish a reinforcement of 275,000 men.

Petrograd, via London, August 14, 11.14 p. m.—Continued gains for the Russians in the Sereth river region and along the Zlota Lips, where their troops have crossed at several points to the western bank, and the capture of the village of Yustobaby, northwest of the Dniester, are chronicled in the official Russian statement, issued this evening.

Plan For Solving Housing Problem Outlined

H. C. Hocken, Former Mayor of Toronto, Says That Building of Two-Flat Houses is the Solution of the Matter

"My plan for solving the problem of housing was to have the city build two-flat houses, their erection and administration to be under a Department of Municipal Housing, formed as a branch of the city government."

This was the solution to the housing problem advocated by H. C. Hocken, a former mayor of Toronto, and given in an interview to a Halifax Chronicle reporter.

"As you probably know," continued Mr. Hocken, "the population of Toronto doubled in eight years, between 1909 and 1914. This great increase in population brought its problems in its wake, the greatest of which was the housing question. After discussing many schemes we had a housing commission appointed, with certain powers granted by the provincial government. I cannot say it was as successful as we desired, yet it did make some remedy. For instance, it provided much better living conditions in those houses it erected, but the rents were little less, for the houses were very substantially built, and the equipment was of the best. Three rooms with all modern improvements, and the cost of heating for a charge of \$17 a month."

"As the problem stands today in Toronto, the war settled it, at least temporarily. Today, however, rents are higher in Toronto than in any city in America. In an effort to reduce the cost, many houses are occupied by two families.

"My plan for solving the problem was to have the city build two-flat houses. Have a department of municipal housing formed as a department of civic government, have it put in charge of a capable commissioner who would be right on his job. I made this proposal after I had studied the question extensively in many cities of the continent. The head of the department of the city of New York city said it was the most feasible way if we had an honest government. This plan would be to rent the house to be rented as a net rental, with a charge sufficient to meet expenditure on capital amortization and depreciation. However, the scheme did not carry with the council. There were reasons, one of which was the increased cost of labor and materials about that time. Having that in view influenced me in favor of the two-flat house idea, as that meant virtually two rentals from one house. Our idea was to erect a house the rent

of which would not be over one week's wages for the man earning \$2.00 or \$3.50 a day. These houses would not have been erected to house dissolute, idle and improvident people, but to help the hard working, honest man whose capacity is not above the labor which pays only \$2.00 or \$3.50 a day.

"The other idea I had of solving this problem was to get the people out of the city by a system of rapid transit. In this connection I advocated the building of subways. The scheme, of course, becomes yearly more feasible, and necessary owing to the growth of the city and the increasing congestion of the streets, also to the fact that the franchise to the present street railway company expires in five years' time, when we shall consider ways and means of improving our transportation system.

"The city has already purchased about two hundred acres of land about three-quarters of a mile outside of the boundaries to the present street railway company. This idea was to build for rental or sale. The sale of the house would be credited to his purchase and when the value of the house had been paid a deed in full would be given him.

BY-LAW MATTERS

James Rodgers was before the court this morning on a charge of allowing his horse to stand in German street for a longer period than permitted by law. Police Constable Journey said the horse was threatening to bite and kick at passers by. The court imposed a fine of \$10 but it was allowed to stand.

Capt. Hurley, operating the tug H. S. Gregory & Sons, was reported for docking a scow at the Carville wharf without the permission of the harbor master. Captain Hurley said that he saw the scow drifting about the harbor one Sunday night about three weeks ago and to protect life and property he went out and brought it in. He said that he had permission from the commissioner of harbors and ferries to leave the scow there and he did so. He was informed that the harbor master must be consulted. COMMITTED TO CARE OF CHILDREN'S AID

The three children who were taken from a hotel near Loch Lomond road last week and whose mother was placed in the Municipal Home, were today committed by Judge Ritchie to the care of the Children's Aid Society.

Rev. W. B. Robinson conducted the case for the society, and also testified to the condition of the home and its inmates, and the painful evidences of want and neglect. Similar evidence was given by County Constable Saunders and Frederick Cunard. The mother herself admitted that she and her children had been in the Municipal Home, and were taken out two years ago by the officials who has also been brought to that institution, and who, it turns out, is her brother. She also testified that she does not know where her husband is and that she had not received any help from him for many weeks. The mother said that the children could not go to school or church because they had no proper clothing, and that she had no visible means of support.

Mrs. Milligan testified to the very filthy and neglected condition of the children when they were brought to the Children's Home, where they are now happily living.

LETTER FROM SERGT. SELMES

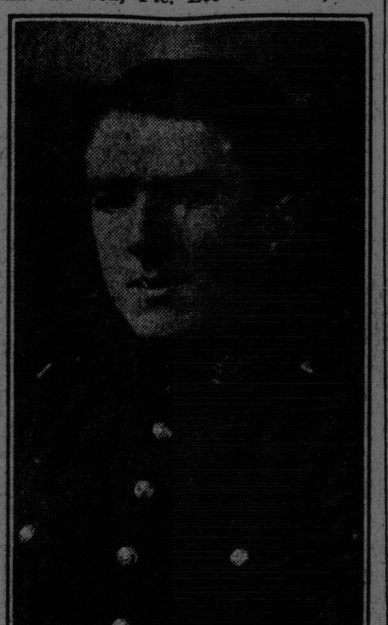

JURY PLACES BLAME FOR THE FATALITY

Find Steamship People Partly Responsible For Double Drowning at Salmon River

An inquest was held last evening at Chipman by Coroner Nugent, into the circumstances surrounding the drowning of Moses R. Brown and Charles Carle, who met their death on Saturday morning in the waters of the Salmon River. Several witnesses were examined, including the officers and deck hands of the steamer May Queen, and also three Chipman passengers who witnessed the accident. The findings of the jury was as follows:

"That the two men, Moses Brown and Charles Carle, came to their death partly through the carelessness and negligence of the owners and employees of the steamer May Queen. And we strongly recommend that in future some responsible person give the signals when making boat stops."

It was said that when the two men were seated in the row boat in which Carle was killed, the signal to start the steamer was given before the small boat was clear and as the May Queen started ahead her steps struck the row boat occupied by the two men and upset them both into the water.

The May Queen was allowed to sail this morning from Chipman as usual, and met between five and six o'clock at Indiantown.
