



(Continued from page 1) On page 4 of the seventh session, it was shown that Aid, McGoldrick had sold a lot of pig-iron to the city. The bills in the hands of the comptroller showed that one day the engineer had purchased from Aid McGoldrick about \$400 worth of pig-iron in eight different purchases of less than \$50 each.

When asked if there was any private advantage to himself or to the engineer by making so many separate purchases, Aid McGoldrick, on page 4 of the seventh session, said: "The lead page 22 of the second session, Mr. Hatfield says that sewers are laid from notes made in the engineer's field book, and that the city might never get paid for these notes, since some of the notes are twelve or thirteen years old, and he is certain that he could not understand them. In railway work, the engineers are not permitted to allow their notes to become more than two months old."

We found that the engineer had a method of fixing responsibility for any blunder or mistake upon himself or any of his engineers. In his evidence on page 9 of the second session, he said that Mr. Hatfield had no written order, but that he delegated authority to him verbally. On page 12 of the evidence taken at the same session, he said that the junction of Smythe street and Mill, the director says he gave verbal orders to the assistant to have the work done in a certain way. On page 15 of the same session, Mr. Hatfield asserts that the engineer instructed him to do this work in a different way. Mr. Hatfield states that he asked for instructions in writing, since the engineer was making him responsible, but the engineer replied that he might as well ask him to put in writing what he was saying to him.

Further down on the same page, the assistant states that he never received orders in writing. On page 21 of the second session, Mr. Hatfield says that it would be more satisfactory to both himself and Mr. Murdoch if instructions were given to him in writing. When he was with the C. P. R. if the chief engineer talked to him in any piece of work and gave verbal orders, in a short time he would receive the same orders in writing.

THE CITY'S HEALTH

The health authorities of the city are to be congratulated on the progress made during the past two years in the enforcement of sanitary regulations, especially in relation to plumbing.

CITY GOVERNMENT

The city council of Ottawa has before it the following resolution:—"That in the opinion of this council the question of doing away with the aldermanic system and substituting therefor an adequate paid commission of five, including the mayor, with the initiative and referendum and recall vested in the people, would be submitted to the electors at the next municipal election, and if carried, that legislation should be at once applied for to make the vote effective."

SIR EDWARD GREY

The rumor that Sir Edward Grey may resign the office of foreign secretary, as a result of the criticism of his course in the Anglo-German affair is probably not well founded. Why should a man who is admitted to have handled a delicate situation with great skill and success be troubled by some ranting radicals? It is absurd to contend that diplomatic negotiations of extreme delicacy should be abandoned from the home.

A French correspondent with the Turkish forces outside of Tripoli tells quite a different story from that which comes from Italian sources. He declares that the Italians in Tripoli are virtually besieged by the Turks, who are under good discipline and in good fighting trim.

Victoria, B. C., is considering a by-law to provide the city with recreation grounds. The Colonist says:—"The point which the ratepayers have to bear in mind in considering the by-law, is a two fold one. One branch of it is whether such grounds are now or are likely soon to be needed, and upon this there can be hardly any question. All progressive cities recognize recreation grounds as an absolute necessity. The second point is whether the necessary grounds can ever be secured more cheaply than at the present. No one will pretend to say that they can be. Therefore it seems to follow that if we are to have such grounds, now is the time to get them."

Commenting on the opening of parliament and the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier threw down the gauntlet of war at the very first opportunity, the Canadian Courier says:—"The old leader still disputes with the new. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the forces behind him believe that Mr. Borden is to Conservatives what Alexander Mackenzie was to Liberals—a one-term leader. They cannot believe that the change is permanent. They refuse to recognize that a new party has permanently seized the reins of government. This is but a repetition of 1873, not of 1896. They are neither discouraged nor disorganized. They will fight as men to whom victory has only been delayed."

In his review of the recent horticultural show in Toronto the Globe of that city says:—"The department of agriculture of the province of New Brunswick has a display of 55 boxes quite near. We are attracted by the unusually dark red coloring of the fruit. Many of the varieties are the same as grown in Ontario, but a few are different. King, Farnese, Wolf River, King McIntosh, Dudley, Bethel and Baxter varieties make up the exhibit. The gentleman in charge hands us a pamphlet, on which we find the following in big type: "Why pay \$1.00 an acre elsewhere when the best of apple lands, with buildings included, can be had for from \$10 to \$25 an acre in New Brunswick, which is but five days from European markets?"

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Arthur J. Gaudet, of Memramcook, has been appointed assistant auditor-general, the post vacated by H. G. Blair. John F. Dryden, former U. S. senator, died last night in Newark, N. J. He was 82 years of age. The Prudential Insurance Co. in 1875. Henry Clay Bessie, jr., before going to the electric chair in Richmond, Va., made a confession that he had killed his wife. He said the circumstances as published were for the most part incorrect, but the fact in itself was true.

