CARGO OF GAS OIL GOES TO MONTREAL

Shipment of Million and Half Gallons Being Unloaded From Tanker

MONTREAL, Sept. 11 — For the first time since the Sun Oil Company, Limited, became established in Canada, they are bringing in a cargo of gas oil for general distribution in Mon-treal. The oil tanker Dixiano arrived on Wednesday morning from Marcus Hook refinery in Delaware Bay, Pa., and is now unloading a cargo of a million and a half gallons at Sec-

tion 34. The Sun Oil Co., Ltd., have recently leased the 2,250,000-gallon tankage space of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power plant at Hochelaga, and will make distribution from there in addition to their own tankage space on St. Patrick street, where oil is unloaded

from cars.
Several years ago the company brought up cargoes for special customers, but this oil, which is suitable for Several years ago the company brought up cargoes for special customers, but this oil, which is suitable for use in oil furnaces, is the first carried here for general distribution.

In anticipation of the growing demand for gas oil, a motor tanker is now on the ways at Chester, Pa, being built specially for the Canadian subsidiary company. It will have a length of 251 feet, a breadth of 41 feet and is to be an ocean-going vessel capable of carrying 20,000 barrels of oil. Should the ship be launched within the next two months, it is expected that she will make her first trip to Montreal before the Close of navigation. In any case the Dixiano is scheduled to make one more trip to scheduled to make one more trip to this port during the season. The home company has a fleet of tankers with tonnage aggregating some 150,000 tons, but these boats are being kept continually in operation on other routes. making necessary the construction a tanker for the Canadian trade.

Millions of Women are Martyrs to the Idea That Every Woman Must Be Beautiful-Is There None to Arise and Proclaim Her Equal Right With Men to Be Comfortable-and Homely?

Except the snake in the grass that chivvied Mother Eve out of Eden and lost woman her first good home, the greatest enemy the female sex has ever had is the individual who first promulgated the theory that every woman must be beautiful whether she is or not and that she can work a miracle and make her-self into a Lillian Russell if she tries hard enough.



MILLIONS of women have been martyrs to this idea. Millions are still suffering in colls of it. Every day millions of women go through agonies to save their complexions that would entitle them to cannonization if it were done to save their souls. The starving Armenians suffer no more gnawing pangs of hunger than do multitudes of rich women striving to maintain that girlish figure.

shop, with its permanent-waving instruments, its sweat-boxes, its reducing machines, its face-liftings and skinnings, its
manicure tables and so on, where the

painful of all—pay out good money for the privilege of enduring
sufferings that should give them seats among the cherubim and
seraphim on high, but that only enables them to get by down here
below.

FOR, alas, unless nature makes you a good-looker there is precious little you can do to help yourself. Yet women go on trying to achieve the impossible of being beautiful though homely, for it is sadly true that woman's one best bet is beauty. It is the one thing she can depend on to earry her smoothly over the rough places of life and atone for and excuse all other lacks and shortcomings.

Of course, this is the fault of men. Men make the most in-

THE pretty woman never has to struggle for her rights. Privileges are presented to her on a silver salver. No handsome woman has to stand in a crowded car. If she is a beauty she could have a whole cross-section if she wanted it, while the men stood and beamed on her. But if by chance a man gets up and gives his seat to an ugly woman he does it with an expression that indicates he feels that he deserves the Victoria Cross for heroic

Talk about men's rights. There is no other right that women envy so persistently and entirely and sincerely as the right to be as ugly as nature made them and to look as old as they really are.

THE right to vote falls into innocuous desuctude beside the blessed privilege of not having to be straight-fronted when you are built on the bay-window type of architecture, and the freedom of a latch key is as nothing beside the giorious freedom of throwing away curling irons and crimping pins and wearing the straight locks with which it has pleased an inscrutable Providence to afflict you.

The worst phase of this injustice, however, appears in society. Ugliness is no bar to a man's popularity or success. It is a fatal handicap to a woman. Yet the homely and the beautiful are endowed with just the same desire for pleasure and love-making.

THE girl with the pale-green freckles and carrotty hair and a snub nose is just as anxious to be amused and entertained and sought after as is her brother similarly endowed. But there is this difference: that, while no man, except upon compulsion, will dance with her or ask her to stroll in the moonlight, brother is received with effusive welcomes everywhere, and so long as he is agreeable no girl thinks of discriminating against him because he doesn't look like a matinee hero.

Nobody can imagine a fat woman with a bald head, being in

nobody can imagine a fat woman with a bald head being in eager request as a partner at balls and parties. Nobody ever saw a crowd of young men hanging around an angular spinster and basking in her smiles.

Yet we continually see women displaying the most undisguised pleasure in the society of such men, and rightly, because a fat middle-aged man or a freckled-faced youth may have charms of wit and soul that would make an Adonis sink into insignificance.

EVEN after marriage the same difference is apparent. Nobody ever hears of a middle-aged man being massaged for wrinkles or physical cultured for scrawniness in order to retain the affections of his middle-aged wife, but the country is full of classes of pathetic matrons solemnly hopping around on one foot or religiously turning handsprings in order to keep young and sylphlike for some John who doesn't care a rap how he looks to them.

And the quintessence of this foolishness is reached when it is demanded that even professional women must have beauty as well as brains! With a man, achievement suffices. Nobody cares whether Chief Justice Taft has a straight-front figure or President Coolidge is a snappy dresser or not; but if they were women, in order to satisfy the public taste, they would have to wear reducing girdles and set the fashion in clothes.

THE beauty cult is the banner injustice to the world, and the woman who first arises and proclaims women's equal rights with man to be comfortable and ugly will be the female Moses who will lead her sex into the promised land of freedom.



NEW YORK, Sept. 11-Bequests to aritable institutions aggregating near-\$4,000,000, were made in the will of Mrs. Annie C. Kane, widow of John Kane, filed for probate in the Surrogate's office. In addition to these specific bequests the residue of the estate, the value of which does not appear in the document, is left to the executors for distribution to charities as they may determine. The only bequests to relatives, except family portraits, personal effects, and real estate at Bar Harbor, are \$100,000 each to two cousins, Fannie Marie Cottenet and Rawlins Lowndes Cottenet. Real estate at Bar Harbor, with house furnishings and objects of art, goes to Peter Augustus Jay, nephew of John I. Kane. Two bequests to Columbia University \$500,000 each are provided for, the first being a permanent fund in mem-ary of Mrs. Kane's father, William C.

Schemerhorn, to be used for religious instruction, and the second an outright gift without limitation as to its use by the trustees.

The Home for Incurables, Third avenue and 181st street, likewise gets \$1,000,000, on condition that a part be devoted to the erection of a building for the treatment of incurable cases
