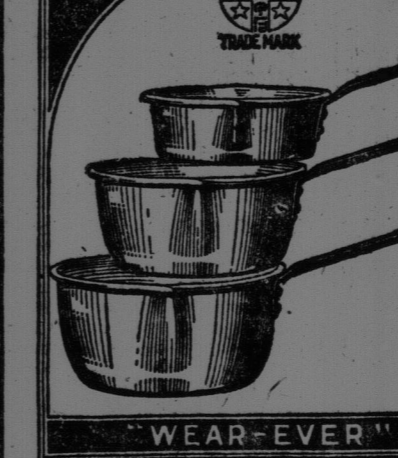

THE EXCHANGE RATE

VI.—What Controls It? WE have already dealt with the principal Trade factors governing the Exchange Rate, and we now come to the influence of the Inflation of the Currency.

Before the great war, it was universally accepted that a paper currency should have behind it a very substantial gold (or silver) reserve. The purpose of this reserve was to admit of the redemption of paper currency on demand.

Canada made less use of this method than most of the belligerent countries, but the percentage of notes issued against the amount of the gold reserve held has risen considerably.

In the United States, the proportion of notes issued to reserve held did not rise to the same extent, and the comparison is one of the factors in the world valuation of our respective currencies.

Next week in article No. VII we will deal with a second war measure which has had an important effect on the Exchange Rate, namely, the Restriction on the Export of Gold.

STINNES ENTERS SUIT IN NEW YORK

Seeks to Force Buying Agent in United States to Render Statement.

New York, Nov. 12.—Hugo Stinnes, Germany's Rockefeller, and a former member of the German cabinet, has entered a complaint in equity in the United States district court for an accounting against Harvey Allan Miller, a British subject.

Stinnes' complaint was entered through his attorney, former Judge Walter S. Noyes. It charges that Miller had contracted in December, 1919, the purchase of coal and metals in the United States for

shipment to Europe, for Stinnes' corporation. Miller, the complaint said, was to receive 25,000 and one-third of the net profits of the transactions.

Miller, the action charges, had repudiated the contract, and, although he had done more than \$500,000 worth of business, no accounting had been made to Stinnes. A balance of \$500,000 had been deposited in the National City bank of New York to carry on the business, it was alleged.

Justice Mayer granted a temporary injunction tying up the funds in the bank until a hearing could be had.

TOUCH OF WINTER
Eighteen Above Zero and 36 to 44-Mile-an-Hour Blow.
With a northerly gale blowing from thirty-six to forty-four miles an hour, and the mercury down to eighteen above zero, citizens this morning got their first taste of real winter weather. Following the rain storm yesterday afternoon, the mercury began to drop and during the early part of the night there was a light snow fall. Later it cleared, but high winds prevailed and continued throughout the day. For the first time this season windows throughout the city were frosted over this morning.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL
Doctor's Evidence on Charge Against Arthur T. Merritt in Cutting Case.
A case against Arthur T. Merritt, charged with cutting, wounding, and doing grievous bodily harm to Charles Thompson, was resumed in the police court this morning and after the evidence of Dr. Edward Campbell of the St. John General Hospital, was given the accused was committed for trial. Dr. Campbell said there were four wounds, one on the left arm about two inches long, cut into the muscles, two on the back, one of which was only a scratch about four inches long, and the other four inches long and about four inches deep, cut slanting. A wound between the ribs under the left arm was very serious as the instrument had pierced the lung near the heart, but all the wounds healed without complications, and the injured man was discharged from the hospital in about ten days. On cross-examination the doctor said it would be possible but not probable that a man could sustain the wounds described by falling on a sharp instrument by reason of his position. The magistrate suggested that it would be possible if he had fallen on a "spike narrow."

FOR AIR FORCE
Lieutenant Stewart Here Next Week to Enlist Mechanics.
Lieut. F. S. E. MacRae, Canadian air force representative of New Brunswick, today received a wire from Lieutenant Stewart, Charlottetown, saying that he will arrive here on Tuesday to recruit mechanics for the service. The period of enlistment will be for four years, and twice during that time the men will train for twenty-eight days at Camp Borden. Speaking of the service Lieutenant MacRae says it is planned to have five companies of mechanics in the Canadian and British air forces are being recruited to join and many have already done so. They will use the Bristol fighter, the Curtiss, the Camels and the Sopwith machines.