A despatch to the Paris Temps yesterday was to the effect that the Turks had regained possession of a large portion of the oasis of Tripoli, and were preventing the Italians extending their front further. It also told of a sortie made upon a detachment of 200 Italians, all of whom were killed. Mrs. Francis O'Shannessy in New York yesterday confessed to having shot her husband, but said she had done so to keep his soul pure, to keep him from another woman. She told a pathetic tale of suffering caused by neglect. The defence in the case is insanity.

At a meeting of the Montreal board of trade yesterday a petition was prepared asking the government that the I. C. R. be made subject to the railways act. Montreal, Nov. 24.—McGill University's five-day whitewash campaign, which opened Monday morning, closed this evening with \$1,500,000 collected and the financial standing of the institution for a time at least secured. Lincoln Centre, Kansas, Nov. 24.—Only two of the defendants in the "Tar Party" case, John Schmidt and Sherrill Clark, were found guilty by a jury reported at 4:30 p. m. this afternoon. The third defendant, A. N. Simms, was found not guilty. The jury had been out some three hours, having started at 11:30 o'clock. London, Nov. 24.—Sir Gilbert Parker left today for Canada via New York. He is a passenger on the Canadian Oceanic.





**INVESTIGATORS REPORT RAPS CIVIC BOARD OF WORKS HARD**

(Continued from page 3.)

whatever to show that he has authority from the engineer for anything he does in the way of signing requisitions in case of emergency, or anything of that kind.

6. We found that all the valuable plans of the city, relating to this department, are exposed in wooden drawers, with no protection in case of fire. In his evidence on page 3 of the first session the engineer admits that all these plans would probably be destroyed in case of fire and that money could not reproduce them, and yet he has never drawn the attention of the council to this serious state of affairs.

7. We found that there is no accurate method of accounting for the cost of any particular work done on Dock street, as evidenced on page 10 of the third session, says that when anything is left over from one job it is taken from the account of another, in his evidence on page 8 of the fourth session, says "There is no method of determining the cost of any particular work, outside of the retaining walls," and, since it has been brought out in previous evidence that no accurate account can be kept of the cost of even retaining walls.

8. We found great lack of economy in the director's methods of carrying on the city public works. On page 4 of the third session Mr. Doig, when being questioned as to the slow progress made on Dock street, stated that this was due to the disadvantage at which the work was carried on the railway viaduct. He said that he suggested to the engineer a dozen times to take up the rails, and in his own evidence, the engineer stated that work cost three times more than it would have if the rails had been taken up. Mr. Doig said that the work would not have cost half as much if the rails had been stopped when they were at the viaduct. Mr. Doig further says that the traffic would have been interrupted only for a few days, and that it would have cost 100 feet at a time and says he suggested this to the engineer, but his suggestion was disregarded. Again Mr. Doig says, on page 7 of the third session, that he reported to the engineer a mistake he had made in the pavement on the west side of Dock street before the pipes was laid there, and further, that if the work had been undertaken a week or so in advance of the contractors, who were laying the pavement, the work could have been done much cheaper and that twenty men working at night are not worth four men in the day time.

Mr. Winchester, in his evidence on page 6 of the fourth session, in answering the queries re the tearing up of the block pavement put down last year on Prince William street and the repaving it with new blocks this year, said that the work was not faulty; that he would not have taken it up of his own initiative but took it up by the engineer's orders. The cost of blocking those 80 yards on Prince William street in 1910 was \$12,282.20 and of re-blocking it in 1911 was \$23,223.00 and for relaying the old blocks on Market square \$28,238.

Mr. Winchester in vogue a poor system of reporting to the engineer. Mr. Winchester in his evidence on page 8 of the fourth session, says that he has no need of the foreman waiting time going to the engineer's office. They could give reports in person, but that the engineer will not stand for this method of reporting. On page 4 of the second session the engineer says that the street superintendents and foremen do not take orders from each other. "They must come to me for orders and I keep in touch with them." Mr. Goodrich in his evidence, page 13 of the fourth session, says he reports to the engineer every morning or night instead of 10 o'clock. In one case he says he leaves his report at the water office and at the other places at the street; but other evidence shows that in a great many cases he goes to the engineer's office.

Mr. Berry, in his evidence, page 4, 5th session, says that he reports every day to the engineer between 9 and 10 o'clock. He said, "Bring it myself." When asked if he could send his report every morning or night instead of 10 o'clock he said, "Today's report does not go in until tomorrow morning." Sometimes he sends his report through Mr. Winchester, but comes three or four times a week himself. When asked if he could not mail it the night before he said "Yes."