RECALLS OTHER TIMES.
The proposal to erect a school building in King square, Carleton, recalls the fact that three times in the history of the city an effort was made to utilize for other purposes land set apart for permanent open spaces. In 1784 the erection of a church on the corner of what is now the old burial ground, opposite the court house, was begun. The church frame was up, but a brick fire spread that way and burned it, and the building was not erected. Many years ago people interested in property in Elliot row tried to get a street through the old burial ground, but it was voted down, as was the proposal to build there a temperance hall.

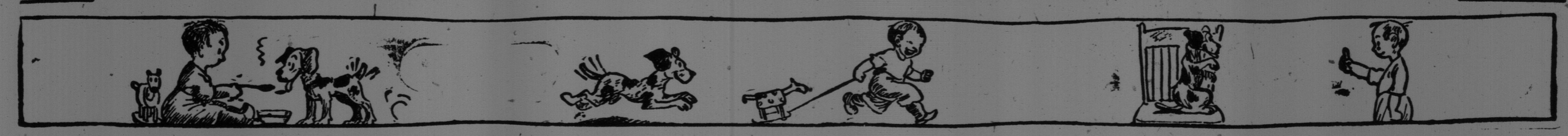

**THE TEXTILE MILLS
NOW AT CAPACITY**

Deny Rumors of Cancellation
of Orders or Discharge of
Employees.

Montreal, Nov. 13.—Whatever may be the case across the border, it was stated today to The Globe on the highest authority, by officials connected with two of the largest textile companies in Canada, that the various mills of both industries are at the present time working to capacity, with prospects for future business altogether encouraging.

Reports recently current have been to the effect that the cotton companies have for some time past been receiving large cancellations of orders and have been discharging many employees from the mills as the result of the lack of demand for the products. Both these

rumors were categorically denied by the two officials referred to.

"There is not a vestige of truth in either report," said one of these today. "We are neither getting nor accepting cancellations, and all our mills are working to capacity. Several of them, in fact, have been put on night shifts in order to catch up with the business already booked, which is of sufficient magnitude to keep us busy at top production for months to come."

Outlook Entirely Satisfactory.

"Our travellers have just started out for the usual spring business, and although it is yet too early to gauge the demand for textile products for 1921, delivery, the outlook is entirely satisfactory. Our new schedules went into effect November 1, and are moderately under existing ones, and we are confident that the new prices will be well received by the trade generally."

"As to discharging help in large numbers, there is absolutely no truth in this. We have been able, however, to cut out some of our inefficient workmen engaged during the war period when

we were unable to pick and choose in this respect, but these have been replaced, by experienced hands. Only recently, in fact, we brought out some eighty skilled operators from the English cotton districts, in order to facilitate greater production at our mills, and in the effort to lower costs. There has been no reduction in the wages paid our workers, and there is no present indication that one will be put into effect."

The conditions described by this official were borne out by enquiry at another textile manufacturing industry, an official of which stated that all the company's plants were working to capacity.

There was also reported to be good demand for lines sought in the Christmas retail trade, with nearly deliveries of new orders difficult to secure.

LOOKING FOR WORK.

Sussex Record.—The lumber situation remains unchanged and the prospects are that there will not be very extensive operations carried on this winter. The labor market is very slack, many men offering for work in the woods are unable to obtain employment in this line.

**CANADA AS INTERPRETER
BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN
AND THE UNITED STATES.**

New York, Nov. 12.—The position of Canada as the link which holds firm the bonds of friendship between Great Britain and the United States was emphasized by Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador at Washington, in an eloquent speech delivered at a dinner given in his honor by the Canadian Club of New York at the hotel Biltmore tonight.

"Canada has by force of circumstances the duty and privilege of being the interpreter of Britain to the United States, and of the United States to Britain," said Sir Auckland, Canada's great deeds and achievements having predestined her to be the leader in securing cordiality between her partners and her neighbors. In a glowing tribute to the Dominion he declared that Canada could not fall in this great task.

"Read the manner of men Canadians are," he said, "and you will never associate the idea of failure with their national effort."

**"UNITED STATES IS NOT
AT WAR WITH RUSSIA."**

Washington, Nov. 13.—The United States has definitely informed the Entente powers that it will not, under any circumstances participate in the blockade against Soviet Russia that has been instituted.

Following this announcement Sir

Auckland Geddes, the British Ambassador, paid a long visit to Secretary of State Colby. The reason given the ambassador for the stand taken by the department, it is understood, is that "the United States Government is not at war with Russia."

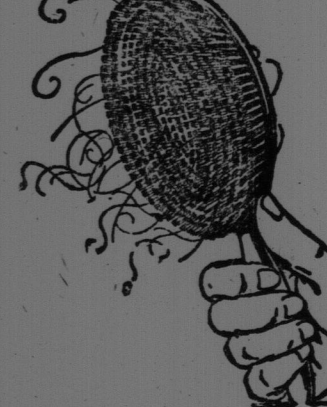

MURDER TO GET MONEY FOR ORGIES

Confessions of Cold-Blooded Slaughter of David S. Paul Are Reported.

Camden, N. J., Nov. 12.—More than \$5,000 was spent in five days for gay parties in Philadelphia by Raymond W. Schuck and Frank J. James after they killed and robbed David S. Paul, Camden bank messenger, according to Prosecutor Wolverton, of Camden County, who has made public additional details of the alleged confessions of the two men. Wolverton announced that \$4,600 of the \$40,000 in cash stolen from Paul was found in a bookcase at James' home in this city. The remainder, more than \$30,000 was buried in two packages at the head and foot of the grave of Schuck's mother and has been recovered the prosecutor said.

Schuck, according to the alleged confession, buried the money in Evergreen cemetery on October 11, six days after he and James, riding with Paul in a motor car in Camden, killed the aged messenger in order to make a better financial showing among their friends. "Getting the money from the grave," said Prosecutor Wolverton, "was one of the weirdest experiences I ever had. Schuck sat beside the man at the wheel of our motor car directing us where to go. When we came to the cemetery there was a hole where the money had been put, and for a moment we thought it was gone.

"Then we brought up two packages, one wrapped in newspaper, the other in plain brown paper and bound with tire tape. "When they buried the money they had sunk a flower pot over the place. Some one had dug up the flower pot, never dreaming that nearly \$35,000 in cash rested beneath."

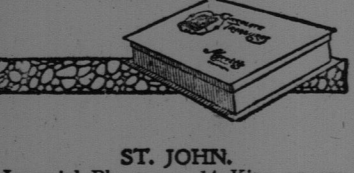
Prosecutor Wolverton said James and Schuck who are locked up in the Burlington County jail would be brought to trial in Camden as it had been established that all the blows which killed the messenger had been struck in this county. The men probably will be removed to the Camden prison today, he added. Both prisoners are married. James, who is 37 years old, was a motor car salesman. Schuck is 32 and was supervisor for a telephone company here. The alleged confessions were identical on most all important points, the officials say. Schuck, however, dis-

claims responsibility for the slaying of Paul, declaring he was forced into the plot by James, who Schuck says, according to the police, beat Paul to death. James in his confession is quoted as saying that each plotted and planned the killing and robbery long before they executed it. Schuck is alleged to have said that James after slaying the messenger also forced him at the point of a pistol to drive to Tabernacle where the body was thrown into a creek. Two days later,

Schuck declared, according to the police, that James compelled him to make another trip to the Jersey pine belt, when the body was dragged from the stream and buried in a shallow grave deep in the forest, where it was found by hunters on October 16. Schuck and James, Prosecutor Wolverton said had a bungalow at Clementon, N. J., known as "Lollypop Cottage" where they were in the habit of entertaining parties of men and women. As these parties grew larger and more expensive, he added, they found it necessary to provide themselves with more money and accordingly planned the slaying and robbery of Paul, with whom both were well acquainted. The night of the killing the prosecutor declared, the two men had a party with some women in Philadelphia. The next day they met several other women, said Wolverton, and for five days they were with girls in Philadelphia, drinking and spending money lavishly.