Mr. Thompson, of the West Side, in his evidence on page 8 of the 5th session, said that he used to report every day to the engineer, by coming over to the engineer's office about 10 o'clock, but on account of protests from the aldermen, he now sends a man to convey his report. This takes about one hour a day and he sends his report through Mr. Winchester, a clerk of the work going on throughout the city.

**Nature of Reports.**

When asked the nature of these reports, Mr. Winchester, seen by the committee on page 1 and 2 of the 6th session, showed his book, in which he keeps a duplicate of reports given to the engineer. This book shows that the city had a team hired from a man named Seely, hauling stone from the crusher. He was paid by the day. The book Mr. Winchester shows that in one day he hauled two loads, in another three and another day only one. When asked what this man was doing the remainder of the day that he only hauled one load, Mr. Winchester could not give a satisfactory answer, but thought he might be put to work somewhere on the streets. When asked if the teamsters could give to the foreman of the crusher as authority for receiving the stone, for certain purposes, and to the foreman of the street where they delivered it, so that a perfect check could be kept upon the stone the number of loads hauled by a certain team he said "No, just send them." And so it is evident that the reporting system is a very ineffective check upon the workmen as well as very expensive as regards the workmen's time.

10. We found that much of the men's time is wasted in coming to the chamberlain's office to receive their pay. From all over the east side of the city, men come to the chamberlain's office to receive their pay. In his testimony on page 12 of the fourth session, Mr. Goodrich says: "They are supposed to come before five o'clock and in order to do this, they have to leave their work at four o'clock. Thus an average of two days' service is lost to the city every two weeks. Men working in the North End have to leave their work at 4:30 to get to the chamberlain's office before five, and in the opinion of the committee, much more than two days' per week would be lost on this account."

11. We found contractors are permitted to take charge of the city's sidewalks and keep them obstructed with piles of stone and apparently without any protest from the director.

NOTED IN WAR, ENDS CAREER AS MURDERER
After Sensational Trial, Capt. Meynier Gets Ten Year Sentence

CHOKED WOMAN TO DEATH
Fled After Crime, Became Tramp Only to Weary of it All And Give Himself up—Relations of France and Spain

(Times Special Correspondence.)
Paris, Nov. 23.—A sensational murder trial has taken place in the Seine assize court here, where Captain Meynier, a graduate of the Ecole Polytechnique, and at one time a brilliant officer in the colonial artillery, was called before the jury to answer the charge of having caused the death of Madame Delvigne, who he described as his bride and who described herself as the Baroness d'Ambrioucourt.

Domestic troubles were his lot. Divorce followed upon a marriage, and he was temporarily struck off the active list. He engaged in some commercial ventures and failed, and in 1904 was retired from the army altogether. The reason in each case was the precarious state of his health.

When in that state he made the acquaintance of a very handsome woman, Madame Delvigne, who had once been Madame Olivier, but who was divorced from her husband. The divorced husband and the divorced Madame Delvigne seemed attached to each other. When she assumed the name of La Baronne d'Ambrioucourt it was natural for all who knew her to accept that designation, and she was called by no other name.

## ADVISES NEW BRUNSWICK TO WAKE UP AND GET SHARE OF NEW CANADIAN SETTLERS

### Colonel Lamb of Salvation Army, Here to See About 12,000 Newcomers, Talks Plainly About Position of Province in Matter

Colonel D. C. Lamb, immigration commissioner of the Salvation Army, with headquarters in London, arrived here today from England on the S. S. Empress of Britain. His mission in this country is to make arrangements for the coming of Salvation Army immigrants this season. In conversation with a "Times" reporter, Colonel Lamb said that the army expected to bring out about 12,000 immigrants during the season, and that they would mostly all go to Western points. "You people here in New Brunswick are altogether too slow," he said. "Why, you don't try at all to interest the immigrant to stay in your province, but you do all you can to shove them off to the west. No wonder your census figures show a decline. If you would only get busy and induce some of them to stay east, why you would be much further advanced than you are at the present time."

"Australia is making a great bid for the old country; immigrants at the present time and during the last couple of years has secured about 25,000. This, of course, is a distinct loss to Canada. The immigrants that are coming out to this country nowadays are, on the whole, a most desirable class of people, and would make excellent citizens. Tell your people to get busy and interest themselves in the matter. You have the opportunities here, the lands, farms, etc., but hardly anyone knows of them but yourselves. Wake up, before it is too late."

Colonel Lamb will leave tonight for Portland, Me., to look into matters there after which he will go to Ottawa to interview the Dominion Government regarding immigration work, paying particular attention to the maritime provinces. He expects to return to the old country about Christmas time.