CAUGHT IN CITY OF "THE LIVING BUDDHA"

Dozen Americans to Try to Rescue Two Comrades from Tribesmen.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Urga, the Mongolian city famous as the home of "The Living Buddha," is the centre of an outbreak which, according to official advice, has reached serious proportions, the lives of foreigners, among them two Americans, being in danger. The two Americans are named Mills and McLaughlin, both of them in the employ of the Mongolian Trading Company.

The uprising in Urga is the result of a combined attack on the city by Russians, Buriats and Mongols. Urga is the capital of Outer Mongolia. According to State Department advice, Chinese soldiers were reported to be looting Russian residences in Urga. The telegraph wires have been cut and the city is now without means of communication with the outside world.

Friends of Mills and McLaughlin are to organize a rescue party and have taken up with the American legation in Peking the matter of obtaining permission from the Chinese government for the party to proceed at once to Urga. The party so organized consists of twelve men, all Americans. They are armed and have provided themselves with a motor conveyance. It is not known what action the legation has taken on their request for

permission to proceed to the rescue of Mills and McLaughlin. They would base their operations on Kalgan, on the Great Wall of China, and near the southern border line of Mongolia.

The American legation has already represented to the Chinese government the perils of Mills and McLaughlin and made urgent demand that the Chinese government afford every possible protection to them.

Urga is the holy city of Buddhists of Mongolia, and is the home of the head

of the church, who is known as the "Living Buddha." It is one of the most isolated cities in the world. The Buriats concerned in the outbreak are a mongrel tribe inhabiting Siberia near Lake Baikal.

9,000 BODIES OF AMERICAN SOLDIERS SENT HOME

Paris, Nov. 12.—Nearly 9,000 bodies of American soldiers who died in France during the war have been shipped to the United States and turned over to their nearest relatives, and 1,000 more await shipment at French ports. It is announced by the United States Graves Registration Service. The work of removing the bodies of fallen Americans will be completed by next Summer, and plans have been formulated for materially increasing the working staffs and facilitating operations. Nearly 60 per cent. of all the bodies of American officers and enlisted men buried in French soil will be returned to the United States, according to recent estimates. At frequent intervals parents and widows of dead soldiers have come to France to remove their remains, but upon seeing the cemeteries taken of the extreme care which has been given to them have decided upon France as the final resting place for the fallen. The exhumation of bodies within the zone began on Sept. 15 and since then work has been completed in sev-

HAVANA COLLECTS CROWD OF THIRSTY

Americans, Attracted by Lure of Intoxicants, Flock to the Cuban Capital.

Havana, Oct. 26.—(Associated Press correspondence)—About the only persons seen in the streets of Havana who show symptoms of over-indulgence in intoxicants are Americans. This does not mean, however, that all the Americans who come here drink to excess. Beer and light wines are so much a part of the Latin life that it has no intoxicating effect. They drink moderately. But some visitors from the dry states seem to drink constantly, once they get to a bar.

To Americans, however, the most disagreeable and sickening picture is the obo from home, a hopeless, wretched creature that infests hotel lobbies. His anhandling is brazen. He picks out people speaking his own tongue, and without shame boldly announces that he wants money for drinks. He long ago discarded the appeal for help to get the shirt from the laundry. Most of these unfortunates did not allow the flag; they followed the whiskey trail, generally as stowaways in ship crews; they deserted, once within swimming distance of the docks, but for passport regulations, Havana office authorities say, there would be undred here from the states with a hirst and no visible means of support. Cuba happens to be the nearest "foreign country" to the states, and government officials here declare that much of the growing travel is due to the fact that the island isn't dry. It is a big item of revenue, and has helped to put up prices for everything.

ALLS THROUGH ROOF CHASING THIEVES

Policeman Leaps Off N. Y. Elevated Structure and Smashes Glass Portico.

(New York Times) Persons at the Desbrosses Street station of the Ninth Avenue elevated witnessed an exciting chase of five alleged knoekets by a special policeman at 11 yesterday. They saw the "special" plunge through a dust-covered portico he mistook for one of coated iron, after four of the men had been captured by crossing the elevated tracks. Thomas Jordan, the special officer employed by the Interborough, removed to Volunteer Hospital suffering from concussion of the brain.

A man, who said he was Joseph Weiss of 126 West Forty-seventh Street, alleged to have been one of the five, was captured after he had crossed the tracks on away. It was while he was attempting to get to the street from the north-bound side of the station ahead of the fleeing men that Jordan jumped from the "L" structure to the roof he thought would hold his weight. He fell about twenty feet in front of 448 Greenwich Avenue.

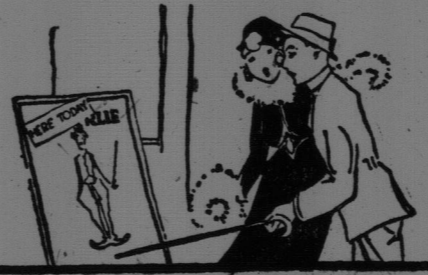

**SUGGESTIONS RE
HOME RULE BILL
ADMINISTRATION**

**Ulstermen's Proposed Amend-
ments to Financial Terms—
Expect Their Parliament to
be Set Up Soon.**

Dublin, Oct. 26.—(Associated Press Correspondence)—The Irish parliament at Belfast for the six northeast counties is expected to be set up immediately, once the home rule bill is passed by the imperial government. It was pointed out that this would serve as an example for all the rest of Ireland, and have a steadying effect by showing the Sinn Feiners that Dublin and the other twenty-six counties could have precisely the same machinery of self-government as Belfast will have for its six counties. There is some agitation for amendments to the financial terms of the home rule bill. Ulster men are opposed to handing over to any Irish body the control of customs and excise. They do not want this privilege for themselves and are determined that it shall not be made available for the rest of Ireland, fearing that it might be used to the detriment of industry in the northern section of the country. Belfast men want more than the £1,000,000 to be granted for setting up its proposed new parliament. They also say that the sum of £15,000,000 which Ireland is to contribute annually to the support of the empire is too high. This would be reduced by about £3,000,000 a year by the annuities now payable to the imperial treasury by Irish farmers

who have purchased their holdings with government advances. This sum is in the future to be divided between the two Irish parliaments. One suggestion has been made that Ireland's contribution to the imperial funds shall be limited to the Irish income tax and super-tax which at present amounts to £10,000,000 or £11,000,000 a year. Outside of Ulster, however, none of these points is being discussed at all. Complete separation and an independent republic is the Sinn Fein policy, while even the moderates demand a government for all Ireland on dominion lines as completely free in finance as Canada. The government's bill does nothing to meet this view and its creation of two separate parliaments in Ireland with equal powers is resented by every section of politicians in the south and west.

New York, Nov. 13.—Advices from Philadelphia state that the head office of the Pennsylvania Railway in that city issued an official denial of a report that plans have been partly consummated for a gigantic transportation and industrial development scheme in Western Canada by the railway in connection with a number of large Canadian corporations. The project was said to include the construction of a new international bridge over the Detroit River, by which the United States railway would enter Canada.

The story of the big deal is reported to have emanated from representatives of the United States Department of Commerce in Ottawa. The Wall

STAGE GOSSIP OF THE WEEK

Interesting Paragraphs From Theatres of Continent

Price Cutting Movement on Foot in New York—Death of Old Canadian Showman—New Plays.

By Ben Deacon. (Canadian Press Correspondent.) New York, November 6.—Where has the New York theatre gone? Or why has he ceased to theatre? This problem is engaging the attention of theatrical managers here at the present time. Undoubtedly there has been a serious slump in the theatrical business. They are no longer "turning 'em away" at the Broadway playhouses. Last season there was hardly a play or a musical show so poor but that it could flaunt the "Standing Room Only" sign at the lobby door; this year at most of the theatres, that sign, beloved of the managerial heart, reposes in some dim corner of the store-room and has not yet seen the light of day.

It appears that there is only one thing wrong with the New York theatrical situation, and that is a lack of audiences. There are plenty of attractions but only a comparatively few of them attract; the producers are active, but the public won't produce. There are some sixty "legitimate" productions from which the public may choose, and a large section of the public, it seems, chooses to stay away from all of them.

This does not mean that the well advertised "Great White Way" is deserted, or that the theatrical profession is in any immediate danger of total extinction through starvation. There is a sufficient number of habitual theatre-goers left in New York, added to the army of transients (including thousands of Canadians) who flock to the playhouses while in the city, to keep the box office employees familiar with the monetary system. It does not mean that many of the habitual playgoers seem to be gradually conquering the habit, and the occasional playgoers are becoming even more occasional. It means that the public is not quite so flush as last season and is spending money more cautiously. It means that theatrical prices have to follow the trail blazed by clothing and sugar in New York, and that trail leads down hill.

The first break in the high prices came this week when the Selwyns reduced the scale at their new Times Square Theatre, where Florence Reed is appearing in "The Mirage." Seats

at that house which formerly sold at \$3.00 may now be purchased at \$2.00. But Canadians who think of coming to New York to get a bargain seat had better plan their trip so that they will not be here on Saturday night. There is one survival of the old scale at the Times Square theatre: top price seats on Saturday nights and holidays will remain at \$4.00. Other managers have so far not evinced any disposition to join in the price-cutting movement. From the office of A. L. Erlanger and Charles Forham, Inc., who control an important share of the theatres here, came the information that no general reduction to the \$2.50 point had been planned so far. Several theatres under the control of this group already have a \$2.50 limit however.

What Erlanger Says. Mr. Erlanger declares the trouble with the New York theatrical business is merely over-production. In a recent interview he said: "Lured by exaggerated stories of the enormous profits made in the business, too many outsiders have entered the field, calling themselves 'producers' and have flooded the market with inferior attractions, and there is no more room for inferiority in the theatre than there is anywhere else, possibly less. This increased competition has been accompanied by a corresponding increase in the salaries of every one employed about a theatre, from the man who opens the carriage doors in front to the stage door-keeper at the back."

Thus Mr. Erlanger has diagnosed the case of the theatre. Meanwhile new shows blossom forth at the rate of three or four per week, and plans are out for several new theatres. Evidently there is not going to be any cutting down of production, or productions, in this industry.

Two new productions were added to the already lengthy list of New York attractions this week. In one "The Prince and the Pauper," William Faversham, a favorite with Canadian audiences, is the star. It is an adaptation by Amelio Rivos of Abby Sage Richardson's dramatization of Mark Twain's famous story. The Prince in the play is Ruth Findley, while Faversham plays Miles Hendon, a role which gives him plenty of opportunity for displaying his ability as an actor of the romantic school. The production is an elaborate one from the scenic point of view and is said to be particularly well staged. The other new show of the week is "The Half Moon," a musical comedy, produced by Charles Dillingham at the Liberty Theatre. It is just a little more tuneful, a little less vulgar, has just as little plot, and is just as amusing as the average mark of the New York musical show.

An old Canadian showman moved off recently. For fifteen years Powers had been trainer of the elephants at the Hippodrome here. He was born in Belleville, Ont., and was fifty years of age. He spent his life as a showman, being secretary and treasurer of the Walter L. Main circus at one time and later with several travelling shows in Canada and the United States before coming to New York. He had a remarkable reputation among animal trainers and was declared to be the only man who ever trained elephants without the use of a hook or whip. One of his most famous exploits was the stopping, single-handed, about ten years ago of an elephant stampeded which originated in The Hippodrome while a rehearsal was in progress.

ADVOCATES GOVERNMENT CONTROL OF LIQUOR. Murdo Cameron Says Nothing More Humiliating Than Unenforceable Law. Regina, Nov. 12.—The first voice in advocacy of government control of liquor since the people of Saskatchewan voted dry was heard this week when Murdo Cameron, M. P. P. for Saskatoon county, and government supporter, suggested the adoption of this course. "Seriously," said Mr. Cameron, "I think that a particular duty rests on those who have no use for liquor in any shape or form, and that duty is to advocate and support measures that will control the use of liquor rather than prohibit it. To my mind there is nothing more humiliating than legislative enactment that cannot be enforced." The speaker found some consolation in the fact that the recent vote would give the province "home rule" in the matter of the liquor business. He stated that the trouble with the old government dispensaries was that they were mismanaged, and he believed that the true solution lay in properly conducted government dispensaries.

OIL FROM SHALES. Sussex Record.—A plant for distilling shale and extracting oil from shale has been installed at Colubrook, St. county. Shale will be tested; products extracted. 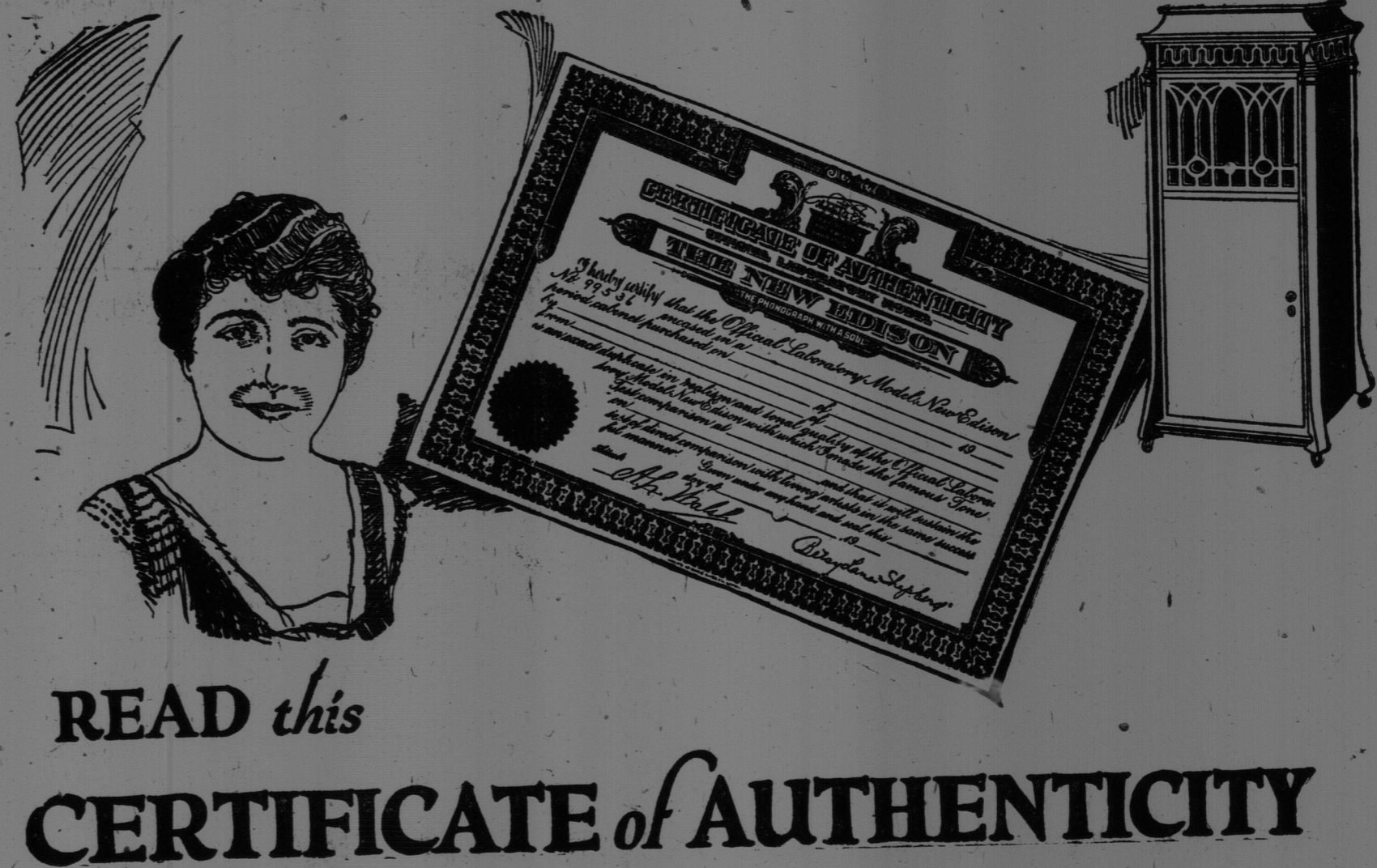
